

Triumph and disaster

istening to the news this morning as I drove to work, I was faced with the image of three women - one triumphant, another fearful, and a third mourning a dead husband. The first was Ellen MacArthur welcomed home to enormous acclaim to enormous acclaim from her record setting voyage. The second, an asylum seeker speaking of her wait for a decision about staying in this country. And the third was the wife of one of ten service men killed in Iraq, greeting the return of her husband's body. Triumph and disaster, all in the space of five minutes. In our world of mass communications, these experiences are juxtaposed; we became a nation of spectators, watching others' lives. What does it mean for us?

I find myself recognising two possible responses. The first is to let it flow over me. To listen to the news but to feel little because I can't possibly do so. I have to get to work, turn my attention to other things. Although this tends to be what I do, I have concerns about this response. If practised on a regular basis, will it not lead to a blunting of my ability to see those in the news as real people, just like me? Over time, am I perhaps reducing my capacity to listen and to hear the joy and pain around me? The second response is to become caught up with certain stories and issues. A friend told me that in a radio phone-in programme later in the day, people from all walks of life were speaking of how Ellen MacArthur's achievement had encouraged them in their own struggles against impossible odds. My initial reaction to this was sceptical.

Yet the lives of people in the public eye (even of characters in soap operas) do have an



effect upon us and on the way we manage our own triumphs and disasters. For whatever reason, Ellen MacArthur's triumph moves me less than did Paula Radcliffe's collapse, or Gordon Wilson's response in 1987 following his daughter's killing by the IRA. However much we apparently ignore them and move on, some stories of success and failure 'touch a chord', and peoples' reactions to them become the backdrop or context for our own struggles. Those that touch us do influence our lives in an indirect way, becoming part of a store of collective memory upon which we draw in order to make sense of what happens to us and to shape our own responses.

Of course, our own experiences of triumph and disaster do not come at us in the same way as scenes in a single news bulletin. They are longer and deeper and cannot be shelved just because we need to get on with work. One of the lines from the poem 'If . . . ' urges us to "meet with triumph and disaster, and treat those two impostors just the same". I think that Kipling is wrong to see the triumphs and disasters of our lives in this way. These experiences are not 'impostors', but the stuff of life. They are real, unique and important, and the joy or pain they bring must be lived through. In them, and our responses to them, character and empathy are formed. What's more, our responses - as much as those of the strangers we watch on the television news - have the power to influence others for good or ill. Like me, you can probably think of people who have impressed you by their courage - or fear - in face of personal tragedy or pain.

In the Biblical accounts of the death and resurrection of Jesus that we read in Church during this season of Passiontide and Easter, there are many characters with a variety of responses and reactions to what is going on. I hear something new in these stories every year, and they work – at one level - in much the same way as some of those other stories from the news or television. If I let them touch me, and shape my own responses, they have the power to change my life.

AN EASTER REFLECTION

In Jesus' time hundreds of Jewish families began the journey to Jerusalem, their capital city, to celebrate the feast of Passover. This was and still is, an important Jewish festival commemorating the exodus of the Israelites from Egypt and their safe flight across the Red Sea.

Historically, the word – Passover – passing over or protection, is derived from the instructions given to Moses by God and referred to in the Old Testament book of Exodus. In order to encourage the Egyptians to leave Egypt, God intended to – "smite all the first born both man and beast in the land". To protect themselves, the Israelites were told to mark their dwellings with lamb's blood so that God could identify and thus pass over them. This saved the Jewish family's first-born from death and allowed them to escape to the desert.

So at Passover time Jesus and his disciples set off for Jerusalem too and were soon joined by other groups of pilgrims along the way. There was a special reason why the crowds were so excited when Jesus rode the donkey into Jerusalem. Long before, God had promised, through the prophets, that he would send the Messiah to save and rule his people Israel. The Messiah would be descended from King David, as indeed Jesus was.

At that time Jesus had been preaching for three years, carrying out his public life of teaching goodness, forgiveness and mercy and healing and curing all ailments. He had become a revered public figure, feared by the Jewish hierarchy and Roman politicians alike. He taught a new belief of love and forgiveness. This was not acceptable to the Jewish rabbi who subscribed to a different kind of teaching, or the Romans, who had put the Jewish people down for years.

