



## CHURCHES TOGETHER Stansted



#### CHURCHES TOGETHER CONFERENCE REPORT

SATURDAY, 14 MAY 1994 AT CHRISTCHURCH URC CENTRE, CHELMSFORD

This conference which involved the Essex Churches Consultative Council and Barking area church leaders was attended by Catherine Dean (Methodist), Rev Margaret Booker (CofE), Rev Margaret McKay (URC), David and Rita Morson (RC), Katherine Hurford (Society of Friends).

The conference was introduced by the Rev John Clarke, County Ecumenical Officer, who reminded us that we should be progressing from co-operation to commitment between churches and that denominations should be initiating local ecumenical projects in their respective areas. He stressed that denominations should be taking a lead in making links between one another and that shifting attitudes towards greater commitments should be the main priority.

The main speaker was the Rev Martin Cressey, Principal of Westminster College, Cambridge, and delegate to the Fifth World Faith and Order Conference at Santiago de Compostela. Rev Cressey focused on the Greek word "Koinonia", meaning participation, sharing, communion and fellowship. Like many Greek words, it does not have an exact translation but can be interpreted in the above four main dimensions, all of which are inter-connected.

"Koinonia" was the theme of the conference. It was about confessing one faith, living together in Christ through Baptism and witnessing Christ in the world. Rev Cressey elaborated on this theme by examining the fuller, deeper and broader dimensions of commitment.

Fuller: Are there limitations to what we

are prepared to do together? Are we exploring every area that we

can do jointly?

Deeper: Do our relationships reflect the

reality of an encounter with

Christ?

Broader: Do we reach across Christian

boundaries to people of other

faiths and to people of no faith?

Some discussions followed. Differences were acknowledged but the value of these differences should be accepted and recognised. Sharing is the most profound experience and should be rooted in what is the will of Jesus Christ; relegating to the sidelines what is additional or erroneous to His will.

The session finished with a service led by the Bishop of Bradwell.

The main item on W.I. agendas in May is 'Resolutions' and so Stansted's members welcomed Mrs. Barbara Ball, a VCO from the Chelmsford office who led the discussion on the 3 resolutions which will be debated and voted on at the Triennial Conference in June.

The first dealt with the donation of organs after death and the most sympathetic but efficient manner in which lungs, hearts and kidneys, etc. could be used to benefit others. A majority voted in favour of presumed consent and required request.

The next resolution voiced the concern of members at the reduced availability of legal aid to the majority of ordinary people because of the Government's alterations to financial criteria. However, Stansted's members voted against the resolution as it stood because the Government had recently bowed to criticism and revised the rules.

Pornography, both explicit and violent, is the subject of the 3rd resolution. Mrs. Ball passed round various calendar pictures to assess what different people saw as pornography and likely to corrupt. It was agreed unanimously that the wording of part of the Obscene Publications Act should be altered and in itself be more explicit.

Our delegate to the Conference, Brenda Ryan, will certainly have an interesting meeting and we look forward to her report.

At the beginning of the meeting, notice was given of cakes to be made for the Carnival and the W.I. show at Cressing, the Bastille Day outing on 14th July, the request for the W.I. to look after the Fountain area and make refreshments for the Anglia in Bloom judges, and a W.I. Quiz Night on November 12th at St. John's Hall.

Judy Colliver is organising one of her splendid theatre trips to Harlow on May 31st and members were asked to sign up for the chauffeured punt outing in Cambridge on June 14th.

The evening was rounded off with a themed quiz and the competition results being announced.

#### GOINGS-ON IN THE WINDMILL

One evening last month mysterious lights and shadows were to be seen moving in the topmost parts of the windmill. Could this have been a reenactment of one of the Scouts' spine chilling initiation ceremonies when a new recruit was told ghost stories and then left alone in the mill in the dark? Nothing so enthralling. It was just two Stansted Millers recording some of the graffiti in the cap of the mill. When the roof of the cap is resurfaced with lead during the current building works there is a possibility that some of the roof boards bearing writing may be splintered, so it was decided to record the jottings for posterity.

