Meeting for worship: llam.

About a year ago, when visiting a friend in Yorkshire, I saw the grave of Sylvia Plath, the poetess, in a high and bleak moorland churchyard. The inscription on the tombstone (a line from one of her poems I imagine) was "Even amidst the fiercest flame, the golden lotus can be planted".

This is a vivid and individual expression of something that is very much part of Christian thought. I am a member of an ecumenical discussion group and many of the books we have read and discussed, and the tapes we have listened to over the years stress the need for people to reach the point of despair before there can be a full awareness of God. It is perhaps particularly emphasised, and well expressed, by Dr. Martin Israel - who spoke so movingly in St. John's a year or so ago.

What I have always found difficult about this is that reaching a point of despair can be caused by a tempermental trait; and I find it hard to accept that those whose temperament does not contain this element cannot be as active and enlivened Christians as those whose temperament does include it. I know it is impossible to know what others are suffering - there will be many serene, calm people who suffer

very deeply. But there do seem to be some whose temperament does not "touch the depths" and yet their lives shine and yet their lives shine brightly. Conversely, there are those who by temperament and circumstance do touch the depths, and tragically no light does come to them. I often wonderwhat it is within us that blocks off that light or lets it through.

I also wonder if it is the contrast that makes us particularly aware of good that comes out of evil or suffering. In painting, the light areas are emphasised by very dark contrasts: the light colour remains the same with or without the contrast but the viewer sees it differently. Is it perhaps that the illumination that comes in the midst of darkness is so striking and startling that it affects us more deeply?

I think I like Sylvia Plath's view that the golden lotus can be planted even amidst the fiercest flame - and marvellous it is when that happens but it can also be planted in happier circumstances.

THURSDAY AM

Up bright and early - today's the day! Still lots to do. How will I fit it all in! First a shopping expedition to buy all the extra goodies - the casseroles are already in the freezer hope they like my cooking -stagger back from Sainsburys and collapse for a cup of tea before blasting through the bedrooms and removing the dust of centuries! By blasting evening the chicken's boned and stuffed, the house is clean and stuffed, the house is clean and sparkling (goodness doesn't it make a difference!) and I collapse for another cup of tea. Heavens! is that the time? Tear down to wait on the corner of Blythwood Gardens just in case the coach arrives while everyone is at the evening service - it does! 8.15 pm and it chugs along with its tired load. We wave them down and greetings are exchanged. Everyone looks relieved to have arrived safely

and it's so good to see so many familiar faces from our visit to Chevetogne last year. We direct the bus up the narrow lane - holding up all the traffic as it positions itself for the narrow entrance to St. Theresa's and then a quick dash up across the grass and I just catch them before they go sailing past the windmill! Everyone comes piling out of Mass and what a happy atmosphere there is as all the visitors are welcomed. At last everyone is matched with a hostess and we all wend our way back home for the first big meal!

FRIDAY

Up bright and early again! 3 cheers for good friends who have invited us all out to breakfast - this is better than the Savoy - such service - Why don't we do this more often Paula!! Off down to St Theresa's again to meet up for our trip to Cambridge. We all board the coach and Rev'd McJlwain leads in his car through the winding and villages to the Old Spring lanes Inn for our lunch. What a glorious day, everything looks marvellous in the sunshine! Now we can all sit and have a well earned drink and a meal that someone else has prepared! This could be disaster time though - there are 40 of us - how will they manage to take all our orders and get us out in time to see Kings Chapel before it closes! They manage, and with great panache - we are all guided past the menus - orders are taken and only 1 person receives a chicken pie instead of a chicken curry! Now for the long walk - hope everyone can manage this - with a few stops to let the slow of gait catch up we eventually reach Kings Chapel - it is certainly worth a long walk! We just have time to have a quick wonder round, buy a few postcards before it closes then on to Silver Street and the punts! 4 punts are ordered and 4 volunteers (?) chosen to man them. Manfully they pole down river as we wave bravely from the bridge and then settle down for a quiet hour with a pot of tea in the sunshine! Oh no they're late coming back - dinner will never be ready before our Ecumenical Service! A quick phonecall home and disaster is averted - the casserole is put in the oven and by the time we all arrive back dinner is well under way!

The Service is marvellous, all the visitors are so moved by the spectacle which we take s much for granted in Stansted of our 5 Churches taking part in services together. So many people have turned out for this and our visitors meet many more of the villagers over coffee afterwards. Then back to Laurie and Paula's for another gettogether and some winetasting! and back late to bed!