The significance of the donkey is interesting, as Jesus was unofficially recognised as the King who would lead the Jewish people to victory. It fulfilled the prophesy of Zechariah "Rejoice people of Zion! Shout for joy you people of Jerusalem! Look your king is coming to you! He comes triumphant and victorious but humble and riding on a donkey". It was known that a king who went to battle rode a horse, whereas a king who came in peace, rode a donkey.

Pilgrims who were already in Jerusalem heard that Jesus was on his way. They streamed out of the city to meet him, waving palms, much as we would wave flags today if our Queen visited the city or town.

On the night before Passover, in an upper room in Jerusalem, Jesus took bread and wine and there performed the first Sacrament of the Eucharist. Judas and Peter, who were both to let him down that night, were there, showing that Jesus gives himself for everyone, but only those who really love him can share his life.

How could his followers know on that day that the shouts of "Hosanna" would be changed to "Crucify Him" a few days later? They suffered the torment of losing their Master, where today we know that Jesus rose in glory on Easter Sunday.

How it all began

John Williams was a missionary and with his wife Mary went out to the islands in the South Pacific to take the Christian message. They had a very interesting time but their mission was fraught with danger. John was eventually murdered.

In 1936, recognising the fascination that a nautical theme had for young people, a new organisation was formed by the London Missionary Society and called 'Pilots'. Though collecting money was an important aspect of the work, helped by the launch of the 'ship-halfpenny' in 1937, Pilots was about much more.

A week night programme of worship, education and fun was designed to complement and supplement what went on in church on Sundays. The organisation was and still is nonuniformed and flexible, catering for both boys and girls, aged from 4 to 18 years.

Margaret was a practical Quaker, a good organiser, prepared to take on many tasks and doing all in the spirit of love. Everything she did was done with good grace and affection: however, she did want things to be done correctly and, to use a Quaker phrase, in 'right ordering'.

Stansted Meeting will miss her enormously for her support, her ministry and for her capability. Thaxted Monthly Meeting will miss her not only as an Overseer, but also for her willingness to attend conferences, courses and committees and then producing excellent reports. British Quakers will miss her as she attended many committees at Friends House in London and went to numerous Yearly Meetings.

Margaret trained as a geography teacher and one of her most rewarding times was the five years that she and her husband spent teaching in Malawi. Both their daughters were born there and Margaret retained a lifelong interest in, and links with, Malawi. It was very appropriate that all donations after her death went to one of the Malawi charities she supported. She held a number of teaching posts locally, but for some years before her retirement she was involved as a Care Advisor.



Stansted village will miss Margaret very much as she was fully engaged in village life. She was very involved in Churches Together in Stansted, with Helpline, the twinning with Chevetogne, Shalom, Amnesty and many musical activities. She also organised the Meeting House lettings.

Latterly Margaret was beginning to spread her wings. She went on trips abroad and to visit friends all over the UK. Her interest in geography stimulated her interest in travel, as well

as her desire to keep up with friends made during her life. She wanted to visit many places and would get very animated when speaking of her plans.

She was very proud of her two daughters, Bridgette and Ruth and her four grandchildren, and saw as much of them as her busy schedule allowed. Both daughters were a great comfort, support and strength to her during her final illness.

Margaret's funeral at Parndon Wood Crematorium and her memorial Meeting held at St John's Church on 28th January were followed by a lunch at the Meeting House. A very large number of people, from far and near, attended and many expressed their admiration of and their love for Margaret. Later in the afternoon Margaret's daughters and her sister planted a weeping cherry tree in the Meeting House garden in her memory. In due course this will have a plaque and Margaret's ashes will be scattered there.

Margaret will be greatly missed by all who knew her -a loving, intelligent and perceptive friend, a reliable colleague and a devoted mother and grandmother.

Make Poverty History

Christian Aid is giving its support to this campaign along with the Trade Justice Movement and a host of other charities and celebrities. What's it about?

- Trade Justice
- Drop the Debt
- More and better aid

This year the UK government has an amazing opportunity to influence the international agenda. In July it hosts the G8 summit and starts its six-month presidency of the European Union. So it has the chance to make poverty history.

Tony Blair has already set up the Africa Commission to look at ways to resolve Africa's problems by increasing aid and cancelling more debt. This is good news, but countries must also be able to decide their own trade policies. So the 2005 message is "Trade justice not free trade!"

The series has languished since Rosina Kirkwood retired after several years as our nature writer. We miss her delightful sketches and comments on our wildlife. We would welcome a renewal of contributions, regular or occasional, from anyone who has feelings for the countryside and would be willing to share them. Contributions could be seasonal observations or specific to any particular flora or fauna.

