#### IT'S TIME TO RIGHT WRONGS

.... is the theme of this year's CHRISTIAN AID WEEK, May 11-20. Here in Stansted there will be the usual houseto-house envelopg collection, and if you have a few hours to spare that week you will be most welcome as a collector.

The Market is on 20 May at the Friends Meeting House 10-12 a.m. There will be the usual stalls, except that this year we shall not be selling clothing. Instead there will be a Bring and Buy stall. Please support us in any way you can.

#### KAMPUCHEA

You may have seen the film "The Killing Fields" and have been horrified by the atrocities committed by the Pol Pot regime. Christian Aid fear that when the Vietnamese, who ousted the regime, have the country by 1990, Pol Pot, now based in Thailand, may take over again. Also, our Government, in common with most western governments, gives no assistance in Kampuchea. For these reasons, Christian Aid has produced a card to send to our M.P. requesting an inernational peace settlement and development aid for Kampuchea. If you feel that you can sign a card, or if you wish to know more about please contact me or your Kampuchea, local church representative.

Christian Aid is supporting projects in Kampuchea to improve food production, to provide supplies and artificial limbs (many people have suffered terrible injuries from Khmez Rouge attacks). It has to be recognized, however, that Kampuchea has already brought the country back from ruin by its own efforts and with little outside help. It could do so much more with our support.

#### THE SHALOM GROUP

Having in the two previous years enjoyed Retreats at Pleshey under the leadership of an eminent Jesuit and a Methodist don respectively, the Group chose Hengrave Hall in Suffolk for this year's weekend, with Penelope Eckerstry; a well-known Anglican, as leader. We owe a great deal to all of them.

Hengrave is outstandingly suited to its present role as an ecumenical retreat and conference venue. A lath century home for a succession of Roman Catholic families, it possesses a beauty and dignity which in itself puts visitors in the relaxed frame of mind which is not only the very essence of retreats, but is also a vital but scarce component of all our lives. Moreover the Community which runs Hengrave Hall had a quiet, warm, efficiency which made us feel that we too belonged.

The theme was "Give our roots rain". We were encouraged to consider our place in God's purpose, which led us to realise that although man is supreme in the order of creation, he/she is also co-inheritor of life on this planet, and should live within the world in which we find ourselves, and not see ourselves as or manipulators of its wonders. arbiters We learnt humility and appreciation. We that it is these simple realised qualities which so often become trampled underfoot in everyday life and which a retreat is so helpful in reinstating to their rightful place. The gardens and lakeside at Hengrave enabled us to absorb this more fully.

We held a Prayer and Praise evening on Saturday, and attended the morning Mass on Sunday morning, from which all of us. whatever our denomination, drew inspiration and comfort.

In true Shalom Group tradition we mixed our spiritual recreation with temporal by giving Monica a surprise party to mark her XXth birthday.

What greater joy could there be than the yearly celebration of the good news that Jesus has triumphed over the cross and risen again from the dead? For Christians, Easter is the greatest festival of all - the events we celebrate are central to our faith.

But the impact of Easter on our society is far less than that of Christmas. True, Easter Eggs are on sale in the shops for weeks and weeks beforehand, but how many of those who buy or eat them appreciate their symbolism of new life which God offers us through the resurrection of Jesus?

Perhaps you may also wonder why this letter is focusing on Easter when Easter Day will have already passed by the time most of you read this magazine. In fact the two questions are closely connected. Because Easter is not just a one-off event: the resurrection is not just something we remember for one day in the year. It is something which we celebrate over and over again. Each Sunday is a reminder of the first Easter Day; each celebration of the Eucharist is a sharing in the risen Christ. As St. Paul writes: "If there is no resurrection from the dead, then Christ has not been raised if Christ has not been raised, then our preaching is in vain and your faith is in vain" (I Cor. 16: 13-14).

