

Why is Science Fiction so popular?

With imagination, a plausible storyline and special effects, we glimpse what might be. A common plot involves time travel. They are warned never to take action in the past that can change things in their time. The classic conundrum: what happens if I go back in time and kill my grandfather? If I kill him, I would cease to exist. So how can I kill him in the first place?

This reveals crucial truth – Actions have Consequences. How will my existence, my thoughts and my actions affect the future? Good or bad? I know someone who terminated her music education because of an unkind word by a Rector – 40 years ago! There is something strange going on today. Modern society is divorcing actions from consequences. It works like this. We claim individual freedom of action but society is increasingly seen as responsible for the consequences.

Teenagers have always been prone to this – seeking benefits of adulthood but avoiding as much as possible the responsibilities! But it is becoming our nation's mindset. For example: 500 abortions every day last year. This is not down to women alone, but also men refusing to recognise their responsibilities.

"Make a tree good and its fruit will be good, or make a tree bad and its fruit will be bad, for a tree is recognised by its fruit." Matthew 12:33

Conscience and the State

After a recent conference, I found myself reflecting on how, in many ways, our lives are increasingly subject to control, regulation and intervention by the State. We are told this is for our own good. The threat of terrorism is part of it, of course, and that is why it has now been suggested that the police should have powers to stop anyone in the street, and demand to know who they are and what they're up to. Prosecution and a £5,000 fine could face anyone not playing ball. Identity cards, efforts to further extend detention of terror suspects without charge, the almost covert introduction of what could become a national DNA database, and the ever increasing surveillance of people wherever they meet are just a few other examples of how our lives are not entirely our own.

All of us should be grateful for the freedom, protection and opportunities afforded to us by the State. For that reason it is right that people should pay their taxes, keep laws and conduct themselves as responsible citizens. However, laws do not make morals. What is illegal may be immoral but what is immoral may be legal. By the same token what is moral may be illegal, for example staging peaceful protests at military bases or not paying the proportion of one's tax that goes on military weapons. Increasingly we may be faced with hard decisions about whether some laws or regulations offend against our sense of who we really are and how we want to live our lives in order to uphold our personal integrity. Then it may be a very difficult issue of conscience to decide exactly what to do next.

South Africa - Awesome Beauty - Fragile Hope! Think for a moment how you imagined the apartheid problem in South Africa would be resolved back in say 1980! Does the word 'bloodbath' spring to mind? Isn't it a miracle that a peaceful solution was achieved? (However, 50,000 people died during transition but at least not millions!) In the days of apartheid Stuart and Brenda Veitch were active in the campaign to shame the South African government into reform. Because the memories of the injustices of those days were still uncomfortable, South Africa was not top of their list when it came to seeking a holiday destination. However, it was difficult to refuse when a trip to coincide with their wedding anniversary was offered as a gifl by their daughter and son-in-law. Stuart and Brenda kindly presented us with an evening of slides, music and vivid narrative at Shalom recently. They are a slick act, and maintain the listener's interest by subtly interacting with each other in a very professional way.

First came the stunning photographs of Table Mountain, the Cape garden area and safari wild life – lions, elephants, buffalo

and giraffe. Next they entered the strange world of the tiny highland kingdom of Lesotho. As we listened to the haunting rendition of a migrant workers' song we could picture the workers leaving their simple thatched huts and making the tough trek through the spectacular canyons to work in South Africa, none of them owning a car. Even today many of the villages can be reached only on horseback, by foot or light aircraft.

After the awesome beauty of the Drakensberg Mountains, came the noisy urban scene of Johannesburg, violent as ever in parts, and definitely not a tourist spot – no useful open top tour bus! Yet a city steeped in history; of Gandhi and Mandela. We were showed Mandela's first home and Tutu's house; the only place in the world where two Nobel Peace Prize winners once lived in the same street. In the Apartheid Museum, families who were unceremoniously kicked out of the notorious Capetown District 6, pored over the huge map of the area and identified their former homes. Still today the district is deserted. Stuart reminded us that South Africa is still fragile. Their people need our prayers for the next step in their journey.

