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

VISIT TO INDIA 1983

My husband and I were invited to India in repayment for his help with a foundry problem. The firm manufactures shock absorbers and is rapidly expanding. This visit proved to be a most enjoyable trip. But it must be understood that we had barely three weeks and were escorted and entertained throughout by members of this company all of whom worked in a management capacity. Metallurgist, mechanical engineer, accountant and so on. They represent a minority of the Indian population but are a growth point of the economy. Their living standard is much lower than UK - few cars, TVs etc.

We went first to Delhi where we were carefully and courteously cared for in the Company Guest House. The Chairman and Founder is a keen horticulturalist and a nursery is kept in Kashmir employing quite a large number of people in providing plants for the sites of the various factories. It was noticeable that the working environment of the shop floor employees was much better than the general housing; pay much lower than in UK.

Our hosts, anxious to show us as much of their culture and history as possible in so short a time, had arranged a sightseeing journey. Beginning at Agra with the Taj Mahal we made our way to Jaipur, Oudiapur, the Ajanta and Ellan Caves by road, plane and train. We saw truly wonderful architecture, paintings and mosaics and learned a lot about Moguls and Rajpurs!

The first impression of India was smell - very pervasive and made up of burning dung fuel and joss sticks.

The next impression was the amazing number of people. Even the wide roads of New Delhi were crammed with ramshackle 'buses, taxis, gaily painted trucks, cycles, rickshaws and scooters while pedestrians and cows wander about. Survival is of the strongest wills and loudest horns. Everywhere were people busy with living doing all their chores, hugger mugger in full view of all.

Our last week was spent in Nasik where my husband worked in the factory and found the plant most efficient and competently run. Every evening we were taken to see the local

sights, meet families and eat local dishes. The old town tumbles down to the river Godavari and was colourful with vegetable market, bazaar and people washing clothes. We were fortunate in going to meet someone's aged relatives living in we were served tea, Indian style - leaves, milk and sugar boiled together. We saw several other Temples, ancient and very new.

We were aware that we were not able to see the "Real India" of the villages away from main roads. Our hosts explained that in spite of growing industrial production and the "Green Revolution" due to irrigation there were many problems to

The last day we were in Bombay. We visited the Gandhi Museum. His room is left just as he used it.

During our stay we only met Hindus and Sikhs and obviously had a superficial peep. There are fourteen main languages and three hundred dialects so there is a great deal more to learn about this wonderful country.

THE RED CROSS

What do you think of when the Red Cross is mentioned?

Do you think of relief in areas devasted by earthquakes; flood disasters; help for the victims of war, or Prisoner of War Parcels, or help for the undernourished in the third world? All these are areas where the Red Cross helps overseas, but in fact the Red Cross is also very active in Stansted.

We try to fill in gaps left by the official bodies, and as a voluntary service we are able to be more flexible and to give help more quickly. Some of you will already know of our work, but for those who don't, here are a few of the things we do locally. We lend medical equipment such as commodes, wheelchairs etc. and if possible they are delivered on the day they are requested, and left with the patient until the Social Services or the Health Department can replace them with their aids.

We also have a Physiotherapy service which the Doctors may request for the housebound. A trained physiotherapist will give up to six treatments free of charge in a patient's own home; this costs Uttlesford Red Cross approximately £3,000 per year to pay the physiotherapists for their work and travelling expenses.

Another Red Cross service is the Toy Library for Handicapped children which is housed in the canteen of the Peter Kirk School. This opens every Thursday afternoon from 2.00 to 4.00 pm in term time, and it is manned by volunteers who give out and check back the toys just as in a book library. The toys are available to any family with a handicapped child who is in travelling distance of Stansted. Again, we raise money locally to buy the toys.

As you will see from just those three activities we are quite busy here, apart from visiting and arranging holidays for the infirm, plus answering all sorts of queries!

In May we shall be supporting Red Cross Week (the first week in May) and this money will help to run the Essex Red Cross, but we in Uttlesford are responsible for raising our own money for all our own services.

If you are interested in helping with this fund raising would you like to join a Member Group in Stansted which would be primarily for this purpose — but we would be glad to use any other talents you have. We always welcome volunteers for the Toy Library and will certainly need a lot of collectors for Red Cross Week.

STANSTED MOUNTFITCHET WINDMILL

The new season of Open Days will begin on Easter Sunday 3rd April and on Easter Monday the Grand Draw will take place at 4.00 pm in the Mill. From then, the Mill will be open on the first Sunday of each month from April to October, all Sundays in August and all Bank Holiday Mondays from 2.30 pm until 7.00 pm.

It should be noted that the Mill is particularly well preserved, having most of its internal equipment intact. This is partly the result of prudent action taken by the Parish Council Windmill Committee and "The Stansted Millers".

The observant amongst us will have noticed that the sails have gradually been disappearing over the last 18 months. This is not some mysterious apparition, but the result, initially, of storm damage which caused a sail to fall. The remaining sails were later removed as they also were in a dangerous condition and more recently the stocks have been removed for treatment against decay. Soon we hope to have the stocks refitted together with new sails. However the cost of these repairs, together with expenses incurred in reinforcing certain floors, is likely to be in the order of £10,000.

As a scheduled building we are of course eligible for a grant from the Department of the Environment towards part of these costs, but it is likely that we will still have to raise £5,000, and to this end an appeal fund was set up. At the time of writing the fund amounts to approximately £600 so keep buying those raffle tickets and tea towels.

We must thank the people who have already made contributions in a variety of ways, from direct cash donations and the donation of raffle prizes to the use of their home for coffee mornings. If anyone wishes to help in any way then they should contact either myself (BS 814360) or Mrs Peggy Honour (BS 813160) who is co-ordinating the appeal.

The Stansted Millers are always pleased to receive new members to assist both with minor (or dare I say 'run of the mill') maintenance items and for manning (personning?) the Mill on Open Days. This is not an arduous task and just involves one or perhaps a couple of two-hour sessions during the season, either to take money at the door and sell guide books etc. or to provide basic guidance to visitors. A prior teach-in can be arranged to provide the basic knowledge required.
