St Anthony's Chapel, Henham 1933-1999

In 1933, a little prefabricated Chapel dedicated to St Anthony of Padua was opened in Henham to serve the Catholic community in the area. It was blessed by the then Bishop of Brentwood, Bishop Arthur Doubleday and it was erected on land donated by the De Steene family fro Belgium.

During the war it was damaged by the bond that fell on Henham causing considerable damage in the area. Some years ago refurbishment and remedial works were carried out. In February 1999, following a structural engineer's report we were forced to close the Chapel permanently. It is no longer safe for public worship especially in adverse weather conditions. Repair work would be too costly and, anyway, it could only be of a temporary nature.

So, after sixty-six years, the Chapel is closed and worshippers there have now transferred to St Theresa's at Millside, Stansted. Everyone is sad at losing our place of worship. It is like parting with a dear friend. All items of value and sentiment have been transferred to St Theresa's. The Henham community still retains its identity in the parish; it is just that their place of worship has changed.

When St Anthony's Chapel was built in 1933, it was then served from Saffron Walden parish. That situation continued until Stansted and Henham became a separate parish in 1970. Like human beings, buildings like St Anthony's have a limited life span. As we continue the season of Lent, we remember again the ashes put on our foreheads on Ash Wednesday reminding us of our mortality. The mortality of St Anthony's Chapel has now been realised.

With fond memories and remembrances and with gratitude for the many blessings over sixty-six years, we conclude with a very sincere: Deo Gratias.

Establishing pacifist credentials has taken us collectively a long time and entailed quite some suffering. How can a group without hierarchy or creed demonstrate that it will not participate in war and 'fighting with outward weapons'? Only when individuals, one after another, across time and space, live out their convictions, so that choices made in different situations still seem to come together as a pattern. Amazingly, we are not widely known as people who will not fight in wars. Not only this, we are almost as widely known for having intervened in wars to try to alleviate suffering on all sides ...

Beyond the general notion of pacifism, the situation has lent a special urgency to our reputation for harmlessness. By this I mean that, as a Friend, I am not only unwilling to serve as a soldier, but unwilling to take up arms in my private capacity. This may not sound like much, but it puts me in a special relationship to political leaders here: they believe that I will not kill them. And they don't believe that of everyone they meet. More to the point, they accept that I don't want them dead, even when I disagree with them. And this too is something they cannot take for granted. It is surprisingly freeing for all of us. I'm sure they don't want to kill me, either. So I feel free to agree with them sometimes, disagree sometimes, without worrying about who else I agree or disagree with in the process, and taking for granted that neither of us wishes to kill the other.

Our annual weekend Retreat at Hengrave Hall was held over the weekend of 21/23 February.

Through apt words and inspirational music, the themes for our many discussions were skilfully unfolded by the Spiritual Director, the Rector of Seaforth, Leeds, much better known to Link readers as Rev'd Tony Bundock, formerly a curate at St John's, Stansted.

By his eloquence and insights many relevant questions were posed to challenge us to find a better personal understanding and a variety of ways of expressing proactively the Christian witness. Through our daily lives what do we do and what can we do to help create the sort of community and neighbourhood that cares for each and every person.

When only 5% of the people are regular churchgoers how can we make any significant impacts on the moral standards and values of society generally? As the Millennium, which gives further opportunities to celebrate 2000 years of Christian heritage, fast draws nigh, will the Christian Church find and foster "New Beginnings" or will it fade as a historical marginalised institution that no longer has relevance to life in the 21st Century?

People give many expressions to life and we are continually challenged each and every day to carry on the same tasks that Jesus initiated. By His new radical approach to religion and beliefs wherein the person - that's you, me, him, her, is the living temple of the Holy Spirit; the living stones which build up the family of God. Every human being, through life, belongs - every person has a part to play, some task, some role, some work not allocated to anyone else. The human personality makes God present to those around us - those we mix and mingle with in the course of our daily lives. God is there not confined in any one place or thing but through the person seeking expression and influence on events. Perhaps in the course of your life already some happening, some event, some person has indicated ways that the Spirit of God has been at work in your own personal spiritual journey. As you go about, caught up in the hustle and bustle of everyday existence have you considered what essential message of the Christian Faith you would most of all wish to communicate to others?

Admittedly the most profound discussions will not yield quick simple answers to the most intricate and complex issues; hence, I find both great consolation and inspiration in a simple prayer -

Lord, make me a better person
More considerate towards others
More honest with myself
More faithful to you
Make me generous enough to want
sincerely to do your will whatever it may be.

Help me to find my true purposes in life and grant that through them I may find happiness and fulfilment myself and bring joy, happiness and your love to others.

Easter - a time to rejoice in our belief

As you read this, we will be nearing the end of the season of Lent. Holy Week that leads us to Good Friday will be upon us. That first Good Friday, the day before the Jewish Feast of the Passover, was a time of utter despair for Jesus' closest friends and followers who became the first Christians. Here was Jesus, crucified, dead and buried; the ultimate miracle had not yet happened. Later, on the third day, which we call Easter Day, Jesus was found to have risen from the dead. This was joy indeed; the prophecies had come true - the despair was gone - it was a time to rejoice in the Risen Lord!