We are called to live as "Easter Christians" - people who know that Jesus rose from the dead and who are ready to proclaim that joyful news to others. Can we say - as Mary Magdalene says after her encounter with the risen Christ in the graden that first Easter morning - "1 have seen the Lord!" More importantly can we not just say it, but shout it aloud with the joy and conviction that Mary must have felt. Do we live as though we have met the risen Christ - as though we have walked and talked with him as those first witnesses to the resurrection did?

At the end of this month, eight youngsters and three adults from our congregation will be confirmed. On that occasion they will make a public declaration of their faith in the risen Christ - they will mark the beginning of a new stage in their life as committed, communicant members of the church. In the weeks before the confirmation - and afterwards - they will need the support, the encouragement and the example of all in the congregation as they seek to fulfil their commitment. They need to see in each of us the joy that comes from being a follower of Christ. Please take the trouble to get to know them - to encourage them - and above all to pray for them in the weeks ahead. A confirmation is an important event in the life of the church - and an opportunity for each of us to recall and renew our own commitment to follow the risen Christ and to proclaim him to others.

May God bless you this Eastertide.

#### SOME THOUGHTS ON THE SWORD AND THE SPIRIT'

"I am always very wary" said my friend, "when people start brandishing swords above my head, feeling as I do that, should I disagree with them, I am liable to lose my ears."

Why then is the image of the sword so disburbing? - violence, anger, the clash of steel, the heat of the moment - these are all part of it, and yet there is more: a feeling of the overriding of another's will and way; action at any price; conversion whatever the cost. All so very human, what then of the divine?

The process of becoming a Quaker is termed 'convicement'. For us there is no glint of steel in the sunshine, no blinding light on the Damascus' road, but a small steady gleam in the darkness which grows ever stronger and brighter the nearer we move towards it; a long, slow infusion of the Spirit in which thought, word and action are revised and refined, maybe many times, before we eventually reach our goal.

There is a tale famous in Quaker history of how William Penn, when he first came among the Friends, always wore he sword which had once saved his life without harming anyone. It struck a discordant note, however, and he asked George Fox, the founder of the Society, what he should do about it. "I counsel thee" said Fox, "to wear it as long as thou canst." Some months later, when they met again, George Fox noticed that Penn was not wearing his sword. "Will" he said "where is thy sword?" "I took they counsel, George" said Penn, "and wore it just as long as I could."

Faith in God, faith in the man, faith in that of God in the man, that ultimately the "evil would weaken and the good be raised up."

"Give us the calm assurance that you yourself will know how to reveal your truth and your righteousness to others, even as we believe that you have in some measure revealed them to us." runs the prayer of one modern Quaker. Or, as that 'eminent Victorian', Mrs Do-as-you-wouldbe-done-by in Kingsley's "The Water Babies" counselled her singularly 'do-y' world. Teach us to care, and not to care. Teach us to sit still."

#### NORTHERN IRELAND

"Our God is one whose goodness cannot and will not be overcome and that the situation in Nortern Ireland is one to which we all contribute by our tendency to ignore it until the next atrocity bursts onto our TV screens."

A group is being formed in Bishop's Stortford/Stansted to overcome ignorance of the Northern Irish question and to actively find ways of supporting the many positive efforts that are being made there to combat the divisions that exist. To this end, a small ecumencial party is visiting Belfast on 14-16 March to meet with various factions and to gain firsthand knowledge of the difficulties experienced.

Already the impression has been gained that Northern Irish people think that the general public in England is contemptuous and impatient of the situation and do not really wish to know about it unless it personally affects them. It has already been seen that a little interest shown by people here gives tremendous encouragement to the peace-seekers, and can also deflate the hostility that the Irish feel towards Northern the 'comfortable' English. A wish to understand and help in whatever way the people in Belfast suggest is the purpose of the visit; to also help them realise that not everyone here is hypercritical, and to implement a two-way visiting programme. This is the vision the group has as its aims for the future.

In exploring the possibilities of where and who to visit, the group were surprised to learn of a nondenominational college in Belfast, Lagan College, which was the first to make a positive attempt to climb the barriers. This college has undergone critical difficulties but the courage and tenacity of its members has enabled it to continue. The English group wish to give active support in this area, even if only of a financial nature.

