THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

On 6th August I attended a very different church service, and one which will stay with me for ever. It was the anniversary of the dropping of the first atom bomb on Hiroshima. Twenty-five years ago, two people met a Hiroshima survivor, and were so moved that they vowed they would hold a service every year on that day. This is now therefore an annual and ecumenical service, arranged by Essex Christian CND. They brought boards showing photos of previous services in places such as Chelmsford and Brentwood Cathedrals as well as URC churches. The 50th anniversary service was even held in Westminster Abbey and they would like to hold the 70th in Westminster Cathedral if at all possible. Photos of our service will be added for future years.

This year it was held in Bardfield Quaker Meeting House. It was a set service, but with a Quaker flavour – five minutes silence at one point. One hymn was the very beautiful 'Dear Lord and Father of Mankind' which was written by a Quaker. Various members of the congregation read prayers, which started off considering the seeds of conflict within ourselves and working towards praying for a world free of conflict and nuclear weapons. The most moving part, for me, was a form of communion. A candle had been brought from Hiroshima, and individually, we all went up to the candle and lit our own candles from it. (A candle had also been sent from Essex to Hiroshima.) The old wooden Meeting House looked magical in the light of these candles, and I think we all felt very close to each other, the people of Hiroshima and to God. During the silence, one Friend ministered (ie spoke) about the coincidence that this was also the day of the funeral of the last soldier to have fought for Britain in the trenches of the First World War. He pointed out that there was no-one left to be tortured by the memories of that awful experience, which is a sort of liberation. The 50 minutes of that service went by in a flash, and yet I was left feeling very moved and with so much to ponder in the following days. Indeed it was a service I shall never forget.


Which box would you tick?

This is the question you will see on posters across the United Benefice of Stansted, Birchanger and Farnham during September advertising the Alpha Course we will be running. Similar courses will be running all across the UK. London commuters will see large billboard posters promoting the Alpha course with other questions such as: Does God Exist? Yes [] No [] Probably [].

The questions on the posters highlight the purpose of the Alpha course, which is to encourage people to think about the big issues of life and explore and learn about the Christian response to these issues in a friendly and safe environment. The sessions are on ten Wednesdays 8.00pm to 9.30pm in St John's Church starting on 30th September. Each evening will start with light refreshments, a DVD presentation on a particular issue, followed by small group discussion. The subjects covered include questions such as Who is Jesus? and How can we have faith? The small group discussions allow people to raise any questions and doubts they may have in an open and friendly environment.

The course is for everyone, but it is particularly helpful for those who may not be regular church attendees, those who have not attended church since childhood but now feel they want to find out more about the Christian faith, those with no church background at all, or those who may be searching for answers to life's big questions and are just unsure. Everyone is welcome. Bear Grylls, the TV Born Survivor adventurer, has been on an Alpha course and is a big fan. He asks the questions "What have you to lose and what have you to gain by going along?" So if you feel that you would like to find out about the Christian faith please came along to the first session and see what you think. Sing for St Mary's

Forty historic churches and 40 choirs sing together for the 40th birthday of the Churches Conservation Trust.

St Mary's will be alive with music and song at 7.30pm on Sunday 4th October, as it becomes one of 40 historic churches across England cared for by the Churches Conservation Trust taking part in a series of unique choir performances and workshops to celebrate the 40th birthday of the Trust - and encourage people to rediscover and enjoy these ancient and historically significant churches, no longer used for regular worship. De Merc Chamber Choir are celebrating the bicentenary of the birth of Alfred, Lord Tennyson (1809-1892) by singing choral settings of his poetry. Most of the music is unjustly neglected: gems by Stanford and Parry will be performed as well as a host of 20th century works by such luminaries as Holst and Bob Chilcott. Tennyson's poetry continues to inspire very recent compositions by Adrian Jolliffe and Russell Pascoe, all performed in de Merc's informal a cappella concert style. FRIENDS OF ST MARY'S CHURCHYARD?

What are we to do about St Mary's Churchyard in Stansted?

