

Five months seems a long time to wait for a thankyou, but when my wife and I came to Bishop's Stortford last September, following the sad death of the Revd. Tom Allen, we were greeted as warmly by Stansted folk - Methodists and all the denominations - as we were by the rest of our Circuit.

Sheila and I have come to enjoy our visits to Stansted. 'Shalom' has already become important as a learning, praying and meeting point; the work of Churches Together in Stansted is full of enthusiasm and imagination; and our own worship and fellowship is a source of much joy. We are glad to be here, and pray that God will bless us together.

1992 might well turn out to be 'more of the same', but in international affairs as well as in national and local concerns that has come to mean change, and more change and unexpected change. We need a firm rock to stand on. We need time for thought and prayer for directing and guidance. May God be with us and his world.

On my first visit to the Whitechapel Mission, where Stortford Churches help care for and welcome the many homeless men and women each week, I was told that a group from Stansted were also on the premises busily sorting clothing to be distributed to those who need it. The Mission values our help enormously, and if 'underpants' has become a smile phrase in Stansted it is only because that need has been understood. I have received a letter from the new Minister at the Mission, the Revd. John LInes, who writes:

'I felt I must write and express the thanks of all at Whitechapel for your labours on our behalf. Being new here it took me a while to appreciate all that you do, but I now see that without the support you give us on a Sunday we would have real problems.

But we are not only indebted in terms of your labours, for you give us goods and money. Please accept our thanks for that also. The new washing machine you bought us is receiving good wear, and is a much needed piece of the Mission equipment.

As 1 look to the future I can see no sign of the problems of our street friends easing, in fact I can see them increasing. In my short time of ministry here the number of people coming through the doors has increased. Sadly amongst these are a good number of younger people and a lot of mentally ill.

May I ask for your care, love, prayers and support in 1992.

QUAKER COTTAGE, BELFAST

Quaker cottage has been used by Friends in Belfast for several years as a place where mothers and their children, Protestant and Catholic, can come to meet and talk during the day. It consisted of a traditional Irish cottage and a collection of other buildings on a hillside overlooking Belfast. Recently there were problems with the cottage and it was decided to rebuild the entire site, but retaining the traditional features. Money was raised from various sources, including Friends Meetings, and work took from Autumn 1990 to November 1991.

The new building has central heating previously staff had to light fires each day. The building is warm with a large room for the mothers, a comfortable children's room, a kitchen and toilets. It was important to retain the friendly, homely atmosphere, and this has been achieved. There is also accommodation for the voluntary helpers.

One helper wrote: "It was a very special experience to see the pleasure of the mothers and children as they stepped over the threshold of the new centre a few weeks ago. Their delight in having such a wonderful facility built especially for them was testament enough that all the efforts spent had been very worthwhile".



"OUR VILLAGE"

This year no doubt we will see and hear a great deal of attention drawn to various development programmes proposed upon the site known as Rochfords Nurseries. This then may be an ideal time to look back and recall some details and memories.

During the mid 1800s the area was known as part of Stoneyfield Common with a small section of Nicolis Field (this applies to the land that falls within the actual Parish of Stansted Mountfitchet for as today the greater part of this site lies in the Parish of Birchanger). Perhaps we may follow the Parish boundary in more detail another time.

Towards the later 1800s this whole area was surveyed by the Rochford Brothers with a view to its becoming a Greenhouse Nursery. The site must have been approved for the land was purchased. This encompassed (roughly using today's known points) the area from the old railway level crossing between West Road and Stansted Brook, from there following the footpath or cutting through the Forest Hall Road, turning left along to Churchill Corner then down Church Road to the footpath through to Manor Road, straight down Stoney Common. there again to meet up with West Road. The whole area therein was probably in excess of 70 acres. Close proximity of the railway was a further important factor as large amounts of coal and coke were needed for firing, and fruit and flower products had to be transported to the London and Manchester markets. Spurred off from the main line was a siding from which a tramway was to be built. This necessitated a cutting to assist with the considerable ascent from the siding to Nursery site (described by John Barker as one of the most ambitious tramway schemes in Essex).

With many other thoughts in mind, not least a good water supply and housing for the work force (what changes!), they were to signal the go-ahead with site clearing and building work. Some of their workers from Rochford's other Nursery at Cheshunt were brought to assist with the building which we must understand took several years to complete.

Hopefully we may continue next month. It is with my grateful thanks to Mr. F. Palmer for the help he has given of which we have more to tell.

If anyone has any information or memories of Rochfords I would be very pleased to hear. Who can better my estimation of the total tramway length?
