ARCHIVES

Early *this* year I went to Saffron Walden to help with the Archive group, working on the history of Quakers in this area. The group of Meetings in the local area is known as Thaxted Monthly Meeting, even though there is no longer a meeting at Thaxted. Felsted, Stebbing and Bishop's Stortford have all suffered the same fate. Stebbing still has its Meeting House, which is used by the village, and by Quakers once a year for a Monthly Meeting. The largest Meeting in the local group is Saffron Walden, and there are Meetings at Dunmow, Great Bardfield and Stansted.

I was looking at old records of Meetings held in the 1870's. Each Meeting appointed representatives to meet together and hold business meetings. These meetings were held at the various Meeting Houses every Month, hence "Monthly Meeting" The same arrangement still takes place today. The dates of Meetings were interesting for two reasons, firstly, they were written as "Third day of the Second Month 1874" or as "Twenty-fifth day of the Twelfth Month 1876" and secondly, yes, they did Meet on Christmas Day and New Year's Day, if the Meeting Day fell on those dates. The dates were used, as shown, to avoid using the days and months that had pagan associations.

Quakers believe that all life is sacramental and therefore Holy, and that no time should be marked out as more Holy; that what God has done for us should always be remembered and not only on the special occasions named Christmas, Easter and Pentecost. So, therefore, it would have been the correct thing to do to meet on any day of the year. My imagination runs wild as I imagine those doughty Quakers, meeting monthly. All the representatives were men, though women were allowed to attend the meetings. Those Victorians would need to travel by horse, horse drawn trap or even walk; they would travel in all weathers, and only occasionally would it be recorded that they "were prevented" because of inclement weather. They saw themselves as going about God's work, and they took their responsibilities very seriously indeed.

Today, life is easier, travel is relatively simple and there are both men and women representatives at Monthly Meetings. We would not have business meetings on Christmas, New Year's nor Easter Day's, and most of us will celebrate those Holy days.

This article goes out in the New Year, so may I wish you all a fulfilling New Year.

More famous than Jesus

can't believe it is twenty years since John Lennon was shot dead outside his hotel in New York. I am not a great Beatles fan, but I cannot hear one of Lennon's songs without it taking me back to a place or a person in the past.

Music marks our days and evokes memories, *Telstar* reminds me of my grandmother's house, the Beatles' *She Loves You* of diving behind the sofa at the sight of a Dalek, anything by Slade recalls school dances, Fauré's *Requiem* of being in love in Paris. Whatever else we are, music is a point of reference by which we measure our past and, by extension, so is cinema and television.

It was Lennon's "We're more famous than Jesus" that sticks in so many minds. Thirty years ago it sounded almost blasphemous, yet today's teens would find nothing unusual about it, though they would probably debate whether Oasis, Britney Spears or Radiohead are more popular than the Beatles.

These days modern culture is not just a point of reference, as it has been for my generation, it has become all absorbing. I'm reluctant to admit that I probably know more about the wedding of Michael Douglas and Catherine Zeta Jones than I do about the effect of Western sanctions on Saddam Hussein. Celebrity news has replaced 'real news', entertainment has conquered reality. Culture no longer sim-

ply marks our lives, it commands our attention and magazines like *Hello* and *OK* reduce us to being spectators.

It is easy to be angered by the way our world appears to trivialise real life and to walk away depressed, discouraged and wanting to turn the clock back. But we don't have the luxury to do that in the church.

The church was founded by people who also felt alienated from the world around them. When St. Paul considered which gods were on display in Athens, he did not retreat from them, but sought to understand the heart and mind of the culture they symbolized. In so doing, he could debate with Athenian elders using language they already knew. Paul entered their conversation using their images and their idols.

In the same way the church needs to look into our culture to see if, to use Paul's language, "God is already there by another name". I may not like the thought of the unbridled hedonism in Ibiza's discos, but underneath it is the despair of a generation which has been saddled with apocalyptic warnings about global warming, famine and AIDS; enjoy today as there may not be a tomorrow. Films like *The Matrix, The Truman Show, Contact* and *The Fight Club* are where issues of ultimate truth and meaning are being addressed. Ethical debates about sexuality among our

young people are sparked by TV shows like Queer as Folk, Ellen and Will and Grace.

There is a young generation which has been lost to the church, but I don't think necessarily that they have been lost to God. If we use church as a hot water bottle, for nostalgia and comfort, then we will continue to grow old and tired. If we are true to our vocation and look for God in the marketplace, then we may be able to join our young people in making sense of this strange world we have become, and they and we will be so much the richer for it.

