

"Six hours in sleep, in law's grave study six; Four spend in prayer, the rest on Nature fix" (Sir Edward Coke, 1552-1634)

Prayer is a fundamental part of our Christian life. Life without prayer is like a family without love or a garden without water: it becomes starved and arid and fails to flourish. Through prayer our life is enriched and strengthened. In human relationships we become closer to people as we talk to them and come to know them better. So too we draw closer to God through prayer as we come to know more of him.

And yet most of us find prayer talking and listening with God - as difficult (if not more) than we find communicating with each other. Few of us can find the four hours enjoined in us in the above quotation to spend in prayer: few of us, even if we find the time, know where to begin. Something that should be as simple as talking to God and listening to him can seem daunting.

So on Sunday mornings during Lent this year we are going "back to basics", to explore together ways in which we can pray. And instead of bringing in specialist preachers, the talks will be given by the clergy with the simple heading "How I pray" - each giving our own personal view of what we find difficult and what we find helpful in our prayers.

To start off our thinking - and, we hope, our praying - we have invited Canon John Tyers, warden of Pleshey Retreat House, to give our opening talk. This will be at St. John's on Sunday evening, 25th February at 7.30 p.m. (following Evensong without sermon at 6.30 p.m.) His talk will be on "Listening to God".

We hope you will join us this Lent in exploring prayer, that through it we may draw closer to God as we look towards Holy Week and Easter.



Although it had been hoped to ring the centenary peal on the actual date, this was not possible and so five present members of the band together with Alan Dixon, the former tower captain, who travelled from Lawford in North Essex, met and range a peal on Saturday 30th December. The actual time for both peals was coincidentally the same, namely 2 hours 50 minutes. The ringers were: 1 Anne Wilkinson, 2 Edmund Wilkinson, 3 Colin Holman, 4 Guy Wilkinson, 5 Alan Dixon, 6 Alan Barber (Conductor). This was the first full peal for both Edmund and Colin.

#### BISHOP'S VISITATION AND CONFIRMATION:

A reminder to all candidates. Please register your names with Father Meehan. The programme starts early in the New

CONFIRMATION? Essentially it is a call to the person to mission (evangelisation), using the gifts of the Holy Spirit received in the Sacrament. It is not self-dedication to God in the sense of someone bringing their own gifts and offering them to God. Progress from Sacrament to Sacrament in a person's life is a progression resulting in new status with new obligations and Confirmation is an outward looking Sacrament (evangelical). Psychologically people need to have owned themselves before they can enter into a meaningful dialogue, and because of the young age of 14 this owning of self is difficult to achieve, and hence very necessary that all candidates receive help to prepare for the Sacrament of Confirmation. It is the Sacrament of continued initiation and must not be allowed to become through abuse the Sacrament of farewell and lapsation.

As a parish family our task is to pray for candidates and help them in their Christian formation and general attitude to life as they prepare to receive the wonderful Sacrament of the outpouring of God's Spirit.

#### Shalom - A Personal View

There is no one on this earth to whom we can fully surrender ourselves, as people have human failings and do exploit our seeming weakness. God is the only one to whom we can be fully ourselves worts and all - thank goodness he knows the real us inside the exterior mess and loves us in spite of it or because of it, devotedly and faithfully.

This is no human achievement but a gift from God - Shalom really is the kingdom of God and each day we can add just a little more completeness to the puzzle of life - take out the pieces that do not fit and discard them - perhaps they will fit when we have completed a little more of the puzzle.

On the night before he was crucified our Lord told his disciples "I am the real (true) vine and my Father is the gardener --- you are the branches. Anyone who dwells in me, as I dwell in him, bears much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing." Of all the "I am" sayings of Jesus this one most powerfully states how utterly crucial is the Christian's relationship with Christ.

The vine was one of the great images or symbols of Israel as the People of God whose divine purpose stretched back through prophets, priests, Kings and judges to the founding patriarchs themselves, Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. In the days of our Lord the spiritual leadership of Israel had gone very badly astray, as so often before. Jesus spent most of his last week of earthly life in Jerusalem. Probably he saw the great vine carved over the main Temple doors beautifully carved and covered with gold leaf. Maybe this sparked him off to say "I am the REAL vine". Real as opposed to synthetic, or false or inadequate.

