The churches lectionary year moves on and people will be saying Easter is late this year. Ash Wednesday is on the 5th March and is the start of Lent and we enter a penitential period as we prepare ourselves to greet the Risen Christ at Easter.

The days of sackcloth an ashes may have past but it is still a period when we should consider some form of penitential experience for the benefit of our spiritual life.

The gospel on Ash Wednesday is from Matthew and is Jesus telling the disciples that one should not make a show of doing good deeds or pray aloud in a public place, but should go to one's private room and pray quietly.

Today we tend to live in a materialistic society and want to have, perhaps, things which we could well do without.

I would like to suggest that perhaps for this Lent we examine what our real needs for life are, go to that private room and think of how, perhaps, we could help those who are less fortunate than we are, spend an extra minute in the quiet of our heart and offer up a prayer for those in need, or maybe find time to come to St John's Church on a Wednesday evening for 20 minutes for quiet meditation and prayer, or, on a Friday evening during Lent at St Theresa's Church. There is a service known as the Stations of the Cross, which is a meditation on Christ's journey to Calvary. Whatever you decide to do, your journey through life will be benefited from quiet reflection in your private room, listening to your inner thoughts.

I found this short saying of William Penn (1644-1718) and I find it expresses the need that we all have for periods of quiet reflection -

In the rush of life, as you have intervals, step within yourself and be still.

Wait upon God and feel his good presence this will carry you through your day's business.

Each time one reads the Parable of the Good Samaritan it seems to throw light on whatever is happening at the time you read it. As I write this there is a renewed crisis and some scare-mongering about asylum seekers - and even (to the horror surely of all Christians) that they might be sent back to their homeland although likely to be tortured when they got there. For Britain to withdraw from supporting the Human Rights Act seems almost unbelievable in a nominally Christian country.

The rules for asylum seekers are stringent, to say the least. As I read in an article last week "the rules were designed by ministers who seem to think seeking asylum is comparable to flying to Tuscany with Buzz". Most applicants arrive with no knowledge of the regulations covering them, exhausted from desperate journeys, with very little knowledge (if any) of English. They need our help.

Inevitably there will be wrong-doers or potential terrorists among them. The disadvantaged and penniless are very vulnerable and more easily exploitable. But dedicated terrorists, drug dealers, gun smugglers, etc. usually have plenty of money to come into a country in a much more comfortable way, and have no need to use such desperate measures.

The Samaritan treated the brutally injured man with compassion and generosity despite him being a stranger belonging to an alien tribe. Can we not try and do the same? Those men and women, and children, arriving in this country from restrictive regimes are much less likely to become offenders if they are made welcome. Last year there was a possibility that a detention centre for asylum seekers might be set up in this area but whether this is still a possibility is unclear. But it would give **us** an opportunity to hold out a friendly hand.

## Timeless Truth

wenty five years ago I would regularly detour through the cloister and nave of Durham cathedral on the way back to college from lectures. It remains one of my favourite places in the country, massive, austere, airy with no decadent baroque froo-froo to interfere with the clean lines of the place.

I was there reading for a degree in theology, and would often sit in the Galilee Chapel next to the tomb of the Venerable Bede, the first English church historian, if I was trying to understand an intellectual problem. Sometimes I would sit behind the high altar next to the remains of St Cuthbert, one of our earliest missionaries, if I was trying to figure out how a theological idea could ever be preached. I didn't expect to hear voices from either end of the cathedral but, I guess I was there to remind myself that I was just passing through, and engaged in a task which others had done for over a thousand years.

All through the year there would be a constant trickle of tourists in the background, marvelling at the magnificence of the place and, occasionally remarking that we can no longer build in the way that our forebears could.

However much I loved that place, I could never get away from how the massive chevroned pillars reminded me of the iron fist of the bishops, who ruled from the castle across the green, not only as lords of the Church but as princes of the

ditions under which they worked, and how many lives were lost while it was being constructed.

world. While I still find myself drawn

One of the best ways of undermining Christian faith is to be romantic about its buildings, and to look for a sense of spirituality which is timeless and eternal. Every building or religious artifact has a human story, and is created out of motives which may be far from being spiritual.

