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



#### VICAR'S NOTES

Recently I went to visit a priest in We sat in the study before Suffolk. lunch with sherry and shared our thoughts. 'How many parishes do you look after?' I asked. 'All in all there are twelve!'. I gulped and looked blank. 'How do you cope with those PCCs - and those church buildings?' I groaned with sympathy. 'l don't. I rarely attend a PCC - lay chairmen do that. I have nothing to do with church buildings - the laity do all that - and if the buildings fall that is their responsibility! r polite sip of sherry 'And the down Another polite pastoral care? The laity do that as wel1?' I tentatively asked, peering through my bifocals over the glass. We are in the process of appointing at least one elder for every parish. These have to be acceptable to the people and appointed officially for the They visit, prepare people for baptism - and, the ineresting thing is' - he leaned forward excitedly - 'they get much further than I can ever do as a stranger to these villages. People open up to them. Of course it is an experiment and there are snags - in some places we cannot find an elder, what happens if the elder moves and away?' And then came the thought that has been going on in my mind for some time. 'But I wasn't trained for a ministry like this - enabling the laity to do almost everything. I have always expected and wanted to be the persona in the parish. It's very hard to change'. 'But of course!' I enquired, You have to celebrate the Eucharist'. 'Oh yes - but only in 2 or 3 parishes Sunday. If they want weekly communion they have to move round. You must read Schillebeeck's book on ministry. I expect you're overproviding!'

Over the last year or so we in Stansted have been grappling with lay ministry and I suspect any hold-up is due to the fact that the clergy need retraining. But there is more to it than that. The laity also need to rethink what they expect from the clergy and realise they have a ministry which is more than cleaning the brass and cutting grass, important as these ministries Also people in the Church and in the community need to accept that ministry is exercised by the laity on behalf of the Church. Unless we break down the idea that the Vicar and his assistants must do everything and visit everybody we shall never see growth in the Church for we are limiting growth to what a few can do.

Over the past 6months we have been asking members of the congregation to visit and contact and we have been sharing our experiences. All sorts of questions have been raised. 'Should lay visitors be officially appointed? 'How can you visit someone you know?' 'Can we do more than crisis-visiting attempt to build up fellowship

within the whole Church? If so how can we do it?' 'Please can we have some more training? I need to know about the Church's ministry of healing, parish baptism policy. I need to know where I stand on certain Christian issues.' 'What do I say to someone who has lost a child?'

We are in the early stages but as a start we have decided to meet once a month for prayer, study and review of what we are doing. The group which is thinking about this is not closed. So if interested ask the cl .....???????? No better not. Ask Pat Clower on 815220. She is our organising secretary. Do hope you enjoy her poem on the subject.

CARDINAL BASIL HUME, ARCHBISHOP OF WESTMINSTER, ADDRESS TO DELEGATES AT THE "NOT STRANGERS BUT PILGRIMS" INTER-CHURCH PROCESS, AT SWANWICH CONFERENCE, SEPTEMBER 3, 1987

I would like to think that it is now very clear that the Roman Catholic Church is committed to this Inter-Church Process.

What of the future? I should like to make four points.

First, I hope that our Roman Catholic delegates at this conference will recommend to members of our Church that we move now quite deliberately from a situation of co-operation to one of commitment to each other. "commitment to each other" I mean that By we commit ourselves to praying and working together for Church unity, and to acting together, both nationally and for evangelisation locally, mission. I recognise, of course, that up and down the land, such commitments have already been made. But I would like to see the commitment I have described becoming official policy. This will be in response to a Gospel imperative, and, in our case, following clear directive from the Second ican Council. This commitment, Vatican then, should be official policy at every level. But we should have in every level. But we should have in view a moving, in God's time, to full communion, or communion that is both

visible and organic. We must not lose sight of this ultimate aim of all our ecumenical prayer and endeavour. By full communion I mean that "koinonia", that fellowship, that one-ness in the Body of Christ, of which the essential elements, were already outlined in the Acts of the Apostles, "... be true to the teaching of the Apostles, the breaking of bread, to fellowship and prayer". That followed the passage describing the descent of the Holy Spirit on the Apostles. From this followed the task of evangelisation and action resulting from concern for those in need. In a full "communion" we recognise, of course, that there will not be uniformity but legitimate diversity. It is not often stressed

sufficiently that even within the Roman Catholic Church there is considerable diversity.