STANSTED PROFJLE NO.30

Mrs Rene Sanders



Rene, although not strictly a Stansted native, has lived her whole life between Thaxted, where she was born, and Bishop's Stortford. When aged four she moved to Elsenham where her grandfather was the licensee of The Crown Inn. She remembers both King George and Queen Mary's Silver Jubilee and the 1937 Coronation which put the whole village "en fete", and has memories of her grandfather, a staunch Labour party supporter, leading a party of villagers to the station where they embarked on the Thaxted Flyer for a day of festivities based on Thaxted Vicarage, then in the occupation of the legendary Conrad Noel. Another abiding memory is of her and her sister careering down the hill in an antique bath chair. No traffic problem then! Her grandmother was given to making spontaneous purchases at sales anything from a cheap item of furniture to a dilapidated cottage, a trait which she is pleased to have inherited. When she was aged 9 the family moved to Bishop's Stortford where she lived until 1956. Rene attended the Herts & Essex High School during the war years, much of it for half days as the buildings were shared with evacuees from Clapton. In 1953 she organised a dance to raise money for the victims of the East Coast floods. Her first job was with Millars, the engineers occupying the site now known as Twyford Business Centre. She assisted the advertising manager and found the work to her liking, so it was not surprising that she moved to more rewarding posts with "Woman" and "Good Housekeeping" in London. Rene well remembers the daily journey from Stansted where everyone on the platform knew everyone else and the waiting room with its fire was one of the cosiest places in the village. By that time she had met Irving, married, and moved to Stansted (1956). The high point in Rene's working life was joining ATV where she was in at the beginning of commercial television. She worked with, among others, Lew Grade and Val Parnell and thoroughly enjoyed those early formative days.

Irving, her husband, was, to the many who knew him, one of Stansted's leading citizens and the local historian. Among his many contributions he was a Governor at Bentfield School, founder of Stansted Millers, chair of both the Sports Association and the Carnival Committee in its heyday, and was a member and chairman of the Parish Council. His name lives on, not only in many memories, but in the Windmill where he has a memorial plaque and where the publications which carry his excellent draughtsmanship are still used and sold. Another plaque is at the Fountain where the refurbishment was done in commemoration of him. Rene remembers organising the children's Fancy Dress at the Carnival when over 100 children keenly competed for the trophies. An important and memorable day for Rene was the celebration of the Queen's Silver Jubilee, led by Irving as Chairman of the Village organising committee. Rene and Irving started the day at 4.30 a.m. setting out Irving's local history exhibition. Then followed many activities including street parties and finally the grand bonfire and firework display on the Recreation Ground. The day finished at 2 am. Rene hopes that the public concern over the state of the two village signs, put up at that time, will be recognised by the Parish Council.

Rene Sanders was also a founder and first President of the Evening WI in 1960. In 1958, Tim was born, followed by Lesley and Louise. They and their families now all live in Bishop's Stortford. Much of Rene's time is now taken up with four grandchildren, Katy, Rebecca, Mathew and baby Sophie, who enjoy her company, her house and the opportunity to play on the "Rec" like their mothers before them. She is grateful for the many good neighbours on Recreation Ground, where the children played happily in each others homes and where the households became a big "family" in those years when young mothers seldom went out to work, and she is delighted that the "Rec" continues to be a happy community.

Rene is justly proud of her Antique and Secondhand furniture business started by her in Stansted, later joined by Irving in his later years and then Tim after a career in retail management. Following a serious fire in 1982, the family business moved to Takeley where it has developed into a well-known and successful enterprise. Tim has now taken over but Rene continues to assist, enjoying the stimulus of customer contact and being a well known face at local auctions.

She is a loyal and active member of St. John's church where she has many friends.

Although she misses the days when families tended to stay in the village, Rene is determined to face at least one challenge of the 21st century by mastering the computer, thanks to the class "Computing for the Terrified" which is held at the Peter Kirk Centre. Although Rene has in later years travelled to the Rhine and the Nile, she is very home-oriented and still lives in a house that has been in the Sanders family since 1929. The "Rec", and indeed Stansted, would not be the same without her.

Essex County Council

An issue which is very much under discussion in County Hall and elsewhere at the moment is that of the case for the expansion of the Airport beyond 15 million passengers per annum to 25 million, and perhaps more in the longer term.

Many readers will be aware that BAA, in the name of the Stansted Airport, is anxious for the expansion to take place, and in an attempt to avoid a long and costly public hearing have, at their expense, caused a number of surveys and investigations to take place, which are designed to answer the numerous questions likely to be raised so that planning permission may be given for the expansion in the near future and without delay. In addition, as many will have seen, money is being spent by BAA now to expand the terminal building and to develop roads and facilities in anticipation of such an agreement.

