



Lost innocence

ast spring I went to a church schools conference. One of the speakers began by asking us what we most hoped our children would have by the time they left our respective schools. The responses from the floor were about self-assurance, of being confident about belonging in the world, a spiritual sense, compassion, empathy. The speaker responded that none of these qualities was on the National Curriculum.

Two months later I was talking to a man in a City bar about the future of the church where he lived. He said he was keen to support it because his wife and children go there, and church is good for women and kids. A couple of beers later, he was saying that the church has nothing to say to the part of his life which begins on Monday morning, (he has a point.)

The thing that I can't get my head around is that, what we covet for our children we have given up on for ourselves. There is nothing wrong with wanting our kids to have awe and wonder at the world in which they are set, we want them to grow confident, strong and become fully rounded human beings. We also want things for them that we either didn't have ourselves, or that we once had, but lost along the way. We want a child to be sincere, because in adulthood you can't always be sincere, we prize honesty and candour knowing that, in the world of work, these won't always get you to where you want to be. We go misty-eyed when a child chooses a relationship over a toy, because in adult life we can easily slip into loving things and using people, rather than the other way round

We want all these qualities for our children, without asking how we came to lose them ourselves. When it comes to faith, it's good for a child to know how to pray, while for us it has become a device of last resort, when all else has failed.

It's not easy for adults to sit back and look at how things have turned out. In adolescence we make choices about how we want to live our lives, in middle age we have to ask whether we can live with what we have done. This is part of life, it comes to us all. But fewer of us ever ask about what our life has done to us? Has our life made us more human or less? What price have we paid for the choices we have made?

Jesus looked at his starving, malnourished and displaced countrymen impoverished as their Roman masters appropriated lewish ancestral lands and commercialised them, and transferred the wealth to the cities. A commercial empire dehumanised his fellows and he set about a programme of creating communities where the unemployed and the cast-offs of empire were made to belong, the malnourished were fed, and the sick healed. He said that this was a snapshot of what the world looked like when God was in control, he called it the Kingdom of God, and it was a way of restoring humanity to people caught up in the callous, impersonal commercial machine of empire.

In two thousand years some things don't change, especially if we leave the human ideals to our children. Jesus said we had to be like little children to enter the Kingdom, but it takes adults to start making the world a place where we can each grow to become be fully human. This starts by creating communities where we treat our neighbour as if they were made in the image of God.

*Monze is situated midway between Victoria Falls and Lusaka, the Zambian capital. Schooling in Zambia is not free and only teachers' salaries are funded by the Government; no provision is made for the purchase of equipment, repairs to buildings etc. The object of the Monze Education Fund (MEF) is to sponsor the orphaned children (10 per cent of the pupils) and help to improve the school infrastructure and facilities. The teachers and parents are very motivated and they are currently engaged in making bricks at a site several kilometres from the school for the purpose of building new classrooms, but funding is needed for transportation to the school site. Our long-term aim is to provide support for post-secondary education in sustainable agriculture which will enable students to support their families and communities.

Five years ago a Mass celebrated by the Pope in the Sistine Chapel was attended by a family especially invited from Poland. They were a father and mother, their children and their children's children. The Mass was the beatification Service of Fr Maximillian Kolbe, the first stage in the process of conferring sainthood in the Catholic Church.

Some fifty years earlier, the father of the family had been randomly picked out by the Kommandant of Auschwitz as someone who would have to die in the hunger cells in reprisal for an escape from the camp. He fell to his knees sobbing knowing he would never see his wife and children again.

Fr Kolbe, who was among the assembled prisoners, then stepped forward and calmly offered to take the man's place in the hunger cells. This offer was accepted and through tear-stained eyes, the father saw Fr Kolbe being marched to the underground cells in his place, to be left to starve to death.

Jesus said, "No greater love hath any man than he who lays down his life for his friends". The Church recognised Fr Kolbe's imitation of the total unselfish nature of God's love, and two years ago proclaimed him St Maximillian Kolbe.

