A MUSICAL PARABLE

The Parable of the Piano as told by Fr Jim Brand

The battered, dented, well-played piano has obviously suffered but has been loved and has given pleasure. Sometimes we are only given 'Rules of Living' and we are unable to use our inspiration or our heart and soul. We are not able to think it out for ourselves, we are only able to obey the 'rules', terrified that if we do not appear to conform we are lost. In this way as with the pianist, only a part of us is living. If we only play with one finger and then feeling nervous and guilty we are unable to take real responsibility for what we do, unable to put the whole of our being behind our lives. Jesus gave us the whole of himself - we appear to be limited in what we are prepared to give.

It is easier for most people to justify themselves by <u>not</u> living to the limit God has given them and therefore <u>not</u> making any mistakes - therefore <u>not</u> giving the whole of oneself; just the fingertips. This is totally dishonest; playing safe with no imagination.

The violin and the drum are very different from each other but in music they are able to listen to each other, love each other and are able to play the main theme together. This is shared with the rest of the orchestra. What is your main theme? Are you able to share it or are you too frightened and want to play safe?

Listening gives one the chance to play and one cannot be without the other. When listening to a singer we do not notice the accompanist if he is there - we notice if he is not there. The whole performance is incomplete. This is the same with the Holy Spirit, without whom life is incomplete.

In an orchestration every instrument gets a chance to play the main theme - our main theme in life is to establish Christ in our lives. Once we have done that we can keep quiet and listen to others. We are all different, like instruments in an orchestraloud - soft - mute - clashing, etc. but all work together to produce the harmonious main theme. Our Pope is the conductor of the music that Christ has written, he makes sure we follow the score!

LENT GROUPS 1998

This year's theme is "Hope in a Time of Change". There will be House Groups on Thursday and Friday evenings and on Wednesday afternoons. The first meetings take place during the week commencing March 1st and full details will appear in the March issue.

The concept of house groups is beginning to gain support in Stansted so we can look forward to good discussions. Do book the dates now and encourage others to come.



The third 'Celebration of Christmas' concert was held on 20th December 1997 and was attended by approximately 200 people. The retiring collection raised £191 after expenses had been paid, of which half was sent to the Emmaus Community in Cambridge and half to the Churches Conservation Trust (the organisation which maintains St Mary's Church). The allocation of 50% of the collection to the Churches Conservation Trust is determined by the rules governing the use of redundant churches.

St John's Choir was joined by singers from the Churches in Stansted and together they performed four choir items. Other items were performed by St Mary's School Choir and instrumentalists, the Lazer Group from St John's and a group from the United Reformed Church led by Valerie Trundle.

Volunteers to read were again requested from all the Churches. The Mountfitchet High School provided the readers this year for the first time and there was an excellent performance by three young readers from St Theresa's Church.

Following suggestions after the concert in 1996, the number of congregational carols was increased to five, with a reduction in the number of choir items. This enabled the rehearsal time for the choir to be limited to three practices and a short run-through before the concert. Due to a large number of commitments for St John's Choir over Christmas and the resulting pressure on their Thursday evening practices, two of the rehearsals were held on Fridays.

Sound amplification was also introduced in 1997 to assist the readers.

If a similar concert is to be held in 1998, the date of Saturday 19th December at 4 pm in St Mary's Church was suggested.

GALLOPING HORSE VILLA CAMBRIDGE ROAD

Now the Co-operative Supermarket

The building was erected by Henry Thurston Senior, the well known showman, steam-engine and fairground rides owner, just after the turn of the century. Some years before his death in 1917 he moved to another home in Stansted and the building then became the cycle shop illustrated in this postcard. Henry Thurston is known to have kept engines and equipment in a field behind the house. Together with his wife he is buried in St Mary's Churchyard.

The name is taken from the horse used in his gallopers and shown in stone above the door. We can only hope that it is still there behind the Co-op facade. Over the archway can be seen to this day a horn of plenty, a beehive and the dove of peace. It remains one of our best examples of Edwardian building.

The cycle shop was owned and occupied by the Matthews family until shortly after the First World War. Their grand-daughter Marion Pretty is thankfully still a well-known resident of Stansted.

The postcard, kindly lent by Paul Embleton, is part of the other collection held in Stansted. Paul writes:

"The recent sale of a collection of Stansted postcards has excited a lot of interest in the village and I have had several enquiries asking it if is true that Victorian postcards of Stansted exist. Sadly the answer is no as the earliest card was not published until 1903. At least after nearly 20 years collecting the earliest card in my collection of 400 cards is dated May 1903 and I have never seen an earlier one. Pictorial postcards were not permitted by the Post Office until 1894 and did not begin to become popular until 1899 when a slightly larger card was permitted. It was not until 1902 that the P.O. permitted a message and an address on the same side and it was only then that smaller places such as Stansted were featured. If anyone has a card of Stansted postmarked earlier than May 1903 or which has an undivided back (i.e. 1902 or earlier) I should very much like to see it and to take a copy for the Local History Society photographic library".