To fill a gap, the following are a few random notes made during February.

Woodpeckers both green, and greater spotted, are making an encouraging resurgence. It may not be possible to attribute this to an increase in old and dying trees after the clearances of 1987 and 1991 but there is a perceptible rise in branch falls in the new century. When they arrive the strident calls of fledglings from the nest are unmistakable. Conversely, owls are a diminished if not endangered species around Stansted, even though there have been sightings of barn owls. The warbler family are mainly summer visitors but there is a local pair of blackcaps which have decided to brave the winter. Also redwings made a brief appearance in

Nature Notes

January. Bats are less numerous nationally and even pipistrelles are seen in smaller numbers in the village but we can take comfort that natterers, short- and long-eared, are in the parish.

Our native Daphne (D. laureola) is classed as common which means widespread, but it is localised. We are fortunate to have at least one private woodland where it grows. Our indigenous snowdrop is having a good year but what of its associate the wood anemone? The impression is of a decline but this may not be reflected in a wider survey. Watch for them in March.

A curious phenomenon is that while there is growing urbanisation, the numbers of deer, foxes and badgers seem to be increasing. Roadside badger casualties are seen most weeks, while foxes are as much urban as rural. The alien muntjac continues to be the scourge of garden crops and shrubs as many residents can testify.

Please let 'Link' know of any observations you may have made. Without a natural history society our magazine can become your forum.



STANSTED EXPANSION PLANS THROWN INTO CONFUSION

Historic High Court Decision

In an historic decision announced by the High Court Friday 18th February 2005) the Government's proposal, as set out in its Air Transport White Paper, for a new runway at Stansted Airport has been declared unlawful as a consequence of the Government's failure to conduct a proper consultation on alternative options.

This is the first time ever that the High Court has allowed a Judicial Review challenge to a Government White Paper and although today's judgement by Mr Justice Sullivan stops short of overturning the Government's controversial airports policy, it has delivered a major setback to BAA's ambition to build a second runway at Stansted by 2011/12.

It is uncertain what will happen next but it is clear is that alternative options for a second runway at Stansted – all of which are on a smaller scale than the option proposed in the White Paper and were rejected by the Government three years ago – must now be put back into play.

Peter Sanders, Chairman of Stop Stansted Expansion (SSE) described the decision as "a vindication of what we have said all along about the White Paper being fundamentally flawed and an important milestone in our battle to prevent BAA from ever building a second runway at Stansted."

"However," continued Mr Sanders, "the High Court decision has the perverse effect of creating even more uncertainty for the local community in the foreseeable future. Fairness demands that the Government should now completely withdraw its support for major expansion at Stansted and that BAA should also do the decent thing and publicly announce that it will not be proceeding with its plans for a second runway. We will be exploring every avenue for taking today's judgement even further, including examining the scope for appeal against certain aspects of the Court decision which still leave the threat of a second runway, in some shape or form, hanging over us."

Today's 109 page High Court judgement throws up a host of anomalies, for example:

Not even a preliminary environmental assessment has been carried out on the other four options which have now been put back into play. This may bein breach of EU environmental legislation.

- Mr Justice Sullivan did not uphold the challenge on commercial viability because, in his view, the Government dealt with this in respect of the option put forward in the White Paper [but see Notes 1 and 2 below]. However, none of the other four options which have now been put back into play has been assessed for commercial viability.
- BAA is currently operating a home purchase scheme for about 100 householders whose homes would be bulldozed if a second runway were to be built 2.5 kilometres to the east of the existing runway, as proposed in the White Paper, and another (lesser) compensation scheme to assist the owners of about 500 very severely blighted properties in the immediate vicinity of the runway that was originally proposed. However, with four other runway options now back in play, including options to the north west and to the south west of the existing runway, there is now a real risk that blight and uncertainty will affect a far wider area.

"It's complete muddle and confusion," said Peter Sanders "and all because the Government and BAA believed they could railroad through these half-baked proposals without proper regard for the legal procedure and without proper regard for the local community. Once again they have leaveed that the communities around Bishop's Stortford, Denmow, Saffiron Walden, Stansted and Thaxted have had enough; we are not the soft touch that they expected."

Notes.