As Rector I feel a real sense of responsibility for this place where the dead of our village have been laid to rest for so many generations. Yet I'm also aware that it looks sad and unloved and really is not cared for in a fashion worthy of those who rest in it. For too many years its care has simply been allowed to drift with just occasional grass cutting and emergency work done to the trees. Is this to continue or can we do better?

The fact is that the people of St John's Church are not able, and have never been able, to appropriately finance the care of St Mary's Churchyard. That is at the root of the present situation. If the churchyard were to be declared closed it would then become the responsibility of the Parish Council, but that would mean that no further burials could take place in it. Is that what we want? Or is there another way forward? I believe that actually the people of Stansted Mountfitchet care about and value their ancient burial ground but have lacked real opportunities to express that concern. I have wondered about the establishment of a group of 'Friends of St Mary's Churchyard' who will seek to raise the finance needed to appropriately care for this much loved place and perhaps organise working parties to deal with some of its problems and make it more presentable and worthy of the village.

IN MEMORIAM PETER THOMSON

1935-2009

Peter and his wife Rosemary downsized from Bishop's Stortford to Stansted in 2006 but had, indeed, begun their married life in Croasdaile Road, when the new estate had been built in 1965, living there for four years before returning across the border where Peter had been born and bred. He was born in a flat over what was then the National Provincial Bank, his father being the manager of the London Meat Company in Potter Street and his mother was nanny to Doctor Wallace's family in North Street.

Peter attended St Michael's School, where he was encouraged to become a chorister at St Michael's Church, soon becoming a regular soloist and first trod the boards in St Michael's Church Hall, now a hairdressers! His involvement with the Church continued into adult life, becoming a Boys Brigade Officer and Captain, Youth Club and Pathfinders leader, and also giving help with various theatrical and fundraising events. When he was 11 he won a scholarship to Bishop's Stortford College, where, although achieving good academic results, he shone as a sportsman, particularly on the cricket field. He began scoring for Bishop's Stortford Cricket Club at an early age, gained his School colours and then played for the town club's first XI aged just 15, later becoming their Captain for a number of years. In the twilight of his cricketing career he was pleased when son Andrew joined him in the Third XI and was honoured to become the Club's President for three years in the 1990s.



Whilst completing his National Service with the RAMC at Netley Hospital, near Southampton, where he worked in the pay office, Peter was fortunate to have a colonel who was also passionate about cricket and, whilst other soldiers on the parade ground were berated for their kit not being 100% up to the mark, Peter was asked where the next match was to be played! Peter did have a trial with Worcester CC but was unsuccessful and, instead, joined the Chase Manhattan Bank in the City where he worked for 41 years. He loved to reminisce about the journeys by steam, diesel and electric and, after various social evenings out, got to know most of the stations between Bishop's Stortford and Cambridge!

BEWARE OF SELF-MEDICATION ON THE (NOT SO) CHEAP

I hope you all had chance to have a break during the summer and are back at work refreshed and full of energy. My husband informed me that there's no point in my taking holidays any more, because the week before we go I am frantically trying to make sure all my ongoing cases are happy; that all test results have been reported to the correct owners; cases I ran out of time to deal with have been passed to other vets; and, of course, the mountain of paperwork has been reduced from at least the size of Kilimanjaro to Scafell Pike. When I come back, I find people with climbing harnesses bristling with karabiners looking at the mountain, at least ten owners to ring urgently, and at least one piece of practice equipment at each surgery in need of repair or replacement. I think I got to Wednesday before feeling like I needed another holiday! I hope you have had a more restful time.

One alarming scenario we have seen at least three times in the last two months is the inappropriate use of flea treatments. This has resulted in the death of two of the three animals concerned. What has happened in all cases is that a dog flea treatment has been used on a cat. This can happen accidentally, of course, but these recent treatments have been made by owners who have a dog version, and think that using a smaller dose on a cat must be safe. On first thinking about it, the idea doesn't seem too unreasonable; cats and dogs both get fleas, the product has the same name, just a picture of a cat or dog on it and it saves money to buy one product rather than two. However, the consequences are dramatic and often fatal as these owners have unfortunately found out. The reality is that cats and dogs have very different physiological reactions to some drugs. For example, paracetamol is very toxic in cats but safe to use in dogs - the same is true of their reaction to flea treatments. The cat products are especially formulated with much lower doses of the active ingredient for cats, and dosing them with the dog product can result in neurological signs, epileptic fits and eventually coma and death. If you read the small print, warnings are clearly written on the packaging about not using the dog product in cats.