There are many brave schemes in Northern Ireland which need our interest, and the group hope to gain knowledge of these to pass on to people here for their sympathy and support. Methodist


#### POST OFFICE POEM

> areas of need, new members and voluntary helpers.

If members of your Church would like a visit from the Organiser or would like to call in at our office which is open from 9.30 a.m. to 12.30 p.m. on weekdays we will be happy to organise it.

#### INFORMATION

The Uttlesford Council for Voluntary Service exists to co-ordinate the activities of the various voluntary organisations in the District Council Area and to offer services and support to them in a variety of ways. Voluntary Organisations in all the towns and villages in Uttlesford are listed in our Directory (price £2.50) and information about Care Groups in the area is published in our quarterly Newsletter.

In addition to this co-ordinating role, the UCVS endeavours to seek out areas of need and put into operation agencies to meet those needs. As an established Voluntary Service Council, we have the opportunity to nominate candidates to sit on various bodies such as the Community Health Council, Joint Consultative Committees and Joint Care Planning Teams. Projects which we have initiated include the recently launched branch of MIND which will help people with mental health problems in a Hospital Discharge Scheme which helps patients (mostly elderly), during the first few days after they leave hospital. Our present concerns are to establish a Care Network to cover Uttlesford which will deal with minor, non-medical emergencies (and provide 24 hour duty officers in key parts of the region), to set up a branch or two of CRUSE - the organisation that cares for the Widowed and their children, and to investigate ways of co-ordinating transport in this rural district.

The Uttlesford Council for Voluntary Service had its Inaugural Meeting in October 1987 and now has an office on the Hospital site in Saffron Walden. The present organiser, Gwyneth Southgate, will be happy to answer any queries about the UCVS and put organisations requiring assistance in touch with agencies who can offer help. Members of our organisation include Parish Councils, Individual County and District Councillors, Churches, Women's Institutes, The Red Cross, St. John's Ambulence Service, The W.R.V.S., Day Centres, Clubs for the Elderly, Handicapped Groups, W.E.A.s and Social Clubs.

Membership, which is £5 annually, entitles a group of individual to a free copy of the Directory of Voluntary Organisations in Uttlesford, the delivery of the quarterly Newsletter, Free Publicity in it, Public Relations Services through the UCVS office and photocopying at cost (5p a sheet, A4 only at present).

We will be dopening a VOLUNTEER BUREAU soon and anyone wishing to register as a volunteer or to join the UCVS as a Member is asked to get in touch with the UCVS Office, c/o Saffron Walden Hospital, Radwinter Road, Saffron Walden, CB11 3HY, Telephone Saffron Walden 513626.



## THE SIGN OF THE FISH

IN THE early days of Christianity it could be very dangerous to admit that you were one of Jesus' followers. You could be arrested, imprisoned and executed, simply for your beliefs.

Christians had to meet in secret — but how could you tell if a stranger was a Christian or not? To recognise one another Christians used secret signs, and one of these was the sign of the fish which could easily be scratched on a wall or in the dust of the road. If the other person wasn't a Christian he'd just think you were doodling, but if he knew, then you knew he was a Christian.

The fish was used as a sign because, in Greek, the first letters of the words 'Jesus Christ God's Son, Saviour spell 'ichthus', the Greek word for fish.



Today, real Christians are still difficult to recognise. Some of them like Vicars or Priests wear a 14 special collar, and nuns

sometimes wear a special dress, which tells you what they do. But how do you show other people that you are a Christian? If you have a happy smile, helping hands, and are friendly, these can be signs that others will recognise.

#### SECRETS

The sign of the fish was a secret sign. If you'd like to send someone a secret message, you can do it with 'invisible ink'.

You need a lemon or onion; squeeze the juice of it into a small bowl.

Using the juice as 'ink', with a clean nib in a proper pen, write your message on a piece of paper. Leave it to dry, and as it dries the message will disappear.

To make it reappear, hold the paper over a lamp or radiator.

This is a very easy way of sending secret messages, but you have to be sure that the person you are writing to knows how to make the message reappear.
