

Be still ...

At this time of the year, everyone is thinking about their holidays, and those with children, how they are going to keep them occupied for the long holiday. Parliament is now in recess and the members are away, only the journalists stay and hope for a story as they enter into what is known as the 'silly season', when a slight whiff or hint of a story gets enlarged into a parliamentary crisis, "Recall Parliament" they cry.

I understand that in the churches something of the same applies, not that I would know, I don't go in for all this church stuff myself, can't see any sense in it. My friends tell me that the clergy tend to go off on their holidays at this time and that you get all sorts of people appearing to take the services, which can sometimes be a welcome change so I am told.

Talking about holidays, I shall be off on my holidays soon, and it is one of the times of the year when I visit churches, particularly if they are old churches, not necessarily for the architecture, for it is the monuments and wall memorials that I find interesting; have you noticed that when you open those heavy wooden doors and enter the church the atmosphere changes? You can feel a strange presence, I don't know what it is, it must be all those prayers that have been intoned over the years. Sometimes when I need a bit of quiet I go into St. John's and sit quietly in that little side chapel you can feel the presence of prayer around you. I nearly always wander around this country during my holidays and in these wanderings I have found it in many places, such as the little chapel at Bradwell on Sea, and going further afield, at Lindisfarne after all the coaches have left, you can stand in the ruins of the Abbey and it is there, it wraps itself all round you, this mystic power of prayer.

I was once very lucky to be taken to Iona and in the quiet of the early morning, or late evening, no matter where you are, in the church or on the sea shore, this mystic power of prayer surrounds you, wraps itself around you as you stand or sit quietly by yourself

Next time that you go visiting some quiet country church, stand or sit still for a few moments and you will hear and feel the presence of prayer. As the hymn says

"BE still and know I am near you be still, I am the Lord."

There is a power which is divine, creative and loving though we can often only describe it with images and symbols that rise from our own particular experiences. It's story is greater than any single cultural version of it and yet it is embodied in all stories in all traditions. It is a power that paradoxically needs the human response. Like us it is energised by the reciprocity of love. It wills our redemption, longs us to turn to it. It does not create heaven and hell for us but allows us to do that for ourselves. Such is the terrible vulnerability of love. This is no theological abstraction but a matter of relationship. Worship is the word that I should use to describe my attitude towards this relationship, an attitude that in those rare moments when I'm fully alive, the whole of myself is open to all that exists in compassion, repentance, thanksgiving, intercession, and praise.

In our busy lives we often fail to make space for intercession and fellowship. We yearn to make life better but our technological skills have outstripped our moral development. Living a moral life is rarely easy but in the end what matters is you and me and what goes on between us. The moment we acknowledge this we give up the freedom to make choices based solely on our own desires. If taken seriously it gives a new perspective on moral dilemmas, one that can be different from seeing them in terms of the rights of the different parties involved. As we engage in the world with faith and moral responsibility as individuals and nations we will inevitably find ourselves transformed.

wonder if you've noticed how many fallacies we readily believe because we really want them to be true? I encounter one or two of them quite often, like the belief that winter is the season for funerals, a view entirely unsupported by statistics. Or, at the end of a dinner party, the idea that a good slug of coffee will render a drunk fit to drive home.

We have a persistent and attractive fallacy in the church which is the assured belief that, if we can get people into the building, under whatever pretext, then they may become regular members of the congregation.

I encounter this one when I discover that 'it has been noted' that I was absent from a concert, or some other function which happened to take place in the parish church. Why would I be there? Apparently because, if I was there, people would feel I was taking an interest in them and they might start to come to church and, single-handedly, I could fill the place to bursting on a Sunday morning.

Or again, in planning for the autumn we were discussing the 'Celebration of Christmas' event in St Mary's church. Although this is not an act of worship, or an event with a Christian focus (it is Christmas which is being celebrated, not Christ), I am told we must have it, as it gets people into church who otherwise wouldn't come, and it may sow a seed in people's minds, which may result in them becoming practising Christians.

Children's Church meets at 9:30am on Sundays in the Church Hall in school term-time, so not in August. Tiny Tots is a mother and toddler group that meets fortnightly on Tuesday afternoons, again in term-time. Laser Group is a 12-16 youth group which meets fortnightly on Sunday evenings at 8:00pm for activities in the church hall. The evening concludes with candlelit Night Prayer in the chapel in church.

The logic begins to look absurd when you state this belief at its most basic: We should dilute, or present the church's purpose in a muted way so we can attract those on the edges, and influence them to become Christians. More likely it acts like an inoculation: expose someone to a weak form and they will be able to build up an immunity to the real thing.

The Revd Dr Jeffrey John, whom I remember preaching forthrightly in my college chapel a few times, when he was chaplain at Magdalen, Oxford, has just written a pamphlet on how to grow churches. He writes:

The truth is that conversion and growth almost never happen osmotically or automatically. They only happen when a deliberate and careful effort is made to invite people into worship, and to equip them with the necessary information and teaching to understand and benefit from what is going on. If you find a way of doing this sensitively but boldly, confident that you are offering something which is actually worth more than amateur dramatics, karate, or whatever, you may get a response. But it is important not to blunt your or your church's sense of mission by imagining that allowing people to use your premises will somehow further the kingdom, it won't.1

People become Christians because they have been caught by a vision of God, and a way of seeing the world made possible by an encounter with the figure of Jesus Christ. It is a life-changing event and does not happen out of benign, sunny optimism, but from a deep desire to be close to God.