The other sad fact of all these cases was the products were purchased from a supermarket, not a veterinary practice. When someone buys a worm, flea or any other product from us, they are given the correct advice on the correct product to use. Our staff are able to give you the right product for your particular situation and explain how to use it properly. If there are any contra-indications, they will be able to tell you, or ask one of the vets. All vets stock a variety of products, so if you don't like giving tablets, there are 'spot on' or liquid products as an alternative, The thought that supermarket products are cheaper is simply not true, and certainly not for these poor owners who ended up having to pay for emergency treatment but no cat to take home.

Stansted Noise Action Plan Public Meeting 7.30pm Tuesday 15th September at OSCA, Henham

However, far from setting targets and limits, BAA is proposing little meaningful new action. The consultation runs until 2nd October and guidance has already been prepared by SSE to help with responses to the consultation questionnaire — available from SSE (see below) or at www.stopstanstedexpansion.com/noise.html.

The meeting on 15th September will be helpful in explaining the problem in more detail and answering questions about how your response can bring pressure to bear on BAA to give teeth to the final action plan. The meeting is open to everyone. Further information from 870558 or from me.

YEW TREES Taxus baccata

The oldest living thing in Britain is said to be the yew tree in the churchyard at Fortingall in Perthshire. The legend is that the young Pontius Pilate played under it when his father, a Roman legionary, was stationed in Scotland. Many British churchyards have very old yews, sometimes apparently older than the churches themselves. The yews in the churchyard at Painswick in Gloucestershire are numerous but said to always number 99 because the Devil took exception to a round 100. There is a 'clipping' ceremony and celebrations each year. Clipping probably did not mean tidying up the yews as now but came from an early English word meaning 'to enclose'. In his poem *Trees* Walter de la Mare wrote, "Of all the trees in England, Oak, Elder, Elm and Thorn, The Yew alone burns lamps of peace for them that lie forlorn".



European Award for Languages

One Year 9 student commented "I enjoyed doing these booklets because it was fun and also let me revise. I think it was good that we were involved with other schools and I would like to do it again." Year 7 comments included: "Making the booklets was really good because it helped me when revising and it was fun making it"; "It widened

my vocabulary which has helped me with my present work. I enjoyed the activity because I had to find different sources to search for the words"; and "It was nice to draw pictures to go with them and this was a good way to remember them."



RESPONSE TO QUESTIONNAIRES

Although the closing date has officially past and analysis should be underway, late returns will still be welcome and will be included in the data considered in formulating the plan. IT IS NOT TOO LATE TO CONTRIBUTE YOUR VIEWS.

If you have any influence with young people, please encourage them to complete the youth questionnaire. The on-line version has now closed, but we have plenty of hard copies in the office and can e-mail it.

Once the analysis is completed, the initial conclusions will be summarised and published after which a first draft of the plan will be prepared.

STREET LIGHTING - NEW MAINTENANCE CONTRACTORS

The contractors, who for some time have undertaken the maintenance of the parish street lights have withdrawn from this business. As no proper notice of the timing of this change has been given, there has been a period in which lights needing attention have not been repaired.

A new contractor is in the process of being appointed. Hopefully a good service will follow.

BUS SHELTERS – STILL ON THE WAY

Although the three Bus Shelters were ordered at the end of April 2009 and we had hoped they would be in place at least by the end of the summer, due to a statutory requirement to investigate the underground services BT, Water, Gas, etc at the sites of these shelters, there has been an unavoidable delay in their construction. We are following this matter with urgency.

BUS NO. 7 – TO BENTFIELD OR NOT?