This brings me to my second point. I would not wish to be less zealous than any of the mot zealous of you in respect of mission. Mission belongs to the essence of the Church as we all well know. But I would not want to see any lessening in our concern for those questions, generally termed Faith and Order. A Roman Catholic contribution will follow from a Roman Catholic concern about the content of our faith, about ecclesiology, about morality, about the Sacraments - questions which I believe, as a matter of urgency, we need to explore together. Mission is of the essence of the life of the Church, but so is the exploration of the mystery of God. It has to be part of our dialogue arising from our common faith.

This brings me briefly to my third point. It concerns the ecumenical instrument. The confusion in my notes mirrors, alas, the confusion in my mind. Of one thing I am certain: that there will be no authentic evolution of Church unity which does not take place at the local level. Whatever else our ecumenical instrument must do, it must not only foster ecumenical relationships locally, but also action in the locality. Anything which prevents that, or does not encourage that, will not, to my mind, be on the right lines. My mind is totally confused as to the kind of instruments that we need, but I am confident, very confident, that there is in this hall a vast experience, skill and wisdom, and

I would be very confident that the right instrument will eventually emerge.

And my fourth point is of a very general nature. When I think of what has happened here these last few days, three words are on my mond. The first is gratitude. Gratitude that we have come together; gratitude that we have though and reflected together; gratitude that we have prayed together. I would endorse entirely the proposal for some kind of assembly, which would meet from time to time, because experience such as our being together, our reflecting together, our praying together is an essential contribution to our ecumenical endeavour. It is in itself an expression of "koinonia" . We are deeply related to each other in Christ through baptism. And then my two other words. Christian unity is a gift from God and in these last few days I have flet He has been giving that gift in abundance. It is also a process of growth. I would distrust anybody who tries to indicate to me what the end of that process will be. One step at a time, and Swanwich has been a very decisive one.

An important event for the Catholic Church in England will take place this month in Rome. At St. Peter's, on the feast of Christ the King on 22 November, Pope John-Paul II will solemnly promote 85 martyrs to the rank of Blessed, as a step nearer their canonisation as saints. The Papal Mass of Beatification means that thereafter Masses may be offered in the Martyrs' honour, either as a group, or individually. This event has generated a great deal of interest around the world, and many parishes in England are organising pilgrimages to Rome for this great occasion.

The 85 Martyrs all suffered death for their faith during the Reformation in the 16th and 17th centuries. 63 of the number were priests, the remainder laymen. A number of martyrs from the same period in England have already been canonised as saints, including John Fisher and Thomas More. The whole process has taken many years of painstaking work to establish whether

there was sufficient documentary evidence of martyrdom in each case. Many cases had to be discarded either through lack of evidence, or because it became impossible to disentangle the true motive of martyrdom from the political involvement of the individuals concerned.

Many of the 85 were from Lancashire, Yorkshire and the North of England and had trained for the priesthood in the seminaries of Douai (in Belgium) and Rome. Their return to England as ordained priests was, of course, illegal and they were fully aware of the consequences if discovered. Evelyn Waugh has given a graphic picture of these times in his life of Edmund Campion (who was canonised in 1970) which is both a classic biography and a minor literary masterpiece.

In all the proceedings the Catholic Church has taken great pains not to damage her relationships with other Churches. Happily the Archbishop of Centerbury has stated his hope that the beatification of the 85 Martyrs will lead all Christians to pursue reconcilation and reunion even more effectively.

No one faith can, of course, claim a monopoly of martyrs. Throughout the ages people of all faiths have endured suffering and death rather than compromise their beliefs, and light shines for us beyond death. Some we can name and know something of their lives, others are known only to God. Tragically in present times the numbers of people imprisoned by repressive political regimes, and tortured and killed for their beliefs show little sign of diminishing. In understanding the sufferings of the 85 Martyrs we are led to a deeper sympathy with the many prisoners of conscience throughout the world.

"Marley was dead, to begin with". So Charles Dickens begins his immortal tale of Ebenezer Scrooge. And soon Dickens reiterates, "Old Marley was as dead as a door-nail". Then immediately "Old Marley was as questions the rightness of the "Mind! I don't mean to say know --- what there i that I know what there is particularly dead about a door-nail. I might have been inclined, myself, to regard a coffin-nail as the deadliest plece of ironmongery in the trade. But the wisdom of our ancestors is in the simile; and my unhallowed hands shall not disturb it, or the country's done for".

