
ICUMEN IN ...

Let them that will, debate The rival's precedence Of early or of late Immense munificence; When June arrives, the date Is summer's perfect tense.





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

Just over one hundred years ago Cleopatra's Needle was erected on the Thames Embankment in London. This magnificent obelisk could certainly tell many tales. Fifteen hundred years before the birth of Christ it stood proudly in Heliopolis in Egypt. Throughout the centuries history passed it by until eventually after many adventures it reached England and its position on the bank of the Thames.

An interesting fact emerged while the needle was being erected. It was discovered that part of the obelisk was hollow, and so it was decided that common objects of the day, children's toys, a set of coins, a bundle of newspapers, a London directory and other articles should be placed within it, so that at some future far away date, anyone finding these objects might discover how life was lived in Britain in 1878.

Much has changed in our land during the last century however and objects placed within the Needle reflecting life today would be very different from those chosen one hundred years ago. The shilling has given way to the fivepence piece, modern toys bear little resemblance to those of last century, and recent technology has made possible up to the minute worldwide news within our daily papers. Fashions change and little exists as it was in 1878.

There is something however which has not changed since that time and will not become old fashioned with the passing centuries. With the other objects within the obelisk in 1878 was placed a text from the Bible, from John's gospel, chapter three, verse sixteen. This text, perhaps the best loved in the Bible, was written out in English and two hundred and fifty other languages.

The text says 'God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish but have everlasting life'. These words of Jesus speak to our hearts as tenderly and compellingly today as they have spoken to men throughout the centuries, and as they will continue to do for generations to come.

Dear Friends,

Perhaps some of you will remember Andre who visited Stansted last year with the party from Chevetogne - he was the gentleman with long beard - a peaceful and quiet person, yet he surprised us all with his acrobatics at our social evening in the Day Centre! Andre spent the weekend with Geoff and me and was a delightful guest.

At Easter he wrote to tell us that a long held wish had become possible for him - his family (and he has a large one) are looking after the family small-holding where they live a self sufficient life - growing all their own food - with cows, goats, poultry and sheep - (Andre always wore a slip-over made from the wood of his own sheep) - but without the benefit of electricity. With his family's help, he has set out on a pilgrimage to Jerusalem - praying for peace - as he makes this old style pilgrimage on foot - carrying only a pack and taking no money with him! He doesn't expect to reach Jerusalem till Pentecost next year and then he hopes to stay on till the following Easter.

When he was with us last year he wanted a copy of the Psalms in English, so we gave him a copy of the Book of Common Praver, as that was the translation he wanted - he writes in his letter that he will be taking the Prayer Book in his pack - so I know he will be thinking of us here in Stansted and praying for us. I thought perhaps you would like to share in his pilgrimage by remembering him in your prayers and praying for peace in he world. It is an amazing undertaking - and I feel that all our prayers could be something very positive in our link with Chevetogne.

As I write this, we are preparing as an Ecumenical party to visit Chevetogne -Geoff and I are hoping that we may meet Andre's family and so obtain news of him.

Andre's leaving Belgium at Easter and returning from Jerusalem in 2 years time at Easter is I'm sure significant, for it was at Jesus' 1st meeting with his disciples after his resurrection that he said "Peace be with you". Peace worldwide and inward peace allow love to grow within us which leads to understanding and reconcilliation.

Healing Ministry : Prayer Requests for Healing

The healing ministry can take many forms: it can involve doctors and nurses and counselling. The communion is also a "healing sacrament" in that it celebrates the healed rift between God and ourselves through the offering and receiving of the body and blood of Christ.

There is one healing ministry we can all exercise and that is praying for the sick. In St John's a group of volunteers have offered to pray for the sick on a regular basis.

Those on the intercession list who we pray for every Sunday are perhaps only a few of those in need of our prayers. There may be many others known to us who need prayer support to uphold them in their daily pain or discomfort.

In St John's, at the back of the church, there is now a box in which can be placed requests for prayers for the sick. Anyone can request prayers for themselves or for others for any aspect of their well-being or wholeness: for the healing

of a marriage or some other relationship; for suffering after bereavement or for prayers during the "run-up" to an operation.

Each request received is passed on to one person on the list of prayer volunteers who will then undertake to pray regularly and privately for that person for one or three months. If you wish prayers to continue on this one-to-one basis after this time has elapsed, it will be necessary to renew the request (i.e. fill out a new card)

Confidentiality will always be maintained if wished. Therefore requests may or may not be placed on the monthly intercession list according to your wishes as indicated on the card.

This is an important ministry: important as an expression of the concern and love we have for one another as members of the 'family' of God. The box is there, please use it, and if you would like to volunteer to pray for someone on a regular basis, please phone me on 816070.



Last month's look into 1888 has posed a few questions, one being where the main area of our population were housed. As a short rough guide we could point to five distinct parts. Firstly, Silver Street, already a well established street, The same goes for Cambridge Road but with emphasis upon the eastern side. One house there on displays 1888. Lower Street was also well populated on both sides extending into Station Road. Chapel Hill on the left looking upwards was by this time fairly filled up the the Post Office. Woodfields and Woodfield Terrace were probably two of the earlier roads branching off the main highway that were built up as the former upon the higher side was almost complete. The right hand side of Chapel Hill behond the school remained clear apart from St. John's Road which was beginning to take shape. The main remaining area was left to Bentfield End with its own population of well over 500.

The roadways serving all of these places were (as still) a cause of much concern.

Who was the Surgeon? It looks as if this should have read "Surgeons" as two well respected gentlemen, Samuel Welch and Sydney Haynes (who was also Medical Officer and Public Vaccinator for the Stansted District of the Bishop's Stortford Union) held these titles.