SATURDAY

Another huge English breakfast! I could get used to this! Even so with all the French that's spoken it seems quite continental! Today our guests are to be shown around the Windmill - again the weather is glorious - Thank you God! We

have lots of interpreters and I push Emilie around the green while her mother Pascale explains the workings of the windmill in French! We all pile onto the bus again with our goodies for the picnic at Little Easton - some cars follow and we wend our way happily again through waving fields and pass well-tended cottages. At last arriving at Rectory Lakes the food is unpacked and shared and another feast is consumed! We all enjoy the sunshine, the companionship and the ducks! Good grief - just 2 hours left to get to the shops for some souvenirs to take home! We all rush around Bishop's Stortford looking for typical English souvenirs - at last they are found in Gateways - marmalade, Chivers jellies and Birds Custard!! Tonight's our big night, we've been preparing for this for months - Our Social at the Day Centre! Thank goodness for our Shalom group. They have all turned up trumps and are going to prepare the Centre for us and look after things in the us and look after things in the kitchen. Edna and Harry have collected the wine and tablecloths and flowers and when we arrive at the Day Centre it is transformed! And such smells! Everyone is seated and served and the entertainment begins. Peter Baker is our MC and raconteur. Fred Boyd joins him for some fun - these boys could be professionals!! What talent we have in our village: and guitar players, piano singers | players, even a group of singers newly formed to sing and recite to our visitors! The jokes are translated the atmosphere is truly marvellous but we are also sad because this is our last night together.

SUNDAY

After another huge English breakfast we meander down to 10.30 Mass. Franz the coach driver looks over his vehicle and suitcases are piled on board. However, it is not to end yet! A telegram has arrived - their boat has been delayed and they have another two hours with us! Mike and Marion Dyer offer their garden for lunch and we all take our leftovers which are to be converted into yet another feast, into their lovely garden and spend our last few hours yet again eating and drinking! Once more we file back to St Theresa's car park - the pace much slower now as we realise it is all about to end. There are tears, embraces and lots of good wishes and invitations for the next year. A Tast photograph and we pile into our cars to race down to the roundabout to position ourselves for a last farewell Goodbye dear friends - see you next. year! We return to Mike's for a last before having another look around the day centre to make sure it is left perfect for Monday and then back home to get down to the mundane again - changing beds and washing! Was it worth it? It most certainly was — in the planning and preparation for it we became good friends and bonds were formed between many

families - if only our visitors enjoyed it half as much as we did it was all well worth while. By the way Eric - have you arranged our next visit yet?!!

How did you celebrate Pentecost this year? Did you send the season's greetings to your friends? Did you home with colourful It is perhaps strange adorn your decorations? that the most significant event in the Christian calendar should have escaped the materialistic trappings that try, albeit unsuccessfully, to suffocate the other major feasts of Christmas and Easter, Sadly, Whitsunday is now even separated from the holy-day which used to follow it; and as far as secular society is concerned, the anniversary of the coming of the Holy Spirit has quietly disappeared.

The name 'pentecost' is derived from the Greek 'pentekoste', meaning fiftieth, and it refers to the fifty days between the two ancient feasts of Passover and Pentecost. For the prechristian Hebrews, Pentecost was equivalent to our harvest festival, and was an occasion for rejoicing and making offerings to the Lord. For the disciples in the year of our Lord's death and resurrection, it coincided with the most momentous event in their lives. For the church today it is a time for reminding ourselves that the Holy Spirit is very much alive, and pleading for us to give him room in our lives. Some of us may be frightened by his power, and wonder whether we can cope with it. Others may feel more comfortable with a binary God; but as far as I am concerned I need all the power and strength that is on offer from all three members of the Trinity. Perhaps we should give Pentecost a higher profile next year, even if it is bad news for diets and turkeys!

We look forward to joining in the United Eucharist at the United Reformed Church on Sunday 5th July at 10.30 am. There will be no Methodist service on that day.

At the recent General Assembly of the United Reformed Church in the U.K. (held in Cardiff) the Assembly heard a report on the progress of church union discussions with the Congregational Union of Scotland.


Ever since the Churches of Christ joined the U.R.C. in 1981 there have been U.R.C. congregations in Scotland. It now appears that the Scotlish Congregationalists will enter the U.R.C. by the time of next year's Assembly (May 1988).

The negotiations are also being observed in Scotland by the Church of Scotland, the Scottish Episcopalians and the Scottish Churches' Council, so this union does not preclude further church union in Scotland.

