A Question of Identity

On 4th July, the day of my ordination as a deacon, I acquired a new title (The Rev'd), some new clothes (including a rather fetching collar) and some gifts. The gifts - like the communion set from the three parishes, and a number of books – are mainly designed to help me to do my new job, as Assistant Curate in this Benefice, and I am enjoying them very much. The title and the collar have been giving me more of a problem. As my ministry is part-time, and since I have another 'day job', I have to work out when to use them.

This may sound simple, but it is in fact quite complicated. For example, I had already decided not to wear the collar to work on a regular basis, but is it appropriate for events such as the Vice Chancellor's leaving service, which I attended in a work capacity? Is its use dictated by the day of the week (my usual days on duty as an NSM being Sunday and Tuesday evening) or the place (only within the boundaries of the Benefice)? I certainly felt very strange when I went to the Chinese takeaway in Saffron Walden still wearing my collar one Sunday evening. The title is just as bad. Shall I change my bank account details? I remember that when I became 'Dr', the bank immediately wrote offering us an increased overdraft facility on the joint current account (despite no change at all in earnings). I wonder what might happen this time - perhaps they'll reduce it?

Clothes and titles are not really important, and no doubt by this time next year I shall have worked out a routine and these questions will cease to bother me, but the questions they raise are interesting because these things are markers of a more significant change. Ordination is not the only occasion - and certainly not the most common one - when we have to work out when to wear a symbol or use a title that accompanies a significant life change. I can still remember practising my new surname and title ('Mrs') before I was married, and that for some time it felt very strange - not really 'me'. I have had long discussions with friends about when to stop wearing a wedding ring after a divorce. When a partner has died, people may still feel one of a pair, and have to adjust to being 'single' - in practical terms if not in their own minds. Booking a single room on holiday can be very significant, for example. Many of these situations are times when we are forced to re-evaluate identity. Titles and symbols such as rings are important not in themselves, but because of what they say about how we understand ourselves, and also how others see us.

This last point - about how others see us - is significant. It explains why it feels inappropriate to be known as 'The Revd' at work - where I am, for my students and colleagues, a Course Tutor, not a pastor--yet appropriate when I am walking about in the Benefice - whatever day of the week. This last point - about how others see us - is significant. It explains why it feels inappropriate to be known as 'The Rev'd' at work - where I am, for my students and colleagues, a Course Tutor, not a pastor - yet appropriate when I am walking about in the Benefice - whatever the day of the week. But what about how I see myself? Increasingly, I have been aware - more acutely since my ordination - that social relationships and status (as symbolised by titles and clothes) do not alter who I am. I remain 'Caroline Mary' - a name given to me at my Baptism when I was six months old. It was Baptism, not Ordination, which marked the start of my faith journey and a new relationship with God. Ordination has been of immense significance to me, marking a new chapter in that relationship, and a new ministry, but this is only possible in the context of my basic identity as a child of God. And this status is one that I share with every member of the Church. We are all both members and ministers of His Kingdom, and it is this that gives an identity that survives all life's changes.

In some ways, being part-time and non-stipendiary is an advantage, despite what I have said about the questions it poses concerning what to wear when. For it means that I work for the Church on the same basis as everyone else. Like others who minister for the Kingdom of God both within the Church and in secular life, whether at work or at home, I have to work out what it all means when I am not in Church. These questions are posed for me in a more acute and visible way, because there are particular markers or symbols that attach to my ministry. But the basic questions are ones that face all Christians. How does what we do on Sundays relate to what we do on Mondays? What implications does my naming by God have for the rest of my life? It seems to me that these are important questions that should not go away, for any of us.

Stansted Regular Aid for the Poor (RAP) Tenth Anniversary

Many people see famines and disasters on the television and read about them in the newspapers, and wonder what can be done. Many individuals make generous responses on their own, but since 1993 an organised and consistent response has been made by the residents of Stansted and district through RAP.

RAP, a sub-committee of Churches Together in Stansted, is a scheme enabling members of the public to support three charities which respond to disasters whilst also giving ongoing support through a monthly donation scheme. The three charities are: Save the Children Fund, British Red Cross and Oxfam. The patrons of the scheme are Mrs Phyllis Harrison, Dr Judith Richardson, Mr John Robinson and the Rev'd David Simpson.