Christian Aid We believe in life before death

Thank you to everyone who contributed towards the grand total of £2075.79, collected in Stansted during Christian Aid Week. In particular I would like to thank all the collectors; and also Brenda, Pauline and Stuart, who ran a coffee morning which raised £95.

The worship material for the Christian Aid service was written by John Bell of the Iona Community and focused on El Salvador. We heard how a fertile and vibrant country with much potential has had that potential diminished for various reasons. Many will remember how Archbishop Oscar Romero, who spoke out for the poor and oppressed, was shot by the army in 1980 as he was celebrating mass. About 75,000 people died during the civil war from 1980 to 1992. Recently earthquakes, drought, floods and hurricanes have battered the country, increasing in frequency and intensity, most likely as a result of global warming.

We also heard how Christian Aid's partners are training people to grow fruit and vegetables to improve their health and incomes. We heard about HIV prevention programmes in San Salvador and how communities are being taught how to reduce the risks posed by natural disasters and how to respond to emergencies. We ended the service with the following prayer:

May the peace of God
reign in all our hearts and in our nations.
May the justice of God
inform our thinking and that of our leaders.
May the love which God has for the world
infect our compassion.

Contrasts and Balance

When I came to Stansted three years ago, I resolved to walk the bounds of the parish as a way of getting to know the area. The main impression that I am left with from those walks is of the contrast between narrow pretty footpaths, bounded by excellent blackberries (it was August at the time) and the extensive transport systems (air, rail and road networks) that we came across as we rounded a bend and emerged from the trees. One moment you could feel as if you were miles from anywhere, and the next there were cars tearing along the motorway, planes taking off or trains rushing past. And this set me thinking about the importance of balance in life.

It seems to me that increasingly people are either too busy or too bored. Those at work seem to work longer and longer hours, and be rushed off their feet, whilst others spend long periods alone. Whilst I might long for a moment's peace, someone else might long for human company and stimulation. We are blessed indeed if we are able to create a good balance.

Balance between activity and rest is crucially important to health and well-being in a spiritual sense as well as a physical one. That is why the idea of 'sabbath' - of a day set apart - is so important. Some of the world faiths have managed to retain this. I have a lewish friend who observes the Sabbath on Saturdays, and I have lived in a Moslem country where the times of prayer punctuate each day at regular intervals. Yet for most people in this country (whether church goers or not) there are now few religiously or culturally recognised guidelines. Now that Sunday opening is with us to stay, we have

to make our own decisions about how to retain a sense of balance. With computer technology, many people work from home and work increasingly flexible hours. So the onus falls on us as individuals to establish our own boundaries. For those who spend much of their time alone at home, the problem may not be how to find space as much as knowing how to structure the time.

In both situations, we become, if we are not careful, increasingly passive - dependent either on external demands or on things such as the TV listings to set our schedules. Hobbies may be lost, and often we do not really know what to do when external pressures are absent - or when the TV breaks down. And so we lose a part of our true identity as individuals with particular interests to pursue. When I look at myself, I realise that although I recognise the importance of balance, I am not very good at achieving it. I think that the secret is to regain a sense of being in control, and to rediscover a sense of purpose and direction from within, rather than being either driven by events or becoming the victim of them.

Whatever our circumstances, we need to have a sense of time as a precious gift, to be used responsibly and neither frittered away nor so packed with activity that there is no time for reflection. "Be still and know that I am God" seems to me to be good advice in a world that sometimes just rushes by. And looking around I think that the contrasts in the local environment between modern technology and hidden paths offer a good image of the sort of balance that we should be seeking to achieve in our lives overall. CC

Perhaps you think that being a member of a church takes just one hour in the week, when we go to sing hymns, say a few prayers and then we disappear until the following Sunday when we do the same thing all over again! However, church life can be very busy and in the life of a church there are many memorable occasions. Looking back over just the last month there have been quite a few.

The one day which many will hold in great affection from their own childhood is the day they made their First Holy Communion. In June, on the feast of Corpus Christi, eight children of our parish took communion for the first time. For the past year they have been regularly attending classes with their parents, to prepare them and help them to understand what an important occasion this will be, in their lives and in the life of our church community.

The little girls all looked very beautiful, traditionally dressed in their white dresses and veils and the boys in their best outfits. The church was packed with their friends and relatives.