The father and the family he had enabled to live through his sacrifice were present again to rejoice and ponder on the great mystery of God's love.

Shoe Boxes

"Operation Christmas Child", a project of the Samaritan's Purse charity, has been sending shoe boxes to needy children around the world since 1990. Each year the number of boxes has increased. Last year 1.2 million children in 15 East European countries received a shoe box from the UK, and in most cases this was the only gift that these children received at Christmas. Worldwide through the Samaritan's Purse international offices, 6.2 million shoe boxes were distributed in 104 countries regardless of their Nationality, Political background or Religious beliefs, and where appropriate, the children are also offered a booklet of Bible stories.

Due to import regulations all items in the boxes should be new or nearly new, and they must **not** contain:

- 1. Mirrors, glass containers, or fragile items
- 2. Liquids, eg blow bubbles, shampoos, bubble bath or aerosols
- 3. Toys which depend on batteries for their operation .
- 4. Marbles or sharp objects
- 5. War related items, eg toy guns and soldiers
- 6. Clothing other than hats, gloves and scarves
- 7. Edible items, eg crisps, biscuits, tinned food or cake, but all types of sweets are OK.

To help with the transportation costs of the shoe boxes, the music group "Charity" are arranging a musical quiz and concert at the United Reformed Church on Saturday 1st November at 7.30 pm; see details elsewhere in The Link. There will be a coffee evening in the Lecture Hall on November 4th to make up the boxes, to which everyone is welcome to come. If you have any items but not sufficient for a whole box, please let Janet Townsend have them by that date, or any completed boxes that you have by November 10th. Thoughts on One World Week

One World Week takes place every October and gives us an opportunity to think about our relationships (both personal and national) with other countries and peoples. The inequalities of our world were brought home to me this year when on holiday in Kenya with our 16 year old granddaughter - in particular on two occasions. Once when we visited a school in the bush: two classes of about 20 children, ages ranging from 3 to 11, in a barn, two or three had pencils, two had exercise books; there were no books or teaching aids except a blackboard, and there were two dedicated (but often unpaid) teachers. The second occasion was being surrounded by young children begging in Mombasa. The gulf between the developed and less developed world was stark and uncomfortable. Our granddaughter said "Isn't there something we can do" - a question most of us ask without finding a satisfactory answer, except putting our hands in our pockets.

Two of the aims of One World Week are "to raise awareness about what's going on in the world - both on our doorsteps and far away" and "to take action to overcome poverty, promote justice and work towards sustainability". We seem rather better at the first than the second.

The Churches of all denominations have quite a good record of helping schools and promoting self-help projects in the developing world, but the problems are more fundamental than charitable works can cope with. In order to get a fairer distribution of the world's resources political action is necessary. Christian Aid has grasped this nettle and works hard to lobby MP's and national and international organisations in order to get a fairer trading system. Perhaps we should all urge our denominations and those who lead them to speak out much more strongly and use their influence wherever and whenever they can.



Quash Industry Rumours about Runway Decisions, Darling Told

Stop Stansted Expansion (SSE) has today (1 September) written to the Secretary of State for Transport, Alistair Darling, asking him to put a stop to aviation industry rumour-mongering about runway decisions - and is asking the local community to do the same by writing their own letters as soon as possible.

The campaign group took swift steps following a news report (London Evening Standard) that a new runway is to be opened at Stansted in 2017 "according to an industry source". The report is the second of its kind in a fortnight and clearly designed to mislead people into thinking that "it's all over" and no longer worth campaigning.

"If everyone can write a short letter to Alistair Darling calling on him to tackle the rumours head on and to confirm that no decisions have yet been made regarding Stansted, this will do much to demonstrate the fact that while we are upset by these rumours, they make us more determined than ever to fight the proposals." said Norman Mead. "Anyone who does write should also reiterate their opposition to extra runways being built at Stansted".

