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
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WHAT ON EARTH IS THE CHURCH FOR?

"Child abuse has been much in the news lately. The terribly detailed accounts of pain inflicted, the photographs of bruised and battered babies, so horrific you flinch from them. A father accused of harming his child who jumps to his death during the trial.

Isn't it surprising then that people still say "Being a parent comes naturally"? Or it's easier to think "It's them not us", even though many parents know they've come within a hair's breadth of bashing their children.

3 eing a parent does not come naturally. You wouldn't stick a plant in the ground and hope for the best. Good parenting needs the right conditions in which to grow and flourish. Squalor and neglect only grow squalor and neglect.

Parents themselves need to be parented at times. They must be properly housed and fed - and feel supported and know that they have some part to play with their children in the future.

Without the right conditions for growth parenting will not survive. It will break down and reduce mothers and

fathers to objects. Once parents cannot value themselves and their children they will treat themselves and their children as so much disposable rubbish.

We are all part of the complex chain of parenting whether we have children or not. Our joint responsibility must be for the children of the present and the parents of the future.

When the links in the chain are broken, we are all in danger."

The above article caught my eye the other day because it was so topical and becoming a very real problem in our society.

At a wedding recently the priest talked about the 'married relationship' and how marriage needs God within it somewhere to take it hopefully through all it's complexities and moods. So God links Christians together in a very mysterious

I feel too that community is very important. We cannot isolate ourselves as parents or otherwise hoping we can go it alone, we need human affirmation, guidance from wiser folks, and often practical help and a listening ear.

We are so fortunate to have a close community at St. Theresa's and also a thriving ecumenical community in the village.

Our church as with the others in Stansted is our meeting point where we pray, celebrate, air and share and it is a necessary part of our Christian life-style.

CORRYMEELA

Standing on top of a hill overlooking the Atlantic coast of Northern Ireland stands the original Corrymeela community.

The name 'Corrymeela' means literally "The hill of harmony". Its establishment in 1965, prior to the present troubles in Northern Ireland, stands out as a Christian landmark in that troubled land.

The aims of the Corrymeela community; to build understanding, reconciliation and peace between the divided communities in Northern Ireland, seem to become more difficult to achieve as each passing day brings yet another outrage which further separates the people of that country.

I first visited Corrymeela in the spring of 1971, aged fifteen. I had never previously had a conversation with a Roman Catholic.

I learned a lot there about my fellow (but Catholic) countrymen. We spoke, ate, played and prayed together, things impossible to do in 'normal life'.

The division between us, based on mistrust and misunderstanding, narrowed as I realised that they shared my teenage problems and a deep love of the beautiful country we shared. We were confronted with our bigotry and recognised it for what it was and the awful destruction it had caused.

Such encounters pave the long and uphill road to peace in Northern Ireland.

We in Stansted are blessed, living in an open, understanding and peaceful community. We must ensure that the example of Christ's teaching embodied in the ecumenical community of Corrymeela is continued.

Corrymeela is our good cause for February. Please support it financially if you can, remember its work in your prayers or, best of all, visit it. I can promise you the beauty of the place, the love of its people and the depth of their faith will not leave you unchanged.



We are glad to bring some further news from Ann Webb from a letter to a member of our meeting, written after the Colombian volcano.

"The Armero tragedy was of course far more devastating for ordinary Colombians (than theterroist killings).

A volcanic eruption which killed 25,000 and left another 25,000 injured or homeless was a stunning blow. The public response was most commendable - I have never seen such mountains of clothing, bedding, medicines, food, etc. as appeared at every collecting point in the city. Now the need is of course for money to start re-building a new life for the survivors.

Our boys' school has promised a new fully-equipped school for the new Armero, and we recently took part in a sponsored walk which raised 250,000 pesos (something over £1000). We also responded to a national appeal for adoptive parents for the orphans of the tragedy. In the chaotic rescue conditions many children were separated from their families who may have been rescued but sent to a different city for hospitalisation.

