



"There are many roads to the top of the mountain". Somebody said these words to me recently, sitting in a beautiful sunlit room in Granchester surrounded by silk Persian rugs and elegant antiques. I had never encountered this epithet before: my personal metaphor was about the spokes of a wheel all leading to the same centre. But this mountain struck me as being an even better concept.

Because you cannot see the person coming up the other side, you have no idea how he is finding his way, how far up he is, how tired he may be, what obstacles he is encountering. You can't near him, let alone see him. Sure, when you meet him at the top all will become clear. But as you toil your way up your path, how can you empathise with your unseen fellow-traveller, let alone have an inkling of understanding about his journey?

This metaphor is self-explanatory. While we vainly attempt to solve problems both global and personal, God's will is at work. The only real progress we make is in our own personal journey - if we so choose - towards the top of the mountain. Trying to organise the journeys of others is fruitless: we cannot hope to understand them. And anyway, what about understanding our own path? "Know thyself", said Socrates. That is what it comes back to. To know the Self, the Divine within us, and allow that light to lead us towards the top of the mountain in the certain faith that it is doing the same for everyine else.

My dear Friends,

"Christian", John Bunyan's pilgrim, emerged from the debilitating experience of the Slough of Despond only to encounter yet another, and very different, snare to hinder his progress to the Celestial City. This came in the person of Mr. Worldly Wiseman and his apparently sound advice. His way of thinking has been called "prudential morality". It is a "safety-first", "don't get yourself into trouble", "keep your nose clean" type of morality. Essentially it is the ethics of self-centredness; it is keeping the right side of the law; it is making sure that others will think well of me; it is goodness, not for goodness' sake but for my own. Such prudential morality is not a matter of great merit and can be a real danger to our spiritual well-being.

But Mr. Worldly Wiseman is too shrewd to present his type of self-centred goodness as it really is and in its true light. He makes it sound right. He directs Christian to the town called Morality and to "a very judicious gentleman" named Legality and his son "a pretty young man", named Civility. It all sounds find. Who can doubt that a life which is moral, legal and civil is highly destrable. For Worldly Wiseman right living is merely a matter of urbane decency and self-interest. But let us suppose he means much more, that he means real and true morality, legality and civility. Who of us is able really to live up to these requirements fully, day after day, in all circumstances? Have any of us the moral and spiritual resources to do so? St. Paul wrote, "The good that I would do, I do not do and the evil that I would not do I find myself doing". That is a problem of failure common to us all.

And this was Christian's problem. He needed to be at peace, joyful peace, with himself, with others, with life in general and (most of all) with God. Such peace could only come for him when he came to a right and happy relationship with God. But he could never achieve this by his own efforts alone. As we would say, "He never made the grade". Consequently he was burdened with a terrible sense of failure with its very crippling sense of guilt, shame and fear.

He could never get right with God on the basis of his own achievements because: A. He never fully achieved, and B. Such a basis could not produce a really loving, filial relationship but only a moral commercialism, a cold contractual meritocracy. The latter is far removed from the family relationships of the Kingdom of God. The only way to be happy with God is, with repentance and faith, to trust utterly in His amazing love and mercy. That is a Father-Child relationship.

The burdens we carry may not be guilt, shame and fear, but feelings of emptiness, meanlinglessness, frustration and boredom. But the cure is the same an ultimate and personal trust that the source, guide and goal of all life is a God of steadfast loving-kindness and tender mercy. That gets us rightly related to God, life, other people and ourselves, out of which comes the highest and most gracious goodness.

ACTION BY CHRISTIANS AGAINST TORTURE

On 10 December 1988 people all over the world will be celebrating the 40th Anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights.

This document, drawn up in the aftermath of the terrible suffering of World War II, sets forth in simple words the basic inalienable rights to which every human being is entitled and without which we cannot lead full and satisfying lives. Its words have been an inspiration to many, showing the world as it could and should be: a place of respect and freedom for all. It has become the international standard by which the behaviour of governments is measured. Sadly, the promises made then have not been kept. Torture and the abuse of human rights is widespread.

Inspired by the aims of the Declaration, and concerned at our failure to implement them, many people will be re-dedicating themselves at this time to the principles of the Declaration.

Action by Christians against Torture, an ecumenical human rights group of which I am a member, is also focussing on this anniversary as an occasion to renew its commitment to work for a world without torture — a flagrant abuse of human rights which is still practised in over 80 countries throughout the world. Yes, Christmas is nearly here. 'We know' I hear you say, 'we haven't heard about anything else for weeks'. Everybody is talking about their lack of preparations, the cost of presents, and all the other things which leave them exhausted by Christmas Day. Well don't worry, I'm not going to speak about the usual Christmas joys and worries. I'm going to do what you'd expect a priest to do and chat about Jesus.

I want to remind us that at Christmas we remember and celebrate an earth shattering, mind blowing and life changing event. An event which makes every difference to everything, which leaves no atom of our being untouched, which fundamentally rearranges the whole meaning of life. The birth of Jesus.





A letter to Edna Goreing of the Shalom Group from Angus Macpherson of Corrymeela

Dear Edna,

Greetings from Corrymeela! Thank you for your most interesting letter, all the news about your Shalom Group and "The Link". It's great to know that such groups exist and with such a varied religious input. I have sent "The Link" on to David Blakley the General Secretary of the Irish Council of Churches as I know he will also be most interested.

Perhaps you would find it interesting to know that where I live in North Belfast -"never out of the news" - there is an amazing amount of ecumenical activity, e.g. Lois my wife and l are in a Bible Study of Catholics and Protestants which grew out of the Peace People, back in the seventies. We meet monthly and have grown in so many ways. We also have a Fast Group which meets on the 16th of each month, moving from home to home. The idea is we try and fast from 8.0 pm on 15th until 8.0 pm on 16th, come together for soup, rolls, coffee and biscuits - provided by the host family. We also try to have someone home from the 3rd world who tells of their work wherever it is and then we all give what we have saved on food into a 'hat' and to the organisation of the speaker. Thousands of pounds have been raised since we started 12 years ago.

have in North Belfast two We also ecumenical communities 'The Colombanus Community' and the 'Cornerstown Community' which have been established despite the situation and both doing excellent work across the divide. I am sorry I do not have any literature about them to send to you.

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
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
