Dear Friends,

This week a copy of John Taylor's new book arrived. I had ordered it after the very successful Caistor'89 conference for the clergy, because along with other material, the lectures that were given at the conference formed part of the book. His lectures were most inspiring and I wanted to reread them.

But its arrival reminded me that this year sees the beginning of the Decade of Evangelism called for by our Bishop John Waine and also by Archbishop Basil Hume in the Roman Catholic Church.

Christian mission and evangelism is the action of the whole body of Christ in the history of the world, a continuation of Pentecost, when God sent his Holy Spirit into the hearts of the apostles so that they could continue the work begun on earth by his Son Jesus Christ. They made a good job of it, now it's up to us to continue that work.

The challenge that the Church is faced with is, that in order to do the job we must ourselves be continually renewed through the Holy Spirit working in us, so that we become living witnesses to the Good News that Jesus brought his gospel of love.

The celebration of the Eucharist is the place for the renewal of the missionary and evangelistic work of the Church - there we are fed by the Body and Blood of Christ, so that we can go out and confess in our lives that He is Lord. But we have to acknowledge with deep sorrow that this is something that all Christians cannot do together. January is the month when we yearly pray for a week for that unity, so that we may not only pray and work together but also be fed together.

This year as we start our decade of Evangelism in the Roman Catholic and Anglican congregations, let us <u>all</u> make it our piece of work of unity to be present at the joint service on Sunday January 21st at the Quaker Meeting House and pray that in God's good time we may be able to celebrate together in the Eucharist.

In the words of John Taylor - "Jesus had little more than 30 months to proclaim something and did something and was something that immediately fired the imagination of the common people" - if only we could resuscitate the same enthusiasm - then the Church might have a darity of purpose.

Let us pray that in  $10\ \text{years}$  the unity we desire may be brought about.

A happy and inspiring year.

Do you, as members of a Society within the worldwide Christian church, try to share in the life and fellowship of the whole Christian community? Do you co-operate as fully as possible in its work, availing yourselves of local opportunities for worship and service with your fellow Christians? Is your distinctive Quaker witness characterised by humility and a willingness to learn from others, so that differences are transcended in a common loyalty to Jesus Christ?

While most Friends would agree that there aredangers of trying to express religious faith in a few words, there are times when it is helpful or needful to say something. The following extract from a talk given by a Friend to a wider audience may help those who find the task overwhelmingly difficult.

The core of our religious life is that our meetings for worship are held in silent waiting on God. Out of the silence someone may speak briefly, or pray, or read from the Bible or other religious work. This way of worship reflects our basic conviction that by looking into their inmost hearts people can have direct communication with their Creator. That conviction can't be spelt out in words, but we base our whole lives upon it.

This approach to religion expresses itself in a package of characteristics attitudes and practices. Here are some of the most relevant for our purpose today:

Although we follow the teachings of Jesus of Nazareth and try to live in the spirit of forgiving love shown forth in his life and death, we do not rely for authority on a literal interpretation of the Bible, or on any dogmas or creeds. Many of us also acknowledge a debt to wise people of other religions and of no declared religion.

Men and women are equal in the Society and we have no ordained clergy.



We try to live in simplicity and moderation, but only some Quakers are teetotallers.

We avoid betting, gambling and speculation.

Above all, we distance ourselves from all violence in thought, word or deed.

We refuse to fight in wars, and we work for peace and reconciliation wherever we can.

We do not regard ourselves as having a monopoly of truth. Acceptance of other views is an essential part of the Quaker way. We therefore don't proselytise. If people decide to join us we are delighted, but you can't be converted to being a Quaker; you can only discover that you are one.

Preparative Meeting also thought it might be helpful if we repeated the Queries upon which our recent workshop on Justice, Peace and the Integrity of Creation was based.

Are you concerned that man's increasing power over nature should not be used irresponsibly but with reverence for life and with a sense of the splendour of God's continuing creation?

Are you working towards the removal of social injustices? Have you attempted to examine their causes objectively, and are you ready to abandon old prejudices and think again? Do you, as disciples of Christ, take a living interest in the social conditions of the district in which you live? Do you seek to promote the welfare of those in any kind of need, and a just distribution of the resources of the world?

Do you faithfully maintain our witness against all war, and all preparation for it, as inconsistent with the spirit and teaching of Christ? Do you live in the virtue of that life and power that takes away the occasion of all wars? Are you always ready, with God's help, to work for reconciliation between individuals, groups and nations?

Do you behave with brotherly love to all men whatever their race, background or opinion? Do you try to make the stranger feel at home among you?

"I am the Light of the World", asserted our Lord. Light does not draw attention to itself except where it is piercing the darkness, or in process of dispersing it. Otherwise we do not look directly at light; rather we see by means of light, by its revealing what is there to be seen when illumination falls upon it.

