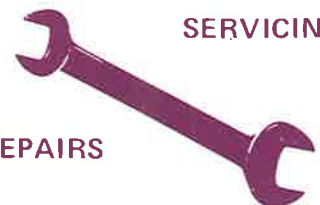

Do you get fed up with the bad news that dominates our headlines - hunger and poverty unemployment the arms race?

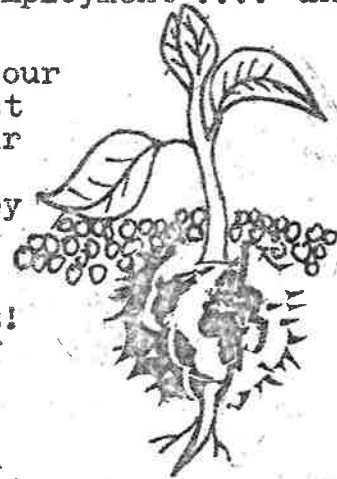
There is good news too! All over our planet, people are taking a stand against poverty, oppression, fear; taking their future into their own hands; planting seeds of hope, where they are and as they can.

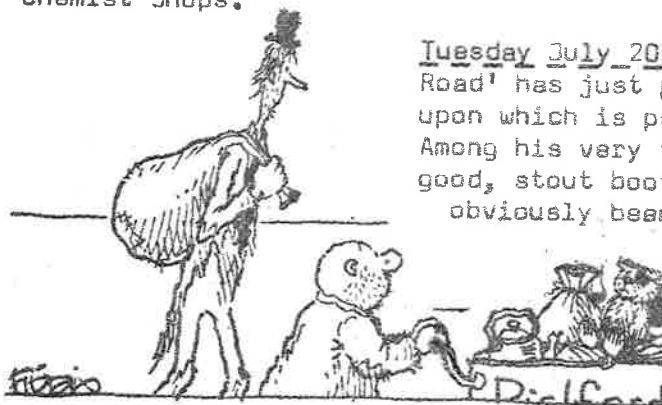
EXCERPTS FROM A COUNTRY DIARY by Peter Trundle

Saturday 19th. June Today whilst digging in the garden I found an old clay pipe of the type that could be bought in a public house some eighty years ago for as little as half an old penny.

If you live in an old property you may have a rubbish dump at the bottom of your garden. Many years ago, before the Council collected

your refuse every Tuesday morning, most householders had to make their own provision for the disposal of unwanted garbage. This usually took the form of a dump at the bottom of the garden. There are a number of signs that indicate the location of such a dump, one being an abundance of stinging nettles. Many treasures of local historical interest can be found, from ginger beer bottles from the local manufacturers, Normans and Minnets, to hair tonics and toothpastes from the Ecclestone Chemist Shops.



Tuesday July 20thA 'Gentleman of the Road' has just passed by, pushing a bicycle upon which is perched a large, battered case. Among his very few possessions is a pair of good, stout boots and a long raincoat that has obviously been put to good use during the last few days of our typical 'English Summer'. But he has a cheerful smile upon his face, and although his lifestyle does not conform with what is considered to be normal, I have a

feeling that in this materialistic world, perhaps somewhere, there is a lesson to be learned?

Methodist

120 people attended the Methodist Garden Party at the home of Mr and Mrs Fred Boyd on Saturday 21st August 1982. The programme of games, entertainment and barbeque on a pleasant summer's evening was enjoyed by all. A sum of £95 was raised for a missionary agricultural project in Indonesia.

From The Revd Harold Fisher:

My previous contributions on the subject of Voluntary Euthanasia and its legalisation will have left you in little doubt regarding my views. My misgivings are so serious that I could not support it, but I have deep sympathies with the compassionate motives which lie behind most of the advocacy it receives. Therefore in concluding my observations on this important issue I offer thoughts on two areas of relevant deep concern.

First, I question the wisdom and appropriateness of those medical and surgical treatments and procedures which can achieve no more than the prolongation of mere physical existence with a very poor quality of life. I am not suggesting that patients for whom such treatment is questionable should, instead, have their lives deliberately terminated. Certainly not. But I am saying that some situations do occur, not infrequently, where medical or surgical intervention should be seriously questioned because (certainly from the Christian viewpoint) death holds out better prospects than a grossly poor

existence. Examples of such situations are: (i) "automatic" surgery on all children born with spina bifida without regard to the severity of predictable handicaps; (ii) the mechanical prolonging of life in patients where disease, disorder or injury has resulted in permanent loss of consciousness and of response to either external or internal stimuli; (iii) resuscitation of patients whose prospects are predictably only those of increasing weakness and pain and then final collapse. Other examples could be given.

It seems to me that in these and parallel circumstances the approach of physical death, though very sad, is fitting and (often) merciful. Convincing reasons are not always given to justify intervention to delay death, which in some cases comes as a friend, so to speak. And the Christian should see death as God's last act of healing in my view.

Second, Christianity takes a very high view of man. He is made for unique fellowship with God, beginning in this life and continuing after death. Having an eternal quality and dimension in his life, death is seen in a very different light, and it is a transitional event in life, not the end of everything for him. Man is called and equipped by God to be His steward on the earth and to act responsibly in respect for and use of all the gifts of creation, including those made available through science and technology; above all to act responsibly towards his fellow man. And God has set forth in Jesus Christ His immeasurable love for suffering, sinful and needy mankind and requires us to exercise Christ's compassionate love and His ministry for the healing of all the hurts of men.