That was some 2000 years ago; but it is as true today as it was then.

Jesus Christ, Our Lord and Saviour was crucified on the Cross at Calvary for the forgiveness of the sins of the whole world and the promise of everlasting life with Him and his Father, God, in Heaven for those who turn and follow him.

To guide the early Christians along their difficult path, God provided the Holy Spirit at the first Whitsuntide. That Holy Spirit is with us today to comfort and guide us through life's tribulations.

As we approach the end of the 20th century, Christians continue to rejoice in their belief in the Trinity of God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

But as an Anglican, can I claim to be a better Christian than members of any of the other Christian church; certainly not!

It was Jesus who said "In my house there are many rooms".

This is literally interpreted today as signifying that some diversity among Christians is acceptable subject to the principal tenet of the faith being followed.

Let us, therefore, this Easter, and for evermore, rejoice with all Christians in the rich diversity of our faith and beliefs, remembering that Christ was crucified on the Cross for the forgiveness of the sins of the whole world; and the promise of everlasting life with Him and his Father, God, in Heaven for those who turn and follow him.

THE WOMEN'S WORLD DAY OF PRAYER

This year, the service was prepared by the women of Venezuela and the local service took place in St John's Church on Friday 5th March. Led by Anne Wilkinson, we greeted each other 'Bendicion' (a blessing please) to which the response was 'Dios te beniga' (God bless you). This was followed by a short prayer, an affirmation of our faith and offering our sacrifice of praise -

"Dear loving, heavenly Father, how wonderful it is to be in Your presence. We worship and adore You for who You are and what You mean to us. We thank You for Your steadfast love, mercy and faithfulness. You are the giver of life and our sovereign Lord and we offer You our sacrifice of praise".

The theme this year was 'God's tender touch' and this was expressed in a litany of thanksgiving for all that we have received.

Prayers of intercession followed, for all the evils of this world which are of particular concern to women - teenage pregnancies, violence, unemployment and homelessness, malnutrition - and a prayer for our own community. While these problems are prevalent in Venezuela, Janet Hollis in her address was careful to remind us that we cannot be complacent in affluent Stansted, not entirely

carefree, for these things can happen here too.

Next year's service will come from Indonesia, 'Talitha Kumi: Young Woman, stand up'.

CELEBRATION OF THE MILLENNIUM



While her big sister, Matilda, comforted her the others had another search and found a parcel for Tilly, whose tears were soon dried. Millennium Project

As a Local History Society we feel that we should do something to record Stansted at the turn of the century. This could be such a vast undertaking that we have decided to concentrate on certain aspects, taking photographs backed up with some written material. There are a good number of clubs and societies in Stansted and we will be writing shortly to all those we know of asking if they could supply, or our members take, 2 or 3 photographs to illustrate their activities and the people involved. If you belong to a group that does not hear from us in the next month or so, please forgive us for missing you and if you are interested in the project, please get in touch.

The Mountfitchet School and Bentfield and St Mary's Primary Schools have all expressed interest in principle in the project so we hope we can involve the children in some way.

Photographs of local public houses, shops and shopkeepers and public buildings would be interesting to compare with those which were taken in past years.

All the above would, we hope, form the basis of an exhibition perhaps some time at the end of 2000. Copies of the photographs would be kept in Stansted for future reference but the negatives would be deposited at the Essex County Record Office, in the Photographic Section of their new building to be opened in Chelmsford in the next year or so and be available for research by historians in years to come. The History Society would retain the copyright of all photographs commissioned by us and taken by our members.

We also intend to assemble photographs and written descriptions of about 10 homes of different styles, ages and inhabitants. These would not be for exhibition and publication at present in the interests of privacy and security but would be kept by the County Record Office with an embargo of 30 years, or whatever time the residents prefer, and would be intended for historical research only. Victorian and other early photographs exist showing details of interiors which are of great interest in the present day and we would not want "tidying up" done so that people will be able to see how we really live now!


The time scale for this exercise would be six months from 1st December 1999 as this will concentrate our volunteer's efforts - there would, of course, have to be some latitude to this if we particularly wanted to record an event outside this time.

The Stansted Mountfitchet Parish Council have promised funding and support and we have other ideas if we can find the time and enthusiastic helpers. Let us hope that at the turn of the next century, although we will not be here to see it, Stanstedians then will, in their turn, record events, compare their findings with ours, and say how wonderful it was that we had the foresight to realise that they would find what we were doing so fascinating!

If you are thinking of doing some research at the Record Office, you may be interested in the leaflet "Planning Your Visit" and Guides to Sources "No. 1. The History of Your House" and "No. 2. The History of Your Family". A few copies were left for us by the speaker and are available free from Peggy Honour, 813160.