- 1) The judgement includes some scathing criticism of the Government for its lack of candour during the proceedings, including a warning from Mr Justice Sullivan that the Government "should remember that the obligation to tell the truth does not mean that the Court need only be told so much of the truth as suits the Department's case, and that inconvenient parts of the truth may be omitted from their evidence." The Judge's criticism referred in particular to the fact that the Government withheld evidence of very serious Treasury concerns over the commercial viability of a second Stansted runway and the fact that "to put it mildly" the CAA was "not encouraged, to say the least" about the prospects of a second Stansted runway being viable.
- 2) SSE will be considering the scope for appeal on the commercial viability issue as a means of building on the success achieved in other aspects of the Court judgement and based on SSE's public commitment to leave no stone unturned in opposing BAA's plans for a second Stansted runway.



Although not a large village, we all know that Stansted has had prominent historical connections from at least the days of the Normans. At our February meeting we heard from Rosalind and Roger Peck about more recent events when the village was involved in helping to relieve a scourge which had been causing death and suffering for at least four thousand years — tuberculosis.

Ros explained that by the late 19th century the disease had reached its most dangerous, and between 1850 and 1950 half a million people had died of it in this country alone. A German scientist, Dr Robert Koch, stated at a congress in Berlin in 1890 that he had discovered a means of studying the organism, which appeared in two basic strains, one affecting animals and the other humans. At a further congress in Berlin in 1899, Dr Koch said that a test had been established to determine which herds of cattle were affected. Worldwide activity followed, and in this country the Medical Officers of Health urged the government into action. Means of eliminating the infected meat from human consumption were sought, but even more dangerous was the risk from milk. However, pandemonium followed a further statement by Dr Koch that, contrary to general belief, humans could not catch the animal form of TB. Another congress was then held in London in 1901 from which it was determined to set up a Royal Commission to oversee laboratories near the sources of disease, to give detailed and prolonged study into the problem of discovering just how much of a risk bovine TB was to humans.

As a result, Sir James Blyth offered two of his farms in Stansted where the laboratories could be set up – Blythwood Farm and Walpole Farm. Ros gave us fascinating detail of their establishment, the personalities involved and all the trials and tribulations they experienced in their work, which involved not only cattle and sheep but also more exotic animals such as monkeys. The work progressed for six and a half years, and in its second report in 1907 the Royal Commission was able to refute the assertion by Dr Koch and prove that infected milk did cause TB, particularly in young children. A final report was made in 1911 winding up the work but the farms had been handed back to Lord Blyth in 1909 and laboratory equipment redistributed for other use.

Roger then explained what happened in the world following the publishing of the Report. Governments tried to exercise control of the distribution of unpasteurised milk with greater or lesser degrees of success – it was not until 1964 that treatment of all milk was made compulsory in this country! Included in Lloyd George's National Health Insurance Act of 1911 was the establishment of the Medical Research Council - the first government-funded organisation to pursue research into health matters. Since then, many important discoveries have been made through the MRC, and 12 scientists working for it have received Nobel Prizes – and it all started in Stansted! It was in the US, however, that the discovery of streptomycin brought the first cure for the disease.

Our meeting on 3rd March will take us to the seat of Government, when Peter Lawrence will be telling us of 'The Hidden Treasures of Whitehall – part 1'. We do hope you will be able to join us.

ESSEX COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT

February 2005

Following the report of January, the county has now decided on its Council Tax charge for the coming year which is set at an increase of only 2.9%. This is a considerable reduction from the previous year's charge [2004/05] which was 4.7%. The decision means that the increase in the tax will only be about 50p per week on the Band D rate and there will be no reduction in services. The actual charges for the coming year are shown below:

Band A	up to £40,000	£611.82
Band B	£40,000 to £52,000	£713.79
Band C	£52,001 to £68,000	£815.76
Band D	£68,001 to £88,000	£917.73
Band E	£88,001 to £120,000	£1,121,67
Band F	£120,001 to £160,000	£1,325.61
Band G	£160,001 to £320,000	£1,529.55
Band H	more than £320,000	£1,835.46

Some will say that this small increase is due to the increased Government grant for this year but this is not the case. The grant has not been sufficient to meet the target set (which was an increase in tax of 5%). The reduction is due to careful management and sensible disposal of under used or unwanted assets over the past year; a practice which will be applied and followed in 2006/07.

