



At a time when war is once more on the agenda, it is worth thinking about religious views on war. A depressing view is that rivalry over religions has caused war and indeed many wars have been fought over religion, or the tribalism of different religious groups. St Thomas Aquinas came up with criteria for a "just war" and several Christian groups are still guided by these.

One of the beliefs Quakers are best known for is pacifism. Many have been conscientious objectors. This stems from the basic Quaker belief that there is something of God in everyone and therefore it is wrong to kill another human being. Life is sacred. Pacifism is not necessarily the same as inaction. Rather than merely opposing war, Quakers are very active in conflict resolution. If the root causes of conflict can be solved at an early stage, conflict can be avoided, and potential warmongers get no support. Yes, this is all very idealistic, but it is also very sensible. In the words of the early Quakers, "Our principle is, and our practices have always been, to seek peace, and ensue it, and to follow after righteousness and the knowledge of God, seeking the good and welfare, and doing that which tends to the peace of all".

Stansted Profile No. 50 Bob Stoddart

On 10th November many people in Stansted will be gathered round the War Memorial in the Memorial Gardens on Chapel Hill to commemorate Remembrance Day. One of those, Bob Stoddart, the subject of this month's profile, has been a member of the Stansted & District Branch of the Royal British Legion for 40 years, serving on the Committee for the last 17 years.

Bob first joined in 1962 and when he retired from business he took over the organising of the Poppy Appeal in 1989 for five years. he was ably helped by Mrs Levy, of the Women's Branch; and the display and collection at Stansted Airport was instigated - at first in the old terminal, now in the new one. For two weeks in November a rota of members man the display from early morning to late at night. Last year's Poppy Appeal raised £9000 locally. This is invaluable for the welfare work that the British Legion does with ex-servicemen and their families. After 1994 Bob was Secretary for 5 years and has been Vice Chairman for the last three years. He emphasises that it is very much a team effort and he is only one of that team.

Bob was born in Northamptonshire into an RAF family; so when the Second World War started his father was on active service immediately. When Bob was old enough to join up in 1941 he enlisted in the Royal Armoured Corps, and from 1943-1945 he served with the XIVth Army in Burma, experiencing hard jungle warfare at first hand; for one period of three months they were completely cut off by the Japanese. The Burma Star is one of his four wartime medals.

He returned to England in 1946 and took part in the Victory Parade in London - in the course of which he met Elsie, his future wife. They married the following year and lived in London until their move to Stansted in 1958.

Before joining up Bob had worked in the Co-operative Society in Northampton starting at the bottom - scrubbing floors and doing deliveries of groceries. After the war he continued his employment with the Society, this time in London doing display work - for which he was obviously gifted, and in 1954 he became a Trainer in Display at Charing Cross College - part of St Martin's School of Art. In 1958 he became Display Manager of the Branch in Bishop's Stortford - hence the move to Stansted. In the following years he was part of the central management team and worked at various branches including Royston, Bishop's Stortford and Saffron Walden, where his long career with the Co-operative Society ended.

Bob and Elsie have two children: Martin, who works at the Welding Institute at Abington and lives with his wife and two children in a National Trust property on the Ickworth estate; and Mary who, after taking a degree, became a Social Worker. But she is now an Anglican Sister at All Hallows Convent in Ditchingham. She runs the Retreat House there and does welfare work in the Community.

One of the high points of a long and happy marriage took place in 1997 when Bob and Elsie celebrated their Golden Wedding in the same year as the Queen and Prince Philip. Not only did they go to the Buckingham Palace Garden Party, but were invited to have tea in the Queen's tent, an occasion they both enjoyed very much as is obvious from the photograph with this article.



Over the years Bob has helped with various activities in Stansted. When his son was in the Cub Scouts he helped every week for two years and then was on the parents' committee of the Scouts and Cubs. One of the activities he particularly enjoyed was coaching boys in the Junior Cricket Club; he had himself been a player for many years, and gladly passed on his skills as a bowler to the youngsters.