I am told from time to time that I am not spiritual, I am political (as if the world really does divide so neatly that way). My pattern of faith comes from what I see Jesus doing in the gospels and how his followers interpreted him in the New Testament. Time and again, I read that the timeless spiritualities begin with the person sitting next to me, and what my relationship is to them. It is also about people whom I prefer not to sit next to, whom God also created.

The nice thing about praying in a great building is that my mind can be drawn up by the lines of the structure, all the way to uncomplicated heaven. Heaven is obliging like that, it can be whatever we imagine it to be.

The problem is that Christians are called to pray that God's Kingdom will come 'on earth as in heaven', and work to make it happen. Jesus calls his followers to find him in the eyes of the broken, wounded and worn-down, and to ask why they end up that way. If this makes faith political, so be it. Jesus' life was terminated by authorities who worried about the political consequences of what he was doing. Durham cathedral was built to show the world that the local political regime went all the way to heaven.

There is no escape to timeless, disconnected, eternal truth for the follower of Jesus, the truth is always local because we are called to love God, and to love our neighbour and begin, one person at a time, to make God's love felt in the here and now.

Of course there are spiritualities which can free you from the changes and chances of the day-to-day world, but Christianity is not one of them.


I am pleased to say that the above postponed event will now take place on **Friday**, 21st March, at St John's Church, 8-11 pm.






### Nature Notes

Amphibians evolved about 370 million years ago, some 180 million years before mammals. They developed from fish with paired fins which became two sets of limbs, each with their own toes and fingers. They are cold-blooded like fish, that is, they cannot maintain a constant body temperature and are therefore dependent on the temperature of the surrounding air or water. If this temperature falls too low they become inactive. On cloudy or cool days one rarely sees amphibians. Their name is from the Greek *amphibios* (both kinds of life) because they can live in water and on land. They can absorb oxygen from air and water through their moist skin. Adults can also breathe through lungs.

Common frogs, one of our most frequently encountered amphibians, should by now have emerged from hibernation. Some have spent the winter months in the mud at the bottom of a shallow pond, others under stones, in compost heaps or in holes in the earth. On mild, damp nights they travel from these winter quarters to their chosen pond. They prefer warm shallow ponds to colder deep ones, so a garden pond is ideal. After pairing, the fertilised eggs (or spawn) sink to the bottom of the pond, but the jelly surrounding the spherical eggs absorbs water and they soon float back to the surface. Females leave the pond after spawning, but the males stay there for three to four weeks. The familiar tadpoles hatch within 21 days and by eight weeks they can use internal lungs to gulp air from the pond surface. They can be predated on by birds and newts and are highly vulnerable, so that by the time they leave the pond as froglets in May or June, fewer than 1% of the hatched tadpoles have survived to this stage.

Another of our amphibians, the common toad, will end hibernation slightly later than the frog, usually toward the end of this month. On mild drizzly nights they move from their hibernation sites (under piles of wood and in hedge

rows and copses) to their traditional breeding pools and lakes, sometimes en masse in enormous groups. Their instinct to breed is so strong that they can travel for several days and cover over 2½ miles. Males, which are smaller than females, will often grab a female, climb on her back and

hitch a ride. They can even mistakenly grab another male who will croak his objection (only males croak). When they arrive at the pool, the paired toads spawn: long strings of fertilised eggs in double rows are released, often winding round water plants. Tadpoles hatch in 10 days (black with short tails) and by May the half-inch toadlets are ready to climb out onto land.

The draining of wetland areas and loss of farm ponds have drastically reduced the breeding habitats particularly of frogs and sadly their numbers are declining. Garden ponds can play an important part in checking this decline. Both toads and frogs are valuable assets to any garden as their diet includes slugs, snails and caterpillars.