The following passages were deciphered:

Wireless apparatus was brought to the top of this mill for the first time on July 5th, 1933 for the reception of signals from an aeroplane transmitted by radio on a wavelength of 5 metres.

Manned and operated by S.G. Hart AMRSGB ST40 INST E.T.

Assisted by W. Gray of Stansted Signals were received from USA, France, Italy, England.

Observations were made from this mill for the first time on Sept. 4th,  $1940\ \text{by R.}$  Bunting and S. Camp.

E.G. Brand, Millfield. Photographed Stansted from the mill Aug. 12 1933. Assistant photographers H. Sanders, T.J. Brand.

If any reader can shed any light on these messages or maybe knows the whereabouts of the photographs taken in 1933, then Peter Brown, 51 Recreation Ground, Stansted, telephone 812816, would be delighted to hear from you.

Over the years hundreds of visitors to the mill have signed their names on the woodwork. Generally the older, pencilled signatures are neater and more ligible than those written since the advent of the biro and felt pen. Here are some of the names from the 1930's:

John Bass, P. Haggerwood, Douglas Hudgell, G. Johnson, R. Kitson, G. Marshall c/o Mrs. White, Lower St., V. Mumford, Marjory Player, 5 Water Lane, Fred Powell, J. Stockley, D.A. Stockwell, William Wooton, and the Jubilee Cottage Gang 1935.

and from the 1940's:

R. Bonner, E.W. Cole, R. Crockford, A.J. Mann, Ella Richardson, I. Roberts, D. Snelling, S. Warwick, C. Watts.

One of these people has been approached with the suggestion that he should pay a fine for despoiling the fabric of the mill for all these years. This line of approach has so far proved fruitless and a little perilous, but negotiations continue.



#### STANSTED FOOTPATHS

During the last few months the Parish Footpaths Working Party has been continuing to improve our local paths. With the cooperation of landowners and the County Council, waymarks have been installed at strategic points. At present we are in the process of agreeing the route of Footpath 45 which runs from Burton End along behind Four Winds and descends to Tye Green Brook. At the brook it has been recently diverted to a level crossing over the new airport rail link. Over the crossing the path turns back along the railway until it picks up the original route up to Tye Green Road. This last section has been well cleared by the farmer as usual. On the Burton End side of the brook and railway the farmer has this year left adequate verges along the field edges and a bridge should very soon be placed over a deep ditch. This path has been very little used in recent years due to obstruction and uncertainty over the route, but from now on it will be a worthwhile addition to your walks, skirting small fields with a good variety of wildlife in the hedges and along the brook.

FP 19 from Gall End across the fields to Alsa Wood has been well walked again this year despite being ploughed and cropped over. It is now clearly waymarked and easily followed.

A walk is planned for the evening of Wednesday 8th June, leaving at 7.30 p.m. from the Community Education Centre at the start of Gall End Lane. The walk will last about  $1\frac{3}{4}$  hours. All are welcome, particularly those of you wishing to get to know our local paths.

Meanwhile, if anyone has any query over the route of a path, or complaints about obstruction, please telephone Terry Hopkins on 813714. He will be very pleased to help you.



#### "OUR VILLAGE"

"Have you seen the new Fire Service Helmets?" This being a question asked by our village Fire Officer during the Parish Council Reception (6th May) to which I confessed no! But of course immediately showing interest.

On April 24th the Station took delivery of the Metro 666 Fire Helmet that incorporates a Polyarylate face shield and Nomex neck curtain which provides additional personal protection to these vital areas during fire fighting. It is constructed in two major parts, the outer shell from long strand fibreglass and resin compound and an impact cap which fits inside the shell. The two parts together absorb impact and resist fire and heat. They were first put into operational duties on April 28th.

Station Officer D. Bayford concluded by dropping a hint that maybe I should "do a little research" into the earlier methods of protective clothing offerred towards our village firemen in times past as it would be of interest!, which left little option but to extend my thanks for this kind offer.