Since RAP's foundation ten years ago, over £20,000 has been donated. In times of crises, the monies have been there when most needed. Among the countries to have been helped are: Eritrea, Rwanda, Bangladesh, Malawi and Iran.

There are two simple ways of supporting RAP, by standing order or by monthly envelopes which are deposited at King's Butchers, Lower Street, Stansted.



One of the biggest sources of complaint in the Uttlesford area at this time is the problems caused by traffic speeds and traffic congestion.

To take the last point first, traffic congestion is a sign of the success of Uttlesford as a residential area and, dare one think it, the success of the airport as a transportation centre. How many people have come to live in Uttlesford, in spite of the aircraft noise and pollution, because they are close to various means of transportation which are readily accessible by car? The result is increased traffic and over use of inadequate road systems. Are we in a position to resist this trend or not?

Having made this point it is right to return to the first proposition which is the problem created by excessive traffic speeds which, as all will know, can be a serious matter – though, and to be fair, one more in the eye of the beholder rather than in fact. How many of us really know how fast and how much above the speed limit a vehicle is going? Do we have a speedometer ready to judge speed, or do we just *think* a vehicle is going too fast? Do we truly practice what we preach? The answers to these questions are difficult and not something that can be answered in this article. Suffice to say that the levels of complaint justify the County taking steps to deal with the matter.

As a result a study has been carried out and a set of criteria has been agreed which provide a set of rules for the installation of speed limits in built-up areas in future. These are outlined below:

- 1. Suggests the use of a scoring system as an interim means of determining 30 mph and 40 mph speed limits on local roads.
- 2. Authorises the Cabinet Member for Highways and Transportation, in consultation with the head of Highways and Transportation, to make changes to the scoring system in light of experience; and to make any other technical adjustments to the policy.
- Authorises the Cabinet Member for Highways and Transportation to approve exceptions to the 2003/ 2005 Speed Management Strategy.

An updated strategy will be submitted to the Essex County Council Cabinet for approval in Autumn 2005. Whilst these changes will not solve the speeding problem completely, if they are enforced this should help. It is now a matter for Members and Parish Councils if they really believe they have a problem to approach the Area Highways Office to request a proper monitoring survey be made. Do we ourselves observe the speed limits?

It hardly seems possible but summer is virtually over. There is some compensation, however, in that now the village organisations are beginning to swing back into action and among the first has been our Society. The meeting on 2nd September gave us a good start when, once again, we welcomed Robert Barltrop to tell us more of his memories of times past, especially in East London. On this, his fourth visit, he was reminding us of the games we played in childhood.

Unable to define *play* as anything other than 'not work', therefore enjoyable, play has always been a separate world from the adult one. Robert reminded us of very many games we all used to play and pointed out that there was often a strict season for them, with dire consequences if you played one at the wrong time. Dividing them into active, sedentary, solitary as opposed to team ones, street and school play-ground, the main and inviolate rule was that Boys and Girls did not mix! Touch or He, Release, Chasing, Five Stones, Marbles, Hoops, Skipping, Hopscotch, Tom Tiddler's Ground, Jimmy Knacker's Game and many others were discussed and brought back many happy memories to us all.

Rules of games were well established and had to be adhered to - the one we all remembered was 'fainites' to bring a temporary stop to the game but there was also 'bags I' for making a choice and, most powerful of all, to cover a hasty retreat 'My mother's calling me'! Oaths were sworn (Cubs' Honour) and rituals for making up after a quarrel were well known. There were rules for making up teams, penalties and punishments such as giving 'bumps' and all these helped to establish children's places in the community and the ability in later life to work and live together. Even the great favourite pastime of tormenting adults allowed children to see what the limits of acceptable behaviour were. In fact, there is evidence that many of the games we played were handed down over many generations, the origins of some resting in Greek or Roman times, if not before. One great advantage that children then had was to play out until around 8 o'clock, in the dark according to the time of year, and could wander freely without fear – although parental stricture could sometimes contain the words "Don't take sweeties from strange men!" Games taught social skills, rules and ethics and there is nothing today to take their place.