# Pub Profile No 3 The Cock

Trevor and Jean Emery, The licensees of the Cock Public House on Silver Street fell in love with the village of Stansted when they were passing through many years ago. When an opportunity arose to take over the Cock Inn, as it was once called, they jumped at the chance, even though in those days, nearly 27 years ago, the pub was a far cry from the comfortably fitted public house that we all know today.

At one time the publican's living quarters were a part of the bar, and as Jean explained, previous landlords often had another job and more or less used the premises as economic housing. A reference to the 1881 Census tells us that the Cock Beer House was occupied by William Amey and his wife Martha, both in their 60's, and probably appearing much as it does in the old postcard below. It's a very different picture today. The living quarters are now on the first floor and the premises have been extended many times.

An enlarged copy of an old photograph, hanging in the bar shows the pub in its original form, before the later Georgian Style additions were added. Eight years ago the attractive restaurant was added to the side of the building and it has become a much loved venue for regular diners.

The kitchens were also completely renewed and Jean and Trevor are now able to offer a very varied menu for both the restaurant and bar meals. Some of the more popular 'blackboard' meals, in line with the changing British taste, are the Balti and Thai Curries, Spanish Chile and Creole Salmon. Some nights every table is taken and Jean likened the catering to childbirth – hard at times, but lovely when the compliments come in!

In summer it is very pleasant to sit outside on the patio amongst the magnificent displays of flowers in tubs and hanging baskets, which have become a feature of the Cock. Jean and Trevor are justifiably proud of being the current holders of the best Public House Garden section of the Essex in Bloom Annual Competition, having also won it in two previous years and been highly commended several times.

Apart from their valued regular local clientele, Trevor remembers having been host to many celebrities over the years, among them Barry Foster, Geoff Hurst, Terence Donovan, Simon Hughes MP and Brian Wilde alias 'Foggy' from 'Last of the Summer Wine'. They pride themselves on the good wines on offer, varying from light wines from the Adriatic coast to the full bodied wines of Argentina.

The Chairman, Mr Cyril Stoneham welcomed members and friends to the February meeting, and, being the first meeting of the year, wished everyone a good gardening year. He then introduced Mr Alan Gillingwater to the meeting who spoke and showed slides on the "Sweet Pea". He began his talk by explaining the history of sweet peas and how sometimes they are known as the Queen of Annuals, because the seed can be sown and will flower in the same year, although some growers will sow their seed in October for the following year, and overwinter them in a cold frame ready to plant out at the end of March, others will sow their seed in February/March and they will be ready to plant out at the end of April. The plants like a lot of water and do not like too much heat. They will flower for a long period providing the blooms are cut frequently and the temperature is not in the nineties for too long!! If it is perfume you are after then go for the stronger colours, as the pale colours have a lot less scent.

He then said that the National Sweet Pea show this year, is to be held at the Unwins trial grounds at Histon, Cambridge, on the 2nd and 3rd July, and would be well worth a visit.

Mr Gillingwater answered many questions from the members present and was then thanked for a very interesting talk.

After coffee the Summer coach outing was discussed. Several places were suggested and by a majority vote the Royal Horticultural Society garden at Wisley was chosen as this year's outing. This outing will be on a Sunday in July, more details later.

Members were also reminded about the Spring show on 5th April and to begin sorting out their photographs for the Photograph Section. The classes are "A Spring Scene" and "A Form of Transport".



Although the thought of more air activity at Stansted Airport is causing much local concern, it was obvious from the high turn-out at our meeting on 6th February that there is great interest and pride in what was achieved by the Allied Air Forces from East Anglian aerodromes during World War II. Mr Keith Braybrook gave us a fascinating talk on the history of Debden Airfield, followed by slides illustrating many of the aircraft and crews involved.

2003 celebrates the centenary of the first flight made by the Wright brothers and it was evident from an early time that aircraft would have a military application, particularly in Army reconnaissance. In fact, a BE-2 bi-plane force-landed in Saffron Walden in 1912. During the 1914-18 war, military aviation developed dramatically - proportionately, the attrition rates in the Royal Flying Corps were as high as in the Army. Duxford and its satellite, Fowlmere, were developed for training at that time, although only Duxford was retained after the war's end.

