Dear Friend,

You will already know from the local papers and from the letter I have sent to every house in the village that I am urging the people of Stansted to respond generously to the Africa in Crisis appeal. Television news reports have brought to the front of our minds what some have called 'the drought of the century'.

I am hoping that we can raise £4,000 over the coming month - just £1 for each adult in our village. I know we receive many charitable appeals and that there are many worthy causes both in this country and overseas. But I do not feel that - from our comparative affluence - we can ignore this tremendous need. The drought has affected fifteen countries in Africa - the crops have failed, and cattle have died.

The charities working to relieve the suffering of people in Africa need help now - not just to provide immediate food aid to starving people - but also to give long term help. Building irrigation schemes, providing seed and tools to replace what have been lost, and enabling people to provide for themselves and their families in the future are also needed.

Early in October there will be a Coffee Morning in the Day Centre. Gifts for Bring and Buy, Cakes and Raffle are requested - please contact Jackie Corbishley. Look out for posters for more details.



I know from my own experience that the people of Stansted are generous and caring. Jesus said "Whatever you do for my brothers, you are doing for me." 

WORLD CONFERENCE OF FRIENDS

About every ten years the Religious Society of Friends holds a World Conference, a gathering together of Friends from 34 different countries. In 1991 it was held in three different locations - in Honduras, Kenya and the Netherlands. Inspite of the great diversity of backgrounds, outlook, and the manner of holding the Meetings for Worship, a remarkable sense of unity was achieved.

The delegates' reports make fascinating reading. The one who went from London to the Kenya Meeting wrote: "We arrived in this beautiful place in a heavy downpour - Kenyan Friends assumed this was God's blessing, ending a two month drought and just in time

for the planting season. We were faced with rich red mud, electricity failture and water shortage, and some of us were at first thrown off balance, but these problems became opportunities for service to each other. As we lived simply many of us learned how few material comforts we need in order to praise God and be happy. We felt called to transcend our divisions, and in worship and celebration felt the power of the Spirit".

In Honduras, the divergencies were even more marked: the delegate there writes: "We have come from all corners of the earth to discover that 'encounter with an unknown person is an encounter with ourselves'. To know God includes seeking Him in others despite the differences and discomforts. We became more aware of the destructive effects of poor understanding and of indeginous rights and cultures. When one people believes itself superior because it does not know the other, this overwhelms the less powerful with an ocean of darkness, which submerges both the exploiter and the exploited. But in this darkness, Latin American Friends have found the Divine Light and the Spirit of Jesus as their guide".

The largest Conference was in Holland, where the theme was 'In Spirit and in Truth: Faith in Action'. There too some of the delegates found some of the divisions difficult to accept but the final paragraph of the report reads: "We affirm our vision that God is calling us to live out the faith that we can have community without uniformity and we can rejoice in the distinctive gifts of Friends from all traditions".

At the time of writing the shop window has been whitened out and overwritten with "Moved to Station Road, first right" (although we understand some confusion took place between left and right). The trading sign has been removed and re-positioned above the new premises at No. 5 Station Road, formerly Minett Office Supplies.

Soon the shop was made ready for business as usual, carrying an extensive choice of pet foods and accessories ranging from pet health foods to hampster wheels or wind-up mice for cats; fish feeds, to fish pond weeks, frozen meats to bird nut treats; garden seeds, to garden needs, hay, straw and so much more.



Continuing Anne Moore's report, Volunteer Nurse at Colentina Hospital, Bucharest, February 1992.

Another room (similar to the "forget-me-not") held the bigger children who were succumbing to Aids and needed peace and quiet. They too responded warmly to affection and stimulation and loved to be picked up to look outside, their eyes wide and shining with excitement at which they could see and hear "out there".

Whilst caring for the children, we had to report to the Romanian Medical Assistants any fevers, infections, weepy ears, diarrhoea or worms we observed. They worked well within their limitations but continuity of treatment was a problem as laboratory facilities and drugs were not available - a luxury we all take for granted!

We also played with the children and their "new" toys or just cuddled them if they were too tired to too sick to play. In Ceausecu's regime they were left in their cots most of the time, sometimes restrained or locked in a "nursery" unsupervised. Due to lack of staff, babies were bottle fed lying in their cots with hygiene sadly lacking. Under Health Aid toilet training and weaning were a priority.

Health Aid has remedied many of the problems, but their future aims are to improve the children's situation further with a life away from hospital.

- 1. Supporting the child at home with their family with Community Nursing and Outpatient Clinics.
- A residential home for those children whose parents cannot be traced or are unwilling to have them at home.
- 3. A holiday home.
- 4. A School of Nursing opened in April 1991.

I am grateful and feel privileged to have been part of this and hope to return for two months in 1993.



ESSEX OUT-OF-SCHOOL CHILDCARE PROJECT




STANSTED DAY CENTRE FOR THE OVER 60'S CRAFTON GREEN, CHAPEL HILL



And sighed for relief as I reached the classroom.




