



JUSTICE AND PEACE IN THE BRENTWOOD DIOCESE



The aim of any Justice and Peace Commission is to replace the poverty and violence of this world with the justice and peace of the Gospels.

There has always been poverty and violence in the world because of human greed, selfishness and insecurity. Poverty and violence are not two big problems but million of little ones, and they are overcome - or not by millions of little people like you and me and the way we react to one another and to the situations we meet in our daily lives.

As one of the "millions of little people" I was present at the inauguration of the new Diocesan Commission for Justice and Peace at Brentwood last month

The atmosphere inside the packed cathedral was beyond description - excitement at the culmination of months of preparation combined with a strong sense of silent fellowship as we listened to the familiar words of peace in the Mass - words which took on a special meaning that day.

In his homily the Bishop emphasised two aspects of justice and peace. He spoke first about the need for every individual to uproot the seeds of hostility and agression within himself, seeds which, when allowed to flourish, develop into national conflict. These personal inclinations must be replaced by a calm acceptance of God's will and a real love of all mankind, a sort of inner peace, before we can work for peace in the world.

Bishop McMahon then considered the quandary that many Christians face, how can the aims of justice and peace be best achieved? Certain controversial issues, such as the nuclear deterrent, unilateral or multilateral disarmament, the transfer of money to the Third World, could not be simply resolved. All Christians must follow their own consciences but their decision must be based on morality not on political or national interests.

The solemnity of the rite of commissioning which followed the homily was carried into the Consecration as over thirty concelebrating priests joined the Bishop around the altar and later moved throughout the cathedral to administer the Sacrament.

At the end of the Mass, after receiving the Bishop's blessing, the whole congregation was asked to make three commitments:-

- 1) to pray for the success of the Commission
- 2) to seek the inner peace, the state of mind described by the Bishop
- 3) to work for the establishment of a justice and peace group in every parish.

There are many people in Stansted who are working for justice and peace in their own particular way, either individually or in groups. If there is a need for a specifically named Justice and Peace Group, I believe that it should be ecumenical. I would be hterested in Link readers opinions on this subject.

A QUAKER IN THE COUNTRYSIDE.

"Nature needs man that she may attain a richer and more refined being; man needs nature not only that he may live but see through her into the unfathomable mystery and miracle of creation."

H J Massingham An Englishmans Year. 1948.

It comes as no surprise to anyone with an interest in the countryside that the living landscape, which perhaps we take too much for granted, has been formed and changed by man over many thousands of years. Over the last fifty years the landscape has changed as mixed farming declines and is replaced by more specialised arable farms, a fact which Massingham much regretted in his time. However, the scale and rate of change are unprecedented in the history

As Bridleways Project Officer I am responsible for over 60 miles of bridleways and green lanes in the rural part of North and East Hertfordshire. The project, which started in September 1981, is sponsored by Hertfordshire County Council and the Countryside Commission, and employs only one member of staff. The bulk of the practical work is carried out by volunteers, students, community service offenders and more recently a three-man community programme team has been set up giving some of the long term unemployed the chance of a job.

The aims of the project are simply to provide useable routes in the countryside for walkers and horse-riders whilst also providing opportunities for wildlife and landscape improvements. The project has already opened up many blocked routes, provided bridges over ditches and streams, planted

trees where the elms have succembed to Dutch Elm disease, and waymarked routes.

These bridleways and green lanes have become important features as many of the hedgerows and trees have been removed. They provide a useful refuge for withing to act as 'corridors' allowing animals such as deer to move safely in the countryside. In addition they break up the landscape which night otherwise be a barron archie preirie, so common nowadays in parts of East Amelia.

