

At the start of December, the church begins the season of Advent, when it looks forward to Christmas. Advent is a time of preparation, but also a time of anticipation, as we look forward to celebrating again the birth of Jesus.

It is difficult to keep the season of Advent properly nowadays when the shops are already full of Christmas goods, and we ourselves become preoccupied with our domestic preparations. It is useful, therefore, to have something to remind us of the need for spiritual preparation.

In church this year we will have an Advent Ring to help us look forward to Christmas. This is something which can easily be copied at home and is a more fitting symbol than modern Advent calendars which are purely secularised.

The Advent Ring has very ancient origins. It consists of a circle of evergreen with four candles spaced round it with a fifth larger candle in the centre. The evergreen and the circle are symbols of creation and of eternity; the candles are symbols of the light which Jesus brings into the world at his birth. In practical terms this can be made with a circle of Oasis on a large plate or tray.
Try using it on the dining table, and lighting the candles before lunch on each Sunday.

The candles, too, have their own symbolism. They remind us of people who are looking forward to Jesus' birth. The first candle, lit on the first Sunday of Advent (3 December) reminds us of the Prophets of the Old Testament, who foretold the coming of Testament, who foretold the coming of the Messiah.

The second candle, lit on the second Sunday, reminds us of John the Baptist, who came to prepare people for Jesus' birth and called them to repent of their sins.

The third candle reminds us of the Virgin Mary, the mother of Jesus, who looked forward to the birth of her son, knowing how special he was to be.

The fourth candle reminds us of all God's people - including ourselves - as we prepare to celebrate the birth of our Saviour.

The fifth candle, in the centre, lit on Christmas Day, reminds us that Jesus has come into the world and shines as a light in our hearts and lives.

This prayer can be used as each candle is lit:

Eternal God, you have declared in Christ the completion of your purpose of love. May we live by faith, walk in hope, and be renewed in love, until the whole world reflects your glory, and you are all in all. Even so, come Lord Jesus. All: Come, Lord Jesus, come.

May God bless you as you keep this holy season of Advent, and shine in your hearts as you celebrate again the birth of his Son at Christmas.

Intimations of Mortality

It may be the dying of the old year that has made me think of some paragraphs in our Questions and Counsel.
They urge us to "Approach old age
with courage. It may bring wisdom
and serene detachment as well as pain
and loneliness. Look for new opportunities for praying and listening".

"Grow old along with me The best is yet to be"

were the Robert Browning words I often heard my father repeat to my mother while I, with the brashness of early middle age, urged her to "grow old gracefully".

Now that I have come to that stage of life myself, I understand what a task I set her. Constantly we hear of or come to know people who are beset by the ugly and humiliating ailments of old age and we wonder how "graceful-ness" can possibly exist. What grace is there in -

"Second childishness, and mere oblivion, Sans eyes, sans teeth, sans taste, sans everything?"

Some weeks ago we heard of the passing from life to eternity of Dudley Robinson after many long years of Alzheimer's Disease. What will remain with us is the sweetness of his nature and the truthful ring of his ministry in Meeting: and this even after his mind was becoming clouded. A reminder that, quite apart from the body and mind, a soul too undergoes training through a lifetime.

I have for long cherished a paragraph in Dame Felicitas Corrigan's biography of Helen Waddell, the medieval scholar and author of Peter Abellard. Her life, it seemed, had ceased to be as the result of organic brain failure with "the total eclipse of her dazzling gifts of intellect, winning charm, balance and humour, her ripe scholarship and deep spirituality. Mute, unheeding, unfeeling, blind to all beauty, a stranger to the family she had so loved, she sat day after day before a picture of Christ crucified, and in that darkness of soul and body, who shall say what mighty work was being wrought in and by her spirit? Mankind was redeemed by a man stretched out with hands and feet fastened by nails to a cross."

Paragraph 36 of Questions and Counsel includes the words: "In despair, remember that Jesus too felt despair on the cross. By accepting the fact of death we are freed to live more fully".

In that is our hope - and we can with a cheerful heart wish each other a Happy Christmas.

This feature is being written in the week preceding Remembrance Day. It is too early to judge how the 'poppy collection' is going - although our 'team' is making an even greater effort this year. Next week our branch has its AGM. So what, you may ask? It is a paradox - or perhaps inevitable by the very nature of things - that at a time when the Legion is being called upon to exercise an increasing benevolent function (via the 'poppy appeal' proceeds), there are fewer active members to perform the imperative roles at the grass roots - i.e. the branches.

There are still many 1914-18 survivors (in all senses) to be looked after; the 1939-45 'veterans' are of an age when, through failing health and hard times, they are deserving of help. And we must not forget that their dependents are looked after too. Subsequent conflicts since 1945 have also produced their victims.

This branch has recently bade farewell to two of our number - Fred Boyd and Fred Harris. "We will remember them". Our branch presently numbers some 70 members. Many can no longer play an active part - but still gladly pay their subs (£5 standard or £3.50 at pensioners' rate). There must be many ex-servicemen (and women) out there who could fill the gaps and swell our ranks - to do the work of the Legion, which must go on for many years to come. Nor is membership confined only to ex-service personnel; others can become 'associate members'. The old service adage about "don't volunteer for anything" is misplaced in this

The demolition of the annexe had meant the loss of 8 craft stalls, but the 18 fitted into the remaining space, providing a wide variety of crafts and a selection of early Christmas presents for all ages.

Although the same number of artists showed paintings this year, it had been decided to limit the number that each painter could submit so that "only" 534 were exhibited. This meant that most paintings were able to be hung just a little better and this was appreciated by artists and visitors who were unanimous in their views that this year they were generally of excellent quality.

Statistics are nearly always meaningless but the event which we regard as a true village event produces monies to be distributed to village charities and good causes. This year's beneficiaries will be considered as soon as possible and although all accounts have not been received, it appears likely that well over £1,000 will be distributed.

The Committee are already, following the loss of the annexe, considering possible ways and means of catering for more craft stalls and improving the viewing of the pictures. This is of course a very vexed and complicated matter and a great deal of thought will be required, but the Committee are determined to ensure that the future of this event will be maintained far beyond this, its 11th successful year.

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Uttlesford Council

Projects which the UCVS has initiated include the Branch of Uttlesford MIND which helps people with mental health problems, a Hospital Discharge Scheme through which representatives from the Rural Over Sixties Clubs in North Uttlesford can help those newly discharged from hospital and the Uttlesford Community Transport group which organises non urgent transport to hospital. A branch of Uttlesford CRUSE, the bereavement care service, will be launched next spring and a Steering Committee is working on a Care Network of volunteers to cover the whole district. In late 1988 the W.H. Smith Willing Hands Scheme came into operation. People wishing to do voluntary work in the community can collect an application form from the Saffron Walden or Bishop's Stortford branch of W.H. Smith and send it in to the UCVS office and, as soon as the new network can organise it, the new volunteers will be placed.

Members of our organisation include Parish Councils, County and District Councillors, Churches, Women's Institutes, The Red Cross, St John Ambulance, W.R.V.S., Royal British Legion, Day Centres, Clubs for the Handicapped, Over 60s Clubs and Social groups. Individuals or groups can join the UCVS for an annual subscription of £5.
