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
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
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

Like most children, I appreciate my parents more since I lost them, and like most parents they were pretty unique!

Mum brought us up quietly, with an open mind, and an inner peace not given to many. She made the best of the little money my father earned, and the rented two up - two down. Besides looking after her own bedridden mother and a mother in law with memory loss, she was *always* there for us - and for our neighbours when they needed her.

Dad was a self-educated man who, in his spare time achieved his dream of building his own home. He was not in the building trade so read books, practised what he had read, got on with it and called building inspectors' visits at regular intervals. We had all learned to lay bricks and floors and my dad was an electrician, plumber, carpenter, roofer, plasterer and master builder by the time we moved in.

Both were Quakers and had run Sunday Schools for the children of the small, very old village three miles walk outside the nearest town. The Meeting House was the size of a small bungalow and an outhouse with kitchen facilities for those special Meeting days. The garden and graveyard sported a huge Walnut tree, which yielded *tons* of nuts every year, or so it seemed to me, a 'Walnut nutter'. Like Meeting Houses all over the world it had a special atmosphere but as transport got better, the bigger town Meetings grew in popularity causing it's sad closure when my parent were in their late teens.

The village Meeting House reopened for their marriage on a fabulous August day in the depression of the nineteen - thirties, my parents having applied for special permission so their friends in the village, mobile or not, could attend the ceremony. It was the first wedding held there for a hundred years. If you have not experienced a Quaker wedding I ought to tell you that there is no 'official' presiding. The couples make their special vows to one another in front of friends and families who act as their witnesses. It's so very simple, quietly intimate, a day to remember.

The Meeting House never reopened again and is now a converted residence for a family who probably appreciate its' wonderful welcoming peace as they return from the days hustle and bustle.

Reaching out

t was a great joy to me when Stansted Parochial Church Council passed a resolution that, from now on, we would give 5% of our income to our church mission, with a view to revising this proportion in two years with a view to increasing it to 10%.

To some of our fellow Christians, this may seem a little tame, but it needs to be borne in mind that the maintenance and upkeep of the parish church and clergy falls on donations from members of our congregation.

The PCC resolution represents a commitment to the *purpose* of the Church rather than to its fabric. A Christian church is measured, not in its ability to stay afloat, or meet its present commitments, but in its ability to make *God's* Mission possible, to show God's love in reaching out to others to help them see that God seeks to draw all people to a relationship with her/himself.

Where do we make God's Kingdom

come? My daily post is always full of worthy causes and I am bombarded by prayer requests on the internet, all of which can be overwhelming unless we take a sane view of what is actually possible.

I believe we begin with local concerns where we have a direct responsibility. The Stort Valley Schools Trust, is a charity which funds a worker to develop relationships with local schools, take assemblies, RE lessons and the like. The Stansted Charities are a number of small Victorian funds for the poor which were consolidated into one a few years ago, administered by the church and Stansted parish council. This is a fund which could easily use more capital, as the demands for help can be great, and costs have risen way beyond what Victorians would have imagined when the charities began.

Looking beyond our own village, we can have a direct effect on communities suffering economic or natural disaster. Agencies like

> Christian Aid and CAFOD act on our behalf working with local organisations in the Sudan, Bengal, Kenya, all over the world to bring relief and a measure of self-determination to the poor.

The time will come when the congregation of St John's will need to decide whether to maintain the structure of the church, or maintain its mission. My hope is that we will choose to leave the buildings and maintain the work.

Uttlesford Community Travel Registered Charity No.1072529

Uttlesford Community Travel (UCT) wishes to publicise the need to recruit more car owners who will be willing to assist non-urgent patients who have no transport of their own to attend hospital appointments.

No doubt you are aware that for some time, Essex County Council have operated a "Social Car Scheme" of car owners willing to transport friends and neighbours to social occasions. But this scheme unfortunately, cannot cater for hospital journeys, and patients living in those areas not served by convenient bus services often have difficulty in finding alternative means of transport for journeys to hospital.

Uttlesford District Council, however, have now made funds available to establish a UCT Hospital Car Scheme, designed to meet the needs of those non-urgent patients who are referred by their doctors to hospital and who do not qualify for transport by the Ambulance Service.