Jesus is the light of the world in both these senses. When we look at Him against a background of gross ignorance, error and evil He shines like a light—house on a pitch—black night. Consider Him alongside the evils of concentration camps, of drug trafficking, of tyrannous regimes, of gang warfare, of naked greed, cruelty and falshood and many other evils and He shines like an incandescent beacon, with self—evident and self—authenticating truth, goodness and love. In such comparisons there can be no doubt about the pre-eminence of His light.

The pre-emincence of His light may not be so starkly obvious when His light is dispersing darkness, when things are partially light and partially dark. The contrast is not so sharp. But if we look at Him long and hard enough He will shine in our twilight zones. He reveals the half-lights by which we are all too easily deceived and with which we are all too easily contented. For instance, our mixed motives, our half-heartedness, our double standards, our dubious piety, our wilful ignorance, our pretence and posturing, etc.

But light also enables us to see what else we could not see. When we look at creation, at life in general, at other people and at ourselves in the light which Jesus sheds, how very differently we see, how much more we see. So much in nature speaks to us of a God of Love or points to such a God as the only ultimate answer to life's intractable pains. Life in general becomes a Godgiven delight, to be enjoyed and shared. Other people are our brothers and sisters who, with Christ's mind, are of infinite worth. We ourselves take on new value and significance as children infiintely loved by God our Father.

In Rembrandt painting "The Adoration of the Shepherds", Mary, Joseph and


the shepherds all have their faces brightly illuminated by the light that emanates from the Baby Jesus. It is a device which he (and others) make use of when depicting scenes from our Lord's life. But it is more than a device; it is a profound theological truth and richly true to Christian experience. When we see people in His light how differently they appear. We see their pains, struggles, hurts, needs, possibilities, nobilities, etc. He is the Light which shows up both gross darkness and the half-lights of life. He is the light which brings into sharper focus what we otherwise could not see, but which we must see if we are to live the life of the Kingdom of God:

#### OUT AND ABOUT IN STANSTED

This is the first of a series of articles which will cover briefly a variety of subjects which may be encountered while walking out and about in Stansted. Many Link readers will be well acquainted with what is written, but even so, it is hoped that each month there will be something of interest to some of you.


As most observations will be made while walking about the parish it is appropriate to comment first on our footpaths.

The ancient countryside around Stansted originally contained a large number of small settlements, hamlets and villages connected by a network of paths and tracks. Some of these tracks developed into present day roads, while others survived merely as paths. A common feature of old paths is that they lead directly from one place to another in a straight line, whereas roads carrying traffic are more influenced by terrain and boundaries and are rarely straight. During the last two hundred years various developments have contrived to force paths to deviate from their original courses: the enclosure of fields, the building of large houses with parks, railways, modern housing estates, motorways and airports, to mention a few.

In the Stansted area it is still possible to trace some paths on the Ordnance Survey map running more or less on their original courses. For example, Stansted to Birchanger via Water Lane, West Road, Rochfords and Forest Hall; Stansted to Ugley Green via Gall End, cutting straight across fields and a plantation to Alsa Wood; Manuden to Alsa Wood via the north end of Pennington Lane; Stansted Windmill to Hazel End via Bentfield Water Mill.


Within Stansted village itself paths and alleyways abound, and no matter how well you know them, why not spend the odd hour in the winter sunshine walking these paths again and working out why they are there and whither they originally led.

Records and maps detailing rights of way in Stansted can be studied in the Parish Council Office where one can also obtain copies of the Village Trail and Saunters Round Stansted.

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#### ST PAUL'S DAY 25th JANUARY

St Paul was one of the Church's greatest teachers. Brought up as a Jewish Pharisee, Saul (as he was first called), was a Roman citizen who earned his living as a tent-maker. He was completely against the early Christians. He was there when the first Christian martyr, Stephen, was stoned to death and afterwards he searched out many Christians and handed them over to prison and death.

But he changed dramatically because Jesus came into his life. One day he was travelling on the road to Damascus, on the way to arrest some more Christians, when a bright light surrounded him. He fell to the ground and heard Jesus speak. You can read all about it in Acts, chapter 9.

Everything changed for Saul then, even if he had a hard time persuading people that it wasn't a trick. Even his name changed, and as 'Paul' he travelled to many different countries to teach people about Jesus. He founded churches and to encourage them while he was away he wrote the 13 letters that we can still read today (they come in the Bible after the book of the Acts of the Apostles).

His travels weren't easy, he was shipwrecked on the island of Malta and he ended his life in Rome where he was beheaded (it was one of the privileges of being a Roman citizen to be beheaded rather than crucified).