A very well-attended meeting held at the Day Centre on 23rd July registered strong objections for the most part to the decision to omit the Bentfield loop from the revised number 7 route (7A will disappear). Representatives from Essex County Council and the bus operators explained the logic behind the change but promised, in the light of representations made at the meeting, to look again at the decision. Other issues were raised including the revised timetables for the 7 and 301 which mean two buses four minutes apart at Stansted and then virtually an hour's wait (decision unlikely to change) and the delay in obtaining new bus shelters (see above).

A copy of the new time-table is on Parish notice Boards and on page 25 of this issue of The Link.

YOUR DOG, YOUR MESS

Regrettably, a number of people who walk their dogs on the Recreation Ground still fail to clear up any mess (no blame on the dogs) which accrues. Not only is this unpleasant for other users but may create health dangers for children. Please think of others and pick it up.

HEALTH CENTRE - GENTLE PROGRESS

In a response to a request for an update, the PCT sent an email on 21 July which gave the following information. Discussions on the detailed design of the facility planned for the site behind Chapel Hill and Silver Street are continuing with the local practice in St John's Road, the landowner and the planning authority. It is expected that this process may taken another two months to complete at which point a planning application will be submitted. Assuming no undue problems during this process, action on site may occur in the early part of 2010. Essex & Southend Link will be holding a meeting between 7-9pm on 8th September at MMCC. Michelle Bassett of the Primary Care Trust will give an update on the

Health Centre. Meanwhile the Parish Council will seek to meet with the parties involved. There will, of course, be the usual opportunity to make comments once the planning application is out to consultation. Whilst it is intended to offer a wider range of medical services at the health centre, the only surgery on site will be that moving from St John's Road, ie this will not become a 'super surgery'. The Council will endeavour to ascertain and communicate further information as soon as possible.

MAKING THE WILLOW TREE AT THE FOUNTAIN SAFE

Having received advice from several sources, the Council has decided to remove a dangerous limb and undertake works on the crown. Action will be taken as soon as possible and may require the road to be closed for a short period. The tree will be assessed at regular intervals to review safety issues. The willow is coming towards the end of its life but, given its prominence and given the longer term possibility that changes may be made to the junction, the Council believes that it is worth the effort to preserve the tree always providing that safety for pedestrians and motorists can be maintained.

ANOTHER NEW POLICE INSPECTOR

The Council has been notified, that after only a short period in this division, Inspector Glen Pavelin is moving into a role at Chelmsford, a town which appears to devour our inspectors. His replacement is Inspector Mick Couldridge, who is, we understand, an experienced officer.

The Council is asking to have a meeting with Chief Inspector Wrigley and Inspector Couldridge to discuss policing in this parish.

NEWS FROM PCSO KELLY ROBERTS

For all members of the community to be extra vigilant around our churches. Last week Broxted church was believed to have had its safe tampered with and the lock damaged by persons unknown. Nothing was taken at this time but churches like Broxted which are left open for the community to access 24hrs are unfortunately vulnerable. The concern is not the money value as very little is held but it is for the historic and irreplaceable documents and registers that are held in our church safes that are the worry. We have in the past suffered with a spate of church burglaries, and is something we do not want happening again. So if you do see anything unusual or suspicious please let us know.

SPANGLES CHILDREN'S CENTRE - AN EXTENSION IN LOWER STREET

The success of Spangles has encouraged Essex County Council to propose an extension which will provide a much more suitable entrance, reception area and toilets as well as a new office. Not only will the space and access be better, but the appearance of the building will be enhanced as the poor addition to the listed building is replaced.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH UPDATE

We have now got our NhW Co-ordinators in place and are working on your behalf in order to bring your more information on the running of the scheme and the possible purchasing of NhW notice boards. This will be discussed at our next meeting on 30th September at 7.30 pm in Stansted Free Church Lecture Hall. Please make the effort to attend.

NEWS FROM UTTLESFORD D.C.

