

ALL ARE WELCOME to our weekly services.

The churches, both nationally and locally, are getting worked up about unity and morality. I wonder how they affect you?

I mean, do you get worked up or concerned about the fact that a large village like Stansted with a fairly low attendance at Christian worship should none-the-less have five different denominational buildings (well four actually because we Methodists are blessed by the use of the Friends' Meeting House), five different styles of worship and five different church structures? Do you want to shake each church in turn and say to them all 'Get your act together!'? I confess I do. In some ways we seem further apart than ten years ago, and now the arguments and discussions are muddied by those who tell us we should 'celebrate our differences'! If that means that we should celebrate our different gifts and different attitudes then I'm ready to applaud because I believe God needs us all if we really are to be His Body - the hand cannot say to the feet 'I don't need you!' But to use that as an excuse for keeping denominations when the variety and difference runs in and out of every separate group leaves me cold. I don't believe the world will believe until we show we can be made one in Christ Jesus. AND YOU OUT THERE: What do you think?

We've also been put on the spot about morality by an important speech to the House of Lords by the Archbishop of Canterbury. As soon as you start to discuss right and wrong, as soon as you begin to speak about eternal truths, virtues, values and beliefs, we are divided again. Divided as Christians from one another, divided parents from schools, people from government, faith from faith. I guess we must stop blaming one another and recall the old biblical truth: 'All have sinned'. We are all to blame if our community is in decline.

And if we are all to blame, we must all share the task of putting things right. We do that by being good neighbours, preferring one another (valuing each other), volunteering to help others and living and loving in such a way that the beauty of God is seen in us. It might even make the churches look at unity again! AND YOU OUT THERE: You're to blame as well, so get cracking!

Saturday 6th July 1996



"Ah well" it's all over, or is it? This year the Bradwell Pilgrimage theme was 'Jesus then and now'. The day started with a warm welcome from the Rt. Rev. Laurie Green, Bishop of Bradwell, followed by an invitation to be part of the Pilgrimage by the Rector of Bradwell, and so the pilgrims left St. Thomas' Church to the rousing hymn "Onward Christian Soldiers" accompanied by a Salvation Army Band.

As we approached St. Peter's on the Wall we were all given a different coloured sticker. The service at the Chapel reminded us of a Christian faith coming through St Cedd and the Celtic origins. Among the hymns we had one from Asia, sung in Urdu-what rhythm! A chant from Taize (Did you see the Bishop of Bradwell singing in sign language?) and a song from South Africa.

The address "Gospel and Culture" was given by Elaine Storkey.

At the exchange of the peace we were asked to find four different colours from our own and exchange the peace with just under 2,000 people it was a little difficult.

As we sat down for picnic lunches, the skies opened and the rains came. Have you played sardines lately in a marquee?

This year Joan and I visited the Ethona Centre at St. Peter's on the Wall. We would recommend a visit to the centre, it is well worth it.

Next year, 1997, is the 1400th anniversary of the death of St. Columba and the arrival of the Continental Missionary St. Augustine. The speaker will be Cardinal Basil Hume and the theme "Local Mission". Book the date now, Saturday 5th July 1997.

#### STANSTED CARNIVAL


Carnival was the theme for this years event which raised approximately £1000 for the Stansted Carnival Trust Fund for Needy Children.

The procession brightened a grey and cloudy day with its colourful floats. Led by the Hadleigh Marching Militaire Band the procession wound its way to Stansted Mountfitchet High School where festivities were opened with a bang - a Chinese fire cracker. £200 was collected along the way. The floats were of an extremely high standard: Bentfield County Primary School took the Overall Winners Cup with a Medieval theme of a castle complete with brave knights, dragon, jester and fair maidens; St. Mary's Primary School won the Youth Organisation Cup; Rainbow Playgroup won Highly Commended and the Herts and Essex Hospital won the Other Organisations Cup with a scene of medical mayhem. A new feature this year was the best dressed bicycle category won by Sarah Wallace.


#### STANSTED FUN RUN/WALK 23rd June 1996

The day dawned bright and warm on this, the tenth year, of the Stansted Fun Run/Walk. As is usual, the behind-thescenes organisation of the day started at 7.00 am with the setting up of posts and signs for the runners/walkers. As the time drew near to the start of the run, excitement mounted as nearly 400 people turned up to participate our bumper year.

The run attracts people from a wide area so it was particularly pleasing that two local people came in as 'firsts' - Ann Hazell from Sawbridgeworth as the first lady runner at a time of 40.54 minutes and Suzanne Thorogood from Stortford as the first under-16 girl in 55.37 minutes. Waiting for the runners to come in at Bentfield Green, people had the opportunity to enjoy a drink at the 'Rose and Crown' (a generous supporter of the run) and/or a barbecue, or bought raffle tickets for the excellent prizes on display.

It was not lost on the local inhabitants that this is also a 'fun' run as well as a serious event and this year we had our first 'baby'. Young Alistair Williams, aged 7 months, who ran the course with his dad pushing his pram came in at 64 minutes. Also registered for the race for the second year running was Bumble, a Beagle dog, who came in at 97.36 - alas 4 minutes slower than last year.

All this enabled the organisers and yourselves to raise over £2,000 for the designate charities for this year: British Aid for Deprived Children, Cystic Fibrosis and St Clare's Hospice. Without your support and goodwill this could not have been achieved so it's a big 'thank-you' to all who came.