It was of great regret to Robert – and us all – that this sort of play is no longer available to our children. Toys, TVs and computers are no substitute for what has gone but he was aware that some educationalists have proposed that instructors be employed to teach children these lost arts – the danger of this, of course, is that this might lead to authoritarianism and lack of flexibility in the use of the children's own imaginations. However, Robert believes that, if the opportunity arose, games would reappear, whether by a sort of grapevine or folk memory he was unable to say. We were delighted with his talk, which contained far more details of individual games than I have been able to record here and we look forward to welcoming him on another occasion to hear what other interesting topics he can produce.

When we next meet on 7th October, we will be hearing about a different type of history, as Eric Allen will be telling us of 'Hatfield Forest – a seat of Power'. This will be at the Day Centre, starting at 8.00pm and we hope that you will be able to join us.

Members have reconvened following their summer break which was relatively quiet. We were delighted to be able to run the Playscheme again, albeit only for two weeks. The main issues now facing the Council are summarised below.

Post Office

We are inviting a representative of Post Office Counters to a future Council Meeting to explain the current position and to find out why, it appears, there is little actively being done to bring this vital service back to the village. We shall endeavour to keep you updated through the Newsletter, local press and this magazine.

Health Centre/Doctors' Surgery

Most people are aware of proposals being discussed to move both of these vital services to land at Elms Farm. However, this is not as straightforward as it seems, and there is a lot of work going on in the background, between all the parties involved, to see if this is a viable option - not least because it would require consent from Uttlesford Planning Department as an exception to policy (Green Belt land). The Parish Council is committed to a full and detailed public consultation on the proposals, and this will happen once further plans are received - hopefully in the autumn.

Rochford Nursery Site

The detailed drawings for one part of this site are now beginning to filter through from the developer, Taylor Woodrow. Uttlesford District Council has recently refused consent for the housing proposals as it did not agree with the layout. It has, however, granted consent for the landscaping plans. Technical drawings relating to the Pesterford Bridge improvements (junction of Forest Hall Road and B1383) have been received, but we have requested more details on this.

30 members and visitors attended the August meeting to be entertained to an interesting talk and slide show by Stansted rose grower Colin Horner assisted by his wife, Heather. Mr Horner announced that due to ill health this would be his swansong talk, which would be a look back over his 37 years of growing roses in Stansted.

Colin became interested in roses because his grandmother grew them, especially 'Dainty Bess'. He started breeding a few roses in 1967 and eventually produced 2-3,000 plants per year. Of these about 750 are budded up on to a rootstock and the rest discarded. Budding up allows the rose to develop in one year instead of about three years. (By way of comparison David Austin produces about 300,000 per annum.)

Colin showed slides of several of the roses he, Heather and their son Calvin had developed including 'Flash Harry' (later renamed 'Champagne Cocktail'), 'Braveheart', 'Heather Honey' (not named after his wife but after a racehorse!), 'Forever Free', 'Isobel Derby', 'Golden Future', "Golden Wedding', 'Friendship', 'Bright Ideas', 'Nice and Easy' and 'Helping Hand'. 'Helping Hand' was launched at Hampton Court Flower Show this year and from each sale £2 is passed to Macmillan Nurses.

At the end of the talk Colin answered questions on rose cultivation after which Cyril Stoneham (Chairman) thanked Colin for the talk and wished him and Heather good luck for the future.

For the September meeting Mr Peter Morris gave a talk entitled 'Deep Bed Vegetables'. He explained that his beds are 20 feet long by 4 feet wide, which means that there is no need to ever stand on the beds once they have been prepared. It is important to ensure that the subsoil and topsoil are not mixed. Manure should be added to the beds each winter (Peter uses 20 tons each winter!) and the beds covered in January in order to warm the soil. Peter then showed slides of the beds when in full production.

Later Peter showed stages in the reclamation of an overgrown allotment and asked members how long they thought it took. All estimates wildly exceeded the time taken by Peter - 6³/₄ hours over a three week period.

At the end of the talk Cyril Stoneham thanked Mr Morris for his talk.

