One of the attractions for me of London, where I have worked for many years, is the great sense of history that breathes from its very stones. In many ways the history of London is a history of religion in this country and many fascinating traces still remain, of the monastic and religious basis of the city in the five centuries between the Norman conquest and the Reformation. Afterwards following the secularisation and then the expansion of London in the 19th century, although the traces are fewer, they are still there for us to recapture today.

Just off Kingsway in Sardinia Street, the Sardinian Embassy stood in the 18th Century. The Embassy chapel was a centre for Catholic worship in London at a time when Catholic worship was banned in England. Embassies were exempt, being "foreign territory". The Embassy was on the site of a previous chapel set up by the Franciscan Order in the 17th Century, in a house designed by Inigo Jones, heavily fined in later life for practising his Catholic beliefs. A A frequent preacher was Bishop Richard Challoner who was responsible for making the original Donai translation of the Bible more readable to the layman. Rishop also preached at a nearby public house. dressed in mufti his congregation seated at the tables with a pint of beer in front of them - in case they were interrupted by a law official! It was during this period of the 18th Century that the Chapel was attended by Dr Thomas Arne (1710-1778) the composer among other works of "Rule Britannia". He also composed music for Mass at the Chapel. Although never described as a fully practising Catholic, he received the Last Rites on his death in March 1778.

In the next century, Doctor (later Cardinal) Nicholas Wiseman attracted large congregations to the chapel. He became the first Cardinal Archbishop of Westminister in 1850 when the Pope restored the hierarchy in England. The chapel was finally pulled down in 1909, and replaced by the Church of St. Anselm and St. Cecilia round the corner in Kingsway. An altar from he Embassy chapel was incorporated in the new church.

This is just one small fragment of London's history and provides interesting glimpses of people bravely defending their ways of worship. Such bravery is not, of course, confined to Catholics. People of all religions have persevered throughout the ages in the face of persecution. It is salutary to think how we would behave if we were so placed. Sadly in this country today indifference is killing off religion far more quickly than persecution ever did.

The International Youth Festival takes place every Easter in the beautiful city of St. Albans. (Once in four years held abroad, Munich and Salamanca being previous hosts, Holland next year). For the festival some two hundred Christians gather from European countries as far afield as Poland and Hungary, from Kenya and even this year from Canada and Papua New Guinea.

kick-off is at Townsend School, on the outskirts of the city, which becomes for the duration of the home festival. although it is only evenings which are spent there. The idea is to sleep there but the excitement and energy created by this event is such that sleep seems to come a long way down the list of things to do with the time! Way the night groups of people can be found dancing, talking, working on projects or perhaps singing in not quite close harmony! I was kept up until the hours being told the most ridiculous jokes by one group of people, not only very funny but clean also! What else would you expect at a Christian festival!!


Now to the workshops; the leaders suffer the embarrasement of demonstrating what their workshop will consist of and waiting to see who will volunteer to study music, drama, dance, theology, art or any one of the numerous workshops on offer.

So if you've ever had a yearning to pass on your knowledge of medieval plumbing techniques or oriental economics, don't sit at home being ignored ... come and be ignored in St. Albans!

The whole week is a wonderful mixture of workshops and worship with the workshops being sandwiched between the morning and lunchtime service. The Abbey itself is the venue for most of the events and to see a beautiful building infused with such life and colour and excitement (a place where people normally whisper in hushed tones) is in itself a kind of worship.

The lunch time services are taken each day by a different denomination, one day an Anglican Liturgy, the next a Lutheran or Catholic Mass. Here is joy: to see so many young people joining together to praise God without being tied to the limitations we so often put upon forms of worship.

The services reflect all that is best about the International Youth Festival; a large number of people coming together from different countries, cultures, backgrounds, but for all our differences, united by one very strong link, our faith in the Lord Jesus Christ.

