A Mid-year View!

Already thousands of words have been written in our newspapers and magazines about the forthcoming new millennium but few stop to ponder on the event that changed the calendar of the world 2000 years ago. Words from one of our great rallying hymns come to mind:-

"Like a mighty army moves the Church of God Brothers, we are treading where the saints have trod. We are not divided, all one body we One in hope and doctrine, one in charity".

And so, on this theme, let **our** party begin, as the Christian Church the world over moves forward into its third millennium.

The Diocesan Conference at Caister 1999

"Freedom for the Future"

Whenever I see the word 'conference' it conjures up groups of people sitting in rows listening to lectures, watching the pages of the flip charts being turned over and wondering how soon coffee will be served. The Caister Conference is nothing like that. It's relaxing, uplifting, revitalising but above all FUN. As the Bishop welcomed us to Caister in Neptune's Palace at the Haven Holiday Centre, he made it clear that we were free to join in the activities or walk on the beach and hoped that it would be a time when we not so much talked about God but would meet with God.

The key speaker for the weekend was Bishop Simon Barrington-Ward and, of course, the theme of freedom was portrayed in each of his three addresses. At times we had to concentrate really hard as this very spiritual and knowledgeable person delved deeply into the meaning of freedom. However, his life of travel was the source of many entertaining stories as he recalled people he had met. The Bishop, we realised, had found freedom in his life to know God in ways which we have yet to discover.

The highlight of my weekend was meeting Susan Sawyers. What a lively friendly person she is with her obvious love of children. We use her books "Living Stones" at "Children's' Church" and we are amazed at the many activities she finds for the children to take part in, but having met her I no longer wonder, as she is so obviously inspired by her deep Christian faith and an overwhelming desire to bring Jesus into the lives of children.

We had freedom to dance, freedom to sing and finally, freedom to take part in the final Eucharist before our last meal together. A group of black Christians asked if they could introduce a song of praise into the service and they quickly taught us the words in their native tongue, which unfortunately escape me. Soon the rhythm of the song became irresistible to the children sitting in the front and they began dancing. Then the adults sitting near joined in and the Bishops came down from the stage. Before long 800 people were clapping and swaying spontaneously with everyone laughing and singing. It wasn't the kind of happy clappy arm waving which many Christians find embarrassing, but a joyous song to the Lord. In that dance we found the freedom we had been seeking throughout the weekend.

Helena Dziedzic remembers Padre Pio

One day in 1968 I felt a strong urge to switch on television. As it happened, BBC2 was televising Mass from San Giovanni Rotondo near Foggia in Italy, situated in the Gargano mountains. I saw an old priest saying Mass in a sitting position.

For the first time I saw the acclaimed Padre Pio of Pietrelcina - the capuchin monk and stigmatised priest. Seeing the saintly man gave me a strange feeling and I felt I had to make a pilgrimage to San Giovanni. He died on 23rd September 1968 and I believe I witnessed Padre Pio's last televised Mass.

It took me 21 years before I was able to visit his tomb in October 1989. Over the years I acquired books, tapes and videos on the life of Padre Pio both in English and Polish. In 1947 the present Holy Father, Karol Wojtyla, a student of the Angelicum in Rome, went to San Giovanni Rotondo to meet the charismatic capuchin. Padre Pio is said to have said "You are going to be Pope, but I see blood on your pontificate".

On 13th May 1981 the assassination attempt was made on the life of John Paul 11. On Sunday, 2nd May this year, that same Pope beatified Padre Pio in St Peter's Rome, the penultimate step to sainthood. The memories of the graces and blessings received through Padre Pio's intercession over the years were in the minds of the thousands who attended the ceremony, and not least Pope John Paul himself.

Family life in the Turner household was generally good. We had many happy times together, especially our family holidays in Ireland, visiting with the in-laws. Ken really enjoyed the fishing and the local tipple.

Sadly, on 6th January 1999, after a couple of years not feeling particularly well, Ken left us. We will remember with fondness this quiet, good humoured, caring man.



Some of you may have heard of the Helen Rollason Cancer Care Centre Appeal (HRCCCA). There was an article in the Herts & Essex a few weeks ago reporting that a local professional fund raising co-ordinator had been appointed. Perhaps you saw that and wondered if it had any connection with HEAL Cancer Charity, as Helen is one of our patrons. The answer is 'Yes, the HRCCCA is a division of, and is organised by HEAL'. Indeed if you read the brochures (which we hope will be available at various places around the village very soon), you will note the connection. So what is the HRCCCA about and how does it relate to the original objectives of HEAL Cancer Charity? The answer is that they are complementary. HEAL was formed about three years ago with the triple objectives of:

a .	Funding a CAT scanner simulator machine for
	the diagnosis and treatment of tumours.
b.	Establishing centres for the provision of holistic
	treatments (aromatherapy, reflexology,
	counselling etc.) for cancer sufferers.
C.	To find research into the application of the

various drugs which come out of the pharmaceutical industry.

