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



On Sunday 8th October at St. Theresa's Church, Stansted, at 10.30 Mass, fourteen children were welcomed by the parish family to begin their first Holy Communion preparation. The children and their parents joined happily in all parts of the liturgy. During the service their parents were asked to give a promise before the assembled community that they would help to the best of their ability to prepare their children for this important sacrament.

One of the features of this course is its parental involvement. We in the Catholic Church, with our Catholic Schools, have sometimes become complacent. "Oh, I leave all that to the school", has been a common sentiment among parents concerning the teaching of religion. While our schools do a wonderful job this somehow takes away the responsibility from parents. The course that we use for the dpreparation for Holy Communion involves both parish and parent.

Over the next nine months or so our little people will be busy learning to become involved with 'religion'. They have a lovely 'Gold Book' in which to draw, write, read the stories and understand the prayers. Their parents have their own book to help their children with the work and to enable them to talk to them about God and what it means to be a Christian. Once a month the children are introduced to the next theme by the Catechist and the parents meet together to discuss the theme at their own level and ay problems they may have. On the Sunday following, parents, children and Catechists meet alternately at Stansted and Henham Church services for a specially prepared Mass. The whole parish family are praying for them. We wish them all well.

"Who am I?" and "What am I doing here?" are questions that will not go away. In one way or another they crop up from time to time. Sometimes with pressing urgency. The answers do not come by looking in a mirror or noting predominating activities. The questions go much deeper. The "I am" sayings of Jesus can be a great help here. It is in what He is, in His complete humanity, that we may discover who we are.

He said "I am the way, the truth and the life". Thomas, who sparked Jesus off into saying that, thought our Lord was talking, in His earlier remark, about journeying from one location to another. But the disciple was mistaken. Life is a journey, not so much geographically, but through time and experience. As such it is a journey into the depths of our own being. We may take this journey in many different ways and so arrive at many different "destinations", by which I mean states of being, of heart, mind and spirit.

Novels, poems and songs frequently tell of the human longing to journey home where our roots are and where we truly belong. Or they speak of aspirations and yearnings for the land of our dreams. This is very true of songs, which often reveal our inward state as that of wanting to be home, wanting to be happily fulfilled. This is the kind of spiritual journey we are on.

Jesus says He has already travelled this road and arrived. It is a way to oneness with God in the depths of our being as we discern God and respond to Him in the life of the world and our own experience. The completion of that journey is the entire oneness, the perfect harmony with God that we see in Jesus. So He is the way for us.

Jesus is the wqay because He is also the truth - the truth about life and God. According to Him the source, guide and goal of all creation, of teeming humanity and of you and me is Fatherliness. And that Fatherliness will take us to ultimate wholeness and perfect joy. To trust Jesus on this is to embark on a life of true family love in which we are all children of the one Father and all brothers and sisters to each other. And that is to find real life. Such a life

has quality, supreme quality. Jesus called it "abundant" and "eternal" and that is both our home and the land of dreams for which we sing. It is the beginning of the discovery of who we are and what we should really be doing here.

Take for instance the two fishermen brothers. Peter and Andrew. Glimpses we have of their personalities in the gospel story reveal them as being as different as chalk from cheese. Peter fiery, impetuous, very prone to speak first and think afterwards, and yet in spite of everything, a born leader of men. Peter, heartbroken, full of remorse at the realisation than fear and impetuosity had led him to deny that he ever knew the one he loved and served on that fateful day of his master's trial.

His brother Andrew, so very different, serious, quietly practical, just the sort of person to have around in an emergency. Andrew, the one to whom Jesus turned for assistance on the occasion of the miracle by the Galilean lake, when the large crowd of five thousand were fed.

There were others too in that hand of disciples. Thomas the doubter, a nickname given to him and still in our language today. Thomas, whose doubts were turned to glorious certainty in the overwhelming joy of meeting his risen Lord face to face.

And Matthew, what a surprise choice he was for a friend of Jesus. A man whose background left much to be desired. Doubtless many eyebrows were raised at his inclusion among the group of disciples. 'Fancy choosing a man like that for a friend' we can imagine the crowd murmuring.

The miracle of God's grace transformed this mixed bunch of men into men of courage and purpose, empowering them to become leaders of the new born church of Jesus Christ in their day.

The, church has ever been made up of such men and women and still is today.

The wonder is that through the centuries until now the miracle of God's grace has been effective in transforming the lives of men and women enabling them to be gloriously used by God in the ongoing story of His church.

Durtng the half-term holiday this month we will be spending a few days with my mother in Frome in Somerset. Frome is a small, unassuming west country market town and I had never taken much notice of its architecture or history until I followed the Heritage Trail which was drawn up to celebrate the town's 1300th anniversary a few years ago.

Something I had never notice until then was a small parade of shops with four sculptures on the frontage dating from 1890. These portrayed the four seasons. spring as a young child, summer as a beautiful young woman, autumn as an older, veiled woman and winter as an elderly man with a long, flowing beard. They made use of a common theme, comparing the passage of each year with the passing of our human lives, from birth, through youth to age and finally death.

The church too picks up this theme. the spring, the time of new life and regrowth, the church celebrates Easter and the resurrection, the new life which Christ offers us.

And this month, remember the dead. as winter begins, we

On the first of November, All Saints Day, give thanks to God for all the faithful men and women who have served him here on earth and are now with him in heaven.

The following day, we keep All Souls' Day when we particularly remember all those we know and love who have died. will be a special service of Holy Communion that day at 8 p.m. in St. John's Church, when we remember all those from this parish who have died during the last year, to which their families are invited.

