

THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

With homelessness on the rise, some local authorities are adopting new measures to rid their towns or city centres of rough sleepers. In the case of one council, a proposed new order will allow officers to seize and destroy rough sleepers' bedding, making them even more vulnerable than before. Public Space Protection Orders (PSPOs) are designed to crack down on antisocial activities in public which have a detrimental effect on local people's quality of life. PSPOs are intended to protect public space for the benefit of residents by targeting various 'nuisance' groups ranging from the homeless and buskers to young people congregating in town centres, to dog walkers, street artists and beggars. The list is potentially endless. In some cases activities to be banned are not harmful in themselves but simply what some people might find unpleasant or annoying, making the whole process highly subjective. PSPOs can be authorised by a single council officer with minimal consultation with the local community and can be punished with on-the-spot fines of up to £100. Failure to pay can result in a criminal record and a further fine of £1,000.

In respect of homelessness the irony is obvious to see. By seeking to protect public space for residents who, by definition, have homes, PSPOs criminalise those people who do not have homes and are, therefore, obliged to inhabit public space. PSPOs can drive rough sleepers from one public space to another for no better reason, possibly, than some local residents thinking they look unsightly. This does feel a bit like those with the most getting more and those with the least ending up with nothing. It is clear that in some cases PSPOs are about pushing problems away rather than helping to solve them. If local authorities really do care about helping the homeless, banning them from sleeping in public or destroying their bedding seems a perverse way of going about it.

If you would like to see more of God's healing power at work in Stansted, or in your own life, why not consider coming along? Those from any church background or no church background will be very welcome.







FOND MEMORIES

As someone born in Stansted I have fond memories of the village where I grew up. I started my working life at The London and Stansted Furnishing Company, which was a large store (now demolished) on the Cambridge Road with several different departments including one that dealt with removals. Further along the road was Green's Stores, housed in what is still known as Green's Buildings. I can remember some wonderful characters that worked there, not least being Mr Neeves who ran the men's outfitting department. If he had not got what you required he could always, 'get it for you'. I recall being approached by him saying he 'had just the thing for me' - a hacking jacket! In a moment of madness I bought some very garish socks from him, an unusual stock item, which caused me a lot of grief. When rolling the cricket pitch at Newport Free Grammar School (now called the Joyce Frankland Academy) I had to roll up my trousers revealing the brightly coloured socks for all to 'admire'.

Another character was Philip Camp in the meat department, and I remember lengthy discussions with him on which half to pick on a purchase that required cutting into two pieces. Miss Olive Tunbridge was the cashier at Green's Stores. She sat in a little booth where the money for purchases was 'pinged' to her along a system of wires in a small container. She would remove the cash and put the receipt and any change due into the container and 'ping' it back to the sales assistant. Miss Tunbridge was also the organist and choir mistress at the Congregational Church (now Stansted Free Church) where Norman Adams manned the pump for the organ, which was situated in the congregation (the pump that is!). I deviate from the subject and mention my sadness in learning of the death of John Rodgers who was a good friend when growing up. We had some very good times. More fond memories!

Our February meeting was a presentation by Tony Morton from the Essex Wildlife trust on Uttlesford Woodlands. The Trust has nine visitor centres, 87 reserves, has 1100 events over a year and is responsible for two nature parks with 33,351 members. Tony started the evening by explaining to us what exactly is woodland and ancient woodland, explaining that all woodland is managed, with the earliest evidence of this dating back to 5000 BC at the sweet track in Somerset where coppice poles have been found. We were shown ancient and modern maps outlining the decline in our woodland in the Uttlesford area and how the woods change over time to help the farming community. He went into the management of woodlands, identifying some of the flora and fauna found in our woods, including what is scarce and protected such as the great butterfly orchid and the oxlip both native to this local area. Tony talked to us about the threat of ash dieback and how this could be as devastating as the Dutch elm disease in the 80s and how the increasing deer population is causing so much damage to our woods and rare flora; the need for fencing is becoming more widespread. Finally Tony recommended a good book for further information: The history of the countryside by Oliver Rackham.



