



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#### STANSTED WINDMILL

It is a pleasure to see the windmill back with its sails on after being without them for most of last year. Anglia TV came along to capture the sails being put back on shortly before Christmas. Although the mill is back to normal to all appearances on the outside, there were still some jobs to be completed and some tidying up to be done in January before the mill is finally handed back to the village.

The official opening of the mill will be in early April and details should be posted very shortly for the arrangements on that day. Then it will be back into the season of openings starting in April with dates through to October (see below).

Apart from manning the mill on open days, the millers carry out work inside the windmill and maintain the displays and artefacts on show. Before the mill is reopened there is quite a lot of work to tidy up the inside and generate new displays, and working days are planned in February and March. #### MR BOOKER'S BAND



I have been unable to find out just when the band started, but from the information I have obtained it would appear that the origins go back to before 1980. Some people think of it as a social group, some think of it as a village club, some as an old pupils association, some as an elite group of talented people; it is definitely a feature of Christmas in Stansted. I have come across lots of people who "only joined for a year or two" or who used to belong but had to give up. Others remarked that they did not know how it started as they only joined in 1985! All of the people I spoke to who had been part of the group had fond memories of it.

Geoff started the group for his pupils while he was teaching. There was a school orchestra which was for beginners upwards and then there was Geoff Booker's Wind Band which was for the better ones. "My ultimate aim at school was to try to get in there with him," was one quote I heard. At school concerts the Wind Band attracted standing ovations, the audience did not want them to finish!

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When he retired, rather than stop the band he kept it going, practising at his house. A few select villagers have been recruited since then, together with a steady supply of promising musicians from the local schools and Geoff has even been known to "poach" a few players from other local wind bands. Obviously a lot of people who were at school have moved away but there are still a few people who have been going regularly since Geoff's schooldays. Usually the rehearsals (a get together and play) are about once a month quite a commitment on Geoff's (and Margaret's) part. Some of the players have been together for the best part of 20 years!

The main goal of the year is to play carols at Christmas either around the War Memorial or in Lower Street, then it is back to St John's Hall for Christmas pies and soup and often more playing (including pieces of music other than carols). In the past the band has also performed for church fêtes and village "do's" occasionally. Primarily a woodwind group, it also includes some brass. Geoff's favourite sort of music seems to be Scott Joplin and his music features fairly strongly among the repertoire as well as themes from musicals.

Now that Geoff's departure from the village is imminent I have heard remarks like "I don't know what we are going to do!" with an air of desperation in the voice. "We are going to miss him dreadfully." It sounds almost as if people are in mourning! It will be an awful shame if the band is discontinued, but obviously he cannot "take it with him" when he moves this time, like he did when he left school. As a spectator I do hope that someone can be found who will take on the job that Geoff has been doing so well for so long and keep the band going.
