

STANSTED - AS IT WAS

MEMORIES

We moved to Stansted Mountfitchet from London in 1910. A quiet small willago, rather dull we thought, but oh dear how wrong we were. It was peaceful not quiet, so friendly and one of the largest villages in Essex.

It was surrounded by large houses and farms where the "Gentry", as they were called, lived who were friends to all. The village itself was divided in two by Chapel Hill, at the top being Cambridge Road, built by the Romans. This was the heart and hub of the village. The Doctor's surgery was there. He always patted you on the heed and popped a sweet into your The taxidermist, whose shop fascingted all the children with its stuffed animals and birds. The clock maker's shop. He went round to all the big houses winding the clocks every week. Joey Ticker, we all called him. We never knew his real name. Then the saddler's shop where the harness, reins and whips were made, which smalt of lovely leather and soap when you went in for leather boot laces. He went round in a pony and trap to all the farms to collect the things that needed repairing and sometimes for a treat he would take some of us children with him. The cross roads where the fountain stands was built to commemorate Queen Victoria's Dismond In those days there was a chained iron oup and water, and also a trough where the drovers and the cattle refreshed themselves as they came from Bishop's Stortford Cattle Market, the men with long sticks prodding the cattle along.

Over the cross roads to the village stores. This was a large busy store where you could get everything you could possibly want. They run a harvest and Christans club and after hervest had been gathered in and hervest money pedd to the workers, the whole femily would go to "Greens Stores" and be fitted out from top to too. Then the benk who shovelied and weighed up golden soversigns without a thought of bank robbers. The cycle shop that built the cycles for the workers and had the first car in Stansted. The lovely chins and toy shop with the busy weavers of baskets etc. at the back of it. Mr. Perry was the weaver and his daughter was a member of the newly started Women's Institute and his grand-daughter is still a member. Mr. Perry gathered the osiers from the watermill where the water-cress beds were. Then the busy wheelwright with his smith; shop.

Down Chapel Hill - first the fire station where the horse had to be caught before they could start out to the fire. The Fost Office; the Chemist's shop who made pills, cough nixture and also tasted your eyes. The Windmill and the recreation ground just off the hill - the Mill belonged to Lord Blyth. The recreation field for the children was given by Lord Blyth. The nost popular place and the delight to all was the village blackshit. There were always a crowd of children gazing over the bottom half of the smithy's door watching the huge fire, sparks flying as the smithy's door the red hot shoes while the horse waited to be shod.

Lower Street, the lower and of the village, had the London North Eastern railway station and the pany and treps waiting to take people home. The engine yard where they had huge steam engines with beautiful peliabed brass all over them, whistling and puffing out black smoke as they chuffed along the road to the farms. The shop that made pork sawages and the little baker's shop with its open fire and big ovens that made lovely hot Huffers.

Around those three roads were the houses of the workers. The children played in the fields and on the recreation ground or in the road - skipping, hoops, tops, hop sooth, eigarette cards. But when the children on the top road saw the Royal Mail van with the two lovely horses racing to the post office, and the children from Lower End heard the evening train whistle, all knew it was time for home where the copper was hot and the that brought into the scullary for our nightly wash. Then hair brushed end in night attire, we would listen to mother reading a chapter of Swiss Family Robinson or The Secret Garden.

There were lovely sweet shops dotted about everywhere in front rooms; little shops all with rows of bottles full of sweets, and counters full of open boxes of sweets - not one wrapped or covered in any way, but all were delicious.

The lemp lighter, with his long pole, lit gas lamps.

The milkman who came to the door, poured milk out of a measure into your jug. The road men had a sack and a stick with a nail at the bottom to pick up the litter.

Our spiritual needs were well looked after with two Churches, three Chapels, big Sunday Schools. Sunday School anniversary and treat were a highlight, when we were taken out to a farm in a hay-waggon for tea and given a bag of sweets and a sixpence at the end. Two schools "British" and "Church" saw to our education.

The great event of the whole year was May Day when the Fair came to the village, or rather when the whole village went to the Fair. Swings, roundsbouts, stalls of rock, darts, hoop-la, all gaily pained, and the huge steam engine that made the coloured lights and the music that could be heard all over Stansted. Mum, dad and the whole family went together, the most exciting time of the whole year.

Memories - Ism't it good that, as you grow older, you only remember the happy times.

MOUNTFITCHET MACHINE KNITTING CLUB

Machine knitting is not so much a hobby as a disease, and once you have caught it, it tends to be progressive and very difficult to cure. (Not that many of us want to be cured!)

Our club in Stansted has been knitting for just over a year now. Our members come not only from Stansted, but Stortford, Harlow, Hatfield Heath, Manuden and other surrounding villages, and ages range from teenagers to grandparents. Some of our members are beginners, using old machines, others have all the latest gadgets, but most are in the middle. Some knit for profit, but most knit for family and fun. The only qualification needed is an interest in knitting by machine.