The next meeting, on Wednesday 6th October at the Day Centre at 8.00pm, will include a talk 'Spices – everything you need. A culinary trip round the globe' by M. Cleeve. Please join us. For non-members the admission fee is 75p.

Post Office

I am not optimistic that we shall have a new post office in Stansted by Christmas, despite what PO officials said in early summer. The positive news I had hoped for when last I wrote this column has not yet come about. However, the District Council has now appointed a project manager to work with the Post Office and others to try to get things moving. She has been talking to at least one potential operator, but no premises have been found yet. Several ideas are being investigated, but it's too soon to go into detail. I'll continue to keep everyone informed each month, as I am able.

Policing

There have been a lot of mutterings in the press about police manning levels in Stansted, changes to the opening hours at the local police station and about who answers the police enquiry phone. There is one bit of good news, that Stansted is to get its own community support officer. These lay officers have been on the beat in Saffron Walden and Dunmow for a year or so and I have had good reports. However, there is a concern in my mind that these officers may be deployed as a substitute for professional police officers. I have written to the chairman of the Essex Police Authority asking for an explanation.

Housing Development

The regional planning debate moved on in September. The latest thinking is that most urban development will take place around Harlow with housing growth in Uttlesford more in line with local needs rather than John Prescott's major agenda. There will be more news becoming public in October, so watch the local press and this space.

Summer Reflections

August is not a typical month in my annual calendar. It is a time when formal meetings are few and far between. It does, however, present an opportunity to get out of the Council Chamber and talk to people and find out their concerns. It also enables me to enjoy some of the countryside around Stansted. I have always counted myself fortunate to live in Uttlesford; we do have some wonderful countryside. It is, however, fragile and cannot be taken for granted. It coexists uneasily with the forces of 'modernisation' whether it be the airport, the new A120 or the M11. One resident told me that he was concerned about creeping urbanisation. It is a concern that I share.

In my walks around Stansted I have been impressed with the turnaround in fortunes of some of our unadopted roads. This was a real cause for concern with people nominating the worst road in Stansted. However residents, often with the help of the Parish Council, have brought about real progress. Clarence Road, Millside, West Road and Woodfields spring to mind. I was impressed by the garden that has been created at the top of West Road. Well done. Something else that has helped to improve the quality of life has been the introduction of flower filled troughs in Cambridge Road, Lower Street and Silver Street. This was something I noticed in Quendon, which I thought we could emulate.

Decriminalisation of Parking Enforcement

A cause of concern for residents particularly of Cambridge Road and Lower Street is the illegal parking of motorists on double yellow lines. I hope that on 1st October 2004 when Uttlesford, acting as an agent for Essex County Council, takes over the enforcement of parking restrictions in the District from Essex Police, we will see more visible enforcement. Enforcement will be undertaken by parking attendants working for Uttlesford. They will enforce all yellow lines and other waiting restrictions in the District. Drivers who fail to comply with the parking restrictions will be issued with a Penalty Charge Notice. The penalty for parking contraventions in the District will be £60. If the penalty is paid within 14 days of issue, then it is discounted to £30. Essex Police will continue to issue Fixed Penalty Notices to motorists parking at pedestrian crossings and for other motoring offences.

I recently visited Maldon District Council to see how they have coped with decriminalisation since they took responsibility for it last year. Their experience, which I hope will be replicated in Uttlesford, is that residents have understood that in order to keep traffic moving and to ensure road safety there has to be firm but fair enforcement It is important for readers to note that there has been no change in the law; all that will change is that the District Council will take on the responsibility of enforcement.



Contrary to expectations, it being the traditional holiday month, our August meeting was well attended - all eager to hear the exploits of the 'Cycling Granny'! The granny, Mrs Jean Smith, told of her experiences cycling over 17,000 miles on her own across the length and breadth of Britain. She began in September 1991 by cycling from Clacton -Aberystwyth and back - a total of 623 miles, which she did in aid of the Olympic Association and raised £800. By the following May she was keen to be off again and went from Clacton to the Isle of Wight and back, over 600 miles and raising £300 for the school roof at St.Osyth. From then on she was hooked and every year in May and Sept. she was off on her travels, so that eventually she had cycled right around the coast of Great Britain, her longest trip being over 1000 miles. She illustrated her talk with maps of all the journeys she made and a wonderful collection of photographs, which she displayed on two large tables. Over the years she has raised more than £21,700 for various charities and now concentrates on the Macmillan Nurses Fund. Now over 70 years old she continues with shorter trips once a year and raises money with talks and exhibitions of her photos - what an inspiration to us all.

