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



#### MOTHER TERESA OF CALCUTTA

Mother Teresa of Calcutta, as she was more commonly known, founded the Society of the Missionaries of Charity on 7th October 1950. The growth of the Missionary Sisters of Charity has been remarkable. Mother Teresa integrated herself into the world, caring for the abandoned, sick and destitute people of all ages, irrespective of cast, colour or creed. She was constantly reminded of her early calling: "I must do something. Something must be done" for the dying and hopeless cases.

The daughter of an Albanian chemist, Agnes Gonxha Bojaxhiu was born on 27th August 1910 in Skopje, Yugoslavia. She was a pious young girl and at the age of 12 she got her first 'calling'. Six-years later some Jesuit priests told her about the Sisters of Our Lady of Loretto in Calcutta and that was it! She was accepted as a postulant at the Motherhouse in Rathfarnham, Dublin; at the age of 18 she was on her way to Calcutta. After 9 years she took her vows and taught for many years in the famous school attached to the Loretto Convent. But all the while she heard the groans of the dying in squalor, in slums and on the pavements of Calcutta, which chilled her heart and she could no longer ignore the voice of poverty from beyond the cloister. Eventually she applied to Rome for dispensation to leave the Order (her Superior gave her blessing, but told her she could return if things did not work out!) to start her own Mission. On 12th April 1948, Pope Pius XII gave Teresa permission to leave Our Lady of Loretto Convent, while remaining a nun under the jurisdiction of the Archbishop of Calcutta. So she was then free to enter the world of the poor!

Her work and achievements are widely known and respected all over the world. A steadfast nun with a very positive disposition, she was "Mother" to all in the slums and leper colonies. Initially she used to walk till exhausted, washing and caring for the dying and destitute where they lay, taking them to hospital, where often treatment or admittance were refused. Initially she was given a house

with two rooms - one for males and the other for females and the Home for the Destitute Dying in Calcutta opened in 1954. She relied on the goodwill and donations from local people, businesses, government officials and other sources sympathetic to her cause.

Mother Teresa also opened an orphanage called "Sishu Bhavan" where deserted children were taken, abandoned through misfortune, shame or circumstance. These children were always made welcome. Many premature babies were left overnight, put in packing cases fitted with a large bulb to keep them warm until they were rescued. They were cared for and specially loved by the Sisters, and eventually adopted. All children were taught to read and write and the older ones learned skills e.g. carpentry, typing, sewing, etc. in schools run by the Sisters.

In the logic of her charity, Mother Teresa considered that the individual was the only true value. Faced with the mass of starving and dying people she didn't see crowds, simply a starving or dying person. Only one. She said: "I never care for a crowd. If I visualised a crowd I would never get started. The important thing is the individual and a one to one approach". She believed - Love is a fruit which is always in season.

I lived in Calcutta in the 1950s and was privileged to help with Mother Teresa's first ever Christmas tree on Christmas Day! My parents were not too happy - their concerns were genuine - when I volunteered to take part in a team to help Mother Teresa, also, our Christmas Day celebrations at home would be disrupted! They were ordinary, but traditional folk, who liked the family celebrating Christmas together, especially meals. The Christmas tree party started around mid-day and went on until about 5 pm, so I would have been absent for most of the day! They appreciated my commitment to the YCW movement, and as we had been approached by Mother Teresa to help organise the event, they relented and gave their blessing!

It was the most wonderful experience! To see the little faces of children of all ages light up; some too small or weak to appreciate the occasion, others with appalling disabilities and / or health problems. For most, if not all, it was probably the first new toy they had received and the first party they had experienced. Sadly, for many it was the last. However, all had a ball; even those too frail to go outdoors were given toys and treats in the wards, which we decorated with streamers and balloons! Christmas is not generally celebrated by Indians, being a Christian event. Not just the children, but every one of the patients who received presents were aware of an abundance of love. They experienced fun, laughter and wonderment on that magical Christmas Day! For us it was great being part of a very special and humbling experience, all the more poignant at Christmas.

Mother Teresa was beatified in Rome on 19th October; six years after her death and the penultimate step before sainthood. A well-deserved tribute and recognition for the nun who devoted her life to caring for the poor.

If pressed to say what we are actually doing in a Quaker meeting for worship we would probably say we were waiting and listening: waiting expectantly and listening in our hearts for the touch of something beyond our everyday selves. It's not always very easy to participate fully in the silence but when we do manage to quieten the busy, anxious, thinking part of our mind, it's possible to enter into a state, not only of peace but also of inspiration.

