Sometimes a few words can say a great deal. This is certainly true of the two verses written above. They are Psalm 117 as translated in the Good News version of our Bible. The shortest psalm consisting of just twenty three words, written centuries ago, but containing within them a message relevant for all time.

It is said that when Oliver Cromwell paused at Haddington to give thanks to God for an amazing victory over his foes at the Battle of Dunbar he chose this psalm to read to his troops.

What a good choice! Not only for soldiers hard pressed for time in baltle, but equally so for busy men and women pressurised in the bustle of life today, these twenty three words speak a message to cheer the heart and lift the spirit.

What does the psalm say to us? It begins with an exhortation that all nations, all peoples should praise the Lord. Would that they did!

The psalmist then goes on to speak of love and faithfulness of God, strong and eternal for all time.

So precious is God's love and faithfulness not just to him but for all men, that the psalmist cannot but burst forth in a final personal poem of praise. 'Praise the Lord'. Join with me in an acclamation as fervent as his.

Last month we learnt of the future plans of two of the assistant clergy in the parish.

Father Tony King and his wife Helene have been accepted by the USPG and will be going to Selly Oak College in Birmingham at the end of September. They will be there for a year's training, after which they are hoping to join a project in Zambia.

Fr. Christopher Kevill-Davies has been appointed as Priest-in-Charge of Barkway, Reed and Buckland with Barley in the diocese of St. Albans. He will be instituted there in October and we will wish him well for his return to full-time parish work.

There will be an opportunity nearer the time of their departures to express our gratitude and to say farewell to Tony and Christopher and their families. As I write, we do not know how long we will have to wait before a new curate can come to the parish and join the clergy team. The number of clergy being ordained has dropped significantly over the last twenty years, and there is a great shortage across the country. This serves to make us realise how important it is that we should encourage young men and our parish to consider This is never an easy women from ordination. decision, but one which needs the support and prayers of family and parish.

We are of course extremely lucky in this parish to have good lay leadership of so many of our activities. The Church's ministry is the responsibility of all its members and each of us has a vocation to fulfil in the life of the parish. However, the special role of the ordained clergy in giving leadership and training as well as in leading worship and administering the sacraments is vital to the church's growth and mission. Please dpray for the clergy, particularly for Tony and Christopher and their families over the coming months. Please pray, too, for more people to offer themselves for ordination.

Letter from Tasmanja

acquaintance who came here from Cheshire 25 years ago made the depressing observation that he was still regarded as English and that no immigrant is ever fully accepted as Australian. Most labels are divisive, hindering communication of common interests and experiences the which should unite us.

Of course labels can also be useful. As soon as I got to Bridport I passed two churches. The name "Uniting Church" in Australia was particularly inviting and on Sunday I joined the congregation. The warm welcome and the service so familiar to anyone who has attended the united services of the Stansted Association of Christian Churches (SACC).

many years I was a very timid Christian. My Quaker label was specific and I felt comfortable wearing it. It took me some time to realise why I was reluctant to declare myself a Christian except to those who knew me well. I was afraid of finding myself credited with views I did not hold. I remember being exasperated when someone similarly insitited that those who did not vote Conservative did not believe in the fule of law!

It was the Quaker peace testimony which prompted me to attend my first SACC While there was little I could meeting. about the problems in Northern Ireland, at least I could support those building bridges between the churches in Stansted. I had thought myself quite well informed about other denominations. However, I was totally unprepared for what happened when I met other Christians who had joined together with the purpose of really getting to know one another in the things that are eternal.

By worshipping together and co-operating in projects of common interest we had the opportunity to observe the same Spirit and work in each of us. Only when we had truly come to feel like brothers and sisters in the same Christian family, and the labels no longer separated us, did we begin to explore very lovingly the differences in our formal expressions of faith. I am confident that I was not the only one to find that many previous misconceptions had already disappeared over the years.

How grateful I am that, when there was no Quaker meeting near, my experiences in Stansted led me to expect support and comfort whichever Church I attended. I was not disappointed. Even more remarkable, when I attended the mid-week prayer meeting I met someone who offered the exact practical help I needed.

He went on to become the official historian of his regiment and, as Augustus Muir, was the author of scores of books, adventure and mystery, children's stories, biography and history, as well as a delightful story of Jesus' boyhood, "The Vintner of Nazareth". He was also an expert on wine and produced a very successful book on the subject, with British and American editions. Although in poor health for several years he continued writing until about a year ago. Our sympathy goes out to his wife, Mair, who is so well-known in the village and who was the first editor of The Link.

CHEVETOGNE VISIT 1989

It couldn't be better, or as good as last time we thought, but we were wrong. It was great and everyone enjoyed themselves tremendously from the word go! We greeted our visitors with coffee in St. John's Hall at 8.00 pm, bang on schedule, even the dreaded Dartford Tunnel couldn't hold our visitors up. They had stopped on the way in Rochester and visited the Castle and Dickens Centre and joined in the Evensong at the Cathedral - Sister Manuella, already in England, missed meeting the group in Centerbury Cathedral - however, armed with a sign saying Stansted Airport she eventually arrived a day late by bus.

Saturday found us in the URC Church for our usual Ecumenical Service, prepared both in French and English which all of us always find so moving - this is what really holds us together - the shared Spirit of Christ. Having prayed together we were all set to enjoy the rest of the day and so set off for Nancy Tennant's home in Ugley to enjoy coffee in her beautiful garden. This was made all the more special because she was 92 years young that day! Our visitors loved the Englishness of the thatched cottage and country garden and we spent twice as long there as we intended, only leaving after singing our greetings - wishing that we could speak such perfect French and entertain with such joie de vivre as Nancy had entertained us!