Two years ago Bob took part in a British Legion research project. They had been asked by the Imperial War Museum for information about the history and details of all the War Memorials in the country for their records. The Essex County Branch sought the help of its local Branches and Bob volunteered to cover the Stansted & District area - Elsenham, Farnham, Henham, Ugley, Manuden and Stansted. This involved many fascinating hours looking through local newspaper archives going back to 1918, talking to people and taking photographs. As well as passing on the information for the Imperial War Museum, he has kept an album of all he discovered - written up and illustrated in beautiful calligraphy, one of his many gifts. He also ensured that each of the villages had a copy of his findings.

Bob is a man of many parts, and he has not stinted in sharing his gifts and expertise with the local community in Stansted, as well as being a valued member of the British Legion team.

Normally, the summer is a time for councillors and officers to recharge their batteries. However, the Government announcements on aviation (the possibility of up to three additional runways for Stansted) and housing policy (the M11 corridor designated as an area of housing growth) put thoughts of relaxation aside. No one should under-estimate the importance of the decisions that Government will be taking about our area. Consultation on the Department for Transport's document 'The Future Development of Air Transport in the United Kingdom: South East' will end on 30th November 2002. The Council's Response

At an emergency meeting called by us, it unaminously resolved to fight any additional runways and significant housing expansion in the district. Your councillors have:

- organised a successful public meeting at the Mountfitchet School;
- arranged for a referendum to be held throughout the District. Electors will be asked whether or not they support the Council's policy of No Additional Runways. The referendum will be organised by Electoral Reform Services
- appointed a professional firm of public relations consultants, Bell Pottinger, to advise the Council

and are currently

helping to prepare a detailed response to the Government's consultation document.

What you can do

- vote in the referendum. It is vital that there is a high turnout
- write to our MP Sir Alan Haselhurst at the House of Commons. He will pass your letters on to Alastair Darling, the Secretary of State for Transport
- sign the Observer petition
- support the campaign against additional runways.

Conclusion

Neither the Council nor we are against Stansted Airport. We recognise that it makes an important contribution to the local economy. We wish to keep it as an airport in the countryside. What we are against is unsustainable expansion which would blight the lives of many residents.

Finally, we should like to conclude by quoting the words of Mr Graham Eyre, the inspector at the last public enquiry into the airport.

"A two runway airport at Stansted would have so detrimental an effect on the environment, would so affect the character of the local communities and the ecology of the area and would have such implications beyond its immediate neighbourhood as to be wholly unacceptable".

Now and subsequent to the decision of the District Council, everyone knows that, subject to the agreement of the Secretary of State, the number of passengers through the airport will grow to 25 million per annum. Thus this issue is more or less decided. The question now becomes:

> Whether the Airport will develop further: how many extra runways might be provided; whether this development will take place; and even, when the development will take place and in what timescale.

These matters, as all will know, are being discussed with urgency at local level with the intention of letting the Government know what the local feelings are, and to represent the views of interested parties.

So far as the County Council itself is concerned, these feelings are being taken into account by all Members now with a view to producing a countrywide view at debates to be held in the early part of the New Year. This action is being co-ordinated with the views of Hertfordshire and East Herts and Uttlesford District, so a united response and representation is being made for all residents.

It is therefore appropriate that readers let their elected Councillors know their personal thoughts and proposals so these can be taken into account. Unfortunately, in the present circumstances, a negative approach will not be accepted by the Government. Thus, constructive ideas and proposals only are required.

Hospices Trek China - Stansted Appeal

It's a Trek of a Big Challenge

On Saturday 15th June 2002, 18 trekkers, in aid of St Clare Hospice, began their long journey to trek 77 kms of the Great Wall of China. They were joined at Heathrow Airport by 55 other walkers raising money for their respective hospices.