These objectives stand unchanged and are already being funded with the income from events staged by the various HEAL groups around Hertfordshire, Essex and North East London - i.e. the area served by the North Middlesex Hospital in Edmonton.

The HRCCCA, by contrast, although inviting contributions from the general public, is also targeting businesses for contributions, with a view to raising money to build a whole new Cancer Care centre at the North Middlesex. The HEAL scanner and holistic centres (one of them anyway) will be in that new building.

The point is that the HRCCCA is a limited term appeal to raise a lot of money quickly, whereas the HEAL fund raising is a long term commitment to supply the on going needs of the holistic centres, equipment and research.

There are about 14 HEAL fund raising groups and we have some very energetic people. For example, one of the HEAL trustees organises a car boot sale every Sunday morning (for which he rises at 04.30 am !) in the car park of the Hospital. As if that were not enough, he now runs another one every Saturday elsewhere - where he finds the stamina I don't know, but we are grateful to him.

Perhaps you know that there is a HEAL charity shop in Epping, now about to celebrate its first birthday.

We in the Stansted group also now have our own charity shop, at the old Photosound shop premises ('Greenwich Village') in the alley next to Jones' Shoe Shop in Potter Street, Bishop's Stortford. That shop is open now so please drop in next time you are in Stortford and have a browse. Contributions of good second hand items would be appreciated and helpers are needed too. If you can spare some time please contact Pamela Jackson (tel. 01279 647354) or Joy Thomas (tel. 01279 813871).

So where are we with the objectives of HEAL right now?

- The holistic centre at the North Middlesex Hospital is open two days a week with another half day at St Margaret's Hospital at Epping.
- There is enough money in the scanner fund to have started looking for the right machine to obtain, and that is happening now.
- Research is on going and there are about eight Macmillan nurses working with Dr Davidson, consultant oncologist at the NMH and president of HEAL.
- Some other useful pieces of equipment have been provided to aid surgery at the cost of about £40,000.

Meanwhile, we are continuing our activities in Stansted.

After the success of our dance in February and Quiz Night in April, we are planning to be at the Carnival in July; we have our annual coffee morning on 8th September, a Race Night in October and another dance coming up on 4th December - so please make notes in your diaries!

The support we have had locally has been outstanding, for which we thank you all and look forward to your continued support.

ALZHEIMER'S DISEASE SOCIETY Caring for Dementia

This year our National Society celebrates its 20th birthday and we, the local branch, celebrate our 7th birthday. During this time a lot of progress in the understanding of dementia has been achieved and so much has been learnt. Diagnostic skills have improved and dementia is a recognised illness that can happen to any one of us and isn't just an illness that affects us just in old age. Unfortunately there is still no cure for dementia, but there is now hope.


For people who become ill with an Alzheimer's type dementia and are diagnosed in the early stages of the illness, drug treatment is available. I must stress this is in no way a cure. The treatment has proved to enhance the quality of life for some people. Over the last 3 years 2 drugs have been licensed in this country, Aricept (donepezil hydrochloride) and Exelon.

Would you like to hear more? On **Thursday 24th June at** 7 pm in the Uttlesford District Chambers, Saffron Walden, we are holding our 7th AGM and our guest speaker is Dr Cornelius Kelly, Consultant in old age psychiatry, Homerton Hospital London. Dr Kelly's interest in dementia and memory stems from working with Professor Brice Pitt at the Hammersmith Hospital memory clinic which largely concentrated on people with early dementia. His chief area of interest is the clinical management of dementia and how best to incorporate research findings into everyday clinical practice. Dr Kelly was an investigator on the Aricept clinical trial. He will be speaking about Treatments for Alzheimer's Disease. Help us to make this a successful evening. Please come along and join us. We need your support.

Now a small plea. We are in desperate need of committee members. We are a friendly lot; we don't bite. We are campaigning very hard for the services that are so desperately needed for people who through no fault of their own become ill with dementia. Unlike many other illnesses the carers, families and friends of dementia patients become the real sufferers of this illness. Dementia is no respector of age, colour, religion, education, etc. and can affect any one of us at any time.

We are a member led organisation so the more members we have the louder our voice. So please, please come along on 24th June and hear more about us and what treatments there may be in the future for patients. Who knows, we may be patients ourselves tomorrow. For further information please ring us on 01371 872519 or 873870. Remember we are here to help any carer who is caring for a person ill with dementia. We look forward to seeing you on 24th June.

For the sake of anyone in the village who saw our leaflet delivered with the Spring Parish Newsletter, in which we were asking for new volunteers and wondered what Stansted Helpline was all about - here is a (relatively!) brief summary.

Stansted Helpline has been operating for nearly 15 years and is a community care scheme, run entirely by local volunteers for the benefit of the residents of Stansted. Its aim is to provide help or advice for anyone in need, when no other readily available form of help is to hand. The requests we receive have been many and varied over the years, but the more regular requests include such tasks as:-

- a) Collecting prescriptions or shopping for the housebound/elderly.
- b) Providing necessary transport where public transport is not available or people are unable to use it.