Recipe of the Month

Chocolate and Coconut Slices

6oz / 170gm plain chocolate

3oz / 85gm margarine

4oz / 113gm caster sugar

4oz / 113gm grated coconut

4oz / 113gm sultanas

2oz / 57gm chopped glacé cherries

1 beaten egg

- (a) line Swiss roll tin with foil
- (b) break chocolate into pieces and put in tin
- (c) place in oven on gas mark 1 / 140°C / 275°F until chocolate has melted
- (d) spread melted chocolate over foil and leave to cool
- (e) beat margarine and sugar together
- (f) add egg and all other ingredients
- (g) spread over chocolate
- (h) cook for 30 mins on gas mark 4 / 180°C / 350°F
- (i) cut into slices when cold


Stansted in Bloom

TIME FOR A LAUGH

It is sometimes said (with justification) that The Link is too serious and lacks the light-hearted touch. A subscriber has sent in this item, which we hope will leaven the lump and persuade other readers to send in an item, which will make our dour old Editor smile. Take it as a challenge!

The following is said to be an actual question given on a University of Washington Chemistry midterm:

"Is Hell exothermic (gives off heat) or endothermic (absorbs heat)? Support you answer with a proof."

Most of the students wrote proofs of their beliefs using Boyle's Law (gas cools off when it expands and heats up when it is compressed), or some variant.

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

Royal British Legion Women's Section

The streets are free of traffic - and of litter, as all Chinese collect it. Enormous loads are carried daily into the city on tricycles; everyone cycles. The children are very well educated and taught to think and speak in six or seven languages.

We saw slides of temples, the old Observatory, the golden throne of a former Emperor, a teaching hospital and beautiful roofs, some with gold or jade tiles.

Stansted Profíle no 11

Lt. Col. Austen Finn

Chapel Hill provides the third resident to feature in this series which must say something for one of Stansted's oldest roads and for those who live there.

Austen Finn is very much a Man of Kent, being born in Canterbury and a product of Kings School where 15 members of the Finn family received their education. His grandfather had established a wholesale and retail business in the city which remained in the family until the second World War. However, in those days Austen's interests lay more on the rugby field and the school's OTC rather than the commercial world. Like so many of us, his school reports could be summarised as "should do better".

Upon leaving Kings School he obtained a post with Nicholsons, the distillers, but having risen in four years as far as he was ever likely to, he left to take up a sales appointment with Shell. As his lifelong interest lay in the Army, it was natural that he should join the Territorial Army and become a Reserve soldier. It was not long before the Second World War engulfed the country, and 1941 saw Austen Finn embarking for India on that most hazardous of transports, an ammunition ship. After a 75 day voyage he landed at Calcutta. His first posting was as an Instructor, followed by a period at the Indian Army Staff College in Quetta. Among various out-postings he spent some time on the notorious North-West Frontier, but with the advance of the Japanese into India in 1942 he was

dispatched to General Bill Slim's headquarters. From there he was sent to Chittagong, which together with Calcutta were the principal ports supplying the 14th Army. Promotion was hard earned but came quickly. His appointment as Port Commandant called for a combination of skill, tact, and above all, determination, to keep men and materials moving. During this time the young Lt. Colonel learned to respect the Indian troops, particularly the Punjabis, and he was impressed with the way in which all races and religions worked and fought together in the now largely forgotten Indian Army.

In 1946 Austen Finn was demobilised and, with his wife whom he had married just before the War, set up home in Woodford. He then started a business supplying Mail Order houses, which thrived until 1984 when he retired and moved to Stansted. With one daughter, Sarah, already in the village he soon slipped into the life of the community. Unfortunately the death of his wife Joan in 1996 was a loss which he keenly feels to this day.

Austen Finn has become well known as chairman, secretary and committee member of our Royal British Legion branch: he also serves on the Gurkha Welfare Trust, is an active member of the Indian Army Association and is a member of St John's Church. To many people his house is the one with the Hermitage in the front garden and it gives Austen pleasure to show visitors round the interior where he has provided a written history. For Austen Finn, Stansted is a place where he has made more friends than during all his years in Woodford. Many would echo one of his few regrets which is the great increase in noise and traffic in the village. Lt. Col. Finn holds fast to many qualities, including an infectious sense of humour, which although (or perhaps because of) their old world values, makes him one of our respected and liked citizens. 
STANSTED MOUNTFITCHET WINDMILL

The season starts in earnest this month after our AGM last month. The work on the Brakewheel, which was mentioned last month, is now complete. The work has made the brake work more effectively, but also, when the brake is released, it allows the freerunning of the wheel, which we need to do regularly to keep the sails in balance and drain water out of the nooks and crannies. We are now thinking through the next stage of work on the mill, consulting with millwrights and experts on a proposal to be able to operate the sails occasionally under wind power without affecting safety when stationary. This would be a significant stage forward on the steady progress towards showing the working of the mill as it would have been when it last operated 89 years ago.