Christians who want to soft-focus their faith to make it more appealing should ask whether this desire comes out of a deep-seated embarrassment about what they believe. It wasn't so very long ago that we used the word 'Christian' to mean A Good Person, and I can't imagine any of us wanting to say that about ourselves. Mercifully, we no longer use the word in that way so Christians can once again be the flawed-people-following-Jesus that they always were. The task is now for us to share openly with others why he is worth following.





LOOKING BACK - THE WI SCRAPBOOK 1965


In 1965 - the Golden Jubilee Year of the W.I. Movement -W.I's were invited to make scrapbooks, records of village life at that time. In that year there were 9000 Women's Institutes in England, Wales, the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man and the membership was 461,000 women. Today, nearly 40 years later there are around 7000 WI's and 240,000 members. reflecting the change in the lifestyle of women today. Nevertheless it is the largest national voluntary organisation for women in the UK and as such has an unrivalled reputation as a voice of reason and integrity on issues that matter to women and their communities. There were two WI's in Stansted in 1965, one meeting in the afternoon and one in the evening and between them they made a scrapbook of Stansted Mountfitchet which is full of information and pictures of the village at that time. Sadly, the afternoon Institute closed in 1997 after more than 70 years but the Evening Institute is still thriving after nearly 43 years. In this year of the Queen's Golden Jubilee I thought it would be interesting to look into the scrapbook and see how things have changed since then.

Even in 1965, Stansted was described as a large village, or according to a Local Government Inquiry at that time, could no longer be regarded as a village at all. The number of inhabitants in 1965 was 3,500 and now with the population in excess of 5,700 - this figure being the estimate given by Uttlesford for the year 2000 - it is even less likely to be described as a village. The scrapbook talks of the trunk road - the A11 - running roughly north and south from London to Norwich, as being very heavy with traffic. Now, of course, it has been re-classified as the B1383 and although a lot of traffic still comes through the "village", the advent of the M11 has made a tremendous difference. In 1965 there was much concern about the proposed motorway, especially that the Parish Church of St Mary would be cut off from the rest of the village. The Ministry of Transport was approached via Saffron Walden Rural District Council - to get the line of the motorway altered to run east of the church. This seems to have been successful as the church did not become cut off from the village, though it is no longer the Parish Church. Apparently also at that time there was some concern about the 'Cast-Iron Fountain of 1871' at the junction of Chapel Hill and the A11 which made the corner very dangerous for traffic. The Parish Council wanted it re-sited on the southern side of its present site, but Essex County Council considered that impracticable. A photograph in the book shows a policeman (P.C. Rickets - now retired and living in Saffron Walden) standing in the middle of the A11 and directing the traffic! I often wish he was still there - but at least we now have a pedestrian crossing further up the road. Also in the picture is the magnificent chestnut tree which eventually had to be removed as unsafe; but whose deep pink candles used to look wonderful in the springtime.

The view down Chapel Hill looks much the same today as it did then, except that the trees in the distance are much smaller and there are no cars in sight on the hill - either parked or moving! The junction of Chapel Hill and Lower Street has seen some changes and mainly for the better. As with the arrival of new businesses the old buildings - one of which dates back to the 16th Century - have been preserved. That particular building now the 'Optometrists' was known then as the Tudor Shop and sold toys, cards and fancy goods. At that time there was a general store on the corner - now D.C. Poulton & Sons, Funeral Directors - called 'Herringtons' It is pictured advertising Lyons Tea, Bev, Will's Woodbines and Goldflake tobacco and in the window are large jars of sweets: apparently the inside of the shop smelt very strongly of paraffin! It was run then by a Miss Stacey and known locally as 'Stacey's'. The book tells us that there were 50 shops in Stansted in 1965 and many of them were in Chapel Hill, Lower Street and Station Road. 'Felicity's', where Goldings is now, was a small woolshop, which also sold baby clothes and ladies underwear and next door was 'Baxter's' the Butchers. Across the road was a grocery shop - J.G. Mumford Ltd. managed by Philip Camp, whose wife still lives in the village with her daughter and son-in-law, Janet and Brian Townsend. Mrs Camp used to work part-time in Felicity's shop. The Mumford family also ran a private car hire and taxi business as well as a fishmonger and poulterer's in Lower Street. John Tucker had a newsagents and confectioners where 'Family News' still plies the same trade and which after more than 25 years is often still referred to as 'Tuckers'. Over the other side of the road was Les Oldfield with his 'Do-it-yourself supplies' in a wooden building which was later replaced by a two-storied brick building. Les retired and closed his business only a few years ago and is still missed by many.

I shall return at a later date to the many other family shops which abounded in the village at that time and to some of the other things that were engaging the people of the area in 1965 - not the least being the expansion of the airport!

