

Dear Friends,


God became man in Jesus - he came near to us he became one of us, gathering us all to himself as HIS CHILDREN to be PART OF CHRIST'S BODY - the Church.

The Christian Family - our own families - MATTER TO GOD.








STANSTED HALL CRICKET CLUB

LONDON CHILDREN IN STANSTED

Gorsefield, part of Tower Hamlets Education, provides a residential experience of five days for children from the East End of London. The children being primarily within the ages seven to eleven are drawn from primary schools. Their visit also encompasses aspects of the National Curriculum, mainly science, history, geography, art, technology and health education. Parties of up to thirty children come each week.

Gorsefield was built as a family house in 1907. It has been catering for East End children for well over twenty years. The house is set in six acres of grounds containing lawns, shrubberies, a fine variety of mature trees, large pond, meadow and a variety of small animals.

Views on Gorsefield are always positive:-

<u>School Inspector</u> - "Highly conducive to creating the right environment in which children could learn and develop their social skills and attitude to self".

<u>Teacher</u> - "Gorsefield is socially extremely important, as well as extending experience into areas of the Curriculum".

<u>Parent</u> - "My child was full of trepidation before going, she came back bouncing with joy. The homely scale of it sounds impressive".

The school journey is still part subsidised by the L.E.A. Additionally in the past the Local Authority was able to give grants to needy children, thus ensuring that they did not miss out on this important experience. Unfortunately, in the present financial climate, this is becoming increasingly more difficult.

In order to maintain this equality of opportunity, we are presently applying to the Charity Commission for Charity status. If successful, we hope to be able to apply for money from various charities to help fund needy children, thus enabling them to continue to benefit from visits to Gorsefield. Part of this process will be to set up a group of Friends of Gorsefield, called the "Gorsefield Society", whose aims would be to support access to a rural education for the Children of T.H., raise funds, appoint a management committee and Trustees. All will be welcome, watch this space for further information about Gorsefield activities.