From Clir Alan Dean

As I predicted last month, a report is now out (and can be found on Uttlesford's website at http://www.uttlesford.gov.uk/main.cfm?Type=PLC SD&MenuId=583) called the Strategic Housing Land Availability Assessment. Any comments on the draft report are invited by Sarah Nicholas at snicholas@uttlesford.gov.uk or by post to the council offices, London Road, Saffron Walden CB11 4ER by September 18, 2009.

The draft report shows some 17 sites around Stansted that have been put forward by owners for potential housing. Many other sites across Uttlesford district are included. They have all been assessed by a panel of 'experts' for their suitability. Some have been given the thumbs down and some the thumbs up. The panel was divided over one site just beyond St. Theresa's church. In my opinion the panel has done a reasonable job in the overall conclusions it has reached, though 'the devil will be in the detail'.

The report says that the total of homes that could be provided on suitable and available sites around the district exceeds the outstanding housing requirement without the need for a new town. The required homes total is significantly exceeded if sites for new settlements are accepted. If Uttlesford were to insist on sticking with a new town, the panel says that Great Chesterford has better access than Elsenham/Henham. In commenting on the A120 corridor around Takeley, the report says that no more road infrastructure would be required to accommodate around 1,000 additional homes there.

This debate has many more months to run. In September the council is intending to mount another consultation on where to put the outstanding balance of over 1,000 homes assuming that it sticks to its present policy of putting 3,000 at Elsenham in a new town. In the past month the government has decided not to push at present for the Elsenham eco-town but might resurrect the idea at a later stage.

In my opinion, it would be a waste of taxpayers' money for the council to proceed with a fresh consultation on how to distribute only something over a 1,000 homes on sites around Uttlesford's towns and villages when we now have a report that shows we don't need to start a new town to accommodate our legal housing commitment, regardless of whether Elsenham/Henham is the

right place (and increasing evidence shows it isn't). I think the next consultation should take note of this report and carry out a district-wide consultation on the evidence that this report has shown; that concentrating most housing in one place isn't necessary and, in my opinion, not desirable.

Difficult decisions ahead

When meetings resume in September we will be faced with some difficult decisions. Officers have advised us that we will have an effective budget shortfall of £1.387 million by 2013. In the interim we can use reserves to sustain service delivery. However, this is not tenable in the long term. Like many councils across the country in order to reduce costs and also to improve service delivery we are looking at partnership working with other councils. Although I am a little sceptical about financial projections, too often in the past they have proved inaccurate, I accept that local government is going through tough times which are not likely to get any easier. Whichever party forms the government after the next general election it is unlikely that local government will be looking at generous grant settlements. The majority of local government income comes not from council taxes but from central government grant. Any decisions on partnership working will have consequences for the staff we employ. It is perhaps not surprising that a survey conducted in late 2008 showed that staff morale was an issue. This can impact on the quality of services we deliver.

POTENTIAL SITES FOR HOUSING DEVELOPMENT

Uttlesford District Council is analysing the possible sites throughout the district for housing development. The list for Stansted Mountfitchet is shown below – those marked * already have planning permission.

If all of the proposed developments (excluding Forest Hall Park – see below) recommended for inclusion were, over several years, to receive planning approval then the number of dwellings to be built would fall into the range 209-357. Once Forest Hall Park is fully built the parish plus the part of Forest Hall Park falling into Birchanger Parish would contain about 2900 dwellings. Thus the high end of the possible proposals above would add 12% to the number.

As parishioners will know, Forest Hall Park, which is under construction, currently has approval for 620 houses whereas the strategic land review considers that a target of 1050 may be achievable. If this higher number was achieved and built then the increase in the number of dwellings on the same basis would be 27%. The Parish Council has discussed this report and would make the following points:

 Green belt should in most circumstances not be breached which would lead to Pines Hill, land north of the Catholic Church and Elms Farm being excluded.

- Density levels are too high and if achieved would continue to change the character of this community. This is unacceptable.
- No more flats in the centre or ringing the edge of the parish.