Uttlesford District Council

I have attended meetings at which plans for a new combined health centre and doctors' surgery for Stansted have been discussed. This centre may also include a council information centre facility. The options seem to be to locate it somewhere in the Lower Street area or on Rochford Nurseries once that area is developed. Our doctors' practice has consulted their patients on the design of the new surgery. So far there has been no public consultation on the likely location by the Primary Care Trust, which is responsible. Your councillors are trying to organise a meeting in September. In the meantime, if you have any views on the possible alternative new locations for the existing Crafton Green and St. John's Road facilities, please let me know.

We are still waiting for the Home Office to make clear its proposal to site a so-called removals centre for asylum seekers near to Stansted airport. One possible location is on the airport itself. I attended a meeting at which we were assured that there would be no repetition of the problems that led to the riots at the Yarls Wood, Bedfordshire centre, which was burnt down. The Home Office says the design would be much better.

There are many controversies and confusions surrounding the Government's policies towards asylum seekers and other immigrants. Some of the people who would be held at any centre around here would still be having their applications for asylum considered at appeal. They have committed no crime. Yet they will be held in a detention centre on our doorstep. I find this offensive and contrary to human rights.


Nature Notes

At this time of year adult ladybirds should be emerging from their pupae. The presence of these brightly coloured beetles is always very welcome to gardeners as both they and their larvae feed on aphids which can cause havoc in the garden.

There are in fact 24 British species of ladybird, with varying numbers of spots (from 2 to 24) and a few with no spots at all. The 2 spot and 7 spot ladybirds, both red with black spots, are the commonest. The name 'ladybird' is a reference to Our Lady who was depicted in the early paintings wearing a red cloak. The black spots of the 7 spot ladybird are said to represent the seven joys and sorrows of Mary.

Aphids form the normal diet of ladybirds but they will eat other insects and will in extreme cases even bite humans. During 1976 a huge explosion of 7 spot ladybirds wiped out the aphids in southern England. In their search for food, the starving ladybirds went on to bite almost everything they landed on, including people sitting on the beach.

Although the majority of British ladybirds are carnivorous, one, the 24 spot, is vegetarian (feeding on clover and vetches) and 3 others feed on plant mildew.



The bright colours of ladybirds (generally red or yellow with black spots) warn birds and other predators that these beetles contain a poisonous alkaloid and would be distasteful. In addition, ladybirds exude a yellow bitter tasting fluid if disturbed. However, both beetles and larvae can be preyed on by spiders, ants and birds. Predation of ladybirds

by swifts, swallows and martins is possible because these birds feed on the wing and the ladybirds would not have time to release their repellent fluid.

In early autumn, after feeding for several weeks, ladybirds seek out overwintering sites. Different species will often gather in the same spot, possibly attracted to others by the release of a chemical scent. They remain inactive most of the winter in curled up leaves, tree trunk crevices and cracks around window frames.

With the warm days of late spring they emerge from their winter quarters, mate and lay their eggs on leaves or plant stems, often near colonies of aphids. The eggs hatch in a few days; the larvae feed on the aphids and shed their skins three times before forming pupae in mid summer. The adult beetles emerge in late summer and thus the life cycle is completed.

St Mary's Churchyard

The condition of St Mary's Churchyard is a topic which always prompts discussion - some parishioners believe that it should be allowed to grow completely wild and encourage nature, whilst others would prefer to see a bowling green! One thing is certain - we cannot please everyone.

Cutting the grass at St Mary's is a bit like painting the Forth Bridge, as strimmers have to be used - differing ground levels and hidden graves prevent the use of lawnmowers. Our contractors have faced various problems this year, including damage to equipment, and the Churchyard proves to be a Health and Safety nightmare for anyone as an employer.

The Parish Council has therefore decided, in conjunction with the Rector, that weedkilling around UNTENDED graves may be beneficial. It will enable everyone to see where the kerb and headstones are, thereby preventing falls and damage to equipment as well. Within the next few weeks our contractor will undertake a trial spray of 6 or 7 graves to see what the effect is. If successful, we shall have all of the untended graves sprayed at the beginning of next season, making the lives of everyone easier.

Please rest assured that treatment will only be applied to graves which do not have the appearance of being regularly tended.

One of the issues which is most frequently raised by householders and residents in the Stansted Division is that of bus transport which clearly occupies an important place in the lives of many.

Whilst the subject is not new - it was a problem in the 1960s - today it has a greater place in people's lives because there is now a smaller and less efficient service than was the case previously.

As a result, those without personal transportation, either a car or a bicycle, are cut off from access to places of entertainment, the shops and hospitals, and places of respite or advice.

Whilst the County Council does its best to support local bus services by providing subsidies, the rising cost of this mean that only key trunk routes and services can be provided. Otherwise residents are forced to find their own means of movement.

Fortunately, the County also supports the various competing support bus services which, though they do not provide a regular service, do at least provide a service which allows groups of passengers to travel together to the various market places or functions at a reasonable cost. Details of these services, if not already known, can be obtained from Parish Clerks.

Readers are recommended to make use of the service because in a very direct way it meets a need, and also and importantly fosters a community spirit.

Altogether, quite a month. Well done, all.

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
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