The next meeting, which I would recommend for anyone who may be interested in London history, is *London under the streets* by Colin Oakes, a professional London guide who is quite a character. The meeting is on 7th April 8.00pm at the Day Centre (behind the Library at the top of Chapel Hill). Two hours of entertainment with a cuppa and biscuits - all for two pounds! Everyone welcome.

STANSTED EVENING WOMEN'S INSTITUTE




Our Speaker in February, Graham Bendall, lives in Witham and comes from a background of gamekeeping - his father, grandfather and he all being gamekeepers. He is still practising and has been self-employed since 1998. To carry on the tradition he is proud to have one of his three sons acting as a gamekeeper on the Althorp Estate in Northamptonshire. Graham described a very happy childhood, learning the art of beating, attending shoots, dealing with poachers and living the open-air life. He remembers loading for Suzi Quatro on a shoot! He told us that he himself does not 'do' technology, but gamekeepers these days do have to use computers. Traps are now banned, but crows are controlled with cages. They can be very vicious and destructive. Foxes are a greater nuisance these days as they have become urbanised and are multiplying fast; the only way to keep the numbers down is by shooting. Apparently hunting never did kill many foxes.

There are increasing numbers of women training to be gamekeepers; but there are only about 5,000 gamekeepers in the UK now, whereas there used to be 23,000. In his early days he used to walk everywhere, but now vehicles are used. Young people are trained in colleges, not on the job as he was. The shooting season begins in September and finishes on 1st February. Birds are looked after in the spring-time to protect them from predators. His son did clay pigeon shooting as a GCSE! He was such an enthusiastic speaker and so obviously a man happy in his way of a life, and we really enjoyed his memories.

A trip along the river Cam has been arranged for 2nd June, with a cream tea on board the boat. We have started a group to meet occasionally on Friday afternoons to do various crafts. Some of our members, as well as other friends of mine, have been knitting squares and so far this year I have made up five blankets which will be sent out to Eastern Europe. Thanks to all who have helped in this - it makes us feel we are not wasting time when watching the telly! Our April meeting is on Thursday 14th in the Day Centre at 7.45pm. The speaker is Helen Baron: Pottery – with a demonstration.

Nature Notes

Dandelion Taraxacum officinale

The dandelion needs no introduction. From childhood it was known as a 'clock' by which to tell the time, and when we had counted to four, most of the white seeded parachutes had sailed into the blue yonder. This mechanism allows the dandelion to grow almost anywhere, and it does. It is not a friend of the gardener, as its greedy tap root takes three times as much iron out of the soil as other plants, and in return exhales ethylene gas; best made into compost for more deserving plants. This plant is nutrient rich containing more Vitamins C and A than any other vegetable or fruit,



and of much value as a medicinal plant. The common nickname 'pee the bed' tells us that this plant has been known as a diuretic, and is still used for this purpose. Recently Steve Brill was arrested, hand cuffed, fingerprinted and charged with criminal mischief for picking a dandelion in Central Park, New York. He was let off as he had eaten the evidence. Brill has capitalised on this, and used the incident to promote healthy eating, and using plants as medicine.

The dandelion features in the diet of many European folk, and is often found on their market stalls, a fact not wasted on the New York Parks Department a century ago. They allowed women and children from the Portuguese and Italian communities to gather leaves, dig out roots and collect the flowers. The flowers would be turned into beer or wine, leaves for salads, and the roots dried, roasted and ground to make a coffee substitute. "The clock is running. Make the most of today. Time waits for no man. Yesterday is history, tomorrow is a mystery. Today is a gift. That's why it is called the present." Alice Morse Earle.

Two new Activity Groups

Keeping Active ... Together and Active Minds are two new activity groups which are held at the Dunmow Maltings. The first offers people with dementia an opportunity to engage in a range of physical activities, including indoor bowling, music and dance and seated exercises. Active Minds aims to engage people with mild to moderate dementia in activities including reminiscence discussions, musical exercises and games. Both groups offer an opportunity to socialise. Eighty-five percent of people with dementia say they struggle with isolation, loneliness and depression. The activity groups provide an atmosphere that aims to help people with dementia keep physically and mentally active as well as helping people express themselves. They can make a huge difference to people's sense of wellbeing. People can get involved in all sorts of activities and the groups enable people with dementia to meet others in a similar situation whilst also having fun and trying out new things. There are more than 82,000 people in the East of England with dementia, 24,000 of whom are in Essex and around 1,100 in Uttlesford, with this last figure estimated to be around 1,770 by 2025. With the right support people can live well with the condition for a number of years.

