

Getting ready for any big event requires a considerable amount of preparation, and none more so than the christian church's annual celebration of the Resurrection of Jesus Christ at Easter.

For many that preparation will involve traditional forms of self-denial - giving up some physical pleasures to concentrate our minds on spiritual matters. We can easily become pre-occupied by the demands of our bodies that we forget the needs of our souls. Selfdenial reminds us that we do have control over our physical cravings, as well as uniting us with Christ in his own time of preparation in the wilderness before he began his ministry.

For others, Lenten discipline will involve some additional commitment - to do more for others, to give extra to those in need, to come close to God and to our fellow Christians through discussion, Bible Study and prayer. That deepening of our faith and love of God is an important part of our preparation to celebrate Easter.

There is a third possibility for our Lenten preparation, which involves not DOING at all. The greatest enemy for most of us today is the pressure of a multiplicity of commitments our work, our families, our homes, our social lives, as well as our commitments to our Churches and their activities. We can easily become so busy doing God's work that we no longer have time to BE God's children. So it may be valuable this Lent to make a discipline, not to do more, but to do less - to free some time in our lives for those who are important to us. Above all, that means freeing some time to spend with God - time simply to be in God's presence, either in the privacy of our own homes, or the peaceful atmosphere of a church, or the quiet of our countryside. We know that God is always with us, wherever we are and whatever we are doing. But we need time to respond to his love and to be aware

of his presence in our lives. Any relationship needs time and effort if it is to flourish, and the same applies to those close to us - our families and our friends, who also need time to care and to share.

May God bless you this Lent as you seek to grow closer to him, and to celebrate the joyful resurrection of his Son this Easter.

BERTHA BRACEY

The arrival of refugees at Stansted turned my mind to one of the Friends who was a friend of the oppressed. Her name was Bertha Bracey. She played a leading role in one of the most significant pieces of relief work carried out by British Friends. It lasted from 1933 to 1950 involving hundreds of full time and volunteer workers whose care and concern brought comfort and hope to thousands of Germans, Austrians and others who sought refuge in U.K. from Nazi persecution.

Bertha Bracey was born in Birmingham in 1898, the daughter of a master carpenter who worked for Cadbury's in Bournville. She started work as a teacher but was attracted to Quaker refief work. She worked for the Friends' Council for International Service in Nuremberg in the 1920s, had also experience in Vienna and with small Quaker groups working among Berlin students.

So, in 1933 when Meeting for Sufferings set up the German Emergency Committee she was well qualified to become the secretary, speaking fluent German and with many contacts in Germany. In early days there was much work to do in U.K. and the G.E.C. office was set up in Friends' House. Help was needed with health questions, training and assistance in solving many problems. G.E.C. also coped with responsibilities on the Continent which meant travelling to Germany, Holland, France, Austria and Czechoslovakia to obtain first hand experience.

One activity led to another as life became more difficult in Germany. It was not possible for all who feared persecution to emigrate and the education began to create problems for some teachers, parents and children especially Jewish or partly Jewish ones. One school was founded in Germany and another in England to provide threatened children with an education (run on Quaker lines), which was becoming impossible for them elsewhere.

Bertha Bracey then played a part in the rescue of 10,000 Jewish children working with British Jewish agencies following the Kristallnacht Program 1938. They arrived in England several hundred at a time and were taken into private families and schools. Also there was work to be done among refugees who were interned mostly in the Isle of Man.

Then it became clear that there would be great need for relief work in Europe after the war and Friends Relief Service Committee took overall responsibility for the Society's work at home and abroad and Bertha Bracey was the Vice Chairman.

There is not space to detail all her work as different and compelling needs became clear. Work with women in her time with the Allied Control Commission. Work in preparing German women for their part in the new democratic Germany and bridging the gap between people so lately enemies.

In her retirement she undertook voluntary work for the charity which became "Age Concern".

She died in 1989 aged 95 - the memory of her love and concern lingers on and no doubt in Quaker history she will continue to receive special recognition for her creative vision, sympathy and inspiration to others in those urgent and difficult tasks.

Two years ago at my school re-union I was thrilled to meet a woman who had been among those Jewish children sent to our school in 1938. She remembered more of our school's evacuation to Somerset and all the ups and downs entailed than I did. She had returned to East Berlin and disappeared behind the wall. We had not met for fifty years!

In those far off days I was quite unaware of Bertha Bracey though we knew that Quakers were involved in the work with refugees.

There is always a light carrier somewhere.



AN EASTER APPEAL FOR THE SUE RYDER FOUNDATION

Some of you know of my interest and work for the Sue Ryder/Cheshire Homes in England for the care of the disabled and very old, and the terminally ill which are open to people of all faiths.

I have been a supporter for over 30 years now and make regular journeys to the headquarters at Cavendish to help there and take numerous useful items - clothing, blankets, sheets - given to me by my friends for use in the Homes or to sell in the Sue Ryder Charity Shops. Nothing is refused or wasted - even shoes are needed for Poland. They are transported free by the lorries which normally return back there empty.

There are now 24 Homes in England, Stanenhoe Park at Hitchin has 50 beds for physically handicapped, long and short term patients. There are 30 beds at Cavendish for medical and terminal handicapped people; at Snettisham, Norfolk, 29 beds for the elderly and disabled and at Thorpe Hall, Peterborough, 40 beds will shortly be available for predominantly cancer care, with provisions for the chronic sick and physically handicapped. More homes are needed but the Foundation is now facing a serious financial crisis due to the recession, lack of support and the inadequate grants received from the D.S.S. and the Health Authorities.



SIMNEL CAKE

You don't have to wait till Easter to make this cake, because although we now associate them with Easter, Simnel cakes used to be made for Mothering Sunday. Servant girls were allowed by their mistresses to make a cake to take home to their mothers.

The origin of the name Simnel is uncertain. One theory is that it comes from the Anglo Saxon word symel or symbel meaning a feast. Another is that it comes from the word Siminellus which was a Roman festive bread eaten during the Spring fertility rites. Similia is the Latin word for "fine flour". The story that the father of Lambert Simnel, the pretender to Henry VIII, was the baker of these cakes cannot be true, as Simnel cakes were around before that.

Now Simnel Cakes are associated with Easter, and the eleven marzipan balls on the top of this cake represent Jesus's disciples, minus Judas.

RECIPE

Ingredients

8 oz butter
8 oz soft brown sugar
4 eggs - beaten
12 oz flour
1 level teaspoon cinnamon, nutmeg, mixed spice
pinch salt
12 oz currants
4 oz cut mixed peel
or use 16 oz mixed fruit
1 lb marzipan

Method

Cream together butter and sugar. Add beaten eggs. Sieve together flour, spices and salt. Add flour and fruit alternately. Put half this mixture into an 8" greased and lined tin. Warm 8 oz marzipan until soft. Roll out to 8" diameter and place on top of mixture in tin. Add rest of mixture. Bake at Mark 2, 300°F, 150°C for $3\frac{1}{2}$ hours. Cool in the tin, then turn out.

Roll out 6 oz marzipan. Brush cake with warmed apricot jam and place marzipan on top. Make remaining 2 oz marzipan into 11 small balls. Put on top of cake. Dredge with icing sugar and brown quickly under hot grill. Do not take your eyes off it or it will burn.

Whether you eat this on Mothering Sunday or wait until Easter I am sure you will enjoy it. You may even want to make two!