SKYWATCH



A monthly look at an aspect of the night sky

When something gets out of control we might describe the situation as chaotic. In science, chaos is a particular situation where many apparently random events are taking place and the outcome(s) cannot be fully predicted. I have discussed before the vast volumes of gas, called nebulae, measuring millions of light years in all directions in which stars are formed over millions of years. In this instance, one area of the nebula was, by chance, denser than the surrounding gas and therefore had a little more gravity thus enabling it to accumulate more gas until, a few million years later, a star lit up. The procedure is chaotic because you cannot look at a 'lump' of gas and predict how each molecule will behave.

Yet once that star is up and running, we can predict a great deal of how the star's life will evolve, based mainly on how big the star is at birth, even when it is hundreds of light years away. So shouldn't we know everything about our Sun? The answer is 'no' because a ball of fire some 875,000 miles in diameter is a gaseous structure, and very chaotic indeed. There is, however, a very important branch of mathematics which tries to predict how some chaotic events will evolve. It is called Chaos Theory and it tries to predict the outcomes of all sorts of chaotic events by statistical analysis.

Much nearer to home, clouds are chaotic, especially one type called cumulo-nimbus. Such clouds are very violent indeed and from which any pilot will steer well away. An American air force pilot was once flying his jet and, having observed cumulo-nimbus ahead, flew above it, at least until his aeroplane's engine failed. He had to eject and fell in to the cloud where he was buffeted up and down for 40 minutes before he was thrown out of the cloud. He survived but was badly beaten up by ice and detritus hurtling around in the cloud. Very much nearer to home, you can observe chaos just by pouring a cup of tea, preferably in a clear glass mug, then adding the cold, denser milk. The swirling shades of brown are in a state of chaos as the two densities and their different temperatures clash; and you have created your very own nebula - at least, for 10 seconds or so!!.



The bridleway which runs westwards from Bentfield to Farnham Green passes through a spinney where a drainage ditch has been excavated and the work has unearthed a fairly large pudding stone. This is a conglomerate of pebbles and silica which lay in a river bed and hardened into rock eons ago and has the appearance of plum pudding. Our ancestors had a fascination with and sometimes a reverence for large stones such as this and local examples can be seen on Ugley Green, by the shell house in Hatfield Forest, and opposite the bus stop in Riverside in Bishop's Stortford. They would usually be found in stream beds and were often moved to places central to a community or perhaps to mark a crossroads (hence: mark stone, market etc.). Where the stone mentioned above has surfaced on this ancient track is the high point between the River Stort and Bourne Brook by Savenend, which would indicate that someone at some time expended considerable effort to haul it up there from one of the river beds.

While on the subject of pudding stones, we know that the Romans used the stone to make quorns for grinding corn and numerous examples of these exist in museums. One was found in a garden in Silver Street in the 1970s and a broken one was seen in a small rockery outside a cottage at Bentfield Green.



We are fortunate in that this area is well provided with footpaths and bridleways which give us access to the countryside for relaxation, exercise, the chance to enjoy the local scenery and wildlife, or just look for stones. The responsibility for keeping these rights of way open is shared by the County Council and the landowners. The path from Gypsy Lane along the bank of the River Stort was closed for some time due to erosion and unsafe bridges. The landowner arranged to move the fence back from the eroded river bank and Essex County Council installed two fine new bridges, so the path is now open to give a riverside walk right to the centre of Bishop's Stortford. In another case the hedge along a footpath bordering a fenced paddock near Alsa Wood had got rather overgrown in recent years but a smart bit of hedge-laying opened it up again.

This promises to be a good year for fruits and nuts; already the blackberries are ripe, sloes and damsons are not far behind and hazelnuts and conkers are more plentiful than last year. Late summer flowers are still adding colour to verges and open spaces and mixing with a variety of bright red berries. Have you noticed all the cuckoo pint berries? Let's take advantage of the fine weather and go out to see all there is to



see, at the same time remembering the work that goes into preserving our paths and treating them and the environment with due respect.





It began as a club for 'handicapped children and their parents' to provide a weekly meeting point for the youngsters to enjoy an evening with kindred spirits and for parents to meet in a social context.