In spite of the low tax figure set as mentioned above, the county intends to spend in the coming year some £70 million – of which £20 million is 'new money' – on road and transport systems, to catch up on what has been a much neglected area over the last few years. In addition an increase of 5.5% in cash will be allotted to schools. Thus there will be more funds available in this crucial area. Readers will, it is hoped, take note of these figures and look forward to noting many improvements in services in the coming year.


Perhaps somebody responsible could answer the following questions:

NEWS FROM MERCER AND HUGHES

Mercer and Hughes has now been part of Stansted life for nearly 10 years. We took over the surgery on the Cambridge Road from Captain Davies when he retired and have extensively modernised, extended and refurbished the entire building. Although it may look like an ordinary house from the outside, inside, as well as the consulting room, reception and waiting areas, we have a large prep room, operating theatre, radiography room and kennel area. In fact one visitor remarked that it was a bit like a tardis! All this space allows us to do all the routine operations and x-rays on the premises, so although we are a branch surgery of our main hospital practice at Saffron Walden, we are pretty self-sufficient. If an animal did need a major operation or intensive care, we can always transfer them to Saffron Walden to be cared for by the team of veterinary surgeons and nurses there. This happened recently when a labrador escaped from his owner, ran out into the road and was hit by a car. The unlucky dog then got up and ran on, only to be hit by a motorbike that had swerved to avoid the car! Despite a dislocated hip and extensive lacerations requiring over 200 stitches, I'm pleased to say he made a full recovery. There is a nurse on the premises at Saffron Walden 24 hours a day to look after the in-patients and a vet on duty 24 hours a day, 365 days a year to cope with any emergencies that may arise out of hours.

We are extremely lucky to have wonderful staff at Stansted. I'm sure some of you will have met Sally our daytime receptionist and Jan our evening receptionist, who has lived in Stansted for many years. Many people don't realize that we are actually open all day from 8.30am to 7.00pm Monday to Friday and Saturday mornings, and Sally and Jan will always be happy to see you if you need to drop by and pick up pet food or worm and flea preparations. During the day we also have a member of our nursing team at the surgery who will be happy to give general advice free of charge. Nurse clinics are held in the afternoons, where routine procedures such as worming your cat (not always an easy task!), claw clipping and micro-chipping can be carried out. We even have a dog and cat version of weight watchers for the plumper pet! As well as conventional medicine I am also a holder of a diploma in homeopathy so can offer a range of holistic treatments and advice for your pets.

Stansted people have made us feel very welcome over the last 10 years and we have a number of regular and loyal clients who have helped us settle in. Sometimes, even when elderly pets have been put to sleep, their owners still drop by for a chat now and then, which is wonderful. Veterinary medicine is certainly a challenging and interesting job. We are a mixed practice, which means we treat farm animals and horses as well as small animals. The proportion of farm work is declining but is more than made up for by the increase in keeping small pets such as rabbits, guinea pigs, lizards, snakes and even spiders! It presented quite a diagnostic challenge when I was asked to identify what was wrong with a poorly tarantula recently! You can't always be sure what you are taking on; one lady came in with a shoebox with what she thought was a hamster that she had found by the side of the road. Thinking it had escaped from somewhere, she took it home and raised it, but started getting a little concerned when it grew bigger and bigger and the hairless tail grew longer and longer! Needless to say the baby rat that she had

found was quite tame by that stage and made a wonderful pet for several years! It is certainly true that as a vet no two days are ever the same and you can never be sure what will walk, hop or even slither through the door in the morning.

Lighting Columns

We are aware of several problems with street lights at the moment - not least some of those on Chapel Hill which appear to go off as you walk past them, and come on again a few seconds later! The electricity board is investigating this particular problem.

We have encountered difficulties once again with our lighting maintenance contractors who have not been responding to our fault reports within the agreed timeframe. We are currently obtaining quotations from alternative contractors and hope that it will not be too long before a new contract is agreed. In the meantime, the old contractor is meant to be attending to our faults, but this is not done as quickly as we would like.

If you notice a street light which is not working, or alternatively which is alight during the day, please let us know by calling or e-mailing with the column number and street name. If you cannot clearly read the column number, please give us additional information such as "outside house number ...". If we do not have specific information, we cannot process the fault report. Thank you for your help.