Where the appointment is at Addenbrookes Hospital, of course, UCT Book-a-Ride members will be able to use the new direct Saffron Walden - Addenbrookes Service introduced on 2nd October. The Voluntary Car Service could then be used to run from the patient's home to Swan Meadow car park, where the UCT Addenbrookes service starts.

Even if the appointment is at one of the other hospitals serving the area, however, the successful creation of a UCT Hospital Car Service could be of great assistance in helping any patients, whether or not Book-a-Ride members, to reach hospital, or at any rate, to reach convenient public transport.

To realise this potential for aiding those out-patients who lack their own transport, however, we need more car owners to volunteer occasional help to enable our friends and neighbours to reach hospital on a mileage payment basis.

In order to make the most efficient use of the time of volunteer drivers for the UCT Hospital Service, the intention is that, unlike the Social Car Scheme, all requests for journeys will be made in advance direct to the UCT office. Volunteer drivers will be invited to specify, periodically, the regular times during which they will be willing to consider requests for trips. The requests for transport will then be matched against available volunteer drivers by the UCT office.

All mileage will be eligible for payment and the UCT office will inform passengers, at the time of booking, the estimated cost of the journey, which they will be asked to pay in full.

Over the coming weeks, the UCT will be seeking to recruit and train the additional part-time staff needed to run the booking system for this new UCT Hospital Car Service. It is also our intention to arrange one or more meetings for potential volunteer drivers to meet the UCT staff and discuss any issues which appear to arise regarding the proposed scheme. Where such meetings would most conveniently take place out in the individual villages, the UCT will seek to arrange this.

Meanwhile, any car owner who is interested in learning more about the proposed scheme is invited to let the UCT office know, by letter or telephone (01371 875787). We will then keep them informed of progress in setting up the scheme and, in particular, tell them of the times and places of briefing meetings.



Uttlesford District Council

Highways

Uttlesford has recently published its draft transport strategy. This was written in conjunction with Essex County Council, who are the Highways Authority. There are some interesting statistics:

86% of households in Uttlesford had one or more cars (Great Britain average 71%)

48% of households in Uttlesford had more than one car (Great Britain average 26%)

About half the workers who live in Uttlesford work outside the District,

Uttlesford has the second highest accident rate in Essex. In 1997 the number of casualties per 1,000 population was 7.8 compared to an Essex average of 5.8.

The report recognised that speed is a factor causing accidents. Some country lanes are particularly prone to speeding traffic. 'Rat-running' on some roads around the airport causes problems. Speeding is one reason why 5,000 non-drivers die nationally on our roads every year; and why, though our roads are the safest in the European Union, our rate of child pedestrians killed is the worst: 1.3 per 400,000, against 1.0 in France and 0.7 in Italy

What is Uttlesford doing to improve road safety? At our Highways sub-committee meetings representatives from the County Council and Essex Police are always present. Mrs. Rose Johnson who is Uttlesford Council's road safety officer also attends. Since 1995 Uttlesford has had a locally determined highways progrannne. For the current financial year the budget is approximately £190,000. This means that district councillors working within that budget can decide on what are Uttlesford's highway priorities and the County Council will implement them.

How has Stansted benefited from the locally determined highways programme? The B1383 between Newport and Stansted has over the last few years been something of an accident blackspot with a number of fatalities. Readers will have noticed that the speed limit has now been reduced to 50 mph and that new road markings have been introduced. It is hoped that traffic calming measures will be in place before Christmas at Burton End.

Councils however can only do so much to promote road safety. It does not only require enforcement but a change of mentality amongst many drivers. Essex Police have limited resources. It was however pleasing, that in response to Silver Street residents complaints that officers were out recently with their speed gun. Speeding is an epidemic problem as a survey issued by the Department of Transport indicates. It states that most drivers exceed speed limits on clear roads, and two out of three ignore 30 mph signs. Personally, I agree

with the views of the RAC, which believes we need to rethink speed limits. Whereas 80 mph would be a more reasonable limit for motorways, 20 mph limits should be introduced around areas where there are vulnerable people such as schools.

The Rochford's site when developed will release under the planning agreement signed with Uttlesford some £400,000 from the developers for highway and transportation improvements. Although nothing has been finally decided, suggestions have included traffic signals for Silver Street/Chapel Hill junction, provision of or widening of footway along Church Road including land acquisition and traffic calming in Church Road.