Like Dickens we generally will not disturb the distilled wisdom of earlier generations found in familiar maxims and aphorisms. We will not question their full grasp of the truth they pithily state. But some brave spirits have done so. People like Oscar Wilde, Hilaire Belloc and G. K. Chesterton. They had the insight and courage to stand some of our too-easily accepted aphorisms on their heads to show they were only half true and to reveal more truth.

One such aphorism, almost universally accepted, is: "If a thing's worth doing, it's worth doing well". The saying contains a lot of truth. parents drilled it into us when we were slip-shod or half-hearted. It was good advice. But not the whole truth. Not the truth if what it meant to us was "A thing is not worth doing if it is not done well". Many things we may not do well, but they need to be done and if we can have a fairly good shot at them Some service will i t is worth while. rendered. We will learn bit by bit be do better. The spirit of the thing be just as important as its mav And so on. And we have to execution. do it worse that we may do it better. So G. K. Chesterton put it this way. "If a thing's worth doing, it's worth doing badly". His version of the maxim is as valid as its original.

Posterity teaches us "Nothing succeeds like success". But Chesterton stood that on its head and said "Nothing fails like success". His version of it has as much truth in it as the original. How? May I suggest you work

it out - I've run out of space! And can I suggest you question whether two other sayings have the whole truth. They are: "It is more blessed to give than to receive" and "He who hesitates is lost".





"OUR VILLAGE"

Towards the end of September the large lime trees that had hid from view the southern-most end wall of old Green Stores were cut, thus clearly exposing for the first time in many years some fine features. Encased within the Flemish Bond Style Red Brickwork are three windows. The middle window cast in ornate stonework holds a date marked 1878 and the letter G. Joshua Green would have at this time been the proprietor and the business was known as Green & Marsh. It was directly above this window that, some years later, when the business had become Joshua Green & Co., a large advertisement board was fixed, being some 18' long and 3' wide bearing the words North Essex Tea & General Stores. If you look very closely a retaining bracket that helped to hold this board can still be seen, exactly when this sign was fixed or when removed I cannot

Above the top window the large round clock face is again in full view whose hands have come to rest a five minutes past one. Perhaps in time it may once again be able to perform its duty.

Another advertisement carried by this store at about the same time was upon the large doors that closed off access to the rear (under the Archway). This read J. Green & Co. North Essex Stores Wholesale Entrance General Merchants Complete Furnishers.

But let us take for today tea. When John Day in 1687 opened his store tea would have been available to only the most wealthy families and even then said to be a luxury. During the later 1880's competition from around must have been felt as Joshua Green & Company beg to inform their numerous patrons and friends that they have no intention of following the syste of giving presents with tea on the plan introduced into the adjoining lately They can, however, owing to the low price of tea, give their customers excellent value for money: ist Class strong flavour tea at 1/6d (7%p) or if presents are required the same article at 2/- (10p) which is business plain and simple. A halt must now be made as the kettle has just boiled.

#### The Warren Cottage Remembered

I was interested in the September issue of Link on the article about Stansted Park & Warren Cottage. I was one of the last people to live there with my late mother and father in law (Mr & Mrs Law)

Father-in-law worked on Elms Farm at the time, which was owned by the late Mr Arthur Findlay. The Warren was a lovely old thatched cottage. We had a pump which had to be primed to obtain water, open coal and wood fire on which all the cooking was done and oil lights. As time went on we did obtain a tin oven which stood on top of an oil burner and I remember it took 3 days to cook a rice pudding in it. We had plenty of roundsmen - Hicks the coalman, Pearsons baker delivered 3 times a week and Stringers the grocers once a week and at a later date we had a Mr Fuhr a baker in Station Road. The shop was also a small cafe and if we ordered a cake, one of the girl Feltons would deliver it all the way across the fields, the cost of the cake, 1/- (5p).

When mother-in-law was ill Mrs findlay would visit her and wish her well. My father-in-law would mow the whole length of Stansted Hall Drive with a scythe, starting at 5 am, as he said it was easier to cut with dew on it. It was cut as short as with a modern mower.

In the 1950's Mr Findlay gave his workers 5/- (25p) Xmas Box and I can remember the horseman telling him what to do with it and Mr Findlay putting it back in his pocket.

We had a dog named Pup who lived for 14 years and father-in-law brought a Draw Ticket for him at The Dog and Duck and Pup won a bottle of whisky.

My mother-in-law left The Warren Cottage in 1960 after which it was eventually vandalised and later burnt down.