The weather was perfect, not a cloud in the sky as we set off for Audley End House, firstly to picnic and then to look over the house and grounds - with a cricket match being played in front of us, the setting was idyllic. Back home a band of willing workers were getting the Day Centre ready for our evening meal. There, a delicious aroma from the sizzling ovens, tables bedecked with flowers, welcomed us and David trying to stop Rita from tasting all the delicious sweets and desserts to make sure they were all right! 60 of us sat down to a delicious meal with entertainment provided by world famous acts - or so we were told! Talent scouts still search for the delicate maiden of the dance of the 7 veils - away like Cinderella at midnight leaving only a chiffon scarf on the steps of the gents!

The folk mass at St. Theresa's was a joyful occasion and it was a happy coincidence that we were read the Bishop's letter urging us to consider carefully our duties in voting in the European Parliament - a duty to consider the candidates attitudes on the environmentl, minority racial groups and cultures, having our Belgian friends with us made the letter most pertinent.

Our day was to be spent in Ely and we arrived at the Cutter Inn on the river for lunch after which we made for the Cathedral precincts. It was Hospital Sunday and so the Carnival floats were out and with the bands etc. the town presented a colourful scene. At 3.45 we joined the congregation in the Cathedral

for Evensong and were uplifted both by the beauty of the surroundings and the simple Christian message preached by the Dean who came over to us at the end of the service and, speaking perfect French, was able to give our visitors a potted

history of the Cathedral and to tell us of its association with another Cathedral in Antwerp.

Some of us had an evening meal together and enjoyed an evening of English/French humour and of song. Robert and Lucian sang some of their traditional songs and we were all sad that this was our last night together.

The coach was leaving at 1 pm on Monday and we had arranged a short trip for them to Thaxted to see its many splendours! Meanwhile some prepared a farewell lunch in the garden. The Morris Men were visiting Thaxted that day and Lily and Liliane, two of our Belgian visitors were delighted to dance with them - then the fun of a final lunch together, a sharing of our delight in the weekend and promises to all meet again next year.

We saw them all off on to the motorway = there wasn't a dry eye in the house!


Helpline serves to harness the goodwill that exists in Stansted. If you have a problem, with no immediate assistance available, telephone Helpline 816008.

Hearing loss is a problem with many people, especially the elderly. This became apparent in the early days of Helpline. As a result we arranged for volunteers to go to Cambridge for training on the maintenance and repair of N.H.S. hearing aids. The training was given by an organisation known as CamTAD (Campaign for Tackling Acquired Deafness) It was decided that we would operate CamTAD within Helpline in Stansted, nevertheless the local CamTAD based in Saffron Walden covers all of Uttlesford. During the month of July, St. John's Church have agreed to support CamTAD as "The Month's Good Cause". To support this kind gesture in a practical way, a CamTAD volunteer will be in attendance at the Day Centre every Tuesday during July at lunchtime, between 1.00 pm = 2.00 pm.

If you have a N.H.S. hearing aid and have a problem, please come along and have a chat. We can carry out minor adjustments or fit new tubes.

If this is not practical you can heave your name and address at the Day Centre any time or simply phone Helpline 8:6008. A volunteer will then arrange to visit you at home. There is no charge of any kind made for this service.

"OUR VILLAGE"

Essex County Fire & Rescue Service held on Saturday 3rd June an Open Day at Stansted Fire Station, where many visitors both young and not so young took this opportunity to inspect the Station, appliances and displays. Open Day this year was also in commemoration of Essex County Council's 100 years.

Three fire appliances were there for inspection, the eldest being a ma ual pump made by Shand Mason & Co. of London which had been purchased by Stansted Parish Council in 1914 and faithfully served with the Fire Brigade until after the disastrous fire at Blythwood House in 1926. The pump was designed to be horsedrawn, but could and was often taken to fires hauled by hand, later it was adapted so as to be drawn by motor tractor. To produce water it was hand pumped by as many as twelve men (if you were lucky) and could produce good jets of water, said on test to be able to throw over the trees at Hargrave Park.

The second exhibit showed a Leyland Pump Escape that served at Loughborough and the Leicestershire area from 1939 until the 1960's. This magnificently restored machine would have had a crew complement of eleven men, riding three at the front and four either side towards the rear. One of its many features being the fifty foot wooden escape ladder.

That brings us up to date where our area is now covered by a 1984 Dennis Rescue Pump which came to Stansted (D.83) in February 1987. Since when it has responded to over 600 emergency calls (5 were answered on Opqn Day alone) covering a mileage distance of around 8.000 miles, crewed by a maximum of six, and as the name suggests, the appliance has fire fighting and rescue capabilities.

Displays included many items of past fire service memorabilia. Two models showed uniform changes from Victorian to modern dress. A fine collection of around two hundred model fire appliances from early 1900's horse drawn to the super modern. Old pictures, photographs and newspaper cuttings were on show bringing back lots of memories for discussion. A stall, boxes, etc. for the Fire Service Benevolent Fund was well supported and our thanks to all who could lend or wish support.

May we end this short report with an "Ask" please if you in anyway can support our Fire Service Jumble Sale on July 8th by giving or buying (lots of bargains). It will be much appreciated.




THE MOUNTFITCHET SENIORS CLUB


