We are in the middle of the course for the Lent house groups - "Pilgrim's Way" - sharing faith and learning from each other. The word pilgrim is used in various contexts. Most of us have read John Bunyan's "The Pilgrim's Progress" which shows the meaning of pilgrimage to be our journey through life with its trials, temptations and mysteries, towards the Celestial City and unity with God. There are pilgrims and pilgrimages among those of other Faiths - Hindu holy shrines and holy places bring many followers and the Islamic Faith likewise - also secular pilgrims as can be seen at Lenin's tomb in Moscow. Near home we shall be coming to the annual Pilgrimage to Bradwell, honouring St Cedd; on a bigger scale this year with the anniversary of the death of St Columba in Iona and the arrival of St Augustine in Canterbury 1400 years ago, celebrating our Christian heritage.

The seventeenth century was a time of great political and religious turbulence in England. The translation of the bible by William Tyndale (401 years ago) into the vernacular fostered passionate interest and led to people perceiving new insights. Dissenting groups, who thought that the church was straying from the teaching of Jesus, grew up. Among them were Quakers. George Fox's long and difficult struggle searching for truth culminated in his conviction that Jesus spoke to his condition and that God was immediately available to each individual. Fox's early followers called themselves "Friends of Truth" - Quaker was an abusive nickname, to ridicule them.

Some of these dissenters became pilgrims; sailing to the New World, America, to escape the constraints or persecution at home. Non-conformity was illegal until the Toleration Act 1689. In 1671 two brothers named Leeds left Stansted for New Jersey and the earliest record of a Quaker in Stansted is 1665.

Since these early days Friends have tried to be open to new insights and to tolerate differing opinions, working for reconciliation where there is strife and enmity and refusing to practice discrimination by six, social class or race. Because they were not permitted to study at Oxford and Cambridge, many Quakers went into banking, iron founding and other trades and became paternalistic employers such as Cadburys and Rowntrees; often active in social concerns - anti-slavery, mental health and prisons. Today, work continues in many troubled areas of the world, especially in reconciliation and peace studies. In Brussels the Quaker Council for European Affairs, consisting of Quaker representatives from all over Europe, watch and study European affairs. In Belfast a similar centre means that there is a meeting place for the two sides in conflict, on neutral ground.

Today we live in another turbulent and exciting century. The growth of communications means that we know more about other people and their lives and beliefs. Intolerance, violence and the widening gap between rich and poor continue, but there is more awareness of human interdependence. However, we still see fear and a desire to hide behind the old barriers and creeds; even forming new cults and reviving old superstitions. It is easy to say "There is that of God in everyone" - not so easy to live it out.

William Penn (1644-1718) wrote:- "The humble, meek, merciful, just, pious and devout souls are everywhere of ones religion; and when death has taken off the mask, they will know one another, though the diverse literics which they wear here makes them strangers -" We must strive to travel together so that we may see beyond barriers in the here and now, seeking justice and peace and the care of our Earth.

A need always for pilgrims.


## STOP PRESS

Christ is the peace between his followers

An historical reconciliation of the Cilician Armenian church with Rome having been notified earlier, it was fitting that Pope John Paul was accompanied by His Holiness Aram I Keshishian, Catholicos at supreme patriarch, in prayers for Christian unity at St. Paul's Basilica on January 25th.

We hear so often of divisions between the churches that it is heartening to hear of such an event. It is also encouraging that further talks were held in Rome in January between Anglican and Catholic officials on the subject of unity, following on from the informal talks held in November 1996.

For non-believers and those of other than the Christian faith the differences and divisions, even hostilities between branches of the Christian Church must at best be confusing and at worst unedifying.

The Pope had underlined this problem when he spoke on the previous Sunday in Rome of the "pressing" obligation on Christians to make every effort to overcome their divisions "if they wish to remain faithful to Christ".

While questions of authority and doctrine can be left to our bishops, presbyters and theologians to grapple with, ordinary Christians could prepare the ground by stressing their brotherhood in Christ and making their peace in Him. We need to proclaim our common Christian values in an increasingly materialistic and secular society. We know this "embrace of peace" in our Christian experience together in Stansted but there remain pockets of bigotry in these islands which we can help to change through our words and example.

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#### STANSTED PERSPECTIVE

I have enjoyed living in Stansted - no, I'm not planning to pass on in either sense - but am looking back on 32 years of being here. 32 years in the same house and with some of the same neighbours! I was saying this to my daughter the other day - 'How awful' she said 'It must have been boring to be in the same place for all that time!' Well, I never say that I am bored, but she does!

A group of us were talking the other day and somebody said "How long do you have to be here to be accepted?" Well I'm not sure that this applies these days, for surely the 'newcomers' far outnumber those born and bred. I've always put the question to myself, how long do I have to live here before it feels like home?

I was lucky to move here in the middle sixties, when so many of the local 'characters' were still around and family businesses abounded. The 'local gentry' living in large houses gave the use of their gardens for village fetes, so the opportunity to mix and get to know the locals was always there. This was also the time when 'Stansted Carnival' lasted for a week, with events held on each evening, and the big day at Hargrave Park always opened by a celebrity. My children still remember the excitement they felt when the band marched along the Cambridge Road and all the traffic was stopped.