Edgar Hope-Simpson, a Quaker doctor, who died recently, wrote the following poem "after a sudden, unexpected spiritual experience".

The poet momentarily sees his surroundings transformed. "The word was made flesh and dwelt among us, and we beheld his beauty".

> He saw the heavenly moment come Unheralded, unmarked, unsung. He watched the magic slowly pass. ## WHITE PAPER PROPOSALS FOR STANSTED ARE 'PIE IN THE SKY'

Stop Stansted Expansion (SSE) described proposals for expanding Stansted Airport as 'pie in the sky' following publication of the Air Transport White Paper today, 16 December.

"Governments don't build runways," said SSE Chairman Norman Mead. "BAA could only proceed with an extra runway at Stansted if there were no legal or regulatory barriers and if there was clear market demand. The project would also need to be environmentally sustainable, commercially viable and capable of being financed. The prospect of Stansted ever being able to meet these criteria is remote."

"The idea of a second Stansted runway is illogical and undeliverable," continued Mr Mead. "The government's 'green' credentials are now totally discredited by this White Paper whose clear message is 'to hell with protecting the environment, our national heritage and local communities: planes take priority.' Well - we'll see about that!"

The group is also contemptuous of BAA which has hidden behind the government throughout the debate. It is calling on the company to put its cards on the table and declare its intentions for expansion without delay. "The community is entitled to know precisely what plans BAA now has for Stansted, and the company should prepare itself for massive opposition" commented Norman Mead.

SSE is committed to pursuing a vigorous and relentless challenge to a second Stansted runway which will include legal, regulatory and planning routes, notably the UK and European courts and authorities, as well as the European Commission.

"The phoney war is over and now the real battle begins," said Norman Mead. "It will not end until we have forced the abandonment of these pie-in-the-sky proposals."

#### End of year Reflections

As one year comes to an end and another dawns it is helpful to reflect on the last twelve months. It has been an eventful period for the Council, the highlight of which were the May council elections which ended eight years of no overall control. The boundary changes meant that I had to say goodbye to some constituents and welcome new ones.

Since May there has been a determined attempt by the Council to improve its efficiency and deliver greater value for money. It appointed an interim director (strategy), a policy and performance manager and a communications officer. In an effort to improve dialogue with residents focus groups were introduced. Four meetings were held throughout Uttlesford which gave residents the opportunity of giving their views of what should be the Councils priorities. I attended the meeting at Stansted which was very successful.

In June 2003 the Council agreed a Quality of Life Plan. The five long term themes that are currently emerging are:

- " Strong Community Leadership
- " Protecting the Environment
- Improving Access to Value for Money Services
- " Improving Community Safety and the Health of the Population
- " Supporting Lifelong Learning and Better Opportunities for Young People

It will be now up to the Council to ensure that these ambitions are realised.

In the coming year attention will be focused not just on the twin threats facing the District (runway expansion and housing growth) but also on our budget for 2004/05. Central Government has realised that local government needs more resources if it is to deliver all that is asked of it. At the full council meeting in October councillors agreed to call upon the Deputy Prime Minister:

"To replace the council tax based on income, reinstating the principle of progressive taxation, that the more one earns, the more one pays."

#### **\*STOP PRESS\***

This item is being written just after Alastair Darling announced in the Commons the Government's preference of Stansted for a further runway. The Secretary of State chose Stansted as the Government's first option for more runways in the south-east, with Heathrow close behind. I view this announcement as little more than a wish list and something that is far from certain will happen. They say they want to see a second runway to the east of the present airport operational between 2011 and 2012. But the Government does not build and pay for airports.

The reason I don't think Stansted will get more runways is because it doesn't stack up economically. BAA's investment in the 1980s is not being paid back. BAA has said that a further runway would have to be cross-subsidised from income at Heathrow. This suggests that a second runway at Stansted will not be viable economically and is unlikely to get commercial support.

The Council was due to renew its opposition at a Full Council Meeting on the day of the announcement and the day that Link went to press.





#### ESSEX COUNTY COUNCIL

#### January 2004

It is to be hoped that all readers have had a happy Christmas and that they look forward to having a happy and fruitful New Year. Unfortunately in this respect the New Year promises to be less happy than it might be because decisions taken by the Government are very likely to have an important effect on the environment in the area.

We are told the Government will announce their decision on the Airport runway problem on 17th December. Clearly the decision will not be well received by one interested party or another, depending upon what the decision is. So far as Stansted is concerned, we can expect orerunway: the problem is where and when. it is likely to be within the next 15 to 20 years, but where, rests with the Minister. We shall see.