However, it is not this, nor the party afterwards that makes this such a special day. In the Eucharist we receive Christ, we believe it is a sign of His love. The children will have learned about God's love; that each of them is created unique and the love they each give to God will also be unique.

We all know that today many young people will stop going to church and will no longer practise their faith. The parents may worry that it is their fault, but although the knowledge of beliefs and practice is important, it is not the most important thing. The heart of our faith is not a set of doctrines but a person, Jesus Christ. We are called to be his followers. Even though our own relationship with Christ may be a loving one there is no guarantee that we will communicate it to our children or others. A relationship cannot be forced; not everyone Jesus called chose to follow him, but we pray that those children who received this wonderful sacrament will continue to obtain strength and grace in a very special way.

Recently we have been told that we would all benefit from just taking three minutes out of our day for contemplation and quiet thought. Some of us are now of an age when we are fortunately able to take longer than three minutes! Our Seniors' Wednesday Club arranged a contemplative day at Clare Priory. Helped by two lay members attached to the community, we learnt about various methods of meditation and were given new insight into the prayer of the Rosary. Whatever our age we all need to find harmony within ourselves. We need time and space to regain our balance, to feel healing and to let peace enter our lives. We are fortunate in this area to have many places available for us to go on retreat, or just to spend a few quiet hours in peaceful surroundings. One of these places is our Diocesan House of Prayer at Abbotswick near Brentwood where we joined the community in their celebration of 20 years of ministry. Their door is always open to all who are seeking spiritual renewal, guidance and healing.

Our Yoga Group members also continue to learn new ways of refreshing their daily lives. We believe that a healthy body is not separate from our spiritual life but one complements the other; hence an end of term session in one member's beautiful garden bringing the special blessing of nature to our class, followed by a delicious bring and share lunch.

Two members of our congregation, Barbara and David Broad, celebrated their golden wedding anniversary recently, and Father Joe presented them with a Papal Blessing. We were all included in their special day and we all enjoyed the wine and cake in the parish centre afterwards!

There are also sad times in the life of a Parish and we said goodbye to a dear friend of St Theresa's, Joan Mercer. Joan worshipped at St John's Church and her husband Francis worships in our church. Francis and Joan have been a model of how successful a mixed denomination marriage can be and have set an example to everyone, always respecting each other's faith and differences and always supporting each other in their spiritual life. Joan died just a few short months away from their diamond wedding, which we would have loved to celebrate with them, but we give thanks for the 59 fruitful years they spent together.

An effective scrutiny process is essential if the cuncil is to achieve its aims of being one of the best district councils in the country.

Uttlesford is the planning authority for the district. As such the Development Control Committee plays a vital role in determining planning applications. Stansted is fortunate that Catherine Dean, Janice Loughlin and John Salmon are members of this important committee.

South West Area Panel

The panel had its first meeting at Henham Village Hall in May. The new Chairman is Cllr Derek Jones from Takeley. The panel approved Stansted Parish Council's application for £3500 towards replacement of swings.

One of the most important issues facing the new council will be the local development framework. This is the successor to the local plan, and amongst other things will be determining housing provision in the district up to 2021. The panel agreed to my request that there should be a workshop this summer for interested stakeholders to consider the local development framework.

The Area Highways Manager for Essex County Council gave a presentation. Amongst schemes affecting Stansted in the current financial year are footways in Chapel Hill between the King's Arms public house and Sunnyside. Other footways measures include the reconstruction of Rainsford Road, Cambridge Road and Church Road.

Street Lighting

The previous district council administration and the parish council have fought hard to keep the county lights on after midnight. Unfortunately, we have been unable to persuade the County Council to reconsider and the trial will be proceeding. We have however, secured a few exemptions such as Coltsfield (pt), Coopers Alley (this runs from Cambridge Road to Bentfield Road), High Lane, Spencer Close (pt), the Spinney. Cllr Norman Hume, who is the portfolio holder for Highways and Transportation, has made it clear that the trial would be reviewed if crime and road accidents were to increase as a result of the lights being switched off.

