## VICAR'S NOTES

One characteristic about Stansted is that people seem to care for one another. It is a small enough community for people to know what is going on. am constantly being told of people who are sick at home or in hospital. We clergy therefore visjt all over the place - Harlow, Cambridge, London, Epping, Romford - and, of course, Bishop's Stortford. Because of this network of information we meet a great number of people over the years and we have a satisfying ministry.

But we not only visit the sick in this parish - clergy and laity pray for them every day. We do our best to keep our intercession list up to date and we are just starting a new scheme for which we ask your co-operation. At the back of St. Iohn's Church are cards on which you are invited to write the name of any person who is ill for whom you wish us to pray. The person may be a neighbour, friend or relative, no matter where they live. Post the card in the box provided - "COMMUNICATIONS TO THE VICAR" - and we shall pray for that person for one month. If you wish prayers to continue longer than one month please write aother card. Then we are asking for people to offer to pray for the sick. They will be given one or two names to pray for for one month. Ragni whitock is organising all this for us so if you want to help with the work of prayer, give her a ring on 816070.

As well as prayers we also administer the sacrament of unction when we anoint with holy oil with the laying-on of hands. We do this after due preparation. So if you want this sacrament please speak to one of the clergy.

We believe by visiting, praying and through the sacranents of the Eucharist and Holy Unction we continue Christ's heajing ministry on earth. We ask you to help us.

As I write I have just heard that Dorothy Kershaw has died. She never recovered from the stroke she suffered in her home. She was a life long communicant of the Church and received the sacrament, in later years, at home once a month and always with devotion and preparation. Many of her former pupils remember her with affection and gratitude. May she rest in peace and rise in glory.


We are sorry that Richard and tsobel Mayn and their children have mover from Stansted. tsobel was a great help in the Church and her lively mind was an inspiration to us. We shall miss her on our Education ministry Group.

We wish them every happiness in their new home in Paignton.

I was visiting one of our Cathedrals recently where there are a number of contemporary works of art, both in tapestry and sculpture. I stood in front of a tapestry designed by John Piper. It is worked in vivid colours - exciting against the old grey stone and the carved wood of the reredos. The theme is the Holy Trinity with symbols in the centre panels representing the Father, the son and the Holy Spirit, while in flanking panels there are the symbols of the four Flements and the four Evangelists. Behind me I heard two people discussing the tapestry: This striking work was "out of place"; "not in keeping with the ancient building"; "too modern".

I am wondering whether this point of view means that for many people Christianity is only revealed in the works of the Middle Ages. Somehow, we should only meet God in mediaeval buildings and interpret his message through language of another time. A lot is written about Christianity being out of date; we live in a post Christian age we are told, and often by the very people who most admore the old buildings and deplore the updating of the language of the liturgy.

Perhaps those artists of the 14 C and 15 C were too successful, their work has helped us to stick in the past. Their work was modern in its original conception. It is true that artists and designers gave of their very best, but it is also true that some of the work was for the glory of patrons and local nobility as much as for God. They were paying for the building after all.
It seems to me that God speaks to us most of all through everyday lives, people whom we meet, whom we know and through our developing knowledge of how our selves and the world are made; God in everything.

This month $i$ visited the Science Museum in Kensington. There, there is a beautiful exhibition of a single animal cell many times magnified. Man contains about one hundred billion cells, each one wonderfully, marvellousjy designed and extremely complicated. The extraordinary mystery of life is gradually being revealed, the world more and more in front of our eyes.
Surely our thoughts about religion must develop too? How much we need humility in face of the wonders. We still do not understand ourselves, our needs and our relations with each other, singly or in groups. Chrjstians belijeve that love is the driving force. This message is as modern as ever, as important as two thousand years ago. Simple - yet infinitely complicated.