Essex County Council

As was reported in the last news, the County Council has now returned from the Summer Holidays ready for the Winter's work. As always when there is a recess, a pile of work is left outstanding to be completed on return. This is the case on this occasion. Thus the Councillors will be busy!

One issue which is to be considered is the question of school terms and holidays; a matter which has been hanging around the world of Education for many years. The issue is which is the best spread of holidays and terms that meets the needs of the pupils and also those that deal with them; the teaching staff and those in support.

Traditionally, there have been three school terms in a year divided by two short breaks and a long summer holiday, this last supposedly so the children could help with the harvest! This time honoured system has been subject to pressure over the past few years for a number of reasons: Public Examinations have increased in number, more children go on to tertiary education and Universities require early knowledge of examination results. With increasing affluence, families too take longer and more frequent holidays and so do not wish these to be dictated by the present fixed periods for school holidays.

There are a number of ideas for reform; a five term year or a six term year, each based on a shorter more concentrated term, separated by short breaks, the periods for term and holiday disregarding to some extent the various religious and public holidays.

Clearly, the problem is not easy of solution and one which cannot be decided on in isolation nor unilaterally, as public transport, administrative and hospital services all to some degree are affected by any change.

Your Council is concerned to study the whole problem as this article is written and thereafter those likely to be concerned will be consulted in depth. Nature Notes

The first 10 days of October were extremely wet with over 2 inches of rain. As mentioned last month this is likely to result in fungi being visible in our woods and on roadside verges as well as in gardens. At the time of writing there are already Giant Puff Balls, (Calvatia gigantean) in Gall End by the allotments. These can reach football size and are unmistakable when mature and white. They harden and darken with age.

There are four other common species, which can definitely be found in the Stansted area. The first are the aptly named bracket fungi. These can always be seen on the Aubrey Buxton reserve. The Many-zoned Polypore, (Trametes versicolor) has individual concentric layers of variable colour. Velvety and smooth when young but hard and leathery with age; they can cover tree stumps and fallen logs.

Look in gardens especially if you have conifers, for the Shaggy Parasol, (Lepiota rhacodes) The cap is at first ovate (a drumstick shape) but expands to become almost flat. It is covered with scales, which are a darker buff towards the centre.

A delightful find and one which is surprisingly common, is Coprinus comatus otherwise known as Lawyer's Wig-see below. This is one of the ink caps and its conical cap blackens from below and deliquesces into an inky fluid. The most likely sites are roadside verges and rubbish heaps.

Finally a gelatinous fungus common on most woods especially elder and particularly on dead branches (Auricularia auricula-judae). Any walk along Stansted footpaths should give you a sighting of this fungus. Often found in clusters these soft brown fungi vary in size from a thumbnail to a child's fist and do indeed bear a resemblance to a human ear.



Marion and Ted Prettv, M.B.E.

Marion and Ted must be among the best known of Stansted's residents. Marion is Stansted born and is most unusual in having lived in the same road, Stoneyfield Drive, for her whole life, and most of this time in her present house. Her schooling on Chapel Hill was followed by nursery nurse training at the Mid-Essex Technical College and School for Art at Chelmsford. The intention to work at Dr. Barnardo's did not materialise and her first job was with Speechley's chemist shop in Bishops Stortford. However she did practise her skills a few years later when, with her daughters at the Primary School, the opportunity returned with children from families in the village.

Ted was a Takeley boy but moved to Bishops Stortford in his early years and attended St. Michael's School. His first job was a four and a half year plumbers apprenticeship with Ernest Markwell. In those days of National Service he soon found himself in the RAF where he became a corporal storeman. Ted has no regrets from those days and felt that it was a good experience, which would benefit the young men of today.