Airport Inquiry

The Inquiry into Uttlesford District Council's refusal to grant planning permission for full use of the runway is taking place at Endeavour House, Stansted Airport. Members of the public are welcome to attend. The Council has made its initial submission in conjunction with Essex and Hertfordshire County Councils. The Inquiry is expected to last until October. Full information is available on the council's website.

dressed for the part added to the enjoyment of all the other visitors too. Everyone had a wonderful time: "The children were a delight!" was the unanimous verdict!



IN MEMORIAM

Roy Bernard Stebbings

Family and friends gathered at the Harlow crematorium on 23rd May to remember the life of Roy Stebbings, who passed away on 12th May within three months of his 80th birthday. A light-hearted tribute was given by Peter Baker, and an edited version is included below. It epitomises the robust sense of humour that Roy shared with the other two members of the OFC. We were reminded of 'The last of the summer wine' rather than 'Grumpy old men'!

"Roy, Peter Hammond and I were members of the OFC - an exclusive luncheon club. In fact we were the only members because nobody else wanted to join. We would visit various hostelries and establish our priorities - Roy would look for an ashtray, I would find the gents and Peter would check the space between the tables for his gammy leg.

Many will know of Roy's voluntary work maintaining canal boats for disadvantaged youngsters. Another feature of Roy's busy life was the French class at our house. Imagine the scene - Thursday evening, 8 o'clock, six exuberant, highly charged, voluble ladies ... and Roy.

The French class did prove useful when Roy suggested a day trip. When he broached the subject I thought "Good. A nice day out, a few cases of wine and some juicy snails." There was more. As soon as we docked in Boulogne, Roy became agitated and directed me to turn left and keep going. There was a note of urgency and nervous excitement. We crossed the border into Belgium undetected and stopped at the first wholesale warehouse where he purchased quantities of Gaulloise, his favourite rolling tobacco.

Yet another of Roy's pleasures in life, which illustrates his caring and patient nature, was his weekly shopping for two elderly ladies; especially when he staggered home laden with groceries and then had to take them back because they were the wrong size, the wrong weight, the wrong colour, too cheap, too expensive or out of date!

A memory that sometimes jolts me awake at night sweating is the Stansted Fun Run. Roy and I would collect our marshal's kit and then charge off in his DIY three-wheeler

Lomax Special. It was a low-slung open-top flier - we were motoring at an altitude of six inches above the ground and all my life seemed to pass before me.'

Peter's amusing slant on a selection of Roy's various activities illustrates that he was a man of many parts. Another voluntary activity that he enjoyed (away from the bad influence of the OFC!), was to help repair and sharpen re-cycled carpentry tools destined for self-help groups in Africa. Roy was one of the founder members of the Tools for Self Reliance group in Stansted, and in 2006 he received his 15 year service certificate for this. He is sorely missed by Rod, Fred and Mike, his fellow 'toolers'.

Nature Notes

We are very fortunate in Stansted in having in the vicinity two reserves managed by the Essex Wildlife Trust. The Aubrey Buxton reserve is probably the better known as it is nearer, lying beyond Gall End to the north of the village. It can also be approached from half-way up Alsa Street. The wooded area of the reserve contains a good variety of tree species including some beautiful lofty beeches. Within the reserve are several ponds, somewhat stagnant now, an open grassy ride at the top of the wood and a sloping meadow area fringed with willows and poplars. It is here that you find orchids during June. Earlier on, in April, you could see wood anemones that have colonised an area near the wood edge.

The other reserve is Turner's Spring, situated east of the village near Burton End. The footpath from the road winds round the back of Burton Bower, across a field and into a small wood. This is an ancient place of woodland that is lovely at any time of the year but perhaps especially in the spring when the daffodils are out and pale yellow oxlips line the path through the trees. The oxlip, *primula elatior*, is a particularly good indicator plant of ancient woodland. It is found in over a hundred ancient woods on the boulder clay of Essex, Suffolk and Cambridgeshire. Another indicator species that grows in this wood is herb paris, a rare plant with four dark green leaves from which rises a flower with pale green sepals and eight long golden sta-

Turner's Spring reserve also includes an area of damp meadow and sedges, fringed by blackthorn trees. It slopes down to a small tributary of the Stansted Brook. The banks of the stream are surprisingly steep and are shaded by horn-beams. Earlier in the year bluebells, wood anemones and celandines all flower here. A few yards away from this tranquil spot is the rail spur carrying passengers on the Stansted Express to and from the airport.

