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

Curate's Letter

are living in very busy times, and if anything life is becoming busier. As a result, numerous people suffer with stress or stress related problems. I constantly hear people say that they areunder a 'lot of stress'. Unfortunately, stress is a very cunning problem in that it is so difficult to The problems caused by stress measure. such as tiredness, feeling low, or a gradual loss of enthusiasm, can always be accounted for by other things.

So what is stress? Well stress isn't necessarily caused by an active or busy life, even though over activity is usually held responsible for stress. highly active life may well be a very fulfilled life. Fundamentally, stress is an imbalance between 'the sort of life we need to lead' and the 'life that we do lead'. The further apart these are the stressful life will generally become.

Living 'the sort of life we need to lead' vary enormously between people. However, we can say that it will have something to do with us feeling fulfilled. And more importantly fulfilled in different areas of our lives, not simply in one bit. Our stress occurs when we neglect important parts of our humanity in order to be obsessed with one aspect of what we do. Eventually that aspect will take over our lives to the exclusion of everything else. The parts we have ignored, whether they be our family, our creative hobbies, or the simple need to be alone and quiet, will then fight for attention causing us stress with all its related symptoms. should, therefore, always be looking to lead balanced lives which bring together the different sides of our character. Easier said than done I know, but it's important we try.

Our faith should help us towards greater balance and less stress. God promises to share our burdens with us. He seeks to call us into the quiet places of our hearts and minds to nourish and support us. Above all, time with God will give us the insight to get our life in perspective and to put our values in order.

In this life it is doubtful that we will ever all walk around with carefree smiles, but maybe with a little more prayer and self discipline we could be less 'stress filled' and more 'peace filled' people than we are at present.



QUAKER WOMEN IN AREAS OF CONFLICT

I recently attended a day in London when three women described their work in the Middle East. Northern Ireland and Sri Lanka. All had been in areas where religious and sometimes racial differences had led to long-term problems, often of a horrifying intensity and violence.

The speaker on the Middle East had been in charge of the Quaker 'Placement programme' in that area, where nurses, teachers and social workers are trying, in small ways, to work for reconciliation. She discussed her experiences in Israel and on the West Bank, where the uprising since 1987 has given the people there hope and purpose in life, and where protest involves peaceful religious groups, as well as the more violent elements.

The second speaker, who lives in Northern Ireland, described the effects of conflict on the children there: how the experiences of seeing friends killed and wounded, knowing their fathers were in prison, witnessing violent house searches and arrests by the army had led to a generation of disturbed children, where stress has led to drug-taking and the need for tranquilisers. She had worked in the Visitor Centre at the Maze Prison, run by Quakers, but discovered that her own child feared that this might make her a target.

The third woman worked as a doctor in Sri Lanka and had seen the effects of great violence in the fighting between the Tamil and Singalese communities there. People are afraid to trust each other, in spite of a 'Peace Accord' signed last year. Her job had been to try and establish some basic medical facilities in the more remote villages, by training local people to do the work; but the need is enormous.

In all three areas, the violence is of a 'sectarian' nature; in all three areas there is a feeling of depression about the difficulties to overcome: and in all three efforts are being made by individuals to bring about a better and more peaceful future.

John Bunyan's Pilgrim, Christian, had scarcely started his pilgrimage from the City of Destruction to the Celestial City before his progress was almost brought to a premature and abortive end. Two people, names Obstinate and Pliable, and one place, The Slough of Despond, posed this threat. All three were really allegorical portrayals of states of his own mind and spirit, or the influence upon him of such states in other people.

The character Obstinate portrays that state in us which would prevent us from even starting upon the pilgrimage of Christian faith and life. I am obstinate when I am inflexibly and immovably adhering to my own attitudes, opinions or course of action; when I am stubbornly resistant to reason, testimony, entreaty or even evidence; when my mind is closed to all ways of thinking but my own and rigidly refuses to change. There are some who reject Christianity out of hand in this sort of obstinacy. One such says, "What science cannot prove, man cannot know", as though that were the only way to truth and reality. Another says, "Look at all the evil and suffering that has come from religion" and so repudiates it entirely, as though there were nothing more to be said. Yet another may say, "Modern, educated man outgrown any need of religion", has assuming that Christianity is only of temporary pragmatic value and not a intrinsic truth matter of and eternal honour the honest atheist and worth. 1 the genuine agnostic. Bunyan's Obstinate represents the rigidly closed mind that is arrogant in its own opinions. This denies an openness to true not only but seriously religion, hinders or prevents the establishment of justice, reconciliation and peace throughout this world.