Dear Diary,

Day One

Decided not to wear boots for breakfast, just spotted Alan in his shorts, little legs and big boots. I don't think the world is ready for the both of us at 7.15am. Loaded up the rucksack with seven bottles of water and a mid-morning snack. Nobody mentioned having to carry 3kgs each day.........'

During a short coach journey through the Chinese countryside the scenery soon changed from flat fields to mountains. Although no sign of the Wall, I felt very excited but apprehensive as the mountains looked quite high and daunting. One bottle of water later, the coach finally pulled up at the village of Ying Beigou and our trek upwards began. I instantly broke into a sweat with the heat and 40% humidity. It just hadn't dawned on me that we would have to get to the Wall before we walked it!! Two hours and four bottles later, we had climbed 610 metres to arrive on the Wall itself. What an amazing sight. Just like the photos, the Wall stretching for miles in either direction and we were about to embark on the journey of a lifetime.

The Wall, in the main, was unreconstructed, very crumbly and quite precarious in places. Our first casualty took a tumble and suffered cuts and bruises, fortunately nothing broken. The many descents and ascents were very steep and I had to step sideways down to avoid looking over the edge at a sheer drop. Was that a tweak I felt in my knee? We trekked from watch tower to watch tower and after about three hours of steps my knees began to get wobbly which was a little disconcerting until I realised that everyone was experiencing quivery legs, a most odd feeling which eventually wore off, thankfully.

The final stage of the morning was along Wall that had been restored and we carried on undulating and meandering as the Wall went at Mutianyu. Many went on to take the toboggan ride downhill into the village to a refreshing bottle of beer. What a hard but rewarding and brilliant day.

Day Two

Very misty today to trek to Waterfall Park. Caused a stir with the bemused locals when we began with stretching exercises in the coachpark. Not so hot but still very humid. More water as we began our quite precarious climb up huge granite boulders but with scenery to, metaphorically, die for. About four hours later, followed the river bed along massively deep gorges. Incredibly peaceful. Holding onto hand railings we arrived at a short but very wobbly suspension bridge, made even wobblier by some of the younger trekkers!!

Declined to go to the loo behind a piece of corrugated iron even after seven bottles of water.

Back to Yun Hu Hotel where full foot and body massages were available. It had to be done.

Day Three

Black Dragon Paw Park and another long hike. Again, steep climbs through brush and arrived at the top of the park and looked down at some incredible scenery stretching far into the distance along a narrow valley. The sun was relentless and my water supply was well and truly depleted. Lunch that day was noodles and spicy chicken which went down a treat. Really have mastered the art of using chopsticks.

After lunch we were given the option of climbing up to the wall to experience a 360 degree lookout from one of the highest watchtowers. The climb was very steep and difficult, along narrow, overgrown pathways. My knee was beginning to cause me concern. About an hour and a half later we had reached the watchtower and what an amazing view. The wall with Mongolia beyond it stretched one way. Reservoirs spread out another, just a marvellous opportunity for more magnificent photographs and reflection. My bandaged knee was extremely painful and my left leg was now the size of a tree trunk and very solid. Thankfully it was going to be an easy walk back to the coach down a cinder track. This, however, proved not to be the case. I was now in absolute agony, unable to lift my leg over even the smallest stone on the pathway. Eventually, Dr Shen administered anti-inflammatory tablets and lots of Deep Heat cream and attempted to almost carry me down to the coach. A cheer came from the rest of the trekkers as I came round the corner, leaning very heavily on the shoulder of the good looking doctor, a position I am sure the others envied!!

During the long coach ride to our next stay in Simatai, I had to seriously consider the possibility of not being able to trek the Wall the following day. The pain I was in was excrutiating and I knew that if I did not rest it then there was a strong likelihood that I would be out of action on the last day of the Trek. I had to let common sense get the better of me and, after several tears, resigned myself to the fact that I would rest the following day.