I remember village concerts in the Central Hall and marvelling at some of the local talent - who could forget Irving Sanders giving one of his 'lectures'? The W.I. was still meeting in the Central Hall when I joined, and with nearly 100 members what better way for a young newcomer to the village to get to know people? The Institute's Whitsun Garden Party was a well-established local event by then and took place in Ivy Turner's garden at Bentfield End (the Turners still ran a grocery shop there). The garden was beautiful and a variety of stalls would be dotted about amongst the flower-beds, with a handy pond for the smallest children to fall into. Records show that even in those far-off days well over £130 would be raised.

The W.I. had a small Drama Group in the sixties and seventies and we would entertain our own W.I. as well as go on tour! I well remember the time we went to Ugley with a melodrama, which involved the 'village maidens' (we were quite young then) dancing around a Maypole. The Maypole (a piece of grey plastic drainpipe) proved to be too tall for the stage - but we hastily improvised by using floor space in front of the stage - and sang and danced to the 'Archers' signature tune!

There was the play that involved having a dead chicken as one of the 'props' - supposedly knocked down by an 'L' driver. One of our members obtained a dead chicken with feathers which she put in the deep freeze. On the day of the performance she hung it on the line to thaw out - it was a hot day and as it melted the blue bottles arrived. By evening it was pretty disgusting and I was the one who had to hold it - but the show must go on - so I wrapped it in a blanket and tried not to breathe!

Nowadays in the village there are so many organisations, educational and recreational. How lucky we are! There is plenty of opportunity too for doing voluntary work which is another way to get to know people. So yes, I do feel at home here and can now look forward, I hope, to the next 32 years of living in Stansted!

## **OUR VILLAGE**

During January 1997 road and footpath refurbishment work started on Chapel Hill which firstly involved (Fire Station side) sectional removal of the original granite and later pre-cast concrete kerbing stones, then being re-sited and relayed retaining the older granite where possible and the later concrete type being replaced with new pre-cast concrete exposed aggregate type stones. (Thanks to Brian for latter description). The footpath (at the time of writing) is in sections being resurfaced with a smooth Bit-Mac type finish.

Vehicular traffic during these works was being controlled firstly by traffic lights, then from the 27th by a complete daytime road closure, which was, we understand, to have caused some disruption and confusion. Pedestrians meanwhile were controlled by footpath diversions. When the first kerbstones appeared in the village I am not sure, but in 1897 as part of the Diamond Jubilee Celebrations of Queen Victoria, improvement work was undertaken on kerbing some of our village paths.

Chapel Hill at this time had only one footpath from top to bottom, this being on St John's Church side and was in all probability so until the latter 1910's early 1920's. Also during this same year we find that some 9 truck loads of granite chippings were rolled into the road surface and road watering was taking place and charged at 7/6d for an 8 hour working day, plus 1/- for the water cart. Road watering was necessary to help lay the dust and to compact the surface as we should remember the road surface was generally made up from the natural underlay, large then smaller stones, gravel and sand to in-fill the gaps. (Several of our roads which I am sure you are well aware of, still can be said to fall under this description). Chapel Hill, in all probability, remained in this state until around the late 1920's as Mr Verco had to take in his clocks because the dust from the road "choked them up". By trade, Mr Verco was a practical watch and clock maker, who advertised "Every description of Watches or Clocks repaired", and had for sale "New Silver Watches Capped and Jewelled 21/- (shillings) each".

Several incidents occurred on Chapel Hill involving horses and carts, steam, motor traffic and bicycles, due mainly to their excessive speed (must have been down hill) or brake failure as the hill is said to have a gradient of around 1 in 22. Speed was causing particular problems in 1910 when cyclists were said to be causing more problems than motorists. This was one reason (amongst others) that a village speed limit was applied for. Perhaps we can recall the implementation of this and a few other of the road problems faced by our village travellers of yesteryear, and also perhaps be able to report that the present day works are complete, which may or may not be interest to travellers in another 100 years' time!



## Stansted Mountfitchet Local History Society

February's meeting was 'members' evening', when speakers from within the Society offered information and insights on a wide variety of topics. Frances Spalding briefed us on the Heath family, 18th Century lords of Stansted Manor; Bob Clarke introduced us to the complexities of measuring longitude, with some pungent asides on the inability of historians to agree upon matters of fact; Peggy Honour in absentia contributed thoughts on the early history of mills in Essex; and Jean McBride brought us into the 20th Century and awoke memories among some of our older members with her researches into the story of the Stansted Home Guard. As always at such meetings the audience was large and properly appreciative; members were exhorted to start thinking immediately of subjects to be offered for the 1998 members' evening.



In order to get the best prices I have been dealing with two companies. Both companies collect free of charge by courier, which is very useful. One company (the one that pays most for the laser cartridges) requires a minimum quantity which I have not quite collected although the ones I already have are worth over £30. However, I have sent a batch of deskjet cartridges to the other company which should raise £22. Of this, 80% (£17.50) will go towards **Fun Run** administrative expenses, and 20% (£4.40) to the **Link**.

# STANSTED MOUNTFITCHET WINDMILL