It is a matter of great significance that, since its foundation in 1972 when Presbyterians and Congregationalists in England and Wales came together as the U.R.C., this new, united church (the first on the U.K. scene) has worked continuously for further union. If you believe, as I do, that the Holy Spirit is calling the churches to unity in our time, with well over 100 unions already notched up world-wide since 1925 (the United Church of Canada), you must be cheered by this small denomination as it pioneers church union in the United Kingdom.

Although these unions have been, to a large extent, uniions of like with like or at least similar, they do bring hope that one day we may be able to overcome even more entrenched differences between the churches. Differences which, thank God, do not now prevent our Christian fellowship, as witness the Belgian exchange visit, but which still give us pause at the altar of our Lord, where we should be "one in the Spirit and one in the Lord".

VICAR'S NOTES

Is Stansted going to change? This seems to be the question on peoples' lips. Property prices are soaring and this will exclude firt-time buyers; retired residents will also be tempted to sell up and move away to a cheaper area. Some say that if the airport brings about a lot of change they will be off to Suffolk or Norfolk and so we could see great mobility in the population.

We do not know exactly what will happen and surely panic should be avoided. My hunch is we will not see much change for 10 years - but I could be wrong.

But these questions came up at a recent house group meeting when we were discussing how to freshen up the life of our Church. Two concerns emerged from the discussions which are not unrelated to changes in population.

First, it was felt that as a Church we need to do more to welcome and integrate newcomers. Of course, an overkill in welcoming can frighten people away altogether - but there are ways of making new residents feel welcome and wanted. Among other projects we hope to produce an 'Information Wallet' so that everyone knows what is going on. Stansted Association of Christian Churches are also revising the which sets out local information and provides a map of the village.

The other subject for discussion in groups was worship. Do we need to make some adjustments to our pattern of worship? Is there room in our pattern for a non-Eucharistic service? Our Church Council reviews worship continually and within the last year have changed the pattern and made some slight changes to Parish Communion. But it is right that the matter should be kept under continued review and in the autumn we plan to have an Open Meeting inviting everyone to come and talk things over. As you know you can never please all the people all the time and there is a danger of seeing worship as an entertainment. Of course we worship God because we want to respond to Him in Praise, Love and Adoration. We come to give and we that in giving we also discover receive.

All this gives me the opportunity to remind you of something I say every July. Do go to worship when on holiday - wherever you are. Apart from the refreshment it brings us so often by worshipping in another Church we receive inspiration and new ideas.

If you are going away have a good time - and please travel safely.

"OUR VILLAGE"

One of the necessities for life we still carry in common with the very first and all subsequent travellers or settlers who spent any time within the area known today as our Parish, for they like us could not have survived without a supply of pure or perhaps not so pure water. Wherever a settlement sprang up, close availability of water would have been of first importance, the only difference today is the method of delivery.

Long before the first wells were sunk people would rely on streams, springs, ponds and puddles for their daily needs. It may be worth noting that many animals roday will drink from a fresh rainwater puddle in preference to tap water. To sink a well was an expert digger's job often done at great risk to themselves. Fatal accidents were not uncommon, and in this our village shared. Many houses and cottages had a private or shared well somewhere in the garden; many are still evident; others covered and lost until, as some do,

collapse leaving a great hole lined with bricks holding together by their placing and weight.

To number the wells in the village would be an impossible task now, but to say there were scores of them would not be unfounded, some being in daily use into the early 1950's. It would be of interest to know if you used one any later than this.

There was a village pump close to the junction of Elsenham Road and the Street (Lower Street). It was often said that the rent from the field known as Pump Field was used to pay for the maintenance of this pump although no hard evidence has yet come to light on this. The pump in fact ran dry about 1902 causing many problems but by this time the Stansted Water Company was well established and eventually came to the rescue. The pump was completely removed around 1932.

Two water drinking troughs were also available in the village, one being constructed of iron, but by the early 1920's it was reported as having been cracked for many years and several people had run against it in the dark and now that motor cars were being largely used its usefulness was usefulness drained and it was duly removed. second trough being close to the fountain, this also by the early 1920's had contained no water for some time as when the trough had been filled it was of no benefit for drinking purposes because motor tractor drivers were putting their suction pipes in to refill with water their thirsty machines. Motorists would also dip empty petrol tins into the trough when their cars ran short of water. No horse would then drink from the supply. Many people who kept horses would not let them drink at a public trough anyway, so it probably seems the age of the motor and their owners had much to answer for water thousands drink who never whence flows the boon they 'which dream, bless" (thanks to the lines from Amwell).






