#### HOPELESS SITUATIONS

This week my husband and I attended a healing service at the Benedictine monastery Vita Pax in North London.

The theme of Brother Benedict's sermon that our prayers should first and most include praise of God, no was foremost matter what situation we find ourselves in. Our tendency, in times of trouble, to call out for help. Perhaps is sometimes we 'feel like throttling Him' than praising Him. But more nevertheless, to praise God and to love Him with all our heart, strength, mind and soul is the first commandment. And by obeying this commandment, Father Benedict said that we would thereby allow the power of God's grae and healing to enter our lives.

In our case the problem is cancer, and amongst the congregation attending the healing service, were other people with sickness and disease, and the less obvious problems of psychological, emotional and spiritual suffering. Were we supposed to feel glad, I asked myself? Surely that would be asking too much.

I don't think that is what is expected there are not many martyrs among us. But maybe the only way forward is to continue to trust our God and to say a prayer of thanksgiving. The Jews in the concentration camps did not abandon their faith, terminal cancer patients testify by their smile and their serenity that their God has not abandoned them, the bereaved give thanks for that life that has now ended. These people all testify to the power of God to touch every situation and make it bearable.

Certainly amongst the cancer 'survivors' we have met, there is a definite agreement that their illness has changed their lives for the better. Initially I thought they were kidding, but now I know what they mean. As a result of my illness, I came closer to God, and to other people. I discovered that it is a great privilege to share each other's suffering. It unites us and makes our lies worthwhile. Love, peace and joy can come out of seemingly hopeless situations.

For centuries it was customary for paintings and ikons to portray saints with haloes surrounding their heads. It is a custom largely unacceptable to the modern mind. Haloes, to us, seems to belong to the world of fantasy, makebelieve and supersitition. We have never seen the heads of people encircled with some sort of fluorescent glow.

True, we haven't literally seen such. But we have, surely, seen some people whose countenances have upon them a more than earthly, ordinary glow. There is that in them and of them which shines with a more than human light. Their personalities are touched with some glory or wonder that, at least in part, transigures them. They shine with "a light that never was on land or sea".

We may see this on the faces of men and women who have lived many years with increasing closeness to God. They have delighted to be with God in prayer and to do His will in life. He is in them to an extraordinary degree. And it shows. We also see it in the visage of those whose lives are given faithfully to real love, goodness, truth and beauty. They are at peace with themselves and all the world and the great health and wholeness of that peace glows upon them. We also see it on the faces of people who bear terrible sufferings in the strength of God's love and offer their pains for his glory. We are told that St Stephen's face shone like the face of an angel as he endured his martyr's death. And who among us who saw Fr. Joe Tuohey in his last few months can ever forget how his face shone so radiantly. Of course he always had a most engaging smile. But now there was something more; something which arose from his offering of his suffering for the glory of God.

#### Methodist

These people give us glimpses into the glory with which human life will shine when that life is totally at one with God. The very loveliness of God is just beginning to show in them and is a foretaste of the full glory that will come to us when eventually God is all in all to us. The Transfiguration of Jesus, celebrated on 6th August, is the supreme example and sign of this. His whole life was completely given to doing only what the Father wanted and to being utterly one with Him. Oneness with God was present in Jesus to a uniquely perfect degree, so that, we are told, his whole being, including his clothes, shone with the very light of God as he gave himself fully to the way of the cross on Mount Hermon.

Everything about our Lord was transfigured into divine perfection in that mysterious experience. Here we see that God does not intend things to stay the way they are. His will is to bring all things to perfection in Christ. In a time when so many most terrible things are happening, this divine purpose is both a marvellous comfort and an inexorable challenge. God give us grace to receive the former and take up the latter.

We have received the first bulletin from St. Luke's Hospital in Kasupe which is wholly devoted to the development of an avocado tree nursery at the hospital. The bulletin reports on how to establish such a nursery and the problems encountered during the development of St. Luke's own nursery.