Annual Parish Meeting

A reminder that this meeting, to be held at the United Reformed Church on Wednesday 16th March at 8.00pm, is your opportunity to come and voice your pleasures/concerns/complaints about the village. In early March you will receive, through your door, the paperwork for the meeting to include the agenda, minutes from last year, Chairman's report, accounts and budget report. We are hoping that a member of the Regional Assembly will be present to talk about the East of England Plan which is currently out for consultation. The Parish Council will have submitted its comments before the Parish Meeting, but it is an opportunity for parishioners to be informed about the proposals and to ask questions.

Resolutions can be proposed at the meeting, and it is helpful if we are made aware of these beforehand in order that answers can also be provided on the night. If any resolution cannot be answered on the night, the proposer will receive a written response after the meeting. Resolutions passed at the meeting are not binding upon the Council, and are usually discussed the following week at a full Council meeting.

Rochford Nursery Development

You will no doubt be aware that significant work has been undertaken on trees and scrub at the junction of Forest Hall Road and the B1383 - Pesterford Bridge. We have asked the Highways Department for further information regarding a start date for the bridge works, but as we go to print this has not been received.

The developers have lodged an appeal with the Secretary of State following Uttlesford's refusal of their planning application for the layout of the houses. There are concerns primarily, we believe, over the way in which car parking has been allocated in private courtyard areas behind the houses the police have commented that they do not support this design as it can lead to hotspots for criminal activities.

Lower Street Car Park

The resurfacing of the coach park has now been completed at the expense of Uttlesford District Council. In time, the recycling containers will be moved into this area, and the Parish Council has agreed to erect some form of screening, hopefully with planting, to improve the visual aspect.

On the subject of recycling, we are pleased to report that from April this year, we are to be given a weekly service for the three recycling containers at the weekends. Last year the service was fortnightly, but thanks to regular use by parishioners, and Uttlesford's need to meet recycling targets, this will be weekly from the start of the new financial year.

Thirty-four members and visitors attended the January meeting and were entertained by Mrs Christine Middleton who gave an illustrated talk entitled 'Some European Gardens'. Mrs Middleton explained the slides she would be showing were taken during family holidays and were mainly of French gardens. The gardens shown included the following:

Villandry, which is on a tributary of the River Loire, is a large chateau with gardens originally laid out in the 16th century and recreated by the current owner last year. One of the main features is the potager in which were grown newly introduced (and therefore highly prized) vegetables. The chateau at Angers dates back to the 17th century and is famed for its carpet bedding, which is planted in what was originally a moat. An unusual feature was the use of pink and white ornamental cabbages in the carpet bedding.

Canon is an 18th century house with the gardens being a mix of formal French and landscaped English.

Parc Floral de la Court d'Aron, near La Rochelle, enjoys a temperate climate and this allows both Mediterranean and northern European plants to be grown.

Most people know of **Giverny**, as this is Monet's garden. The public park in **Avranches** is a 20th century creation and this also is famed for its carpet bedding.

Between Nice and Monaco is the early 20th century Villa **Ephrussi de Rothschild** that is noted for its fountains, which are synchronised with music.

Mrs Middleton also showed slides of Holland - Keukenhof, which is mainly a magnificent showcase for Dutch bulb growers and is therefore at its best in spring, and of Floriade 1992. A Floriade is held every 10 years and includes exhibits by the major Dutch horticultural firms as well as many foreign countries. The Floriade are open all summer and therefore many of the beds containing massed annuals have to be replanted several times during this period.

The Chairman, Cyril Stoneham, then thanked Mrs. Middleton for her talk and excellent photographs.

The next meeting, on Wednesday 2nd March at the Day Centre at 8.00pm will include a talk by Mr. Tony Powell entitled 'Autumn Colour'. You are invited to join us. For non-members the admission fee is 75p.



Present and even past parents will remember primary school parents' evenings as significant events in the school year, when they have the opportunity to hear about their child's progress. These are essential and valuable to both parents and teachers, but often happen in a busy, rushed environment, at the end of a long day of teaching. This term in St Mary's we are trialling a different approach, to try to provide a more professional consultation with our parents: each class teacher is having a reasonable working day in which to discuss the children's progress with their parents. Of course, their class still needs teaching - which is where I come in! Parents' evaluations will tell us how well it has worked for them, but so far teachers are finding the new arrangements a great improvement. To give privacy and status to parent consultations, the discussions have been taking place in my office. So this gives me an extra excuse for not tackling the ever-increasing mountain of paperwork. (Yes, the media is right about this!) But the real bonus for me is a chance to spend the planned day with each of our classes, in order of age from the youngest to the oldest.

