THE TWO CITIES

In 1859 Charles Dickens (1812-1870) wrote his historical novel A Tale of Two Cities. The two cities were London and Paris, and the time was that of the French Revolution. Dickens begins with one of the best known passages in the language: 'It was the best of times, it was the worst of times, it was the age of wisdom, it was the age of foolishness...'

Some fourteen centuries earlier another great writer, Augustine of Hippo (354-430), also wrote about two cities. In his time the great Roman Empire was visibly collapsing and decadence was everywhere apparent. Indeed, it was in reply to the charge that Christians, with their other-worldliness, were causing the decline of the Empire that Augustine wrote his famous book The City of God. When news was brought to him in Carthage that Rome had been sacked by the barbarians he told his flock to turn away from cities like Rome which men build and men destroy. "Turn rather" he said "and concentrate your attention on the City of God, which men did not build and cannot destroy".

As I think regularly of the world I am strengthened by Augustine's words. In the weeks ahead we will be preparing for another Christmas. Again and again during the season we will be reminded of these two great cities, or kingdoms, the earthly one and the heavenly one. "That the earthly and the heavenly city exist simultaneously and intermingle is a fact recognisable only by Faith", is how the Second Vatican Council puts it, No. 40 G.S. Scripture will use different language to express this intermingling of these two cities at this time of the year when it simply says "And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, full of grace and truth ...", John 1:14.

May we have the necessary Faith and Insight to respond accordingly.

By the time this letter appears in print the crisis in Zaire, Rwanda and Burundi may have been defused to a certain extent through the offices of the U.N. and member states armies, with aid beginning to reach the most desperate through the several established relief agencies.

(Regular Aid to the Poor) and its <u>ongoing</u> support for three of these agencies: The Red Cross, Save the Children and Oxfam - a scheme now established for three years. This year our village Harvest Festival was held in the United Reformed Church and led by Rev. Margaret McKay. It was a most inspiring service. Margaret had carefully chosen readings and hymns which illustrated fully the creation of God's world.

The church looked wonderful with a vast array of 'real' harvest produce (no tins) topped off by a magnificent bread wheat sheaf, these donated by members of the U.R.C.

After the service the supper was held in the URC Hall behind the church and this was packed to capacity. The supper was excellent, described as a "posh ploughman's" with many different cheeses, ham and salads together with various puddings, all donated by the various churches.

After supper we were entertained by the very professional Rev. Chris Bishop from Manuden, who sang us old English Folk Songs and told us a variety of really good jokes. He really should be 'discovered': although perhaps we wouldn't then have the benefit of his talent.

Chris then turned out to be a very efficient auctioneer and all the fruit and veg. etc. from the church was sold off at a very lively auction and raised the sum of $\pounds 40.00$, which together with the church collection, we agreed should go to the Whitechapel Mission in the East End of London. This is a refuge for those who have fallen on hard times. Regular trips are made to Whitechapel by volunteers from Stansted and Bishop's Stortford to help prepare and serve food. distribute clean clothes, give the occasional haircut and have a chat.

Later, at the recent CTS Executive Meeting, it was agreed that the amount raised through tickets for the supper, some $\pounds 90$, should also be donated to the Mission, which is celebrating its Centenary this year.

The evening was a success not only because the service and supper were excellent, but mainly because we were all together and it really doesn't matter at times like these, which are only too few and far between, where you worship on a normal Sunday morning. Mary Warnett

THE ROYAL BRITISH LEGION



An attractive basket of plants was presented to Mrs Parry and our President also thanked her for her work.



No meeting for December or January, but we meet again in February. We do wish all our members a very Happy Christmas and a healthy and happy 1997.



To Danny's surprise he saw a tiny baby lying in a bed of straw. He knew at once what he would do. He scampered away to the thistle patch and collected as much down as he could.


When he got back, the church was in darkness. He crept inside and put the thistledown under the baby's head. Danny went back again and again until he had made a lovely soft pillow.

Members will look at the houses at the end of Bentfield Causeway, Bentfield Green, Hole Farm and Bentfield Bury with different eyes after listening to Toby Lyons talk and slides of the Manor of Bentfield Bury which dates back to around 1066.

He showed us aerial photos of the houses and the surrounding area, old maps, pictures of farm hands of the 19th century, and photos of the Gosling family who owned Hassobury House. Many houses in this area date back to the 1500s and the Wealden House on Bentfield Lower Green is possibly the oldest of them all.

Mr Lyons who was assisted in his talk by his wife Frances (a member of the Gosling family) was thanked for an extremely interesting and informative talk.

During the business members were thanked for all their hard work when they arranged the tea for the Royal British Legion after their dedication service at St John's Church, and the help they had given Mrs Ryan who organised the refreshments at the Art and Craft Market.

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AGE CONCERN NEW HELP FOR OLDER PEOPLE

A major scheme to help older people is in the process of being launched within the District of Uttlesford.

The Home Support Scheme, set up by Age Concern Essex, with a grant from Joint Finance (Health and Social Services) has been hailed as an important move in improving services for older people within the District of Uttlesford and has been welcomed by all the local statutory and voluntary organisations.

The scheme is being run by co-ordinator, Julia Rodd, who is working from 12b Stortford Road, Gt. Dunmow.

Age Concern Chief Officer, Terry Cassels said "We will supply help with basic housework, shopping, very practical work for older people who cannot do it for themselves.

A lot of older people who used to have housework from Social Services no longer receive this service and it has meant some people are really struggling to maintain their homes and could go for a whole week without seeing anybody at all.

This is a way of monitoring older people to make sure they are not deteriorating physically or mentally."

There is a charge for the service of $\pounds 4.75$ per hour as funding is limited.