A BOY IN THE WAR

This contribution comes from Keith Turner, a former resident and organist at St Mary's Church. It makes an interesting alternative to Dick Pollard's recollections of the recent past and we hope that more of Keith's (and Dick's) reminiscences will follow.

I was born at 55 Lower Street (Victoria Villas), and five years old when World War II broke out. I moved with my mother and father to 28 Park Road for a short while and then to 41 Lower Street where my father and uncle had a grocery store trading as Turner Bros. The Turner brothers were my father, Kenneth, and his brother, Ronald, and they had inherited the business from their father, Frederick.

Ken and Ron were a little too old to be conscripted initially, but after the first 18 months or so both were 'called up' leaving my brother, mother Ellen with my elderly grandfather to try to continue to run the business and to bring up myself and my brother, Paul.

My first few years at school were in the Infants class at the Council school on Chapel Hill and the teacher was Miss Thorpe. At the age of five, boys and girls were taught together but separated at the age of eight, the girls progressing to Miss Double's class and finally to Miss Woolley (Headmistress). In the playground boys and girls were separated by iron railings. The boys were then taught by Miss Bradford and finally Mr Enoch (Headmaster).

The boys' playground was on quite a steep slope and in midwinter we were not only allowed, but encouraged, to pour water from the toilets at the top of the playground down the slope to form a really thick icy slide. I don't remember any boy breaking an arm or a leg during this highly dangerous annual event but I wonder what school inspectors might have to say about this activity if it happened in the present 'Nanny State'? You might imagine from this that our headmaster was easy going, or laid back. The opposite was the case, and in the top of his cupboard was a large bamboo cane. It was about 3 ft long and was a bit split at the end from constant use. We were caned for some of the most minor of misdemeanours. To digress for a moment - Brian Bunting, whose father owned the greengrocers in Lower Street, supplied us with hair from his father's pony's tail which, if laid along the palm of our hands, was reckoned to split the cane.

When I was seven my uncle, who was an accomplished organist, decided that I could sing in tune and should therefore join the church choir (St Mary's) and also receive piano lessons. In wartime there were no street lights and every dwelling including churches etc had to observe the blackout; consequently my piano lesson was during my lunchtime break at school. I had to get to Mrs Godefroy's house on the Recreation Ground and she would often keep me too long causing me to be late back and for this I was caned by the Headmaster. You will not be surprised to learn that my progress as a pianist was slow, to put it mildly, and I was greatly relieved when my uncle decided not to pay for any more lessons. Of course, I know now that I should have told the family what was happening but I was too scared to do so in case of further punishments.

A few years later one of my Harlow College School reports said that I was 'A Serious Child'. I think this remark would have applied to a high percentage of children of my age. We were old enough to understand the terrible situation that had existed during the war. We saw on cinema newsreels the devastating effect of the bombing and experienced bombs in our own village, including a flying bomb which came down at Burton End. Also our fathers were somewhere in Western Europe. We all had evacuees living in our homes and we could see how awful it was for them. We saw in the press pictures of columns of defeated soldiers with heads bandaged, legs and arms missing and we knew of families whose fathers would never return home. Hitler and his war machine were only a few miles from our coast, so in spite of our British stiff upper lip and Mr Churchill's powerful rallying speeches, was it any wonder that we were considered to be of a serious disposition.

At the back of our shop in Lower Street there was a wooden loft (I believe it still exists) and underneath were some stables, a slaughter house, a smoke room (for smoking bacon) and a cheese cellar. During air raids my grandfather and my mother would take us to the cheese cellar where we tried to sleep on wooden slatted shelves until the all clear was sounded. Many school lessons were interrupted by air raids and we had to use candles in a dug-out shelter in the bank between the Council School and the Memorial Gardens next to St John's Church. Miss Bradford would read to us while the spiders and other creepy crawlies were all around us what fun! Later on a brick built shelter was constructed. Children were not always able to have proper footwear as leather was short in supply and generally only one item of footwear had to be used come rain, snow and sunshine. Boys could sometimes be seen in mid-summer with only a pair of wellies and in winter just a pair of plimsolls.