More importantly the housing issue is under active discussion and consideration at this moment and the County, in conjunction with the Districts, is developing ideas for how many houses should be built and where they should go. Full details are to be published in late January or early February. Readers are invited to take note and be prepared to add their voices to the protests. Probably it is not an issue as to the numbers, which will be decided by 'fiat', but it is the question of the infrastructure - sewers, roads, power, medical support, schools, etc. - which is the very real issue and one in which everyone will have an interest. Again readers must be on the alert to discover what is proposed and end their voices to the protests.

To move to another sensitive subject which will not lead to a 'Happy New Year'; readers should be aware that in March the county must set the Council Tax, which will be based on the Government Grant which is published as at an increase of 5.5% on last year's figure. Whilst this looks to be a generous figure set against the current rate of inflation of 2.8-2.9%, though even here which rate is used does present a problem. What is not made clear politically is the fact that much of the grant is "ring-fenced" or specially allocated and therefore must be spent as dictated and not as the County might prefer. Hence the Council Tax becomes a disguised tax increase!!

After last year's increase of 15.9% it is hoped that the increase - and unfortunately an increase there must be - will be kept below 10%. What the figure will be will be announced in late March. Let us hope the County financiers can meet the target, which readers must remember is another form of stealth tax imposed by the Government, who appropriate the Business rate, on 'e can only assume, to subsidise the grant.

All of our members were saddened for the recent death of our good friend Bessie Blyth.



Our meeting on 4th December took the form of a Christmas celebration, when we were delighted to welcome once more members of the Manuden Historical Society, who kindly provided delicious seasonally festive food. Our thanks also go to Tony Wellings for master-minding the drink, including a hot punch, which was much appreciated. However, before we began socialising we enjoyed a presentation given by Mr John Stock of the East Anglian Film Archive.

The Archive has collected a large amount of film dating back to the end of the 19th century, all relating to East Anglia and much of it originating from amateur film makers. It is generally of good quality but most of it is silent. Until the arrival of the "talkies", there was no standard speed used to show films and projectionists cinema manager's need to extend or shorten the programme! Mr Stock pointed out that nowadays in films or on TV, producers show excerpts from old films at the wrong speed as they believe the public expects this. As we saw, however, the earliest films can appear quite normal and, in fact, the early technology was good, even extending to colour. Mr Stock showed us a varied programme, ranging from trawlers at Yarmouth in 1896 to a Butlin's publicity film of 1946, by way of the fleet at Southend in 1909, a children's outing to Epping arranged by a London factory in 1916, life on a farm in 1924 and several other subjects. We were grateful to him for a most interesting and enjoyable evening.

## Paediatric Liaison Nurse Specialist

## Fran Richards

Many of you will know Fran - a very talented, busy and highly qualified lady, well respected in her professional capacity in and around Stansted, and also in a personal way. She is devoted to her family, Church activities, School, Music, the Arts and other aspects of the village community. Fran also sponsors an "adopted" child and proudly talks of the little boy who writes letters and sends photos to his "adopted family." I felt very humble and realised this lady has a special warmth and affinity for children.

Fran did her General Nurse's Training for four years – three years to qualify and one year as Staff Nurse at Bart's Hospital in London. She then worked a year at Oxford, which involved Health Visiting, School Nursing, Psychology, Sociology, Public Health, Child Development and Horse Riding. She obtained the necessary Certificates and loved the subjects and time spent at Oxford. She was also a keen member of an Orchestra and played the flute, which she still enjoys, and contributes her talents locally.



Fran worked as a Health Visitor for two years in Hatfield Heath. She then lived in Sheering but moved to Stansted in 1976, aged 23 years. She also worked at Great Ormond Street Hospital for a year, where she did her RSCN: a Specialist Paediatric Nursing qualification. She spoke enthusiastically about her work and time spent there. She then worked at Harlow College for a year, lecturing on Child Care and enjoyed that too. When she left, the students gave her a clock - her timekeeping was questionable! She still has the wind-up clock and many pleasant memories!

Fran married about this time and worked as a Sister for four years in Cherry Ward (a Children's Ward) at St Margaret's Hospital, Epping. She loved it there. She took time off to have her first child, returning to Cherry Ward until Emma was one year old. She then returned to Health Visiting, working till 2001.