The address for people to write is: The Rt Hon Alistair Darling MP, Secretary of State for Transport, 76 Marsham Street, London, SW1P 4DR. Those writing should send a copy to their local MP at the House of Commons, London SW1A OAA asking him to follow up the matter further. At the **August meeting** members were treated to an interesting and informative illustrated talk by Mr. Louis Drake on "Italian Gardens". Although many present were expecting to see and hear about gardens in Italy today, Mr. Drake devoted his talk to the development of gardens in the area around Florence during the 15th and 16th centuries.

Until the Medicis brought peace to this area of Italy in the middle of the 15th century, the hilltop villagers were constantly fighting the neighbouring villages and states. The Medicis were an extremely rich family and once peace reigned, set about building magnificent houses with associated gardens. Initially the gardens were small but as more rich people built houses in the region during the 15th and 16th centuries, the sizes of the gardens increased. These gardens were very formal, most including parterres with box hedges, and included, especially during the latter part of this time, elaborate water features. Apart from cascades and pools these often had elaborate fountains and objects driven by water power.

Throughout his talk Mr Drake showed slides of paintings depicting how many of the gardens looked when they were created. Unfortunately many have disappeared and those that remain are often run-down due to the high cost of restoration and maintenance. At the end of this very interesting talk the Chairman, Cyril Stoneham, thanked Mr Drake.

On Saturday 30th August the United Reformed Church Hall was once again the venue for the Mountfitchet Garden Club's Autumn Show. As with most recent shows, the number of entries was down owing to the recent spell of very hot weather; however the judges praised the high quality of the exhibits.

The prize-giving was carried out by the Club Chairman, Cyril Stoneham, who had to be assisted by Show Secretary Janet Townsend, as many of the prizes were won by him. Following the prize-giving there was a spirited auction of many of the exhibits, conducted by Brian Townsend.

At the September meeting Mr. Dennis Gifford, Head Gardener of King's College, Cambridge from 1961-1986, gave us a brief rambling, illustrated account of the development of King's College.

King's College was founded by Henry VI in 1441 as part of his scheme to create a college to take graduates from Eton which had been created the previous year. The impact on the town was great as many buildings near the River Cam were purchased and demolished to make way for the building. King's College Chapel was the only part of Henry's plans to be completed, but only many years after his death, when Henry VII, in his will, ordered the completion of the work. Since the reign of Henry VIII there have been extensive additions made, including the Gibbs Building in the early part of the 18th century.

King's College have purchased many plots of land in and around Cambridge since its foundation, including an estate of about 1000 acres in Grantchester. This was purchased because as the number of students grew from the original twelve, it became impossible to obtain sufficient food supplies locally.

Mr. Gifford related several amusing anecdotes regarding the grazing of cattle and sheep on the grounds, including a story about the escape of several rams which were eventually traced in various parts of Cambridge (including one found in a room up three flights of stairs!).

After the Chairman, Cyril Stoneham, had thanked Mr. Gifford at the end of his talk, Club President, David Williams, presented the prize money for the Autumn Show.



A footnote to the Nature Notes in the previous issue of Link:



Biologists from Bristol University believe they have discovered how honey bees choose a suitable nest site and measure the capacity of the internal space. The ideal space (which may be a hive or a hollow tree) is 40 litres; this can accommodate 30,000 bees in addition to the honeycombs. It is thought that the bees estimate the space capacity by crawling over the internal walls to measure the surface area and by making very short flights to estimate the length of the free path to the entrance.

This amazing feat is the equivalent of humans being able to estimate *in darkness* the size of a space that could hold 30,000 people.

A spate of burglaries in our two roads was one of the reasons why we had a street party last year - the other was of course the Jubilee.





The new season of History Society meetings commenced on 4th September, attended by a large and enthusiastic number of members. An old friend, Mr Robert Barltrop, got us off to a good start with further memories of his early years in the East End of London, this time concentrating on the days of horse traffic.

