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



I'm told that at the time of writing this article, February 4th, the hours of have increased by about ninety daylight minutes since December 21st, the shortest day. This is good news for everyone, but particularly for those who, according to recent article in the press, are erers from seasonal Affective а sufferers Disorder or S.A.D., a condition peculiar to the winter months, and thought by some researchers to be directly attributable to the lack of sunlight at this time of the year.

Life for sufferers of this condition is described as being 'sort of off-white, with tiredness, depression, and a feeling of inadequacy pervading their lives'.

In an attempt to alleviate their suffering light-starved volunteers in the U.S.A. are being subjected to ultraviolet rays with the same spectrum as the sun, thus reproducing the conditions of a bright summer day. Two American researchers are currently engaged on further tests which it is hoped will give greater relief to sufferers in the future.

'Winter blues' are no doubt distressing, but there is a far deeper darkness which affects everyone at some time of life which no amount of artificial sunlight can dispel. This is the darkness of pain, bereavement, loneliness and despair which can be so overwhelming that it seems as though the sun will never shine again.

'Thou canst illumine even our darkest night'. These are words from a poem by the German pastor, Dietrich Bonhoeffer, who was executed during the second world war for his denouncement of Hitler and the Nazi regime.

The poem, written for the New Year of 1945, four months before his death, expresses Bonhoeffer's deep conviction that faith in Jesus Christ, who came to be the light of the world, can illumine the whole of life, bringing contentment and peace in times of joy and sorrow.

Let his prayer be ours. 'May God keep the light of faith burning in our souls'.

In summer months some of these services are held at St Mary's. See notice in church porches for further details or ring one of the clergy.

At the end of this month we will celebrate again the resurrection of Jesus from the dead at Easter. But we cannot celebrate that joyful event without remembering that to rise again Jesus first had to die. And so in the last weeks before Easter - in Passiontide, and Holy Week leading up to Good Friday - our thoughts, our prayers and our worship are focussed on the cross.

Wherever you look in church you will see the cross. It has remained the central symbol of our Christian faith. We are marked with the sign of the cross at our Baptism; we mark ourselves with the sign of the cross as a reminder that through our Baptism we share in the death and resurrection of Jesus. Frequently, however, the crosses in our churches, or the crosses that many wear, are made of precious metal and ornately decorated. There is a story being told of someone going into a jeweller's shop to buy a cross and chain. "Do you want a plain one or one with a little man on it?" the shop assistant asked. Beautiful though of our crosses are, that beauty can many easily mask the reality of the cross. The cross on which Jesus died would have been rough and heavy. His death was very slow and very, very painful. The cross for us must not become simply a pretty piece of jewellery with a little man on it, but a constant reminder of God's inexhaustible love for us.

The cross is a reminder of death. It is also a sign of life. We know that Jesus rose again from the dead, and thus the cross becomes a sign of triumph and hope for each of us. The hope which the resurrection offers assures us that at our own death, we too may come into the presence of the risen Christ. So we pray that each of us, through being ready to share in Jesus's suffering on the cross, may share more fully in the hope and joy of the resurrection at Easter.

May God bless you this Holy Week and Easter.

THE YEAR 2000

The Diocesan Pastoral Council was inaugurated by our Bishop on 22nd October 1987 to plan for the future. As a new member of the Council and St. Theresa's Parish Representative, I have been catching up on the year's work for this exciting project.

The task is to assist the Bishop in drawing up a 10-year plan by 1990 to enable the Diocese to move ahead as a unified body towards the same goals and in the light of a shared vision into the third millenium. The 10-year plan does not mean that we plan for 10 years ahead. The year 2000 is the focus - the actual planning will be in -2-year phases.

As a first step in this 2-year process of enquiry, discussion and prayerful reflection, the Bishop has asked the Council to listen to the views of <u>everyone</u> in the Diocese, including young people, men and women of all age groups, non-Catholic partners, the sick and the

housebound. A simple (anonymous) questionnaire was distributed in our Parish in February. The responses people made will be used by the Parish and the Diocese to plan for the future. By the end of 1990 the Bishop will implement a 10-year Pastoral Plan which will reflect these views and respond to people's real needs.

Lord Jesus Christ, Son of the Living God, teach us to walk in your ways more trustfully, to accept your truth more faithfully. and to share your life more lovingly. Inspire us by the power of the Holy Spirit for mission within our Diocese and guide us in our Pastoral plan, so that your name may be made known and that all may come as one family to the Kingdom of the Father, where you live for ever and ever,

As Bunyan's pilgrim "Christian" continues on his journey and has various experiences, he finds an excellent pilgrim companion named Faithful. They are truly devout men and kindred spirits, but are soon joined by a third who, though he appears fine, is of a very different spirit. Christian recognises him and keeps a distance from him. But Faithful is meeting him for the first time and is readily deceived by attractive manners and clothes and by agreeable speech. This new companion is called Talkative. He cheerfully tells faithful that his greatest delight is to talk about the Christian religion as they continue on pilgrimage. At the drop of any hat he is ready to launch into well-informed and very articulate discourse on any and every aspect of Christianity. With a ready and golden tongue he can talk beautifully about their religion.

But there lies his downfall. And Christian, who is well acquainted with him, knows how hollow all his talk is and warns Faithful: 'Remember the proverb, "They say, and do not"; but the Kingdom of God is not in word, but in power. He talketh of prayer, of reprentance, of faith, and of the new birth; but he knows but only to talk of them. He is the very stain, reproach, and shame of religion to all who know him. Thus say the common people that know him: "A saint abroad, and a devil at home."