(A small charge is made for transport requests to cover the cost of the volunteer driver's petrol).

c) Sitting with the sick or housebound to enable carers to take a break.

And many more.

We also have an extensive list of contact names and telephone numbers for specialist information or help and thereby aim to resolve (hopefully!) any problem with which we are presented.

Stansted Helpline is managed by a committee of 8-10 people, has a rota of 10 people who man the telephone and, at present, a band of approximately 60 local volunteers who can be called upon to offer their services to those in need. Whilst this undoubtedly sounds like a lot of people, ideally, more volunteers, especially drivers, are always needed since very few of our existing drivers are available at all times. In addition, we prefer not to "overuse" our valuable volunteers who give their time so freely and generously.

To give some idea of the extent to which Helpline is called upon, last year we received a total of 158 calls, of which 100 related to requests for transport. During the 6 months between April and September, the transport requests <u>alone</u> involved the following:-

	27 different clients;
covering	45 journeys;
travelling a total of	250 miles;
using	22 different volunteer drivers.

The running costs of Helpline amount to approximately £300 per year which relate almost entirely to the telephone charges, with small administrative costs when we feel it necessary to e.g. produce leaflets. Everyone donates their time and services completely free of charge, other than reimbursement of petrol, which is paid by the "clients". We therefore rely heavily on the generosity of local fund raising organisations and individuals to meet our expenses and enable this care scheme, which is available for the whole community, to continue its work.

I hope this article serves to broadly explain Helpline's purpose and means of operation. 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St Clare Hospice

Many thanks from all of us at St Clare Hospice to everyone who participated in our house-to-house collections in March. Once again, the local community for whom we provide Hospice Care Services has been very supportive.

The St Clare West Essex Hospice Care Trust provides Hospice Care Services to help and support people with life-threatening and terminal illnesses and to ease the stress of caring that family and friends experience. Over 250,000 people live in West Essex. Every year, 600 of these people will die from a terminal illness and would benefit from hospice care. The Hospice Centre is situated on the roundabout of Junction 7 of the M11 on the outskirts of Harlow. We offer Day Care facilities, a Family Support Service, an Equipment Loan Scheme, Bereavement Support and a 24-hour Helpline.

The building of an eight-bed in-patient extension started last summer. To date, over $\pounds 1.4$ million has been raised to pay for it. We could not have reached this far without the help of the local community for which we are very grateful. Continued support is essential to complete the project so that the new unit can open in early 2000.



OUR SPORTING ORIGINS

Stansted Park Cricket Club was founded in 1860, although there had been an earlier club known as Stansted Albion. A tennis club was established in 1889, two years earlier than the first football club, formed under the aegis of the cricket club. In 1903 a golf course of nine holes was laid out on the castle hills and adjoining land, but did not survive the first world war. The Stansted Polo Club had an even shorter existence, being started in 1892 and disbanded in 1903. Its ground was at Silver Leys, Bishop's Stortford.

The Bowling Green was laid down before the first world war and the Stansted Bowling Club still flourishes there. Founded in 1933, the Stansted Sports Association purchased the Hargrave Sports Ground in that year. The ground was formally opened on 22nd June 1935.

Burton End founded its own cricket club in 1948 but the name was later changed to Stansted Hall C.C. and it now plays at Stansted House.

Luke Pearman, Keith Ayres and Patrick Hearn can probably give us similar information on the Junior Football Club, Junior Cricket Club and Stansted Hall Juniors, so demonstrating that sporting initiative is still alive. *Editor*


After normal business at our last branch meeting, Mr Markham held our attention with his talk on "Cruise Ship Holidays".

They have three daughters - Marion, Linda and Hazel. Marion lives in Bishop's Stortford and was involved with Grove Cottage for Mentally Handicapped Children. Linda, who lives in Exeter, is the creative member of the family and amongst other things makes dolls' houses. Hazel lives in Stansted and, as many readers will know, is involved in the production of Link.

Len and Queenie have 8 grandchildren and 7 greatgrandchildren. She is pictured below holding one of her youngest relatives - a one-year old great, great nephew.

Len's working life was spent with the London and Stansted Furnishing Co., apart from four years during the Second World War when he was away in India in the RAF. Meanwhile, Queenie looked after the two older girls and put up two telephonists who had been evacuated from Southend: Gorsefields was used as the local Post Office Telephones Headquarters. The village was enlivened by the US Airmen stationed at the Stansted Airbase. Queenie's mother ran the laundry that dealt with all their clothes and she had many amusing stories to tell.

A faithful member of St John's Church, Queenie has, over the years, taken part in many of its activities - the choir, the Tuesday Club, the Mothers Union (at one time its enrolling member). She is in favour of Churches working together and for a time was a representative on the Churches Together Executive. She also helped for many years at the Day Centre and joined in all sorts of local activities. Many people know and appreciate her. Civic Amenity Site


Since the opening of the new car park in Lower Street also the new home for the rubbish skips - we have experienced problems with the availability of the skips.

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