COMFORT AND COUNSEL

Pentecost reminded me once more how words have changed their meaning over the years. The King James ("Authorised") version of the Bible in a famous passage at John 14 (often read, in part, at funerals) reads "I will pray the Father and he shall give you another Comforter that he may abide with you forever". At the time of a funeral we are in need of comfort which is the second meaning given for the word in my dictionary "relief from grief, etc." The first meaning is a "state of ease". But this is not what the KJV meant by "Comforter". The meaning of the word has changed.

"Comforter" today would mean to the average person a woollen scarf, or a downy quilt, or a baby's dummy.

What the word meant in the time of King James and Shakespeare was something quite different. So modern versions of the Bible translate it as Counsellor (Revised Standard), Advocate (New English), Helper (Good News and Moffatt), Someone to stand by you (Phillips), Advocate (Jerusalem B). Phillips has the literal meaning of the Greek word (paraclete). Counsellor and Advocate bring in the idea of a defender at court, an adviser, or Helper (as in Moffatt and Good News).

So the Holy Spirit (for this is what Jesus is promising) is our strong defender and helper.

The "comfortable words" of Christ do not invite us to be at "ease in Zion" but invite us to be strong in Christ, to put on the whole armour of God and, having done all, to stand, trusting in the power of God and the Counsel of the Holy Spirit.

OVERSEAS GROUP

The Overseas Group has received another delightful bulletin from Dr. Van der Maas of St. Luke's Hospital, Chilema, Southern Malawi and the following is an extract which deals with one day's activities:

Chilipa

The Chilipa health centre is next. There has been a lot of rain and the road is slippery. About half a mile before the health centre everything is flooded, so we take off our shoes and wade through. The water is murky and warm, but it cools the feet.

The health centre is quite big. It has two small wards, a maternity ward and an out-patient department. The medical assistant takes me on a round of the wards, and considering his limited facilities, he does a good job. The maintenance of the buildings leaves a lot to be desired, but it is difficult to find skilled craftsmen and materials locally, and St. Luke's is far away. White ants have eaten all the window frames and rafters, and when I knock on a door, my hand disappears, leaving a big hole. My joke that we are getting holier and holier falls flat ... obviously a more serious approach is needed.

Time to go

It is now time to leave. The two students we are leaving behind seem a bit scared, but we know they will be well looked after and will enjoy their two weeks in "the bush".

We wade back to the ambulance, and I manage to fall flat on my back into the river, but nobody laughs. Instead they all apologise and lok at me with some suspicion because I think it's so hilarious!

Back at Nkasala we pick up patients. The back of the ambulance is full and hot, and if you're not feeling well it must be awful to travel like this. Unfortunately there is no alternative.

THOUGHTS ON FESTIVALS

The early date of Easter this year has led to a wuick succession of issues of "The Link" in which the 'great' festivals of the church have formed the main theme. Christmas, Easter and now Whitsuntide.

Friends have had no special services to announce or events to describe. Perhaps it is this concentration on special seasons that has led me to turn this matter over in my mind, all the more because it was the pattern of the Christian year that I missed most when, long ago, I joined Friends.

What was it, we must ask, that led Friends, in common with other Rotestant churches, to adopt the austere discipline of insisting that the birth and death of Jesus, the gift of the Holy Spirit and the example of the Christian saints, should be remembered without the prompting of special occasions. Equally, we might wonder why, in recent years, Friends are drawn back to these celebrations, either in the ecumenical life or in remembering them in our own Meetings for Worship.

The first question is the easier to think over. By the Sixteenth/Seventeenth century thinking people found the extravagance of many celebrations unacceptable. Rich processions and bejewelled statues, for many hid rather than revealed, and there was the fear that simple people might confuse the symbol with the inner meaning and give it undue respect - a fear that lingered well into our own day. If we think of Yule and Shrove Tuesday, of the Bean King at Twelfth Night and of mi-careme, it is understandable that serious-minded people, at the time when they were taking personal responsibility for their faith, might fear that riot and misrule often took over. We nowadays find a similar fear surfacing every Christmas, though the cause for our anxiety is often extravagance rather than unruliness.