## "What Place has Drama in Worship"

Paul Alexander's name was not new to me: my summer holiday reading had included his autobiography; he was also at the Edinburgh Festival with his performance of St John's Gospel. Paul was exploring a field which had long intrigued me: the place of drama in worship. 'What can we do to interest young people?': 'How can we make There are no simple answers to these questions, he felt, but perhaps something of an answer is indicated when more and more people eager to communicate the Gospel turn to an organisation such as SEEDS.

Discovering and expressing our God-given Gifts
SEEDS comprises a team of artists covering the entire range of creative activity from acting, theatre and opera, to directing, writing, singing, dancing, music, composing, poetry, prayer, creative parenthood and the use of video. Their ministry is to promote creativity in worship, to help church congregations renew their understanding, and revitalise their love for worship, by the use of the creative arts - by discovering and expressing their God-given gifts.
'You can learn by daboling', said paul. 'What we hope to give is an experience of, and involvement in, a creative process'. 'Process' and 'experience' are the two crucial words here. Both are essential for the individual to discover his creativity. Perhaps, he suggested, that is where the Church can learn from the artist. The Church teaches that 'Christ is our life'; but that life must be experienced and become a reality for each of us.

What is it that the artist brings to the Gospel? Quite simply, an experience nf it. 'Art can sinack into people's souls', Paul claimed. 'Dramaticaliy, your唯

Paul is perhaps best known for his kerformance of st fohn's Gospel. He first turned to that text when searching for the spirituality of the Christian faith.
'On stage, l attempt to live out, to telj a Gospel which t believe absolutely. Both you, the audience and l are engaged in a process which is aj ive because i am with you, struggling to make it a reality, experiencing the truth - and just as surprised by truth as you are'.

In recent years, the Church has been guilty of holding the artist in fear, and treating him with mistrust. Discovering ourselves as creators, as participants in God's creative activity, is a painful process which demands a fearful journey into our own depths, and a disturbing of the waters therein. For most of us these waters remain untouched, stagnant - and so we deny ourselves an experience of God's transforming love.

The artist's commitment to Christ is in this strughle to "make it real"; to tell a story that gives life in abundance: and to open eyes, open ears and open minds.

In February 1633 g great and good man sent a book, written in longhand, from his deathber in Bemerton, near Salisbury, to a great and good friend in little Gidding. near Hidntington. The Reved Fdinund Duncon was asked to deliver this message with the book: "Sir, i pray deljver this ljttle book to my dear brother, and tell him he shall find in it a picture of the many spiritual conflicts that have passed betwixt God and my soul, before 1 could subject mine to the will of lesus my Master: in whose service l have now found perfect freenom: desire him to read it: ard then, if he can think it may turn to the advantage of any dejected poor soul, iet it be made public; if not, let him burn it: for l and it are less than the least of God's mercies."

So George Herbert sent the manuscript of his poetry, within a few days of his death in his fortieth year, to his closest friend, Nicholas Ferrar. Thank God Ferrar instantly saw the greatness of the poems and had them published. One cannot imagine how it could have been otherwise. Filit had he judged them worthless and burnt them we would never have sung these great hymns: "king of glory, King of peace", "Let all the world in every corner sing", "The God of love my Shepherd is" and "Teach me, my God and King". Nor would we have heard that unsurpassed devotional poem, "Love bade me welcome". English literature would have losi a unique volume of superb poetry and English spirituality a glorious treasure for the soul.

Herbert was of aristocratic birth, brijliant intellect, very high attainment at an early age. The highest offices of the land lay in prospect before him. But "he chose rather to serve at God's altar, than to seek the honour of state employments". Many of his friends thought it beneath his dignity to become a clergyman. Herbert replied, "It hath formerly been adjudged that the domestic servants of the king of Heaven should he of the noblest families on earth; and though the iniquity of late times have made clergymen meanly vaued, and the sacred name of priest contemptible, yet will l labour to make it honourable by consecrating all my learning, and all my poor abilities, to advance the glory of that God that gave them".