Part of the development scheme includes a public relations exercise, where members of the Airport staff carry out briefing meetings in local villages to outline their proposals and to answer whatever questions may arise.

Readers are encouraged to attend these and to raise any questions they like. They should do this against the background that already the Government, in the form of the Civil Aviation Authority, has given permission for 185,000 take-offs and landings in any one year to take place with immediate effect. Simple mathematics would inform those interested that with a passenger load factor of 80 per landing a total of 14.8M is now a fact and, should the passenger load factor increase as aircraft become larger and larger, the increased targets will be a matter of fact, again sooner rather than later.

It is clear the airport is likely to expand. It is for those concerned to decide whether they wish this to happen or not, but it is important also in the national interest that the decision is taken on reasonable grounds. Thus it is for all to investigate for themselves the facts and listen to the briefings so they can properly decide.

Nature Notes

AT THE TURN OF THE YEAR


Low and cold the early morning, winter light glints on the hoar frost woodland. Not a stir or a murmur to be found, until we announce our presence with sound of frosty crispy beech leaves as we make our way through the new gate to the Aubrey Buxton Nature Reserve. (The old crooked stile was always a challenge). The sighting of the first snowdrops beckons the New Year in. (The snowdrop has been spread by man from its natural habitat in woodlands in the west country).

Splashes of colour - aconites - can also be seen. (leaves do not appear until flowers have faded).

A pine cone jammed in the bark of the tree shows that a great spotted woodpecker has been eating the pine seeds.

In the same way the presence of Nnthatches can be detected. (Tree creepers go up the bark of a tree whilst nuthatches go down). Birds from the woodland tend to move into gardens to sample the takeaways when the going gets tough. Whilst grey squirrels always keep a good store of nuts, they still raid bird tables. (The grey squirrel has almost wiped out the red squirrel population in this country). Conservationists are still striving through initiatives such as Red Alert to halt the spread of greys in Cumbria and Northumberland. The battle in the south, apart from Thetford Forest, the Isle of Wight and Brownsea Island, is already lost.

We edge our way through the woods and out to an open ploughed up barley field. A robin sings sweetly near by. (They actually commit murder among their fellows; does this explain its remarkable affinity with man?)

The Museum Service - Death by a thousand cuts

Unlike schools, rubbish collection and libraries, museums are not a statutory requirement for local authorities. Consequently, they represent an easy target for budget cuts. Most cuts are so gradual that the scale of the problem is only gradually becoming apparent. It is death by a thousand cuts. Britain's regional museum service is facing a "catastrophe" of under funding, falling visitor numbers and deteriorating collections. Yet, even those who do not visit museums benefit from their existence, in the education services they offer, in the inspiration they provide in the works of art, books and films which are indirectly sparked by museum collections.

We are fortunate in Uttlesford in having Saffron Walden Museum, which is located in the grounds of Saffron Walden castle. It has been described by one visitor as "a real gem". It is the only registered museum, which preserves the district's archaeology, natural history and local history. Stansted residents will find it of particular interest, as it will be taking on the large and important archaeological finds and records from the excavations at Stansted Airport. In planning for the future care of and public access to the Stansted material the Curator, Carolyn Wingfield, would be interested to hear from residents about their views. Museums have perhaps in the past had a dreary image. The new generation of curators have done much to challenge this perception. There will be an exhibition running from the 22nd January 2001 to June 30th 2001 entitled 'Victorian Values'. This will be a special exhibition marking the 100th anniversary of Queen Victoria's death. Admission charges are modest at £1 for adults and for children under 18 there is no charge.

In view of the excellent work the Museum does, I was saddened that the Leader of the Council had proposed that it be subject to a 10% cut in its budget. Fortunately, following representations made by myself and Councillors from all political parties this suggested economy was withdrawn. Instead, there will be a Best Value service review in 2002.

Car Parks Review

In March 1999, the Council opened two Pay and Display car parks at Lower Street and Crafton Green. Uttlesford entered into a partnership agreement with the Parish C6uncil for Crafton Green. This provided for the District Council to manage it as a Pay and Display car park following work to upgrade it with joint funds provided by both the District and Parish Councils.

Following a survey of the car parks by the Parish Council, which clearly showed that they were under-used, representations were made that the 6 hour limit was no longer appropriate. The Community Services Committee of the District is being asked to approve a new tariff of £2 for all day parking to be introduced in both car parks. If agreed, this would take effect from 1 April 2001. Other charges for periods of up to 1 hour, up to 3 hours and up to a maximum of 6 hours would remain unchanged.



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
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


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