There followed a period of cut-backs, but with the rise of the Nazi Party in Germany, Parliament gave authority in 1934 for the expansion of the Royal Air Force. This resulted in the provision of a number of aerodromes in East Anglia, all built to a common plan and with a high standard of accommodation. A little earlier, a plane had force landed on some farmland and it was noted at the time that the site would provide an excellent aerodrome. It was from this that Debden Airfield was developed - the only fighter base - all other Expansion Stations being devoted to bombers.

Debden was commissioned in 1937 as a Sector Station in 11 Group, which covered all Southeast England. The Sector Stations all had Operations Rooms to control their fighters in the air and were provided with hard runways to enable all-weather flying. The airfield was blitzed twice in August 1940 during the Battle of Britain, after which the Operations Room was transferred to Saffron Walden Grammar School. As the Blitz continued on London, Debden converted to night fighter operations. Then as things quietened down, the airfield became an Operational Training Unit, becoming active again as Spitfires replaced Hurricanes, and Wings comprising several Squadrons were formed in 1942.

With the involvement of the USA in the War, Debden became home for the 4th Fighter Group of the 8th Army Air Force, flying first Spitfires then Thunderbolts and finally Mustang; the latter able to escort the bombers right the way across Europe.

After the War, Debden remained busy as the base for the RAF Empire Radio School until 1949, then became a

Technical School for aspiring RAF tradesmen, and from 1960 to 1975, was the headquarters for the RAF Police. It was then transferred to the Army and today not much remains of the RAF's occupation.

Our next meeting on 6th March at 8 pm at the Day Centre will have a more peaceful theme. Our own Peter Brown and Ralph Phillips will be speaking about the Stansted Recreation Ground, and we hope you will be able to join us.

### UTTLESFORD DISTRICT COUNCIL

### Your Council Tax 2003/04

At the full council on 11th February Councillors were asked to approve the budget for the next financial year. The recommendation will be for a 7.5% increase. Although this is higher than some of us would like it does not come as a surprise. The Budget will include £100,000 for the Stansted Airport Campaign and £50,000 for Community Wardens. This year will not be a good one for council taxpayers. It looks as if the County Council precept will be up by 16.7% and the Police Authority precept by over 19%. I leave it to others to justify these increases. The District Council is the billing authority and is responsible for sending out council tax demands but only a small part of it goes to Uttlesford. The B & D charge for the District will be £108.69 and for Stansted Parish Council £46.14. Combined Parish and District is £154.83 At the time of writing the County Council and Essex Police Authority had not set their budgets and precepts.

### Community Warden Scheme

Cllr Robert Chambers, Leader of the Council and Chairman of Essex Police Authority has proposed that the Council consider introducing Community Wardens for the District. Community Wardens are employed in many other parts of the country. They can play an useful role in helping the Police. However, they have only limited powers of enforcement, some of which are:

- a) Detain, for up to 30 minutes, suspects who fail to give details
- b) Use reasonable force to detain, as at a)
- c) Issue fixed penalty notices
- d) Enter any premises to save life and limb or prevent serious damage to property.

The scheme if implemented would cost £300,000 per annum of which Uttlesford would be asked to contribute £50,000. Although community safety is high on the agenda of many residents, should Uttlesford be expected to partly fund this scheme? I would be interested to hear from readers on this topic.

Now thoughts are turning to the question of the Budget for 2003/04 and the rate of council tax to be set. Many will have read in the national press that the settlement from Central Government was, in Essex's case, very bad - an increase of only 3.4%. Hence, in spite of every best effort on the part of Members and Officers, there can only be a proportionate increase in contributions from residents. Readers should therefore be aware of this and be prepared.

At present the Budget will be set at the meeting on 18th February, and thereafter a report will be written for publication in March. On this sad note these notes are ended.