Day Four

Went with the rest of the trekkers to see them off on their way, feeling saddened that I was not with them but my knee was still swollen and painful. Wished everyone a good trek and said that I looked forward to seeing them in at the other end.

Spent most of the day with my leg up to try to reduce the swelling which wasn't helped by the extremely hot sunshine. One of the other trekkers was seriously ill and spent the day asleep in a darkened room. A few others, who also needed to

rest, lounged around chatting and swopping life stories - a good time to get close to each other.

Later that day, we got our boots back on and prepared to meet the others who would shortly be coming into view. We climbed sharply and swiftly to the nearby watchtower and already I spotted the first trekker making his way across the suspension bridge which then led to the final watchtower of the day. The trek had covered 28 watchtowers in total this day.

Waiting anxiously in the watchtower, we looked across the gorge at the string of watchtowers linking the wall. It was fascinating how easy it was to spot various people at such a distance plodding down the last flight of steps to the bridge. Calling words of encouragement and admiration across the chasm we were rewarded by waves and whistles back.

I was very moved to watch everyone coming up the last, very steep flight of steps to where we waited. People were looking very hot and exhausted but exhilarated by the day's achievement.

Day Five

Today is Hospice 'Wear Yellow' Day and all the trekkers will be wearing their specially designed yellow trekking T-shirts. However, many of the T-shirts have by now, been cut, shaped and adapted to cope with the hot and humid weather.

We started off the trek from where the trekkers finished the previous afternoon and earlier. It was lovely and clear. The first ascent was very steep and I was now using two walking sticks. It was slow and hard but we seemed to cover ground quickly, and looking back over the landscape when we reached the watchtower was awesome. At the highest point we had climbed 981 metres and were rewarded with the the most wonderful views of the Wall that had been trekked the day before. The unreconstructed Wall perched along a craggy ridge with precarious drops either side. Every inch of land was carefully tended and the terracing was everyone's idea of a Chinese landscape. Eventually we left the Wall and descended through a farming village and picked up a trail to take us to the watchtower where we were to have lunch, regroup and go down to Simatai as a large group for a finale that was to mark the completion of the Trek.


We rounded the corner to Simatai Lodge to be greeted by a line of Hospice T-shirts hanging over tables laden with sparkly wine, Chinese champagne and the very loud sound of Chinese firecrackers.

A grand total of £45,000 was raised for the hospice, including some £2,073 raised by the residents of Stansted, in support of the 198 trekkers. An amount beyond my expectations!! I would also like to add my thanks to Fred Williams and those members of the Stansted Social Club who have raised £200 between themselves.



Nature Notes

Hedgerows at this time of year take on a wonderful range of colours, particularly if they are ancient hedges with a large number of shrub species. If you spot dark red leaves and



extraordinary shocking pink berries revealing orange seeds, you will be looking at the spindle tree, so called because its hard wood was used for making spindles. The 'spinsters' or 'spinners' (usually unmarried women) would spin by hand using a wooden spindle on which to wind the wool. The wood of the spindle tree was also used for butchers' skewers and today artists' charcoal is made from it.

Although called a tree, the spindle is more often a 15ft bush. It prefers chalk or limestone and in this area can be seen along Limekiln Lane where the chalk outcrops.

The blackthorn (prunus spinosa), by contrast, grows anywhere. It is noticeable in spring when it is festooned with white flowers before the leaves come out. In autumn it produces dark purple sloes, very astringent but totally transformed when made into sloe gin. It spreads by means of suckers, thus forming thickets and this property is shared with other species of prunus.

Wild plums or damsons are all varieties of *prunus domestica* and are probably descended from the blackthorn crossed with other sweeter wild plums. The bullace (*prunus insititia*) may be a true native in Britain. This small tree, which is found in hedgerows around the village, can have purple or greenish-yellow fruits (the Mirabelle) which are quite sweet when fully ripe and make excellent jam.