American soldiers and airmen were living under canvas while they were building the very long runway at Stansted. The *Flying Fortress* bombers needed this to be able to take off fully loaded. Many of the Yanks enjoyed meeting local families in the village where they could spend an hour or so in the warm, and chat about their families back home in the States. I still have a lovely letter sent to my family by Corporal William S Madden (from New York) No 32231102 US Army C/O C817 ENG AVIATION, which was written on 31st November 1942 after he had been posted to North Africa. He was always grateful for a few home comforts. I remember him well and he liked to tell us about his folks back home. He was a kind man and as children we enjoyed the *Candy* he gave us and my grandfather was given *Lucky Strike* cigarettes (free to US troops abroad).

I have lots more memories of those few years which I hope to put on paper in the future.

Joan Mercer 1919 - 2007

Joan was born in Wimbledon and after local schooling went on to study economics at Regent Street Polytechnic. After a period as a typist, the war intervened and Joan went into the Air Ministry's Meteorological Branch in Gloucestershire. It was here that she met Francis, then stationed with the RAF at Moreton Valance, where at a dance coins were tossed for the unaccompanied girls. Francis' choice of coin led to a wedding and ultimately good news for Stansted.



After the war Francis took a job in Birmingham. Joan lived for a short time in London, where Elizabeth was born, before joining Francis. Living conditions were not good, so in 1952 Joan went to her parents home, a large 17th century former ropewalk house at Newham-on-Severn, a place of which she had fond memories. The family then grew to four with the arrival of Vincent.

In 1954 the family reunited at Harlow where Julia was born. Joan worked for a time for Pitney Bowes and was active at Latton Church where she became Rev'd Barry Rose's PCC treasurer. Following Francis' retirement in 1984 they moved to Stansted (again coming under Barry Rose's pastoral oversight) and where they have had a happy retirement in their Bentfield Gardens home.

Joan was active in the village and particularly St John's Church where her self-effacing manner won her many friends. She and Francis consistently worked for the Save the Children Fund and were awarded their Long Service Medal. Joan became a regular participant in many village activities and in joint church ventures such as Shalom and in their reciprocal visits to Belgium. A truly ecumenical family. At all times her three children and eight grand-children were her great love and concern; in fact, Joan was a true matriarch, never happier than when surrounded by or at table with the whole family. Frequent visits to Woodbridge and Bowness (where Joan had her favourite room in Elizabeth and Tony's large B & B) became a feature of their lives. Her passing will be keenly felt in so many places. Our condolences go to Francis and the family.







Will Self to lead protest walk against Stansted Expansion

Author and columnist Will Self will lead a five mile protest walk through Hatfield Forest on Saturday 15th September to highlight the threat to the 1000 year old National Trust property from airport expansion plans which would make Stansted's 'airport in the countryside' bigger than Heathrow today. The five mile Runway Ramble through the ancient woodland is being co-ordinated by SSE to coincide with the planning application for a second runway, expected in September from airport operator BAA. Hundreds are expected to attend the morning walk, which sets off just after 10.00am. Will Self agreed to take part in the event when he toured Hatfield Forest and other ancient woodland threatened by BAA's plans last December.

Airport expansion would jeopardise the tranquillity of the forest, while there are grave concerns over the impact that such massive expansion would have on its ecosystems as a result of changes in air quality. There are also fears that climate change impacts would render the woodland vulnerable to extreme weather conditions, which would further compromise its survival. Aviation is the fastest growing source of the emissions, which contribute to climate change. Beyond the perimeter of the forest, the massive landgrab being sought for the airport's development would see nearly 500 hectares of land (much of which is of special landscape value) and up to 27 hectares of woodland destroyed. A total of 73 homes including 18 listed buildings would also be demolished if the plans were ever allowed to go ahead.

Proposals for expansion on Stansted's single runway are already being considered at a public inquiry this summer following the local council's refusal to give permission to lift the cap on current throughput at the airport. A further public inquiry to consider the second runway application is expected to begin in 2008 although it will be 2010 before the outcome is likely to be known.

Hatfield Forest is located at Bush End on the B1256, just off Junction 8 of the M11. Entry is free with a suggested donation to the SSE's fighting fund.