He is saying that the divine purposes which God had called Israel to serve and fulfil would now be served by him and those committed to him in love and trust. The real divine community is made up of those who draw their life from him; those who are alive with his spirit, truth, love and wholeness. Not only the trunk, but also all the branches in whom he lives and loves, make up the complete Vine of Christ, the New Israel of God. All such have their life in Christ, are incorporate in him and can say with St. Paul "I live, yet no longer I; Christ lives in me".

Truly belonging to the Vine, the People of God, is not determined by ethnic origin or historical prestige, not by theological orthodoxy or ecclesiastical involvement, not by traditions or ceaseless activity, but by having his life, love and spirit in us. This is the cruciality of Christ. A love-relationship with him is indispensable. Apart from him we can do nothing. His life in us produces the Father's fruit.

All this is really the Father's work, for, says Jesus, He is the gardener. It is the Father who makes it possible for the Christ Vine to flourish and grow and bear fruit. Wherever the Christ life is found, there the Father is at work, and such are found in many places, not infrequently where we do not expect them. But then, as St. Augustine said, "God has many the Church does not have and the Church has some God does not have." A challenging word! How much are we in the Vine because God is creating the Christ life in us?

I came across some words recently written by Charles Dickens to his son who was about to set out on a new life inAustralia.

Parting from ones children to a far distant land must be painful at any time, but for aprents in the last century, before the days of planes, telephones and other modern means of communication, the parting must for many parents have seemed a final one, the possibility of meeting again remote indeed.

This is what Dickens wrote. "I need not tell you that I love you dearly, and am very, very sorry in my heart to part with you. I have put a New Testament among your books, because it is the best book that ever was, or ever will be, known to the world. As your brothers have gone away one by one, I have written to each such words as I am writing to you, entreating them all to guide themselves by this book. Only one thing more. 

#### STANSTED LIBERAL DEMOCRATS

The constituency supper club at Stansted Day Centre in December was a sell-out. This was given by Dr. David Reynolds from Cambridge on his involvement in making the BBC TV series "Oceans Apart", about the historical relationship between Great Britain and the USA. #### OUT AND ABOUT IN STANSTED II

Let's look at bricks.

Bricks have been used locally ever since the Romans started building their villas and recycled Roman bricks can still be seen utilised in St Mary's Church and possibly elsewhere in Stansted to this day.

Our local clay makes good bricks and maps show that brickyards existed near the new Bentfield Sports Field, in Brickyard Plantation off the Elsenham Road and at Brick Kiln Spring in Stansted Park. These have disappeared except for a few holes and bumps but models of the Stansted Hall kiln and brickyard equipment can be seen in the local history section of the Saffron Walden Museum.

Quite a number of houses were built in Stansted during thenineteenth century using the local red bricks and the skills of the brickmaker and the brick-layer combined to please the eye of the stroller. Bricks over doorways and windows were specially moulded by the brickmaker and hand rubbed and shaped by the bricklayer for a perfect fit, an arduous and skilled job.

You will soon notice examples of high quality brickwork as you look around Cambridge Road, Silver Street, Chapel Hill, Lower Street, Recreation Ground and Bentfield End. Notice especially the Post Office, the Social Club, the carriage entrance at Linden House, the Limes Stables and the front of the old chapel in Silver Street. The pattern of bricks round the doors and windows of the buildings on the corner of Chapel Hill and Sunnyside is repeated onChurch Cottage and also in Burton End. Consider the doctor's surgery in St. John's Road with the original house and gable in the middle, an extension on the right and a commendable and more recent extension on the

It is apparent from the dates on the buildings that bricks were not commonly used before the nineteenth century. St. Mary's tower was rebuilt with bricks in 1692 and you will notice that the bricks are longer and shallower than modern ones. Whilst walking round looking at brickwork try to decide which could be the oldest brick building in Stansted, and at the same time cast your eyes over other buildings and enjoy some of the remarkable features that adorn our village.