The same theme continues later in the month when on Remembrance Sunday remember all those who have died in war.

We know, however, that just as spring will follow winter; as plants and flowers spring to life again, so for us too, death, although sad, is not the end. Because Jesus died and rose again for us on that first Easter day, so we have the promise that after death we shall come into God's nearer presence, in that place where sorrow and crying and pain and death will be no more.

One of the things about the title of The Link is that it is just that - a link between different people and different churches. Many people, many churches. How are they linked? Many things are different between them, many are the same, and writing as a person who is a Friend and a mother, I would like to share something with you who are reading this which is personal to me and yet emphasises this very point.

Quaker Meetings for Worship I must explain for those who are not familiar with them, do now follow an 'order of service' but are based on a gathering together, sitting in a simple deepening silence in the increasing awareness of God. Often out of the silence one person or another may speak - a fresh insight, a passage from scripture, the quiet reflection, a new say of seeing something known before. The belief is 'That of God in everyone'.

As a writer, Hope Hay says "It is not uncommon for this ministry to reflect what others, unknown to the speakers, have already been thinking", and if often happens that one builds upon another, expressing the continuing widening and deepening experience of the group as a whole. Each spoken contribution is born of silence, and silence, each time deeper than before, LINKS one to another.

I have heard somebody express the feeling of peaceful stillness in coming into a Quaker Meeting as 'Like coming into a sheltering harbour out of a storm'. This feeling I have heard expressed by others as 'Like coming home'.

My youngest son, whose personal faith is that of the Roman Catholic Church, used the same phrase to express his own feelings on entering an enclosed Benedictine Monastery, "It's like coming home".

So let us remember the LINK in all our lives. So much is different, so much is the same. We don't all live in the same home, and if we think of our own place of worship as not only a home but a spiritual harbour, let us all do our bit to strengthen it. It is said you can do nothing about the storm if you are a harbour wall, but you can still be the harbour.



#### "OUR VILLAGE"

Looking further into Stansted's Branch of the British Legion we will turn to Sunday 13th November 1926 for upon this day their first special service of Remembrance for fallen comrades was to be held at the War Memorial followed by a short service and address in St. John's Church.

It was arranged that 500 circulars should be distributed house to house in the district, inviting ex-servicemen to parade, wearing medals, outside the Central Hall at 2.40 p.m. for 3 p.m. at the War Memorial. A poppy wreath was purchased and duly laid at the Memorial by Chairman Mr. E. Cawkell. The Church Service was to be a public service open to all, although tickets could be obtained from the Rev. H.W. Booth to reserve seats in church for relatives of the fallen. This day was reported to have been well attended by ex-servicemen and greatly appreciated by the general public who attendedin large numbers.

The 1927. following Parish vear Councillors, Special Constables, Stansted Company of Girl Guides, Brownies and members of the Fire Brigade in uniform were invited to attend the Remembrance Service. Some £70 was to be sent to Earl Haig Appeal Fund from that year's successful poppy sale, £42 5s 1d being from Stansted and Birchanger, the remainder from surrounding villages, thanks to ladies for helping organise the sale of poppies was given by the Chairman.

1927 was also to witness two other special events. In August a pilgrimage to the battlefields was organised and attended by Blanch Members where Mr. Harold Buttery was to be made an Honorary Member of a French Ex Serviceman organisation. Later, to return this compliment, M. Henri Carpentier was elected an Honorary Member of the Stansted Branch. Mrs. Hutley and Mrs. Wooten were also able to attend this pilgrimage. On return, an interesting account of their battlefield pilgrimage was given to Branch Members by Mr. Littlewood.

On the evening of September 14th 1927 at Bentfield Hall. Mr. E. Cawkell made a gift to the branch of a Legion Standard

'a long-desired possession). Their new Standard had its first outing when a party of members attended the County Rally and Fete at Braintree. We close with thoughts of 70 village men. their names inscribed into the Memorial. In proud and grateful memory of the gallant men of Stansted who fell in the First and Second World Wars.

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#### TOOLS FOR SELF RELIANCE

Back in the middle of September when the sun was still shining I spent a day in the New Forest getting to know at first hand what the charity organisation, Tools for Self Reliance, gets up to. Some time ago I read that TFSR had been set up to collect old and neglected tools for sending out to selected groups in developing countries, after suitable refurbishment. What I found at TFSR headquarters was a converted building housing a warehouse, a workshop, an exhibition area and offices. The warehouse is stacked high with saws, hammers, screwdrivers, pliers and more exotic tools in various conditions of functionality ranging from useless to ready for use. The workshop contains simple refurbishing equipment such as grindstones and de-rusting wire wheels. I had on-the-job training on these and was assured that I had the makings of a good refurbisher!

Rather than saying more at this stage, I will get to the point of this article, which is to invite anyone who is interested in supporting a Stansted TFSR group to get in touch with me. The group would need people with a variety of skills such as:

- Acting as tool collection agents.
- teaching basic skills such as drill and saw sharpening, and putting new handles on bammers.
- learning how to refurbish and then doing ir.

I am hoping to take a party of interested people down to the N. London TFSR workshop one evening before the end of the year in order to meet the organiser for our area (Kate Sebag) and to see what

might be involved in setting up a small workshop and TFSR group in Stansted.

#### Macmillan Nurses

A team of Macmillan Nurses is now operation in West Essex. This palliative care group specialises in helping terminally ill patients and works in close cooperation with the Primary Health Care Team.