George Herbert's greatest distinction is that he was a true saint, living ever more closely to God as his years went on. The secret of his warm, compassionate, generous sanctity lay in his life of prayer. In this time of Lent the first lines of his poem "Prayer" come timely:
"Prayer, the Church's banquet, Angels" age,
God's breath in man returning to his birth.
The soul in paraphrase, heart in pilgrimage,
The Christian plummet, sounding heaven and earth."

## "OUR VILLAGE"

Sorry to tell at this moment little further knowledge of Mr. J.S. Francis has so far come to light, apart from a memory of his Watch and Clock shop that stood almost opposite the Windmill Public House (now Guest House) and a remark of his which went something like "If you want to buy a watch, buy a watch, but don't stand breathing on my windows", said in his own special accent that can only be retold by those to whom it was meant for. Given tjme, something further is sure to emerge.

So we will progress a little further with our look at greens Stores where now the early 1900 's are beginning to unfurl. The proprietors certainly bad the forward-looking approach and knew how to tempt customers to their store, for they offered a hancsome present to all young couples about to marry who purchased furniture from the store (who could not normally afford to pay a visit). The range of goods was perhaps comparable with a modern departmental store.

After Monday's weekly wash (clothes and linen) a mangle was a must, a very strong mangle with $18^{\prime \prime}$ rollers could be yours for 35 shilitings (who can remember turning one of these with the tub underneath to catch the water). Now something to cover to the fioorboards "Special Best Cork lino" $13 /$ fod for a square 3 yrdsx 3 yds. If you were lucky enough to afford it this could be atopped by an Axminster Carpet at $4 / 11 d$ per yard. A brass fender for the downstairs fireplace 5/11d while one for upstairs, for most bedrooms had provision for an open fire,
would cost you $1 / 0$ bd. Double sized 1 ron bedsteads went from $13 / 11$. For the olr front ronm (or if you were better off, sitting room) a seven piece suite of furniture could cost as much as $x 3$ gs 6d. Remembering this room was, and often still is, only used on high days and holidays, for a fire in the front room was something special.

All of these articles could be dellvered to your door transported either by a horse or more often multi-horse power-drawn wagon. Failing this, a steamdriven pantechnicon van was at their disposal which would probably be manned by a crew of two who had to sit upon this machine with little or no protection from the elements, the only windscreen wipers needed being a piece of rag to wipe clean their eye goggles from the smoke and smuts. Nevertheless, business must have been quite brisk for they offered removals by road, rail or sea.

## GORSEF IELD RES IDENTIAL CENTRE

Gorsefield Residential Centre is one of the Inner London Education Authority's rural centres. J. is specifically for the use of children and teachers from the one hundred or so pi imary, secondary and special schools in the London borough of Tower Hamlets. The centre is used all the year round in a great variety of ways.

The children are resident for a week at a time and come to the centre with their teachers to undertake many different activities and experiences. Tnis will depend on the age of the children and whether they are doing exam courses or not, etc. Consequently one week may be used by a sixth form biology group, and the next by a group of 8 year olds from a stepney Primary school.

You may well see groups of children in the village, perhaps comparing the shops up Chapel Hill with those along Whitechapel High Streat. Ynu may come acioss a long straggly line of children walking along footpaths up to Ugley, possibly studying the wild flowers, trees, anjmal signs, or perbaps doing some orienteering with maps and compasses. The children also travel away from Gorsefield on occasions - to Saffron Walden to look at the architecture, to Hertford Cattle Market, to a local farm and so on. All of these are new experiences to London Children.

Whatever the children do when they visit Gorsefield is closely tied up with what they are doing back in the classroom at school. Often the work the children have indertaken up in Stansted becomes the basis fo the rest of the term's work.

Not only do the children work hard when they are here, but the whole experience of living in a beautiful country house for a week is something most of them have never experienced and may well never experience again!