The Christian view of man must surely call for far more adequate and appropriate care for the terminally ill than our splendid, but over-worked and over-stretched Health Service can at present provide. And this calls not only for additional Government resources but also for more energetic interest and service from the churches and from society as a whole.

More well-informed and relevant support can and should be given to the families of the terminally ill and to families recently bereaved. Here, surely, is a most fitting area for the wise and sensitive compassion of Christ to be exercised by His Body, the Church. It is not, perhaps, more than a few people who could properly fulfil this ministry. But if it is to be done well and for all who desire it, then there is need for more than the Clergy to do it.

Guideline procedures, consultations, etc. are doubtless desirable, wherever possible, to determine if and how intervention should take place in the kind of cases mentioned in my second paragraph. The Christian understanding of man has special contributions to make in establishing those guidelines.

Although there was only a week's notice of the event, it must be a measure of Fr Tim's popularity that a couple of hundred people arrived at church from as far afield as Waltham Cross and Puckeridge. Everybody seemed to know everyone else; the musicians present congregated together, and provided an excellent accompaniment to the enthusiastic singing. The whole service was most moving as, from Fr Tim downwards, we were all pleased to be together again. At one stage of the Mass, when the sign of peace was exchanged, there was such a commotion as the congregation bustled around greeting long lost friends that the relatively staid members of the resident Redemptionist community were quite shocked!

After Mass, everyone shared a picnic in the beautiful church grounds. Although Mass started at 12.30, the Stansted contingent had to leave the picnic long before it was over in order to arrive at St Theresa's for the Baptism of Joseph Michael Warnett and Nicholas James Mackay. Once again the church was full of happy singing people, with a large proportion of children. The Christening service was lovely, as we have had a number of births recently, and there were loads of gorgeous babies and toddlers in church. Some of the musicians had come from St Joseph's to play at St Theresa's. Baby Joseph's sisters, Hannah and Rachel, sang and played in the choir, and also his mother, Mary. The two fathers, Hamish Mackay and Colin Warnett, read the Bible excerpts.

The joy manifest there was similar to that shown at the reunion. At both services there was a wonderful feeling of a loving, sharing, caring community, that infected all who attended them.

A SAD FAREWELL

The parishioners of St Theresa's Church (and St Anthony's, Henham) have received a great shock. Our parish priest has been asked by the Bishop to take over the large parish of Dagenham.

Fr Joe Tuohy came to Stansted early in 1975 and during his seven years here we have seen great growth in the parish and an active participation in ecumenical events and projects such as THE LINK. We are all very sad to lose him and pray that God will help him in his new and very challenging position.

We know that Fr Tuohy is also very sorry to leave us but he takes with him the knowledge that he has achieved much in Stansted and has been a true father and friend to his parish family and the wider community of the village.

Society of Friends

In October we have One World Week and the Week of Prayer for World Peace, both from 18th to 25th, and Disarmament Week, 24th to 30th.

What a mockery it is to talk of "One World", a world which is spending over £300 billions a year, more than the entire income of half its population, on military activities, while hundreds of millions are malnourished, illiterate, have little or no access to medical services, and 250 million children have no schooling. The Brandt report showed what could be done with money wasted in stockpiling arms. One half of one percent of one year's military expenditure would buy all the farm equipment needed to increase food production and make the food-deficit countries self sufficient by 1990. In a 10-year programme which succeeded in eliminating small pox from the whole world, the World Health Organisation spent less than the cost of one modern strategic bomber; at present the malaria eradication programme is held up for lack of funds - half a day's military expenditure would suffice to complete it. Where is our sense of values?

A group of experts appointed by the UN Secretary General has completed a three-year study on "The Relationship between Disarmament and Development". They have concluded that "the world can either continue to pursue the arms race with characteristic vigour or move towards a more stable social and economic development it cannot do both." The arms race and development are incompatible. We must, if we are to "recognise our responsibility to care for and share the world's

resources" as we are called to do in One World Week, work ceaselessly for disarmament.

The Second Special Session on Disarmament was a failure as far as disarmament was concerned - no measure for disarmament could be agreed. But it did achieve something - and it was no mean achievement - it agreed by consensus on the guide lines for a UN World Disarmament Campaign, in which non-governmental organisations as well as governments have a vital role. No, not collecting more signatures but informing and educating people all over the world about the unbiased facts and dangers of the arms race, and generating public understanding of our perilous predicament. Frank Barnaby, a former Director of SIPRI, the Swedish International Peace Research Institute, in a paper written last year for the Bradford School of Peace Studies said: "the main, perhaps the only hope for the future is that people will learn the facts in time if people knew the truth about the nuclear arms race, they would insist on action by political leaders to stop this insanity. We will avoid nuclear disaster only if the public protest in time."

So the UN World Disarmament Campaign has been born only just in time. Although SSD II was a disappointment, we must not be discouraged, must not give up. Plans are afoot now in London for a multi-organisational drive for a "nuclear freeze", a campaign which started in America and was the object of the massive public demonstration in New York during the Special Session and is still gathering strength. You will hear more of this in Disarmament Week.

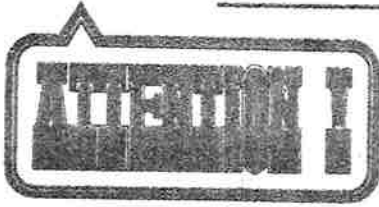

If 100 people would make a covenant of £50 a year (£4 per month) we would almost reach our target. There is much more to diamonds than this! After the meeting everyone said how much they had enjoyed themselves.
