Methodists have at least three starting points for a New Year. (No doubt our friends of other Christian traditions always knew there was something odd about us!!) With much of the world we begin a new calendar year on 1st January. With the rest of Christendom we start a new Christian Year on Advent Sunday. And on 1st September we enter another year in the life of the Methodist Church. I daresay there's nothing very odd about this. All Christian Communions and all people have several "years" which begin at various disparate points in time.

To have a multiplicity of starting points is a good thing. They are important focal points of the past and the future, of history and hope. Such focal points make us aware of what lies behind and what could lie before us. We are brought to consider the past and prognosticate the future. As I've said, it is important to have these foci of history and hope. A nation, or community, or Church, or individual person cannot have a real identity without both memory and expectation.

We need a history to be who and what we are. I am the product of the genes of my ancestors; of countless influences upon me from people, experiences, situations, places, books, music, etc; and of my reactions to all that has happened to me. My identity and unique personhood come out of my personal history. My own history has made me the "me" I am today and memory enables me to know that. This is equally true of communities, whether a nation, Church, local, or area of interest community. Though, of course, the more people there are involved and the longer the stretch of time then the more complex and tangled the history will be.


A person cut off from his past is severely diminished in his humanity. If I totally lost my memory I couldn't possibly know who I am. I would be bewildered and lost in a meaningless maze of sense-impressions, nothing would speak to me of me or clarify my identity. Millions of people in this century have been greatly (though not totally) cut off from their history by being displaced, exiled, enslaved, imprisoned, etc. Driven or taken from where they essentially belong they become rootless, anonymous, without the dignity of a specific place, community and tradition of their own. But to be fully human we need hope aswell as history. For our history has not given us complete fulfilment and wholeness. True, much success, joy and satisfaction has come to us. But memory is also littered with failures, distresses and shames. We are not yet what it is in us to be. A sense of incompletion and longing is never far away. So hope is very necessary awell as memory in order for me to be me. If disablement or deprivation or fear or injustice deny me a real future then I am direly impeded in developing my full humanity and unique personhood. We all need an open future that gives the chance of new beginnings and further development.

John Wesley was once asked about his own progress in the Christian life. He answered "I am not what I once was. I am not what I hope to be. But by the grace of God I am what I am". Not a bad answer and the best hope for all of us - the love of God healing and hallowing the past. holding and hallowing the future. God so bless us all.

#### COST OVER-RUN

I was reading the other day that the great Alaska pipe-line which brings oil from the Arctic to a shipping point farther south was projected to cost 900,000,000 (900 million) dollars. No doubt that sounded like a lot of money at the time.

The final cost was 8,000,000,000 (8 thousand million) dollars which was a cost over trun of almost 10 times!!

What price the Channel Tunnel?

We are familiar with the phrase "the cost of our salvation". Some would say that the Crucifixion was all "cut and dried", a part of God's plan from the start. I do not agree with this and I think the crucifixion was a terrible cost over-run. Just as 2 world wars and the present nuclear arms race are a gigantic and unnecessary cost over-run.

Unnecessary, that is, if we human beings were prepared to follow God's way and

not our own.

Thecost over-run of human pride and vain glory is measurable in terms of the Crucifixion.

We did that! Not God.

Sometimes individual Christians seem surprised and perhaps aggrieved at the cost over-run of Christian commitment, in terms of time and effort, difficulty and challenge, and, yes, it must be mentioned, in terms of simple pounds, shillings and pence.

Why, I wonder, when everything is relative to the Crucifixion? John 3:16 says nothing about death and crucifixion. It says God so loved the world that he gave his only-begotten Son. He gave him, we crucified him.

- God suffered, and that was the terrible cost over-run.
- We are still paying for it, just as we are still paying for the 2 world wars, the Holocaust, and the Alaska pipe-line. (Oil <u>is</u> expensive stuff isn't it? Just ask the sailors in the Persian Gulf).

Lest I over- run your kind attention I'll leave it there for your to think about.




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## WOULD YOU LIKE TO CONSIDER BEING CONFIRMED?

"PUT OFF THY SHOES ....."

Exodus 111 5

Men it seems, have always and universally recognised a special, indefinable quality - "the place whereon thou standest is holy ground" and felt more able to worship, to know God in such a spot. The grove of trees, the standing stone, the tiny island or great river, the holy city, Jerusalem, Mecca, all attest the strength of this feeling. Moreover, we have endeavoured to make such places ourselves, from the simple altar in the catacombs or the desert cell, to the great cathedral where all that men can make of the beautiful is brought together to create a worthy place for this Presence.