"Poor, little, talkative Christianity", was how E. M. Forster once spoke of the Church and of us who belong to it. How easy it is to fall into the trap of Bunyan's Talkative. It can be true of us both as individuals and churches. In churches with committees, councils, conferences, etc. we can spend more time talking about Christianity than living it, expend more effort debating God's work than doing it. And we may easily deceive ourselves into believing we are doing it just because we are talking about it. Religion can readily become a "Talking shop".

And like Bunyan's character, as Christian observes to Faithful, "He thinks that hearing and saying will make a good Christian, and thus deceive his own soul". We may read, write and talk about prayer, but not pray, knowing a great deal about it but not doing it; about faith, but not having it; about love, but not living it; about God, but only as hearsay.

Here is a danger for every church and every Christian. "Not everyone that says to me 'Lord, Lord' will enter the Kingdom of Heaven, but he who does the will of my heavenly Father". "He who does the will shall know the doctrine." Two quotes from our Lord - the warnings of His love.

UTTLESFORD COUNCIL FOR VOLUNTARY SERVICE

INFORMATION

The Uttlesford Council for Voluntary Service exists to coordinate the activities of the various voluntary organisations in the District Council Area and to offer services and support to them in a variety of ways. Voluntary organisations in all the towns and villages in Uttlesford are listed in our Directory (price £2.50) and information about Care Groups in the area is published in our quarterly Newsletter.

Inaddition to this coordinating role, the UCVS endeavours to seek out areas of need and put into operation agencies to meet those needs. As an established Voluntary Service council, we have the opportunity to nominate candidates to sit on various bodies such as the Community Health Council, Joint Consultative Committees and Joint Care Planning Teams.

Projects which we have initiated include the recently launched branch of MIND which will help people with mental health problems and a Hospital Discharge Scheme which helps patients (mostly elderly), during the first few days after they leave hospital. Our present concerns are to establish a Care Network to cover Uttlesford which will deal with minor, non-medical emergencies (and provide 24 hour duty officers in key parts of the region), to set up a branch or two of CRUSE - the organisation that cares for the widowed and their children, and to investigate ways of coordinating transport in this rural district.

Uttlesford Council for Voluntary The Service had its Inaugural Meeting in October 1987 and now has an office on the Hospital site in Saffron Walden. The present organiser, Gwyneth Southgate, will be happy to answer any queries about the UCVS and put organisations requiring assistance in touch with agencies who can offer help. Members of our organisation include Parish Councils, Individual County and District Councillors, Churches, Women's Institutes, The Red Cross, St. John's Ambulance Service, The W.R.V.S., Day Centres, Clubs for the Elderly, Handicapped Groups, W.E.A.s and Social Clubs. Membership, which is £5 annually, entitles a group or individual to a free copy of the Directory of Voluntary organisations in Uttlesford, the delivery of the quarterly Newsletter, Free Publicity in it, Public Relations Services through the UCVS office and photocopying at cost (5p a sheet, A4 only

"Our Village"

In the January issue a brief look was taken into events at Bentfield End Cricke: Club, after which further memories of this Club have again come to light.

Mr. George E. Rose, who farmed Bentfield Green Farm (whose dairy proclaimed "Our Milk and Cream are of one quality - The Best) started the Club around 1930. Their wicket was fenced off (removed for matches) from the outfield as the farm's dairy cattle had access to this field during the week, which had an effect of turning fielding into an art of minding your step. (This practice is still observed today by some village clubs).

The pavilion was opened by Club President, L.D. Gosling Esq. This building was thought to have started life as a brick drying shed, seeing service with the nearby brick works. Later it became a roost and shelter for chickens, all before its renovation into a fit pavilion.

A fixture card for the 1936 season tells us of a season opening on May 7th and closing September 26th. Opponents being Farnham, Rickling Green, Ugley, Clavering, Rickling, Henham, Arkesden, Sheering and Berden, on a home and away, with a home fixture v. Stansted British Legion as a Bank Holiday game.

Transport for away matches was for several players quite an experience, taken in the back of the farm's Manchester lorry; seating consisted of a hasty arrangement of chicken box type seats which on some occasions proved none too strong - no doubt adding to the afternoon's entertainment.

Amongst the club rules could be found: 1. All subscriptions to be handed to Treasurer not later than May 3rd. (Playing members paid two shillings and sixpence). 2. A member of the committee shall be responsible for the return of all apparatus each night with the assistance of members. 3. The committee shall have power to expel any member from the club who is abusive or causes annoyance to other members.

My thanks go to Mr. Arthur Trundle and George Herrington, both being playing members of this club, who have made today's story possible. Hopefully we may see a few more overs bowled before the close of play.



In Lent the church was dull and bare, but at Easter it is bright with masses of flowers. The flowers remind us that the world is full of life, even though it looked so dead throughout the winter months.

In our church we have an Easter Garden, made from stones and earth, grass and flowers and in the middle there is an empty tomb with the stone door rolled away to one side. You can read what happened in a special garden on that very first Easter Day in Matthew chapter 28; Mark chapter 16; Luke chapter 24 and John chapter 20.

If your church doesn't have an Easter Garden, or if you'd like your own at home, why don't you make your own.

EASTER GARDEN

YOU'LL need a shallow tin or dish, soil or potting compost, moss, stones, an egg cup, flowers and a small clay plant pot.

Line the dish with soil or potting compost and put the clay pot on its side to make the tomb. Cover the sides of the pot and the soil with moss. Scrape a space in the centre of the dish to fit in the egg cup or other small container, fill this with small flowers and leaves and add some water. Decorate the garden with stones, pebbles and other flowers and put one large stone beside the mouth of the flowerpot to make the door of the tomb. Spray your garden with water and it will keep fresh for quite a long time.