By sheer coincidence it was the Stansted Parish Council that was to instigate the first of any protective clothing for issue to our village fire brigade members. Prior to 1913 no formal fire uniform or kit was made available (or even suggested as far as we know) until February 1913 when attention was drawn to the Parish Council by Mr. Buck. Stansted he reported had a little fire brigade, a hose cart, hose, some of which was nearly new, but that at a fire on 31st January 1913 (report next issue), there were more volunteers than required, some of whom pulled hose about in a terrible way, hindering firemen. The police did not know who the firemen were, therefore he considered firemen should have a cap or badge to distinguish them from others.

Mr. Rowell asked Mr. Ratcliff as their Chief Fire Officer if caps were essential, to which he assured they were, as some people were trying to help with good intent but some came to get their names on the list with a view to getting something afterwards as helper.

Mr. Tissiman informed the Meeting that the lowest price for helmets was 16/6d  $(82\frac{1}{2}p)$ . Mr. Spencer remarked "Helmets were of no use without uniforms as the firemen would look like tin soldiers". Caps it was said would cost 4/6d each  $(22\frac{1}{2}p)$ . The matter at this point was passed to the Fire Engine Committee Messrs. Norman - Dudley - Ratcliff (Mr. Brett was elected onto this Committee later that year). They were to select and purchase suitable caps at a price not to exceed 5/0d each (25p).


Doesn't time fly when you are having fun!! The children have been extremely busy practising for their "Maytime Concert" and collecting items for their sponsored "I-Spy" boards.

The coffee morning at 58 Chapel Hill on 19th April raised £175.73p for the Bible Society. Here is some news from their latest bulletin.

One distribution of Scripture portions was to 90,000 street children in Nicaragua. The children, many of whom are orphaned and live on the streets, received colouring books with illustrated stories from the Old and New Testaments. Many of them have never known their earthly fathers but through the Bible portions they can learn that there is a Father in Heaven who loves and cares for them as children.

In the slums and on the streets of Rio de Janeiro, for instance, there are around 2 million street children, and there is an urgent need to tell them of the enormous love God has for them.

Meanwhile on the banks of the great Amazon river, thousands wait for the medical and spiritual help offered by the Bible Society boat "Light of the Amazon", and one of the projects in 1994 is to provide the crew with 3,000 New Testaments to distribute among these communities.

In the UK the Bible Society provides a service to prisoners by making available a booklet of a special edition of Mark's Gospel "God Help Us" through prison chaplains and then further sending a copy of the Scriptures if they want to read more.

You can see that the work of the Society is worldwide and varied and your support at our coffee morning goes in some small measure to help with that work.

#### Friends

Some time ago we were obliged to cut down a beautiful old pine tree in the Quaker meeting house garden. It was a great sorrow to us all and it prompted me to think of the countless trees and whole forests that are steadily being chopped down, minute by minute, all over the world. We Quakers have planted another tree and shall be planting more, but billions of trees need to be planted to heal our damaged environment: slowing down global warming; producing oxygen; protecting the soil; restoring rain fall; conserving energy and providing shade from ultra-violet radiation. The loss of trees is not just

lowering the quality of life but threatening life itself.

It's tempting to think that worldwide problems are so great that whatever contribution we make is insignificant and can have little or no effect. However, I have just read a most uplifting article about the American Tree People in California who are struggling to carry out a vast, world-wide tree planting programme. They detail some measures which sound simple but which, they say, will have an immediate physical effect if done on a large enough scale. We can re-cycle paper and cardboard; refuse to accept wood products whose origins sound suspiciously tropical and containers and packaging that can't be recycled. We can bring our own containers to take-away restaurants and our own bags to supermarkets. We can also help by using cars and clothes dryers less and bicycles and washing lines more. Most importantly we can all help trees and forests survive by planting trees ourselves and by supporting the many conservation groups around the world. Indeed, it is only through the positive actions of all of us that local trees and substantial areas of forest will survive for the delight and refreshment of future generations.