We know there is little of the rational in this. We may argue that others have worshipped in this place and we are helped by remembering them, or by the beauty of the surroundings, but this does not seem to be all. Rationally, the wide water meadows by the River Stort, or the openness of Royston Heath or the Gog Magog Hills, even the top of the mound of Stansted Castle, would serve as a place to greet the sun on its rising for Midsummer Day, but still Stonehenge draws the crowds. those who are most afraid Even of worshipping the place itself, try as they might, sense this. Friends outstandingly have tried to reject the idea of a special place, contrasting

church with meeting house. yet in honesty we must admit to Quaker Pilgrimages: to the north west, to Pendle Hill where Fox first had а conviction of a "people to be gathered", or Firbank Fell, where, on the open moor, he preached to a great gathering of seekers. Let's be honest about this, and admit too, to a special feeling about the little meeting house and garden on Chapel Hill, Stansted, and be glad that our Methodist friends share this.

But, hold lightly to these things. broadcast Salvation Army service came from a Citadel that had formerly been a Methodist Chapel: other redundant chapels serve new communities as Seventh Day Adventists are Mosques. using a Quaker meeting house now too large for Friends in the area. There is a problem in deciding how, or even whether, to preserve some of our oldest buildings. This is not, we know, a problem for Friends only. Readiness to let go, to change, is hard but sometimes needed.

There is one sure place. I turn to Keats' Ode to Psyche:

"I will ..... build a fane In some untrodden region of my mind."

In our quest for God, we think too much, relfect too much, talk too much.



What was that you said? You have heard many birds sing, you have seen hundreds of trees. Ah, was it the tree you saw or the label? If you look at a tree and see only a tree, you have really not seen the tree. When you look at a tree and see a miracle - then at last, you have seen! Did your heart never fill with wordless wonder when you heard a bird in song?







#### "OUR VILLAGE"

Last month we began to look at some of the old field names that bounded the right of Church Road. Now let us turn to the left hand side.

There still to be found is the large expanse known for at least 150 years as Stansted Park which probably covered some 200 acres. This area at this moment in time is one of the last undeveloped corners of our village and has survived almost intact. Cattle still graze upon the slopes. If you are lucky enough to view this from half-way up Chapel Hill a better sight would be hard to find.

Within this portion of Stansted Park could be found places known as The Warren, The Old Brick Ground, Brick Kiln Spring, with its own water pump close by. This cottage as Mr. Robinson recalls burnt down around 20 years ago, the fire brigade not being summoned. Cuckoo's Parlour, Blackcurrant Spring are just a few more place names to be found in the lower half of the park. The Park's eastern boundary was made up of Durrels Wood and 12 acres field, It is this area that is to undergo dramatic changes starting later this year. How many men in those old hard days walked to Saffron Walden Court to answer charges of poaching within these bounds may never be known, but many did, for this was considered a very serious offence. Many tales can be read from the book written by a Stansted Game Keeper.

Many of our members attend the Training Centre at Saffron Walden where a wide variety of skills are used. Each person finds what they are best at, and when talking during the evenings about what they have been doing that day the conversation becomes a little onesided if you haven't seen the centre.

Even after Mrs. Hedges' talk at one of our A.G.M.s I still couldn't picture it in my minds eye, so when a few weeks ago they had an open evening I went along with Denise and her parents.

Of course Denise was only too pleased to show me round. The first room we went in to was the craft room, which had lots of lovely pictures on the walls, all painted or coloured or made by trainees. Lots of clay models fill the shelves, and someone had been collecting dried flowers and fir cones to make very attractive table decorations. Across the corridor is the printing room where Birthday and Christmas cards among lots of other things are printed.

We then went to what I have to say was my favourite room where the bird tables, boxes, feeders and the like are made. Stacked everywhere are different shaped woods. Some I could work out what they would be used for but others I hadn't a clue until Kenny arrived to give us a demonstration. He didn't mind working overtime, in fact he obviously enjoyed it and with glue and an electric hammer he had soon shown us how a bird table is made. He also told us they had been very busy all week as they had an order for over 400 tables and boxes which had to be out by the end of the week. They are flat packed at the centre.

The wood is cut in a separate room; I could see many a young person would have a great time using the huge machines. There was a lovely smell of new wood and sawdust in this area.

Another part I found interesting was THE FLAT. It is just like a Bedsit with bathroom where trainees go to practice their practical home skills like washing themselves and their clothes, cooking and washing up. They have a washing machine, electric and gas cooker. Lovely small microwave, iron and ironing board stand in a corner, a little kettle for tea and coffee making are on the side.

Now when Timmy tells me he has cooked his own lunch I know he has done so and where he has managed to do it. After cooking lunch they eat it in the dining come sitting room where there are table and chairs, settee, T.V., stereo and telephone, a super little home from home.

Some trainees also do some packing, like cotton wool buds, rawplugs, patterned sticky tape and many other things. There was so much to see, it's a job to tell it all. There is a feeling of a close family about the place with lots of photos of trainees and helpers, postcards sent from holiday makers everywhere. When I asked Denise what she liked doing most she replied "Going out" which they tell me means going down the down to do some shopping and on some really exicting trips.

If you go to Walden on Tuesdays, which is market day, please look for the stall from the centre where they sell some of the goods they have made. Some unusual things for your home or to give to someone as a lovely present.