It was interesting to hear how in the 1970s it was not the practice to access Speech Therapy for a child before the age of 4 years - there were no support services to pick up problems such as Autism and Communication disorders, which were prevalent. Now Speech Therapy is accessed from babyhood, using Speech Therapy for Feed and Swallowing problems, as well as Speech and Language disorders. Therefore, Autism and Communications disorders are identified much earlier now and identification is much better. One of the symptoms a Health infant massage, to help mother and baby relationships.

Fran left in October 2001 to take up her current position as Paediatric Liaison Nurse Specialist, working from 9.30.a.m. to 4.00.p.m. Monday to Friday and, for the benefit of the lay person, her numerous and varied day to day 'Liaison' roles are outlined below:

- 1. The passing on of information to those who need it in order to protect children. This could be information about accidents children have, so that Health Visitors and School Nurses could target accident prevention and offer advice. Common accidents are burns, scalds and falls: falling off bikes, skate boards and furniture, i.e. beds, tables, and high chairs are common! Another problem is accidental poisoning.
- 2. Analysing the reasons children of all ages attend the A&E department, in order to provide the best care and services. For example, adolescents who have taken drugs, overdosed on drugs and/or alcohol and other forms of self harm; they need help from the Child and Adolescent Health Services which, nationally, are very scarce, so by identifying the need, it is hoped services could improve.
- 3. Mental Health needs for teenagers are universal. Fran said: "We don't know people's stories or their family stories - some don't know what pain goes on in their children's lives and it's all to easy to judge on preconceived ideas." One aspect of Fran's job is to think the unthinkable - that adults may harm children -either physically or sexually. Assessing adult behaviours that put children at risk is vital in her work. Also recognising drug and alcohol abuse, domestic violence and bitter divorce battles. England is a country where the legal system dictates that an adult hitting an adult is 'assault', yet an adult hitting a child is 'reasonable chastisement.' "Where is the justice?" Fran asks.

Training Medical and Nursing staff about safeguarding children enables her to link with the Police, Social Services, Health and Education departments in order to work together and share information.

3. When working with families where child protection concerns have arisen, Fran strives to work with parents, *particularly in a kind way*, remembering always that the child's needs have to come first. Multidisciplinary working is yet another interesting aspect of her job, i.e., encouraging people to talk to each other, understanding each other's needs, jobs, etc.

Fran touched on the subject of teenage magazines – how they have to use information that teenagers use themselves. Teenage magazines can be a great source of helpful, non-judgemental information. However, she suggests parents have to check out the magazines their children read. Some magazines are not suitable nor respectable as they should be and neglectful of their emotional needs.

Two further areas Fran is involved in are:

- a) a Steering Group member of the Royal College of Nursing and Child Protection Forum
- b) a Co-ordinator for the CONI or Care of the Next Infant scheme. This is set up by the Foundation for the Study of Infant Deaths, to support parents who have lost a baby.

Fran visits A&E every day; also the Walk-In Centre and Special Care Baby unit in Harlow three or four times a week as well as the Children's ward at PAH, Harlow; she also has links with the Child Development Centre at Harlow. She likes her regular visits to the Neonatal unit to see premature babies and Harold Ward to see children there.

I asked what motivates her and Fran replied: her unsentimental love of children! She is intrigued by the novel ways they can injure themselves around the home and how they live their lives in difficult circumstances. (She is concerned about alcohol abuse and really does not recommend any combinations of vodka, cider, lager and Bacardi Breezers, as all combinations make one sick!).

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#### UNASHAMED NOSTALGIA





The Aubrey Buxton Nature Reserve in Norman House Lane started life as Stansted Wildlife Park in the 1960's. The then owner was Aubrey (later Lord) Buxton, a well known naturalist and one time director of Anglia Television where he produced the famous Survival series. When he left Stansted in 1976 he passed much of the park to the Essex Wildlife Trust, who still manage it and so ensures its future. The photograph shows Aubrey Buxton holding a wounded bittern, one of a pair which he rescued from certain death and successfully introduced into Boathouse Swamp. Most unusually, the bitterns thrived and for some years the male's springtime booming could be heard all over Stansted. Their road to recovery was filmed and became the first authentic record of the bird's movements when making its distinctive call. Although the bitterns are no longer there we can take satisfaction in that these early conservation measures have led to a steady increase in the U.K.'s bittern population - at one time close to extinction.

Over the past two years the Trust's working parties have made significant improvements so that the Nature Reserve now has a healthy invertebrate population and records 22 species of butterfly. Visitors and volunteers are always welcomed. If you could be one of the latter, ring Mike Rowley on 01799 550378. It's actually in our parish!



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
