





#### UCVS ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The Annual General Meeting of Uttlesford CVS will be on Friday June 5th at 8 p.m. in Uttlesford District Council Chamber, Council Offices, London Road, Saffron Walden. There is ample parking space on site, a lift for those unable to use stairs and an induction loop to assist hearing impaired people.

As usual, the Chair will be taken by the President, Saffron Walden MP, Alan Haselhurst. The speaker will be Jill Pitkeathley, Director of Carers National Association and author of the book "It's My Duty, Isn't It?" which was used as part of the group leaders' briefing for Uttlesford CVS Carers' Day last October.

Mrs. Pitkeathley lectures widely on the plight of carers and was one of the small team of advisers working with Sir Roy Griffiths during the writing of his Community Care Report. Many will have seen her contribution to the programmes "Who Cares?" and "Who Cares Now?" presented for BBC Television by Dr. Jonathan Miller and for the past two years she has been advising the "Princess Royal Trust for Carers" which was launched in October 1991 by our last guest speaker, HRH The Princess Royal.



In the late 1970s when Hargrave House was still a residential home for "Special Needs" children, we discovered a need to start a special troop for boys who wanted to be scouts but who could not reasonably join Stansted Scouts.

Derek Honour and Judy Goddard started the troop, with Tim Mace, Simon Lee and Stephen Gerber and Mark Gerber who came with his brother. I joined the next week! The boys had learning problems, but were great fun to work with and we camped and worked as any other troop.

Over the years more boys came and went, more leaders came but hardly anyone went (we have just "lost" Nigel Morris as he has moved to Cambridge). We have camped at jamborees, been to Belgium, the New Forest, Perry Wood (near Gatwick Airport), been on a narrow boat and much more.

We had a weekend away near Bacton in Norfolk this year, bivouacked in October, visited Whipsnade Zoo, a steam railway ....

The Scout organisation is open to anyone, those with special needs are normally integrated within a Pack or Troop. In our case we have a few boys who would find it difficult to join in with others and would in turn hold back some of the "normal" scouts. It is for them that we run this group. There are only three such groups in Essex and only a handful around the country. Many special needs groups are run as school troops, such as the Guide Troop running at Peter Kirk School; we wanted to give the boys a chance to mix with others and choose to run as we do. This does not mean that the school troops are second best - on the contrary - 1they allow children from further away to join in whilst at school when they could not come back for an evening meeting.

This year we are going to Blankenheim in Germany to a hostel for our summer camp.

We were hoping to fly from Stansted, but it does not now look possible, so we are fund raising to hire a mini bus and for the ferry fare.

We have 5 boys in the troop and recently Clare joined us. She is a Guide at Peter Kirk School but is joining us to allow her to go camping, swimming and join in other activities outside the school.

We meet on Tuesday nights and anyone who wishes to join us should come and see us, or give me a call (Saffron Walden 524120).

#### "OUR VILLAGE"

The Rochford's Nursery story continues with our attention turning towards the land, for it is in this direction that Mr. Joe Watson has been of immense help, being employed within this department for over 50 years. His help removed the furrow from my brow.


The Farm consisted of some 36 acres of arable land which produced crops of wheat, barley, oats, sugar beat and potatoes. These were grown on a crop rotation basis along with hay and clover.

Mr. Watson so well remembers when his farming mechanical power was literally "Horse Power" and recalls with affection the names of "Flossey, Tinker, Ivy, Bonney, Nobby and Laddie". The latter two being large horses of the Percheron breed (after Perche in Southern Normandy?) Between them they drew the implements to plough, sow, reep and mow, along with many other duties. Old stabling originally used for accommodating First World War horses was to become their stables. It is only in very recent years that sadly these were destroyed by fire devouring with it some irreplaceable mementos.

Another memory recalled that on one occasion whilst potato spinning his horse disturbed a wasp's nest. This of course was most unacceptable to the residents who duly took their revenge upon one of the unfortunate potato pickers who received multiple stings. Mrs. Watson bravely administered first aid. The horse also suffered from their attack. Mr. Watson narrowly escaped but he saw a wasp crawl across the peak of his cap.



## UTTLESFORD BRANCH

MIND is opening a new drop-in centre in Stansted on Tuesday April 21. It will be the third one set up by the Uttlesford branch of the mental health charity in less than three years.

Anyone suffering from phobias, anxiety, depression, schizophrenia, eating disorders, or any other mental health problems will be welcome to pop in for tea, coffee and a listening ear at the Friends' Meeting House, Chapel Hill, on Tuesdays from 2-4 p.m.

Anne Ruskin, co-ordinator of the Uttlesford branch said this week: "We have been convinced there is a need for a drop-in centre for a long time but our opening hinged on support from volunteers. We now have several offers of help and a lot of enthusiasm".

MIND will also be starting a befriending scheme in Stansted. Trained volunteers will meet people on a one-to-one basis, usually in their own homes, for about an hour a week. They will chat over coffee and possibly share hobbies or go shopping together. It is for people who do not like big groups or who are unable to go out due to panic attacks or agoraphobia.

Training will be offered to helpers and to anyone wishing to do befriending. The next course will begin on April 28 and will run for 10 consecutive Tuesdays at the Crafton Green Clinic, Chapel Hill, Stansted.

"We already have the support of local doctors and social workers, based on the success of our drop-in centres and befriending schemes at Saffron Walden and Dunmow and we anticipate people from Bishop's Stortford and the villages will benefit from the Stansted services," said Mrs. Ruskin.

A couple of us made it to the Netley Marsh HQ of TFSR at the beginning of March for a refresher session on sewing machine refurbishment. We were also to hear at first hand about the plight of people with homes in the Eastern parts of Sierra Leone. Many of them have been forced to move to the capital city (Freetown) or even over the border into Guinea in order to escape the depredations of guerillas from Liberia and beyond. One interesting result is that some tools sent out to Sierra Leone by TFSR are being looted and used by the Liberians. It may be argued that this does not matter provided that the tools are being used for peaceful ends, and not ending up on the black market! Whilst at Netley Marsh we had the opportunity to complete

and pack our first carpentry kit which is now probably on route to Sierra Leone.

At the end of March two of us attended the national AGM of TFSR. There was not a tool in sight, but it was good to meet members of other TFSR groups, and to hear some healthy debate on TFSR policy. For example, there was a long, but necessary discussion on whether TFSR was right to accept a promotional package from B&Q which would include stands and collection boxes at about 30 DIY stores. objections centred on the slowness of B&Q (and similar DIY chains) to phase out environmentally unfriendly products from their stores. In the end it was agreed (far from unanimously) that working alongside B&Q would give TFSR a better opportunity to influence them than could be achieved by lobbying from the outside.