I have started with the biggest challenge for me, as a junior-trained teacher: a day with Willow class (Reception and Year 1 children). But I had a fantastic day with the children and gained a great deal of insight into the learning of our 4 and 5 year olds – and it highlighted for me how hard teachers of younger children have to work to make it meaningful. I was relieved that our own skilled practitioner was going to follow my efforts on teaching subtraction!

As I have worked with progressively older children in the last couple of weeks, I have felt more within my comfort zone – and had more sleep on the preceding night! However, the experiences have not been so different:

- § Children of all ages love learning and are becoming better at thinking about their learning and becoming reflective learners. As a school, we have worked very hard on developing everyone's perception of learning and it has been exciting to see that really happening.
- § Our excellent adult support makes a huge difference. Children of widely differing abilities are all catered for and encouraged to learn at the appropriate rate for them.

As a headteacher, I think it's important to know all our children and I like to spend lots of time with them, but find that isn't always possible with other demands, so this has been a great opportunity to remind myself about what an exciting journey it is being a teacher and experiencing children's learning at first hand.



UTTLESFORD DISTRICT COUNCIL

East of England Plan



For Uttlesford, the plan is proposing 8,000 houses. Plans are already going ahead for 5,350 new homes in the district such as the Rochfords development. This leaves a balance of 2,650 new homes. My colleagues in Dunmow are concerned about the way that their town has been targeted for extra housing growth. Suzanne Walker of the Council for the Protection of Rural England has urged everyone to become involved in the consultation. She warned that "if we are not careful we could wake up and find ourselves living in the suburbs of London".

It is not just what is being proposed for Uttlesford that should concern us. In East Hertfordshire 20,800 new homes are being proposed. Ten thousand homes to be built on greenfields north of Harlow and 2,000 homes on the outskirts of Bishop's Stortford. Such proposals would have significant effects on the infrastructure which we and they share; for example schools in Bishop's Stortford, increased pressure on our roads and train service and also upon Princess Alexandra Hospital in Harlow. East Herts Council Leader states that the "proposals are flawed, based on flawed thinking and have been pushed through a deeply flawed and undemocratic process. The options are both unsustainable and illogical". They have published a leaflet 'speakup eastherts'. More information is available on their website www.eastherts.gov.uk.

Some councils such as Harlow have come out in favour of the Regional Plan. Their joint leader mentions a recently published Halifax bank survey. This states that first-time buyers can't afford a home in 92% of UK towns. Combine that, she says, with the growing waiting list for a council home and it "becomes obvious that we can't go on as we are, and that we need to provide affordable homes to meet the needs of our community".

A copy of the regional plan is available for consultation at Stansted Library. If you wish to comment on the Plan you have up until 16th March to do so. You can comment on-line at www.eera.gov.uk. Alternatively, you can write to East of England Regional Assembly at Flempton House, Flempton, Bury St Edmunds IP28 6EG.

Council Budgets

Provisionally, the Council is considering a 4.5% increase in the council tax for the coming financial year. The council has taken on new responsibilities placed upon us by the Government, but with no extra funding to deal with them. When readers receive their council tax bills next month, it is important to remember that although the District is the billing authority most of what it collects goes to other bodies, e.g. County Council, Police Authority and Parish Councils.

Pensioners Guide

The council tax can hit those on fixed incomes particularly hard. There may be help available. The Government estimates that four out of ten pensioners are still failing to apply for council tax benefit, which could on average cut their bills by £426. This is in spite of the fact that since the introduction of the Pension Credit many more pensioners have become eligible. The Pensioners' Guide provides valuable advice on all the help and entitlements available to pensioners. The publication is free and can be obtained at the District Council offices or by contacting the order line on 0845 6065065. If you think you are eligible for a reduction in council tax or possibly some assistance with housing benefit for rent payments you should contact Sue Ellis at the Council on 01799 510340. A home visiting service can also be provided to assist with completion of the claim forms.

Remembering the Holocaust

Alan Dean as Leader of the Council planted a yew tree in the Maze of Bridge End Gardens, Saffron Walden. The setting is perfect for quiet and thoughtful contemplation of that awful event. I visited Poland last year on a European Young Entrepreneurs visit, and took the opportunity of taking students from Italy, Poland, Slovakia and the UK to Auschwitz. I thought it was important that young people should be aware of what happened 60 years ago.




