

God is in all beauty, not only in the natural beauty of earth and sky, but in all fitness of language and rhythm, whether it describes a heavenly vision or a street fight, a Hamlet or a Falstaff, a philosophy or a joke: in all fitness of line and colour and shade, whether seen in the Sistine Madonna or a child's knitted frock: in all fitness of sound and beat and measure, whether the result be Bach's Passion music or a nursery jingle. The quantity of God, so to speak, varies in the different examples, but His quality of beauty in fitness remains the same".



MORE 'E' VICAR?

Having heard of alternative theatre and alternative comedy, Andrew Jones took a look at alternative church at the Greenbelt Festival last summer ...

Greenbelt is an arts festival which last year was celebrating its 23rd year. For the last three years it has been run in association with Christian Aid helping those in need in third world countries.

The whole idea of Greenbelt is to spend five days camping in the freezing cold rain and learning more about who Jesus was, and how you could help Christian Aid.

During the day you could go and see preachers, comedians and live music of new groups which not that many people will have heard of. There are, if you get bored with the seminars, plenty of tents with bits and bobs that you could buy, such as CDs, tapes, videos, clothes and jewellery.

A suggestion, if needed, is to take your own food for breakfast and supper and try the different food stalls available, although be aware of the prices because they do seem to be higher than you would expect. I do advise you to try the French-style crepes and the homemade doughnuts. Another word of warning, not to have openair campfires and make sure you have your gas cookers under control because the wind is quite strong and could easily knock them over. You can take a caravan but if you want a good position, get there early. The best place is near an exit so you can get away early, but the only disadvantage is that you are a long way away from the Greenbelt Festival Village and the entertainment.

The best places at night are the Mainstage and the Courtyard. The Mainstage contains excellent music from well established groups, while the smaller Bandstand is for neighbourhood garage bands which are airing their set for the first time. On Sunday morning Mainstage is used for Sunday worship for those who want to go, and you may. as I did, see the Archbishop of Canterbury.

In the Courtyard, a 17th century farmyard, there is adult entertainment which, basically, is stand up comedy. Sitting down on a damp floor may not be a great idea, but when you see the comedy you will realise that it is worth sitting for almost two hours. This venue was called The Velvet Smoking Jacket.

A few more places worth visiting are Charlies 24 Hour Cafe, the Cybercafe and two very big tents which contain live music from jazz to jungle, films and also a disco every night.

Alcohol is not allowed on site, though if you camp near one of the main pathways you will be kept awake by the odd drunk hippies singing out of tune to what they call music. It is certainly worth staying up into the early hours of the morning for the conversations around the campsite, so there's no need to worry about the noise anyway.

Greenbelt Festival 1997, working with Christian Aid, will be taking place at Deene Park, Northants from August 21st - 26th, £62 Adult, £35 under 16's, concessions and family rates available. If anyone is interested, please get in touch with Andrew Spurr, 815025.

STANSTED PERSPECTIVE

February. The blue skies are all the brighter for coming unannounced among the long lingering gloom of dark clouds which have kept us close to our homes over the winter. Out here in the woods there are copper buds in cloven branches which will soon become a mist of green bleached in the clearings.

It's Nature's second chance which comes unfailingly with each new year, its undaunted, renewed optimism and hope, excelled only by that of church congregations each week as the preacher ascends the steps to the pulpit. I hope they are not disappointed as we are who live out here, though you wont see the discarded fridge and mattress once the leaves come out and cover them. I guess it doesn't matter if they can't see it.

Don't get me wrong, church only comes to mind as Mrs Bigfoot has just returned from down the road. It was a close call, she was almost spotted. A young family, she says, were trooping up the hill for a baptism, all dressed up with a little happy juice to chase away their apprehension. As if the miracle of new birth is not enough, they go back there each time, whatever their world throws at them, with new hope to connect their life with all the other lives which have passed through that building and with all that lives and grows by the same spirit up here.

They use water, I'm told. It's about purity and cleansing. There's hope for you, though if the church had to find clean water out here in the fields it would think twice about using it to speak of life and health. Bigfoot junior almost didn't make it through the winter drinking where he thought it would be okay. But most don't see it, so they wouldn't understand.

There's a cool wind coming straight across from the motorway so it's not fresh as I remember in years past, too long past. They could make power with that wind, lots of it, and it would be clean. I've heard they wont, the humans, since it matters to them that they would be able to see the machines, tall, shiny sleek and elegant. Cousin Bigfoot says they have them in the north country. I thought they would go for it here since they have an old one right in the village which they're quite proud of, but it doesn't seem to do anything any more. They must like the look of that one.

I'd like to see as humans see, just for a short time, though I don't think I could stand it for long.








CHILDREN'S PAGE WHAT A NOISE!

Stansted Mountfitchet Local History Society

On the second day of the year, despite the freeze, some 26 hardy souls gathered to hear Peter Brown give a fascinating account of the first hundred years of fire control in Stansted. The early days are understandably obscure but it seems likely that the first appliance was installed in the 1770s, following which a Samuel Game (whose grave can be seen in St Mary's Churchyard) was paid to grease the pipes and fittings. A replacement "engine" was bought in 1822 and served until 1914. Peter, ably supported by his neighbour Peter Baker, quoted several contemporary reports of fires, many of them caused by lamps and candles and aggravated by the widespread use of timber and thatch. Such was the interest of the audience that Peter was persuaded to give a similar resume of the second hundred years at a future date.