All in all the project continues to carry out a number of small improvements which when accommissed over time should make a significant contribution to conserving the country-side, its wildlife and landscape so that many might enjoy its beauty in the Aubure.

at our recent ACM I quoted from a book published in 1895 called In a Cloucestershire Garden and written by one Canon blacombe. He was the vicar of Bitten, noar Bristol, as was his father before him. The good Canon served the parish for 65 years, until his death at the age of 94. Pather and son served successively for a total of 99 years! Canon served successively for a total of 99 years! Canon sallacombe had then to know and hove his garden well. These are the words I globed; from the Gerden in Decomber:

"... There is no menth in the year in which some, or indeed many, good flowers cannot be enjoyed. By own experience has been that a garden is a constant pleasure, and that the pleasure does not depend upon unbroken success. There will be many failures and treatment disappointments; there will be losses, smellines of the flowers and fruits, and sometimes of the entire plants; there will be killing frosts, and long drugsts, and unfaithly secons; but the true gardener takes all these as necessary parts of his work - 'minds quiet and contented take', or may take, than all as necessary parts of the pleasures of his garden. That no season is altogether barren of pleasures.

There is a good philosophy of life in this old gardener's observation and experience.

Pailures and disappointments are built into life and nature - but they do not tell the whole story. Eilling frosts, long droughts and unfruitful seasons will doubtless occur but nature survives. Probably it can best be summed up in the idea of a great Patience underlying nature and life. "Underneath are the everlesting arms" says the Bible.

Our important smirits fret and fune at slow driver, traffic lights (red, of course), late trains, letters that don't arrive overnight. The feet that we live in a world of instant coffee and possibly instant annihilation makes it all the harder and all the more necessary to learn patience.

Only as we 'possess our souls in patience' will we learn the gardener's philosophy and say with Paul, "man plants but God gives the increase." We might even learn to survive. If not, the flowers will remain to mark our passing and Patient Nature will have the last word.

Faced with a deficit in last year's accounts they have decided that we must continue to give to charities and missions to the tune of £750. This amount will have to be taken from slender reserves. Some would say this is foolhardy and yet I am sure that a Church which lives to itself dies by itself. Somehow, despite the difficulties, we have to keep looking out. I am grateful to the PCC for making GOING this Christian stand.

We would not be in this position if everyone was putting into practice the Stewardship policy we urged last year and about which our Stewardship Chairman, Mike Steed, has written in this month's Link. The giving in this parish is very good and we are grateful for the response we had to last year's renewal campaign. But I say to think about it and if you want further information ring Mike on 813226.

What happens when our reserves are exhausted? I do not know but I remind myself that the Church advances when it takes risks.

St John's Appeal has, of course, meant the raising of money and I am so grateful that people keep on doing their bit here and there. There is no doubt that many feel the agony in raising money for a building when millions in the world are starving — and yet here we have a building which is meeting needs of people in this place and all we are trying to do is to keep the water out. I write this on Ash Wednesday when we have had the St Mary's School Eucharist, Holy Communion in mid-morning and Sung Eucharist in the evening. Despite the agony I am convinced that we must do our best to get St John's in good repair.

We are about to accept tenders for the next stage of the work which includes reshingling the main spire, replacing the lead on top of the tower and retiling the south chancel roof, lady chapel roof and south transept roof. The south aisle roof is also to be renewed.

This is going to cost in the region of £25,000 to £30,000 to which we hope the Department of the Environment will contribute 40%. When you walk around the village, look and



see how many times you see St John's spire (it is particularly impressive coming down Grove Hill) and think how poorer Stansted would be without it, then, if you have not yet made a covenant please consider doing so. Ring Peter Pavitt on 812567.

Money, money, money? But do remember that the money is not for me or the PCC. I seem to have spent much of my ministry being concerned with repairing buildings and raising money, and that in itself can be frustrating.

Perhaps some advice to young clergy before accepting a new parish should be "have the building surveyed!"

THE PROUDS ARE ON THE MOVE!

There seems to be some confusion! As you all know, we're moving to Boreham Wood after Easter. But many of you have asked us "where is Boreham Wood?" Well, it's in Hertfordshire, not far from Watford, next to Barnet, and bordering the London Borough of Edgware, just within the London Telephone district. I haven't actually tried this out, but they tell me it is 15 minutes drive from St Albans; 10 minutes from Brent Cross and 20 minutes from Regent's Park. Oh, and it's only 45 minutes from Stansted.