When a disaster of this magnitude happens on the other side of the world you can feel horror and respond by giving to fund-raising organisations, but when it happens only 150 miles away, to people you live among, then the sense of horror and hopelessness is magnified a thousand times.

In those first few days I am sure that all residents of Colombia, Colombian or "gringo" were equally stunned by the scenes of human terror and misery. I found myself saying "what can I do" when all I could do was contribute whatever material goods could be given, pray, and let the Red Cross and other rescue workers get on with their job.

Now that the first shock is over it is almost easier to put some energy into the bigger fund-raising schemes while continuing to hope and pray that the authorities do not let this become just yesterday's disaster and forget the need tore-build a new life for the "damnificadores" - the Spanish word for the survivors is particularly chilling isn't it?

Uttlesford Home-Start has really taken off with 90 referrals and most have been introduced to a volunteer (see overleaf).

WHO IS REFERRED?

Families with at least one pre-school child, who are experiencing difficulties for a number of reasons such as:

Loneliness

they have recently moved to the area they have no immediate family to help in a crisis they live in an isolated village without transport they have no friends in the area they are house bound due to illness

Depression

Families with budgeting problems

Single parents

Marital problems

Two or three young children, twins, boistrous toddlers

Families with handicapped children

Families who are afraid of their own too severe reactions to their children

Families where parents themselves did not experience a very good childhood and therefore do not have knowledge of basic parental skills.

Parents who need the reassurance of another experienced mother

WHO CAN REFER?

Parents themselves can ring us direct Any interested party who has the consent of the family (see overleaf)

VOLUNTEERS

It is the volunteers who make Home-Start and we now have a group of 35. May I take this opportunity to thank them all for all their time and energy. They are all parents and know what it is like to be at home with small children. Many have experienced the isolation, the times of loneliness, the times of worry or stress and also the joys that children can bring. We hope that some of the families who have experienced the help of a Volunteer will in time become Volunteers themselves.

For we do not ask for any qualifications, (except having been a parent) from our Volunteers, but feel more important is a warmth of personality, reliability, confidentiality and a sense of humour. Nor does age or background matter. All Volunteers must attend a one day a week course, 10 week preparation course. This helps the organisers to get to know the Volunteers and the Volunteers to get to know each other. It also provides an opportunity for Volunteers to gain information about other facilities within the area and to participate in group discussion.

We have a course continuing on 4th October at Salamon-House, Saffron Walden, and have a few places left. Anyone interested should ring Dunmow 5705.

Joan has been visiting me.for over a year now and I look forward to her visits. Although we do have our differences of opinion sometimes. She always comes back to me, where many people have given up. I know I can rely on her especially when things are all going wrong.

We go to lovely places when Joan visits, even to a posh pub! Also when I go go court she's there for me to talk to and help me out.

I do worry that one day she won't be able to visit me anymore, I would really miss her."




MOUNTFITCHET GARDEN CLUB

The speaker at the Club's January meeting was Mr. Gingell from Ramparts Nurseries, Colchester, who specialise in growing and selling plants with grey or silver foliage. Most of these plants are naturally occuring 'wild' plants and are therefore not normally available commercially, but provided they can be given the right growing conditions they are relatively easy and undemanding. Most grey or silver leaved plants originate from areas with a Mediterranean-type climate, with strong sun and drying winds. The reason for their greyish colouring is usually the presence of tiny hairs which have evolved as a natural defence mechanism preventing the plants from losing too much water by transpiration. As the light intensity around the plants gets higher the hairs stand up further from the plant and give an overall greyish effect, much sought after in floral arrangements. This effect can also be used to advantage in the garden, where the softly coloured foliage can be used to contrast with or compliment other plants.

Mr. Gingell illustrated his talk with a superb collection of slides showing the more unusual and less well-known grey and silver foliage plants. He ended his talk with a few words on Hybrid Garden Pinks, which require very similar growing conditions to the grey plants. Members asked a variety of questions and a visit to the nursery will probably be arranged.

Next month the speaker will be Mrs. Shipp, on Flower Arranging. The speaker in March will be Mr. Garston, on the Mixed Border.

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