The great age of the horse was between 1840 and the end of the 2nd World War, when there were more horses and horse-drawn vehicles than at any other time. There were several reasons for this - the Industrial and Commercial Revolutions linked with the development of the Empire, involving the cities and the docks; the growth of public transport from omnibuses and horse-drawn trams to Hansom Cabs and Growlers; the replacement of oxen on farms by heavy horses; the door-to-door services provided by the railways; the expansion of military use through the cavalry but also the movement of men and material and the increased use of horses were everywhere, with stables, farriers' forges, wheelwrights' workshops, transport cafés, horse troughs, etc. and many of these old structures are still visible today.

Mr Barltrop's father was a dealer in green fodder - tares, lucerne, clover and rye grass - cutting 300 bundles daily in the fields at 4.30 am and starting his rounds by 8.30, whatever the weather. He supplied stables of all sorts, from small businesses to large breweries and the mounted police - helped by the young Robert from the age of 8 years, a tremendous experience for a youngster. Mr Barltrop gave us many anecdotes of the personalities he met and explained the hierarchy involving carters, carmen, horse-keepers and the like. London was always congested and road speeds were not a lot different from today's.

The use of horses was not an unmixed blessing. There was the constant noise of hooves and rumble of iron-rimmed wheels, stables swarming with rats, mice and flies, filthy roads in spite of the sweepers and smell permeating everything. Disease, largely carried by flies, particularly affected babies, and tetanus was rife. Even the horse-troughs were polluted!

With the increase in motors during the 1930s, the use of horses dropped off but revived during the petrol shortages of the War. Mr Barltrop's father eventually sold his business and retired. Bored after six months, he took a driving job, which he continued till he was 85. I am glad to say that Mr Barltrop himself looks as hardy as his father and we look forward to his next visit to us.

Our next meeting will be on 2nd October at 8 o'clock at the Day Centre, when Carolyn Wingfield will be telling us about The Saffron Walden Museum: "A World of Discovery at your Doorstep".



The Stansted Roll of Honour

The Roll of Honour referred to in the June "Link" that shows the names of the Stansted men who served in the First World War, has now been repaired and framed and is due to be hung in our Parish Church in time for Remembrance Sunday.

It had disappeared from a wall in St Mary's in the 1930s but was discovered last year in a quite disgraceful condition in a locked chest in that redundant church.

Thanks to two firms of experts in Cambridge, namely Brignalls Bookbinders and the Trumpington Gallery, as well as considerable help from Paul Embleton and Peter Brown, both of Stansted History Society, the refurbishment has now been completed. In addition, our Vice-Chairman, Bob Stoddart, has contributed his considerable skills in dealing with the calligraphy needed to complete some of the damaged and missing names and details.

Obviously it is a very important social and historic document. It lists 413 Stansted men who served out of a total male population of 1111 in the year 1911 (the nearest census to 1914).

The Roll has been framed in a suitable manner, not only as a . tribute to these men, but also to meet the necessary stringent requirements for hanging in St John's church.

ESSEX COUNTY COUNCIL

Reminder - Remember that autumn is coming as will come the rain. Are you prepared? It is for you to do this - it is too late when the rain is falling.

Having made this point, it is time to move on to the activities of the Council since the last report, which dealt with the question of the disposal of the remaining Council owned Old People's Homes. Consultation on this subject is nearing its end and a decision will be taken in November. It is important that all are aware that whatever decision is taken, the occupants of a Home will not suffer and will receive the same standard of treatment which they have always had.

Another consultation which is ongoing is that related to the funding of 'home to school' transport to selected denominational schools. Under the current Act this is not a mandatory requirement; transport being provided under the Act for the school in the catchment area regardless of denomination. Essex County has provided transport in the past but now believes the expense cannot be justified. Whilst many disagree with the premise, the price is a charge on the council tax in the coming year which many others disagree with. Which way the consultation will go remains to be seen, but opinions and views would be welcome by the undersigned in order that a proper decision can be made.

Finally, readers are reminded that the new Planning Act is about to become law, with consequences that will remain unseen for the present. Yet, as has been made public, in addition to the current 5,000 houses a year authorised for building in Essex, 200,000 houses are to be built over the next ten to fifteen years. The County is preparing to resist this encroachment - your views and support will be welcome.