We meet twice a month. The first Wednesday, when we have a qualified instructor; and the Thursday after the third Wednesday, when we compare notes amongst ourselves. Each meeting has a theme, e.g. Multicoloured knitting (Fairisle, pictures, stripes etc.) using up odd scraps of yarn, designing your own patterns, etc. There is a "wool shop" where we can buy yarn for as little as 10p per ounce, and of course, we always have a "cuppa" and a biscuit.

Most of us have found that the best way to improve our knitting is to compare notes with fellow enthusiasts. The club encourages us to be more adventurous, and with adventure comes spectacular successes - lovely knitted dresses with a soft drape that only knitting can give, individual sweaters that could cost £100 upwards in the shops, or even curtains or bedspreads. But we can also get spectacular disasters - when the club members can give genuine sympathy and a few helpful suggestions to put it right.

Although minimal at the moment, we are trying to build up a library of useful books and gadgets which can be borrowed by club.members.



We pray that it will be richly blessed by God and that it will be begun, continued and fulfilled in mutual love, trust and a single-minded desire to glorify God and serve His Kingdom in Stansted. We invite our fellow-Christians and, indeed all praying people in our village to pray for God's blessings to be known and His will to be done in this matter.

It may be that this venture will be the beginning of wider and more embracing attempts to find closer Christian relationships at the "grass roots" level in Stansted. We rejoice in the very good relationships we already have between all the churches, but it may be that God has yet fuller relationships in store for us here. At least we need to be sensitive to any promptings His Spirit may give us.

After much hard work and worry we are glad to be able to share our pleasure at a Meeting House restored, if not to glory, to coundness and strength.

The woodwork of our Moeting House had been in bad condition for some time - that much we knew. What we had not realized was just how badly it had deteriorated and what a huge amount of work needed doing to put it all right. Investigations showed the problem to be just as alarming as we feared - if not more so! We knew we were to be faced with a huge bill but it was only when work actually started on replacing the timber that the extent of our problems were revosaled.

Our main problem (apart from the obvious one of money) proved to be finding a builder with the necessary expertise who was willing and able to undertake and commence the work before another winter set in. A further concern was to ensure the people who use the building during the week should not be too inconvenienced by the building-works going on around them. Further problems cropped up as the work proceeded in that our big sliding doors proved to be unsound, unsafe and not up to the Regulations - then we realised all the new wood would need painting and that

some of our electrical wiring, previously hidden behind panels, had become uneare ... and so on.

That ALL these problems have been solved fills us with gladness and we want to say "Thank You" as follows (it sounds like "The House that Jack Built" - but it is our Meeting House that has been rebuilt) -

To Elliott-Leyford Limited the firm who restored the woodwork and also restored our faith in Builders. They came, they saw and they estimated - they arrived on time, at the time they said they would. They worked and told us exactly, at every stage, just what we were up against and everyone who worked on site was helpful, co-operative and extremely efficient.

To David Martin, our Surveyor who advised, who patiently explained and who kept his eye not only on the building works but on our worries and conserns - truly we could not have done without his skilful guidance.


The Playgroup - "Thank You" to overyone here for without your help and oc-operation when windows were taken out, when building works cluttered up your play space and when workmen were 'in and out' - the job would have taken so much longer.

To our Methodist Friends, who share our Moeting House for their concern, their practical help and encouragement and their financial support - we are grateful and we know you share our delight at the final results.


VICAR'S NOTES

I write after the first week of the Partners in Planning exercise and can say that the planning team are delighted that to date nearly 80 people have taken part and have enjoyed meeting together and discussing the future of our Church. Later we shall publish the results of our thinking and planning.

Lent always presents us with an opportunity to take stock of our Christian
life and this year, on Monday 14 February
at 8.00 pm in St John's we are having a
short service of penance and forgiveness. The small group that planned the
Lenten programme suggested that before
Lent begins it would good to have a time
in church to reflect and to seek God's
forgiveness together. It could also be
a time when we plan our Lent rules. I
hope you will be there. Other details
of our Lent programme are set out else-

where but I would like to mention the sermons on Sunday mornings.

We have invited four preachers to come to the Family Communion and share with us their thoughts on 'Christian Concerns'. On Sunday 20th February Canon Edward Finch, who is Director of the Department of Mission is speaking on 'Poverty in Britain'. At the Diocesan Synod Meeting on 16th October last year the Synod passed overwhelmingly the following resolution:

"This Synod calls on the Church in the diocese to discover and stand beside the poor as a prime duty of Christian discipleship."

Canon Finch has prepared a document on this subject and I am pleased he is able to come and share his thinking with us.

Then on Sunday 27th February Sister Dorsen Boylan, a Roman Catholic sister who is a Canoness of it Augustine's Community, is coming to speak on her work in East London in a multi-racial situation. She has been working in a project called ZEBRA which is bringing together black and white Christians. Her subject is "Christ in a Multi-Racial Society". 
YOUTH VIGIL

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
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
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