Recipe of the Month

Date Pudding and Lemon Sauce

6oz / 170gm self raising flour
2oz / 55gm breadcrumbs
3-4oz / 85-115gm finely chopped suet
6oz / 170gm chopped dates and/or figs
2oz / 55gm honey or golden syrup
2 tablespoons milk
A little grated lemon rind
Pinch of salt

- (a) sieve the flour and salt into a bowl
- (b) add breadcrumbs, suet, dates and lemon peel
- (c) mix well
- (d) make a well in the centre of the mixture
- (e) warm the honey/syrup
- (f) pour honey and milk into the mixture
- (g) mix to a dropping consistency
- (h) turn into a greased basin
- (i) cover with greaseproof paper
- (i) steam for 2½ hours

Serve with lemon sauce:

- 3 tablespoons golden syrup 2 tablespoons water 2 tablespoons lemon juice Knob of butter/margarine
- (a) boil syrup and water in small pan (do not stir)
- (b) when liquid begins to thicken remove from heat
- (c) stir in lemon juice and butter



Our Book-a-Rode service has gradually developed since its launch in September. It emerged from an Uttlesford Council for Voluntary Service initiative to meet an obvious need in our widespread rural district, where public transport is sparse.

We provide a door-to-door service for Uttlesford residents who do not have the use of private cars and who find public transport awkward, either because they live where there is none, or very little, or who have disabilities, are elderly, or otherwise isolated. The vehicles have electric wheelchair lifts so that users can remain in their chair while travelling and an electric side-step to ease entry.

You may have seen our new R-registered Nissan people carriers which have recently been fitted with our green and yellow diamond logos, as well as those of our sponsors. These include Essex County Council, Uttlesford District Council, BAA Stansted Airport and Three Valleys Water.

We now have 3 of these vehicles covering all of Uttlesford, one of which is based in Stansted by courtesy of the governors of Peter Kirk School, who have allowed us free parking. Bill Fegan from St John's Crescent and myself are your local drivers. The others operate from Saffron Walden and Great Dunmow, with their own drivers, but we are flexible enough to cover each other's patches to meet demand.

Qualifying residents join the scheme for an annual £5 membership fee. They may then telephone to book rides at a subsidised cost of £1.50 for the first 4 miles, then 25p for each mile after that. An escort, child or partner can travel with the member for just £1 per trip. Journeys have included shopping trips to town centres or out-of-town supermarkets, visits to friends and relations in hospital or their homes, to dentists, hairdressers, post offices, libraries, clubs, classes, pub lunches, etc. We will also travel out of Uttlesford if a vehicle is available.

As drivers we enjoy and take pride in providing a caring, helpful, reliable service that our members do appreciate and which really is door-to-door. At the start of January we had about 90 members but only a handful were from Stansted so there must be many potential members whose lives could be enhanced who do not yet know of the service. Those readers involved in our village churches, clubs and societies may know of such people in Stansted and we would be pleased if you could help us to help them by putting them in touch with us.



ST MARY'S CHURCH DRIVE

Last month the resurfacing of the drive and car park was completed by the Thaxted firm of J.F. Knight (Roadworks) Ltd. They have done an excellent job and the Church, Churchyard and Parish Cemetery can now be approached with some confidence and vehicles can be parked without fear that they will be bogged down. Certainly it all looks very nice and it is to be hoped that the minor problems reported in the press will not recur.

The work cost nearly \$16,000 and is the first major renovation that has been carried out for over 50 years. As will be known, the Parochial Church Council, which is the responsible body, could not possibly have funded the work and the finance was raised by private subscription. At least 125 people contributed to the appeal which was launched at a special Whitsunday service after some initial "pump-priming". At that service there was an inspirational sermon from Roy Tricker of the Churches Conservation Trust and an address by Richard Shervington, one of the appeal committee. He paid tribute to the work of the Trust, to the previous Rector, Bob Wallace and his successor, Andrew Spurr, for supporting the appeal throughout and for dealing with the complicated task of obtaining the necessary Church permissions. He also thanked Mrs Janet Hollis for chairing the appeal committee, the Hon. Treasurer, John Summers and the committee members - Ray Clifford, Basil Irwin, Audrey Rodgers and Phyllis Saban and the many devoted people who tend and maintain the Churchyard and decorate the Church.

The appeal committee would like to thank all those who made contributions, large and small, including the Churches Conservation Trust and the Stansted Parish Council. Their names will be recorded discreetly within St Mary's together with reference to anonymous donations. The committee would also particularly like to thank those whose initial generosity with time, talents and funds provided the impetus for the project. It is a tribute to the people of Stansted that appeals for two major projects associated with church buildings can be successful in a single year. We must hope that this generosity will continue in addressing the increasingly challenging issues of church finance.