On his return in 1952, his courtship with Marion brought them to their wedding at the then Congregational Church. Their daughters Carol and Diana were born in 1954 and 1958 and they, like their parents, became immersed in village life during the school years. Ted became a lead specialist with the Ministry of Works and remained with the organisation through its various manifestations until it became English Heritage. He retired in 1995. During this time he was largely based at Audley End and came to know and respect every part of the mansion. He also worked on the Tower of London, Downing Street, Westminster Hall and other houses in East Anglia. His later years were spent as supervising foreman over a wide area. Ted's RAF background led him into the Royal Observer Corps where with 11 other men he spent 36 happy years based at the still surviving underground bunker at Henham. He recalls how aircraft reporting in the 50's gave way to nuclear reporting, the training for which he was profoundly glad not to practise. However, it was Scouting that became his "spare time" activity. As a former Scout at Hockerill, he remembers a night hike to Stansted where under Malcom Treacher's direction the boys spent the night in Stansted Windmill. He was the right person to lead Stansted's Bulldog Pack for 35 years and is perhaps best-known through the scores of boys -many now parents themselves - who were led by him. He was justly awarded the Scout Medal of Merit and Bar and is cheered that one of his old Cubs, David Ciancola, is now a Cub Leader in Haverhill, and that grandson Matthew became a Cub Scout in Old Harlow. Ted's greatest regret is that several changes in uniform have detracted from the status of the Scout Movement. The old jersey and cap were thoroughly serviceable and meant something to the boys. The Windmill is another of Ted's enthusiasms. He has been a Steward for

many years and can still be relied on to carry out the smaller repair jobs which constantly arise and for which his working skills can be used.

In 1960 Marion became, with Margaret Chastney, Olive and Maisie Bunting, Elsie Stoddart and Margaret Meadows, a founder member of the Stansted Evening Womens Institute. It is a tribute to the Institute that, 40 years on, Marion is having her second term as President and that these founder members are still active. Marion feels that credit should be given to Marjory Cowan for perceiving the need for such an evening organization as a result of meeting mothers at the school gate, and is pleased to see the W.I. increasing in membership again. She was a member of the Parish Council for some 16 years, some of them as Open Spaces chairman and the last four as Vice Chairman. Marion looks on her time as well worthwhile and an opportunity to repay the village for the good things she has experienced here.

Marion has also served on the Brownie and Guide Committees and is currently secretary of the Local History Society. For some years she was well known in her jobs with Pearsons Bakery in Silver Street, as a school dinner lady and at Family News on Chapel Hill. Both she and Ted are keen practitioners of Tai Chi, the beginning of which Marion attributes to a happy weekend at the W.I.'s Denman College. Her particular pride is that her granddaughter Rachel is the fifth member of the family to attend the Herts and Essex High School but they both feel that their greatest day came in 1995 when at Buckingham Palace Ted received his MBE for services with English Heritage.

They are determined to spend all their days in Stansted, a wish that we sincerely share.

St Clare Hospice

Official Opening of St Clare Hospice In-Patient Unit

St Clare Hospice's new In-Patient Unit may have been taking patients since January but the Official Opening took place on Wednesday, 11th October at the Hospice, Hastingwood. The ceremony was a dedication of the work of the whole of Hospice including our Day Care facilities and outreach services, which have been operational for a number of years.

Over 300 specially invited guests attended. The Hospice Chief Executive, Brian Hilton, began the proceedings at 11am. The Rt Hon Lord Braybrooke (Patron) spoke about the origins of the Hospice and thanked everyone who worked so hard to enable the in-patient extension to be built. He then unveiled a plaque just inside the entrance to the Unit.

Ian Paterson, OBE (Chairman of Trustees) stressed that St Clare's is a community hospice belonging to everyone present and all who support our work. He said "Since the new Unit opened, over 100 patients have benefited from in-patient care and around 680 people are currently being helped within the wider community. All this costs around £1 million per year, only one third of which is paid for by the NHS. This means that we need a great deal of support both now and in the future".

Philip Platt, husband of the late Gloria Platt who was one of the founders of the Capital Appeal to build the Unit then read from the Old Testament on behalf of the Jewish community. He chose an extract about the symbolism of light.

Next, the Rev'd Charles Masheder (Trustee) introduced a procession of people representing key groups involved with the Hospice and Father Paul McNamara from Holy Cross Catholic Church initiated the passing of a special candle around this representative group.

Eventually this symbolic light of hope was returned to Father McNamara who carried it in front of the audience before handing it to staff representative Jo Price (Fundraising Administrator). Jo then carried the candle to the Sanctuary inside the Hospice where the light will burn for evermore. Once the eternal flame had been lit, Rev'd Charles Masheder gave a blessing.




Royal British Legion Women's Section

Friday 1.30-3.00pm Pre - Schoolers