Boreham Wood was once a village, and is now a large housing estate which sprang up in the 1950s. There are some 40 or 50 thousand people living there, most of whom would probably tell you that Boreham Wood, and the Pinewood Studios, is where they shot all of the special effects for "Star Wars." There were once two Parishes in the town, but now, they have divided it up into three areas within one Team, of which we will be a part, looking after the Parish of St Michael and All Angels. St Michael's is a modern Church, built in 1954. It stands on the corner of a crossroads, with a Hall next to it, built on to the Church itself; the Vicarage is then next door to that. During the week, we have three Communion services, and on Sundays we have two services: 8.00 am Communion and a 9.30 am Family Communion. They use the A.S.B. Rite 'A' at all of their services.

As you have probably guessed, I won't be on my own. There is a very good Team to back me up, which meets at least twice a week. There is a Team Rector, another Team Vicar besides myself, a Stipendiary Deaconess with me at St Michael's, and a Curate with the Team Rector. The Team Rector used to be the Curate at St Francis, Welwyn Garden City when I sung to keep an eye on me!

The service of Installation and Licensing will be on Monday, 25th April, at St Michael's at 8.00 pm.

TINY TOTS

Yes, we're still here! If you have pre-School age children, and have always been looking for an excuse to bring them to Church, then we provide that excuse for you on the second and fourth Tuesdays in every month in St John's at 2.15 pm. After a short service with lots of familiar songs for the children and a story, we all go over to the Hall for tea or squash and biscuits. And we still manage to finish in plenty of time for you to collect your older we would love to see you.

JUST ONE MINUTE, please, to think about that 'ONE-HOUR' PROMISE says Michael Steed, Stewardship Committee Chairman.

We are known as a 'Stewardship' parish. There is a notice for visitors in our two churches saying that there are no collections at our services as givings are on a regular pledged basis with members promising to give a set amount weekly, monthly or annually.

Each autumn, the parish's Stewardship Committee conducts a renewal when members pledge a year of service and dedication as well as giving. Father Andrew this last autumn devised and led a renewal on a novel theme of 'One-Hour-a-Week Committment.' Our congregations were asked to consider a minimum commitment of one hour each week to some form of work or service to the church, one hour to attend a church service, one hour of prayer and/or bubble reading (less than ten minutes a day!) and to give the equivalent of one hour's salary or nett income weekly to God's work in this parish.

As the half-way six-months post arrives, the Stewardship lommittee would like to ask members if they constantly remind themselves of their one-hour commitment? When one looks that the amount of work being done for and in the church and at the attendances and enthusiasm of the 'Partners in 'lanning' house meetings, one feels that possibly no reminders are necessary. But your Stewardship Committee would like to feel that the pledges are being remembered daily by all hose who made them a few months ago. What we are really suggesting is that one-hour worship, one-hour prayer, one-our service, was a dedicated promise for a full year and ot just a gimmich at renewal time. It is so easy at that ime to say this is a great idea, and then for the theme o be gradually forgotton. We hope this is not the case this ear. Forgive us giving your memories this little 'jog'.

A NEW ORGANISATION: Stansted World Development Movement 'Water means Life'

After a series of self-education meetings since first getting together in October 1981, we have identified a project, which is not only topical (can water really go on strike?) but could also provide a significant boost to the health of a whole village in NE Thailand. In a letter recently written from that area, Sister Mary of the Good Shepherd Sisters writes: 'Now that the dry season is setting in, everyone is crying out for water. We have already helped villagers to construct eleven wells. The villagers cooperate by digging the wells and, with the donations we receive, we supply concrete rings, cement, sand and gravel. Our aim is to help village by village, a minimum of one well to begin with - this often involves clearing and repairing an existing one which is usually highly polluted and held in place by rotting planks - then when possible increase the number to four wells per village. This does not apply to every area as in many places there is too much salt in the soil. The people from those areas must draw water from the nearest well - often at a distance of 2 to 4 km.