Over the years the club has regularly met on Thursdays at 7.00pm in St John's Church Hall. Some of the early members still attend with the result that the 'children' now include many in middle age! However, the young seem to enjoy their evenings as much as their elders and there is no age divide. Its evening activities are many and varied, comprising the ever-popular discos run by Garry King, specialised versions of tennis and cricket that can compete in entertainment value with Wimbledon and Lords, bowls and bowling on our own artificial surface, quizzes, bingo, line dancing, curling and treasure hunts. Occasionally a magician or musical entertainers will drop in. The club has summer outings and a festive meal in January. The high point is the Christmas concert for which there are usually 'House Full' signs and rave notices. Mother's Day, St George's Day, Halloween and birthdays are celebrated with due ceremony!

As many of our members now come from the Saffron Walden area, the club provides transport each way thanks to a team of drivers and escorts. The stalwarts of the club are a loyal group of parents/helpers together with several teenagers/young adults whom Marion has justly praised in recent issues of the 'Link'. There are currently almost 40 members and there is often room for newcomers among those who have learning difficulties or a physical disability, with their carers if need be, but has to be subject to travel availability. Despite the thunderstorms and torrential rain of the previous nights, members and friends of the Mountfitchet Garden Club were blessed with sunny weather on Saturday 18th July when they visited Freda Davis' garden at Harcourt House in Bromley followed by Tim Hart-Dyke's World Garden of Plants in Eynsford, Kent. Freda's garden has evolved over ten years and is an ornate Victorian garden, with routed walkways through flower borders, pots brimming with flowers, bulbs and shrubs, unusual statuary, hidden areas, and plenty of seating. The garden has a tranquil atmosphere which encourages visitors to sit, relax and enjoy the views. The garden won first place in the 2007 Bromley in Bloom competition (Premier Back Garden Category) and was also entered into the NGS's Yellow Book last year. The second part of our trip to Kent was to Lullingstone Castle in the village of Eynsford. The trials and tribulations of transforming a rose garden into The World Garden of Plants were featured in two BBC series. In 2000, whilst plant hunting in the jungle region between Panama and Colombia, Tom Hart Dyke was kidnapped by guerrillas and lived under the threat of death for nine months. During this time, to 'keep him sane', he planned a garden in his diary that would contain plants collected from across the globe. Upon his release, he set to and transformed the one acre rose garden into a map of the world. The aim of the garden is to celebrate the plant hunter and show where the plants we grow in our own gardens today originate from. Throughout the garden there are stories/notices about the plant hunters and the specimens brought back to the UK. The garden is still evolving with new areas planned for future years.

Exploring the connections between mind, body and spirit with Isobel Bradshaw



My mum loved to read – she loved books and poetry. She would have read E M Forster's 'A Room With A View' many times dreaming of 'The Grand Tour'. This may have been a necessity, of course, living in a Midlands village, married to a carpenter and bringing up four children. I have recently lost my mum but not her vision of the world, how she loved life and people - her wellbeing. Many enjoyed my mum's wellbeing. She was only ever described as a lovely person. Despite living in an old house with little money and losing my brother, she possessed a great spirit and inner strength to love everyone around even when "They could do with a good smack!". I have always felt very close to my mum, yet puzzled. She protected a privacy; at times I have felt excluded, even a little resentful.

My mum's wellbeing was inspired by trips to the library (this being the only time that permission wasn't asked for nor denied). My father never read a book in his life. He was proud and slightly in awe of this cultured woman but his world was his workshop and the outdoors. Home life was dominated by my dad's likes and working patterns. I smiled as I sorted through my mum's books. In front of me was a copy of Virginia Woolf's 'A Room of One's Own.' I wondered, had my mum lived joyfully by creating an inner life? My mum generously loved others whilst understanding the need to create an inner emotional and intellectual support for herself.

