



A VOYAGE WITH ECUMENICAL ENCOUNTERS

In travelling up the coast of Norway I had not expected ecumenism - but I was wrong. At our table there were two Norwegian Lutherans, A German Roman Catholic, an Anglican, a Quaker and a Japanese Buddhist!

We visited the modern Cathedral at Tromso - the most northerly Cathedral in Europe (everything in Norway is the most northerly something - town, village, church, etc.). It is a magnificent structure, built to resemble an iceberg and it has the largest stained glass window in the world. A young medical student explained to us most movingly the significance of the window's design - an enormous figure representing God, with two tiny figures, a man and a woman, reaching up for succour.

When we arrived at the little church at Trondenes (the most northerly medieval church in the world!) our local guide very firmly said "And now we will have a service". She was quite a formidable lady and it would have been a brave Muslim or Atheist who did not join in. We had a beautiful little service with hymn and prayer sheets printed in Norwegian, German and English.

All this, and the magnificent scenery and warm friendship. Certainly a voyage to remember, Katharine Hurford

He wished us to have the character that we have and all that goes to make us the person we are. The basic Real Me is the talent I have rather than the intelligence, ability, looks, etc. that I so often concentrate on.

As one writer puts it, "The real tragedy of life is not in being limited to one talent but in the failure to see and use the one talent". This basic talent, this Real Me, has to be discovered, recognised and made my own. Then I proceed to develop and harmonise it and, where necessary, rehabilitate it, but not try to change it out of recognition. If that were done or possible, then the Real Me would be gone! Wouldn't it?



A Letter from Rev Margaret Booker and Geoff Booker

It was a difficult decision to make, to leave after 23 years, but as one gets older, shopping, gardening and housework and transport become uppermost in one's life. We were a little too far from the village and the price of houses also entered the equation - being cheaper in this area, which we knew and liked. To be able to walk to the village is a joy and we do have excellent small shops and transport every hour to the nearest towns. To have no hedges to cut, which had become a task like the painting of the Forth Bridge, never ending, is a great relief and half the amount of grass to mow another bonus. I do miss though having no room to grow vegetables; and finally a slightly smaller house, larger rooms, but compact which helps the housework blues.

It is a slower way of life here, we are in most evenings! Being a small village there are fewer opportunities for social work, no Day Centre or Meals on Wheels or Helpline, but we do have a National Trust property, the oldest water mill in the county - first built in the 12th Century. We help by being wardens once a month, answering people's questions and showing off the property - they still mill on a Sunday; we are getting quite expert on milling matters!

We have taken up where we left off 24 years ago when we lived in this area, meeting up with ex-colleagues and friends. Geoff is singing with the same choir and small group, but alas not playing in the same orchestra as they have two bassoonists already, but he has teamed up with two other woodwind players as a trio and plays at one or two events.

As for me, I seem to have become absorbed into the Deanery, active retired clergy are thin on the ground (though this one isn't so active, my 10 year old hip replacement has to be replaced). At our first meeting the Rural Dean and I discovered that we had both been trained by the same Vicar - I at Ramsey as a Reader and he at Wisbech as a Deacon! We have had three interregnums in the Deanery and I go to two parishes once a month regularly to take a service. The third interregnum has been filled, it was the chaplaincy at Hinchingbrooke Hospital in Huntingdon - I took my turn with the Deanery clergy in answering emergencies and taking services. It was good to be back in hospital life, as I had worked there as a Physio. Of course I help in the team here, three of us in a small village! A Rector (his only church), a Reader and myself. We both miss having a choir in church and there seem to be no young people so Geoff misses the Lazer Group and the band.

It has taken time to adjust and we miss all our friends in Stansted, but do enjoy returning occasionally to see you all. We hope you will feel free to ring up and come and see us and our mill. Houghton is a delightful village - lots of visitors who sit and eat their ice creams under the clock tower, fishermen who tell their tales! and the locals who gossip happily. Everyone is very friendly and we are very happy.

STANSTED PERSPECTIVE

That oft-used saying 'plus ca change, plus la meme chose' (the more things change, the more they are the same) is a wise observation. Apparently a copy of the Essex County Chronicle dated November 1899 recently came to light during woodworm treatment in St. John's Church. It was salutary to read that at a foundation-stone ceremony in Chelmsford the worthy Methodist chairman lamented that "with the increased secular education of the present day there often came loss of parental control and moral restraint". In the same speech he commented on "the growth of (denominational) unity in recent times". It was uncomfortably familiar reading to see accounts of several violent deaths, thefts and a wife-beating. There was also an interesting report of Col. Baden Powell making a night attack on the Boer trenches at Mafeking, and by contrast an amusing advertisement for Page Woodcocks Wind Pills. However, what was noticeably different was the quality of the writing. The whole sheet had an easy and grammatical flowing style which made reading this archive a pleasure seldom experienced in today's press. The English language is too good to be subjected to electronic massacre or death by desertion. Can we not positively improve our speech and revive the art of good writing?

again the following day with all their toboggans for more fun in the snow.