We have prepared a leaflet for every house in Stansted so that everyone can have the opportunity of making a contribution to a very specific cause. It costs £175 for each well and there are literally thousands of deprived villages without a local supply of ckan water. So please help to get Stansted Mountfitchet inscribed on a well in SE Asia. If you do not have a leaflet, but would like to make a gift towards a well (have you given up anything for Lent?) then pur treasurer, Alan Dean, will be pleased to hear from you at 49 Recreation Ground, Stansted CM24 8BD. BENTFIELD COUNTY PRIMARY SCHOOL

How do you make a siege weapon or ballista which will propel a 10 gram ball of plasticine over a distance of 6 metres and hit a castle keep 1 metre high? Pupils from schools in the area have been considering just this for the past few months and the variety of models which they came up with was truly amazing. Mostly made from wood they ranged from less than one to a few feet high. Rubber bands, elastic, hinges, springs, metal bands and twisted string were all used in various ways as were the wheels of a pram and plastic and wooden spoons.

We gathered, dressed in appropriate costume, in the playground of the Peter Kirk school on a cold, windy February afternoon to find out how well they would all work. The first engagement involved each school using all the machines they had made to fire 100 plasticine balls at the castle. We scored 10 if one landed in the keep and 1 if it fell in the perimeter of the castle. Bentfield scored 46. The second part of the competition involved each school's best machine in a rapid firing assault. How many balls could we get into the castle keep in one minute. Most schools only managed one.

There were no prizes as such but Malcolm Lewis in Class 8 was commended for having the best looking machine of the afternoon. I took lots of photographs and we all had a jolly good time and are now looking forward to the next time we all meet - I wonder what the children will be called upon to 'invent' next.

THE MOUNTFITCHET SCHOOL

ESSEX COUNTY SCHOOLS GYMNASTICS CHAMPIONSHIPS FOR BOYS

With over 120 Secondary Schools in Essex the 'TEN TOP BOYS GYMNASTICS SCHOOLS' entered this year's rebirth of the County Championships. The Mountfitchet School Boys Team from one of the smallest Comprehensives of around 700 Boys and Girls, was competing against some of the largest schools, Chelmsford, for example, having about twice the number of pupils.

The Competition took place at the Eoswells School, Chelmsford, on Tuesday afternoon, 8th February. Each school had a squad of 5 boys with 4 of each team to count in the overall scoring. Each competitor had to perform a compulsory vault over a 1 metre or 1.25 metre box - this vault being a 'Through Yault'. They then had to perform a voluntary vault out of a group of 5 graded vaults - graded due to their degree of difficulty.

The second phase of the competition required a floor sequence of movements lasting 30 seconds to 1 minute and marked according to difficulty and continuity.

The first boy to compete for the Mountfitchet was Brian Davies who with a total mark of 28.8 put the school amongst the top 5 after the 1st round.

The Mountfitchet School contid

Second to perform was Patrick Banks who made up ground and produced a good mark of 31.4. Colin Davies performed an excellent routine with a mark of 33.4 to take the school closer to the leading three schools - another excellent performance by Richard Moth produced a nail biting finish through a tense afternoon of competition. Richard scored 32.3 to place Mountfitchet school 3rd - .5 of a mark behind the Plume School, Maldon. (Nigel Rawlings was our 5th competitor as Reserve).

Out of nearly 60 competitors Colin Davies came 4th.

The school Team did exceptionally well in their first serious competition. All boys were 'Home Grown', learning and developing their skills during school lunch time and evening practices. None of the Mountfitchet boys were just entered by the school to compete because they were members of outside Gymnastics Club. This aspect was a very pleasing one for the teachers and pupils involved.

COMPUTER-ASSISTED CAREERS ADVICE

The Mountfitchet School was the first school in the area to use a new computer-assisted careers advice scheme. Pupils participating take a 3½ hour test, starting with simple questions and gradually becoming more difficult which are devised to examine all the various skills which they possess, be they practical or academic.

The results appear about a week later, in a booklet form listing the special talents and attributes of the pupil, and recommending a particular area of occupation which they could follow. There are also lists of suitable jobs within that range, and addresses to write to for further information. Parents have to pay for this service, and the price ranges from £10 to £25, depending upon the detail of the results supplied.

Although it is a very new scheme, first results seem very encouraging, and it is hoped that this will be a valuable addition to the careers advice services which the School offers to pupils.

FIELD STUDY COURSES Some senior pupils have recently been spending time at the Bradwell Outdoor Studies Centre as part of the 'O' Level Biology and Rural Science Courses.

A group of senior boys have also recently visited the Wood-working Exhibition at the Wembley Conference Centre.