Psychologists suggest that we may choose to construct something 'other' when a relationship or a life situation is lacking in some way. Identifying another space may allow us to continue in life by providing more feelings and experiences that are otherwise missing. To secure and maintain this new space the foundations, the walls are protected by self worth, an absence of guilt to attend to your own needs, to live knowing you deserve happiness. Happiness, spiritual teachers suggest is the purpose of our creation. I have recently changed my workshop (my music room.). From an argument with my lovely teenagers - I realised we all needed a little more space - by adding a discreet TV to the book shelves, and two large removable beanbags the girls claim their room within seconds of my singing pupils leaving the house. When the teenagers and the pupils have 'left the building', I have discovered a room of my own. The quietness and the potential of the room are prodding me to become my mother's daughter. It is my intention to create a room with view - a view of love and wellbeing.



Have your say on noise, community urged

SSE has published a step by step guide to help people to respond to BAA's Noise Action Plan consultation. BAA is required by law to publish a five-year plan to explain how it intends to reduce nuisance from noise and its impact on sleep disturbance, health and education caused by the airport's operations and overflying. SSE has criticised the way some information has been presented by BAA and gaps in proposals to address noise issues. This consultation is a start but there are no teeth in the guidance for delivering the plan that would ensure BAA did anything it wasn't already doing. The consultation closes on 2nd October.

Ryanair slashes winter flights

Ryanair is to slash the number of aircraft operating out of the airport this winter. These will be cut by 40% compared with the summer schedule – 40 planes down to 24. This will result in a 30% drop in flights and the loss of 2.5m passengers between October and March 2010. Ryanair accounts for two out of every three passengers using Stansted. Like Stansted's other major customer, easyJet, Ryanair opposes BAA's second runway plans on which the airport has already squandered £200m. The resulting increase in airport charges at Stansted is the main reason that Ryanair has transferred flights to other airports.

Stansted passenger numbers plunge as BAA losses mount

The continued fall in passenger numbers at Stansted Airport means that SSE's forecast that the total will drop to less than 20 million this year remains on course. Passenger numbers have fallen 10.5% compared with the preceding 12 months, while the number of flights has tumbled 12.8% over the same period, BAA reports. Stansted's passenger numbers have now fallen for 18 consecutive months and there are now fewer passengers than five years ago and fewer flights than six years ago. BAA's losses at Heathrow, Gatwick and Stansted more than tripled to £545 million in the first six months of the year, caused by the continued fall in passenger numbers and a massive deficit in the airport operator's pension fund. The losses were despite a rise in revenue from airport operations, which included increased passenger charges that airlines said were excessive. Retail turnover was also up. However, analysts say that without a sale of Gatwick, BAA will have difficulty repaying £1 billion of its £12 billion debt which falls due in the spring, says the Evening Standard.

Carry on regardless: Government will protect air travel 'for the masses'

The Government will protect air travel 'for the masses' even in a so-called low-carbon Britain. This was the admission by Ed Milliband, climate change secretary, to coincide with publication of a white paper on climate change. In an interview with The Guardian he said the Government would find deeper cuts in emissions in other areas. Air travel would become more expensive as Britain tried to meet G8 targets to cut CO2 emissions by 80% by 2050. It would be wrong to

impose the target on airlines, which would be covered by the European Emissions Trading Scheme from 2012 if they fly to and from the EU. "I don't want to have a situation where only rich people can afford to fly," he said. The average household income of leisure passengers using Stansted is £47,000, says Jeff Gazzard of Aviation Environment Federation, in a response to The Guardian report. Meanwhile, The Times has seen documents that say Britain's plans to cut emissions by more than a third by 2022 could be achieved by buying 'permits to pollute' from poor countries rather than reductions in domestic emissions – effectively overturning a commitment by Alistair Darling that the UK would not rely on carbon offsets.

Commuters urged to lobby National Express

Train users are being urged to respond to a consultation by National Express East Anglia to ensure that additional capacity is not allocated to Stansted Express services at the expense of commuters. The train operator is to introduce an extra 188 new carriages but MP Mark Prisk is concerned that too many will be assigned to Stansted Express. Another key issue is the fact that for those commuting from stations that can only accommodate eight carriages, the new trains and probably all the fast trains will only stop at stations which can accommodate 12 cars whereas, campaigners argue, they should all be capable of taking the 12 car trains. The deadline for responses is 11th September.