The importance of avocado pears is described Dr. Van Der Maas, the Senior Medical Officer at St. Luke's, who writes:

"A FAT LOT OF GOOD"

In order to survive, we need food. Most adults and bigger children in Malawi can obtain enough food, but it is the weaning child that is our concern.

A weaning child should, in a small quantity, have plenty of calories, proteins and vitamins. It should be soft, bland, clean, not too difficult for the mother to prepare, available at any time of the day and it should be cheap.

The avocado pear fits this description perfectly. Its calorific value is higher than any other locally available fruit, due to its high fat content. The mother does not need firewood or water to prepare it and she can carry it with her to give it to her child at any time.

Another aspect is that the avocado pear bears fruit at an important time of the year. From January onwards, the grain stores are low and the new harvest is not yet in. The mangoes - another useful dietary supplement - are just finishing. The avocado pear may not grow well in every area, but in those areas where it does grow, each household would benefit from at least one avocado tree."

So they developed an avocado tree nursery.

It is encouraging to read that, alongside the financial support being provided through U.S.P.G., (the Parish has now raised £181) the Hospital is developing and helping itself within its own limited resources using the assistance of school students and others at little financial cost. Through our financial support, perhaps we are releasing for productive purposes local resources which might otherwise be directed, for example, to fund raising and other activities of secondary importance to the medical care being provided by St. Luke's. If this is the case, then our support may be broader and less superficial than at first might appear. We hope so.




# 'Youth Focus'

Were you surprised as I was to discover that the 'Daily Service' on the radio has been broadcast continually for sixty years and holds the record for the longest running programme on radio?

I discovered this fact as I listened to 'Women's Hour' recently. The Rev. Elsie Chamberlain, one of the earliest of women ministers in the Congregational Church was recalling her part in the very first broadcast service in 1928. Like many listeners, I imagine, hearing this date made me curious as to Elsie Chamberlain's age, and I was interested when the interviewer asked her whether she was willing to say how old she was over the air. She very politely declined to do so, however, saying that if she did, listeners might think she was old and 'past it', whereas this is certainly not the case. Elsie Chamberlain, being still a minister in the Congregational Church and as was obvious from the interview, very much 'with it' indeed.

To return to the 'Daily Service'. Countless millions during the past sixty years have been inspired, helped, encouraged or comforted as they have spent a few moments in the midst of a busy morning in company with so many worshipping God.

I remember many years ago visiting an elderly uncle, whose beloved wife had died the previous night, and finding him sitting quietly listening to the broadcast service, finding comfort and peace in God's presence, as the words and music spoke to his deep need in his time of distress.

So if you're around at 10.45 a.m. any weekday and haven't yet turned in to Radio Four at that time, I would warmly recommend you to do so. It's a most worthwhile experience indeed.





# "OUR VILLAGE"

Following last month's look at events at the Liberal Club we can take its story a little further. In 1892, because of some annoyance shown by the other political party, the Liberals and Conservatives met resulting in an agreement to convert the Liberal Club into a Working Men's Club. Around 1894 Sergeant Major Stewart was shown as Caretaker, with Mr H Gayford, Secretary. In 1896 the Working Men's Club hosted the Annual Dinner of the West Essex Cricket League whose president, the Earl of Warwick, occupied the chair (Stansted fielded a team in this league).

The Reverend Oakshot in 1902 negotiated an agreement with the W.M.C. Committee for use of their large Assembly Room to be used as a Parish Room for parish Several conditions had to be met, one being, he must provide a separate staircase sited at the far end of this large room to the outside. he took on and it was so done, the cost being around £49. Heating for the room was done by warmed air. There was also a fireplace and gas was available. The new Parish Room was over the next few years extensively used for concerts, dinners, jumble sales, dances, meetings and social events. A concert performance given by the Church Men's Guild on 23rd, 24th February with a repetition on 21st and 22nd April 1903 raised £7.14s 8d towards the Parish Room Account. Thankfully it was recorded by our Reverend Oakshot as follows:-


# THE ROYAL BRITISH LEGION WOMEN'S SECTION