The second question is more difficult because we are not looking from a distance but are involved. Steadily, over a long period, our need to bring the whole of life to worship has been given a place. This recognition began, in England, with a great outburst of

from the late Seventeenth century through the writing and music of John and Charles Wesley, to the Victorians, It developed further with the revival of colour and form among Anglo-Catholics and has continued a steady and varied growth. Now that dancing too has its place - ca we say, sealed by Archbishop Desmond Tutu in the Birmingham Festival? - the growth seems complete. The presence in our country of other faiths with their own ceremonies and celebrations may have helped the understanding of how universal is our need for celebration, for colour and for song. We seem to have made a circle in valuing ceremony, music and symbol. Since we seldom come back to the same exact place, it may rather be a spiral which enables us to find a new way of living with a new understanding of these things.

Friends too have become more open to 'the Arts'. We could ask you to listen to Friends' Schools United Choirs at Christmas, to look at our Quaker Tapestry or to look and listen to Gerard Hoffnung's jokes in music and drawing. Quaker life has, with both good and regrettable results, come out from the shadows of the strict 'Quietist' time. But you will continue to find at the centre our quiet, waiting Meeting for Worship.

"OUR VILLAGE"

We ended last month by making reference to "Green's Moadow". This large meadow stretched approximately from the rear of Old Green Stores in Cambridge Road down to the alley way opposite the Central Hall and length wise from Chapel Hill to the bottom end of Clarence Road - St. John's Lane. From around the later 1950's this whole area had been developed into what today we know as Greenfields and other surrounding properties.

Although we (at this moment) cannot say exactly when this meadow was first used for football matches, we do know it was through the kindness of Mr. Harford Green that this capital field was used from 1903 onwards until the mid 1930's. If you should chance to see or have seen photographs of the Stansted Football team taken upon this meadow it will more often than not have in the background a small building which had become the Club's changing room. This building is probably the only surviving reminder (apart from a few large trees) of the grounds connection with its sporting days.

Given its proper title "The Hermitage" which still stands in the front garden of No. 52 Chapel Hill, from where Mr. Synn can tell a little of its history. In 1492 John De Vere, 13th Earl of Oxford, built a small chapel at the top of what is now Chapel Hill. In 1650 the chapel was converted into a forge and was used as such until 1870 when it was pulled down to make room for the present road. The then owner of Stansted Hall, Fuller Maitland, bought the structural materials some of which he gave to Joshua Green who built this present HERMITAGE in his garden as a private place of meditation In the early 1900's the in 1871. Hermitage was used as a changing room for the local Football Club.

After that there was a period of neglect. High in the eaves of this building there was a carving showing the arms of the De Vere family but this was removed by a previous owner of the house. The end window was boarded up for many years and when the boarding was removed in 1986 most of the iron window frame had rusted away except the top portion which has been retained. The wooden arch and the oak leaf mouldings round the side of the roof inside are originals dating from 1492.

STANSTED AFTERNOON



In May, Mrs Keith, a voluntary county organiser, put before the members the four resolutions to be put before delegates at the A.G.M. at the Albert Hal in June. What can sometimes be a duli meeting was this time very lively indeed, under Mrs Keith's expert handling. A COLOURFUL CHURCH

IN SOME churches the front of the altar and the stole (the long narrow band) that the vicar wears, change from time to time. No, it doesn't mean that his other one is at the cleaners or that he fancied a change. Each season of the Church's year has its own distinctive colour, and these are called liturgical colours.

GREEN is the colour we've got at the moment. Green, the ordinary colour of nature, is used during the seaons of Epiphany (after Christmas) and Trinity (between Whitsun or Pentecost and Advent). Trinity lasts for about half the year so green is the colour we see most.

The next change of colour will be to PURPLE. Purple, the colour of penitence and preparation, is used for Lent (the 40 days before Easter) and Advent (the four weeks before Christmas).

Then comes WHITE and GOLD, which are used for all the joyful festivals such as Easter, Ascension and Christmas.

RED, the colour of fire and blood, is used at Whitsuntide

(Pentecost) to remind us of the coming of the Holy Spirit to the disciples like tongues of flame (Acts 2:1-11). It is also used on the festivals of martyrs to remind us of their sacrifices.