The character Pliable shows us an opposite threat to Christian Pilgrimage. Pliable, as Bunyan describes him, is all too eastly influenced, swayed, enthused or deterred. He is all wishbone and no backbone. He bends to every wind that

If Obstinate is unyielding Pliable is spineless putty. has him very readily joining Obstinate is unyielding granite. Christian in his pilgrimage because of what was it it for him. His eyes were not set on the Glory of God and the coming of God's Kingdom, but on what he in his purely self-centred wanted When he soon encountered desires. difficulty and not dividends, he gave up. follows Christ for Anvone who essentially selfish reasons will not stay with Him long. And those who may continue to "tag along" in the hope of some "spin-off" will be much frustrated and have a joyless religion. It is those who delight to do God's will who find the satisfactions and joys of Christianity.

The Slough of Despond represents a fairly common experience of Christians. and exultation thrill which many experience when becoming Christians is often followed by a reversal of mood and feeling into despondency. This is part our psychology. Our emotional resources cannot sustain a perpetual high (Nor, indeed, endure an unyielding low point). The mountain top has its corresponding valleys. But most the time our souls are healthiest in, to speak, gently undulating country. It is not good to wallow in despondency. Neither is it good to be forever seeking some new spiritual thrill or "shot-inthe-arm". An unhealthy longing for the often produces the former. latter Genuine faith does not depend on thrills, though enjoying them when they come. Whatever our feelings God is God and, as Christ marvellously shows, God is Love.

So what to write? Perhaps I might share with the wider "audience" something that I plan to say next Sunday. Call it sermonising if you will.

At this time the world is full of ware, destress and calamity of flood and famine. This disturbs faith in that it brings up a question older than Job. Why does God allow such things to happen? Job's reply is, in essence - perhaps you mere mortals could build a better world?

The world can be dangerous, and we can make it more dangerous, but would we really want a world which did not contain adventure and excitement? I have, in a small way, been caught up in Nature's sudden whims and to deny that the element of danger, risk and adventure is not exciting and challenging would not be telling the truth. That still does not explain death and destruction but it is a part of this mad, mad, wonderful world we live in.

Consider, men have gone down to the sea in ships, risking life, since time Think of the old seafaring immemorial. Saint, Brendan, braving the oceans.

After centuries of wrecks around our coasts, a man named Sir W.M Hillary had the idea of forming a voluntary service, voluntarily supported which today is known as the R.N.L.I. The lifeboat crews risk their lives in all kinds of storms, to save others. This is getting too long so I quote these words of Winston Churchili.

"The lifeboat drives on with a mercy which does not quail in the prescence of death, it drives on as a proof, a symbol, a testimony, that man is created in the image of God, and that virtue and valour have not perished from the British race".

Could we paraphrase: The Church of Christ drives on with a mercy which does not quail in the presence of death, it drives on as a proof, a symbol, a testimony, that man is created in the image of God.

In spite of storm and shipwreck (think of St. Paul) or calamity. No power can separate us from the love of God made known to us in Christ. Think about it.

"OUR VILLAGE"

Towards the end of August 1988, work began on demolishing another well-known village building which had stood for the past forty years or so along St. John's Road. It was known and used as the school kitchen and canteen.

Having been constructed by Messrs. J.L. Glasscock around 1947 with Mr. J. Levey being the Builder's Foreman, materials were to be supplied through the Ministry of Works to form a single-storey unit of brick and concrete supports holding metal framed windows and corrugated asbestos roofing which together well outlived its expected lifespan. Initial electrical installation was carried out by L.G. Maslen. A dividing wall with built-in serving hatches covered (except at meal times) by roller shutters separated the kitchen from dining area.

Dinners were supervised, prepared, cooked and served by a staff known as "The Dinner Ladies", whilst those what washed up always seemed to be engulfed in steam. Cooked meals also prepared from this kitchen were delivered by van driven by "The Dinner Man" to many other schools within our district. School dinners were eaten at fold-down type tables with bench seats. Meals were collected and distributed by dinner monitors who always seemed to be able to get a "little more" by saying "that's mine".

Many other activities were held in this canteen (hall) ranging from school assemblies with music accompaniment of a piano to the Annual Parish Meeting. Now all that's left to remind us of these and many other activities is an area of levelled rubble with the chimney stack being last to come under the hammer.

Prior to having a building upon this site the ground was used for allotments, the peak growing time being during war years. Before this Mr. Herrington (Loppy) had the use of this field as grazing for his cows which he daily drove down towards Chapel Hill where a gate (just upwards of today's school gate) allowed him to drive them across Chapel Hill along Woodfields-Millside to their milking sheds beyond Mill pit.