Grant-aided flower arranging classes have now been confirmed and begin at the end of November. We have 18 members keen to take part so that the Christmas floral arrangements in and around Stansted this year should abound.

One of our members has agreed to make a new cloth for our W.I Competition table, using the original sampler made by a founder member, Olive Bunting, who died earlier this year and who had helped to make our beautiful tablecloth that is used every month, over 30 years ago.

Our September meeting was again full, with old and new members gathering to hear our speaker, Melvyn Prentice. His talk ' The Learning Curve, A Horticultural Experience,' began as an experience in finding his way off the A120 and into Stansted. However, with the aid of mobile phones we were able to talk him into the village and even run up the road and escort him into the Hall. Once seated he launched into a fascinating account of his life in the plant world, which began at the age of 15 years. Since then he has gained immense experience working in large private estates, doing conservation work, helping to restore historic gardens and giving help and personal advice at garden centres. He is also a Parish Councillor and has managed to gain academic qualifications in Conservation and Management Planning in the ensuing 26 years.- not bad for someone who left school knowing only that he wanted to work in the open air. Members took advantage during the coffee-break to ask him for advice on their gardening queries.

Seven colourful blankets are winging their way to the Winged Fellowship Trust in Chigwell; we support this appeal every year and, in fact, knit squares all the year round for them.

Several members expressed an interest in going to see the 'Sound of Music' in November, at the Harlow Playhouse, staged by BSAOS. We supported the coffee morning for Aids victims in Malawi with a cake stall - all homemade not from M&S! We have our own coffee morning on 20th October in aid of Essex Air Ambulance Services. They were the subject of a Resolution at our AGM this year and made us all aware of the work they do and their reliance on donations. Half the money will go to our County Headquarters who now have to provide disabled access to the premises. THE HERTS & ESSEX ELECTRONIC ORGAN SOCIETY

This society celebrates 25 years of entertainment in 2004 and will mark this by having our most requested artiste, John Mann, to play for us on Wednesday 20th October. John Mann is an accomplished player of church, theatre and electronic organs and also a brilliant pianist. He is located near Brighton and plays for some of the services at the crematorium.

The club was started in 1979 and was based at the Herts and Essex Hospital Social Club hall. Until funds increased some meetings were arranged with members entertaining. There was a '40's Night', a 'Country and Western Night' and a visit from the 'Pearly King and Queen' from Harlow, accompanied by a cockle supper.

When changes came in the NHS, the hospital had to ask the club to seek other accommodation as the Social Club hall could no longer be used. After much searching it was decided to move to Birchwood High School. The move was not welcomed by the membership and numbers dropped.

Once more a new venue was sought. At this time a new hall became available from Bishop's Stortford Council on the St Michael's Mead estate, with ample parking. After alterations to the ceiling the acoustics were ideal for our purpose and the hall was booked. Our first meeting was scheduled for February 2000. We had a packed hall to listen to Len Rawle, international organist. Len built a house in Chorley Wood, bought the Wurlitzer from the Empire in Leicester Square and built a room around the 2,000 pipes. This is the largest four manual Wurlitzer in Europe and was seen in a TV programme called 'Sublime Surburbia' on 29th July 2004.

Since moving to St Michael's Mead hall our membership has increased and we are now in a position to book top line artistes.

Unfortunately the original President, Peter Kent, and myself are the only surviving founder members of the club but we now have a dedicated committee who run the club very efficiently. We have had the occasional coach trip out to Turners of Northampton and Thursford Museum, where there are collections of large, old street organs. If you have never heard what the latest electronic organs sound like, such as church, theatre or symphonic, it is something worth experiencing.

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

ANOTHER GLIMPSE OF THE PAST





In contrast to our present railings to the Fountain which are in sad disrepair, this view, taken a century ago, shows a quiet and tidy junction. 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
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