Both groups are on Mondays: Keeping Active ... Together 10.00am-12.30pm and Active Minds 1.00pm-3.30pm. People are invited to attend both groups and can bring along a packed lunch. Tea and coffee are provided. As well as activity groups, we offer other services including a weekly gardening group and a Carers Peer Support Service. Please note that the monthly Tuesday café at the Stansted Quaker Meeting House is no longer running. NEWS FROM YOUR LOCAL COUNCILS

THE BUILT HERITAGE AND THE NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

As part of the Parish Council's background work on the Stansted Neighbourhood Development Plan we are looking at the local built historic environment, heritage assets (buildings and other structures) that are valued as distinctive elements of the local historic environment, and particularly the role of Local Heritage Lists. We are seeking your help with identifying such heritage assets and would welcome your suggestions of assets which could be added to a Local Heritage List so that strategic local planning properly takes account of the desirability of their conservation.

Stansted has grown over the centuries and is rich in historic character. Hence a large number of buildings and other structures are already Listed Buildings: numerous houses and cottages, as well as churches, public houses, barns, and of course the village windmill. Also listed are the Drinking Fountain and Mile Post on Cambridge Road, the War Memorial and various water pumps. There are also three Conservation Areas in the village: a large one covering much of Lower Street, Chapel Hill, the Recreation Ground area and Silver Street; plus two smaller ones in the Bentfield End Causeway and Bentfield Green areas.

However, there are no doubt a number of other buildings and structures which form part of the local identity and distinctiveness in the village's historic environment which are not Listed Buildings. These could be buildings such as houses, commercial premises or industrial buildings, and such structures as red telephone boxes, road signposts, flint walls, cast iron lamp-posts and much more.

Local Heritage Lists play an important part in building and reinforcing a sense of local identity and distinctiveness in the historic environment, helping to conserve and enhance local character. The process of listing in this way provides an opportunity for communities, in partnership with local authorities, to identify valued heritage assets, not already Listed Buildings but which may be in Conservation Areas, which they wish to protect at a local level. Local Heritage Lists provide additional protection alongside Listed Buildings, have no extra consent requirements but do help to influence planning decisions.

Are there any non-listed buildings and structures which you value as distinctive elements of the local historic environment as they reinforce a sense of local

identity and which by being conserved will enhance the local character? If so please let us know by emailing parishcouncil@stansted.net giving the name and location of the building or structure and why you feel it is worth conserving.

LOWER STREET PHONE BOX



The restoration work on our phone box is now complete and hopefully a defibrillator will be installed in the very near future. We are indebted to Mark Gerber who did a fantastic job in bringing the kiosk back to its former glory and to the Rotary Club for their financial support.

The iconic red phone boxes are certainly part of the built heritage and are a key part of many of the best street scenes in the country but in the age of the

mobile phone there is a risk that they will slowly disappear so we are pleased that our phone box will be around for future generations to enjoy.

We haven't got room for a history of the British phone box but suffice to say ours is a K6 model and if you want to know more there is a fascinating website to explore at www.the-telephone-box.co.uk.

FLORAL DISPLAYS AND GRASS CUTTING

The gardening and grass cutting contracts recently came up for renewal which was an opportune time to review the service we provide through our contractors. We get very few complaints about our grass cutting and we have even had a few compliments so, having completed the tendering process we were happy to renew the contract with the company we have used for a number of years. Three bids were considered in detail for the gardening contract and after careful consideration it was decided to award the contract to CGM Landscapes. They have considerable experience in working for local authorities and come with very good references so we are looking forward to some impressive floral displays which will be well looked after through the season.

TREE ISSUES

The Parish Council is responsible for most of the trees which grow on the open spaces around the village. A comprehensive survey of all our trees was carried out in 2014 and this classified trees according to their condition and identified trees that needed some kind of action from a tree surgeon. The contract for the second stage of the work identified has been awarded and the work will be carried out in the near future. Sadly, we are to lose a beech tree and a horse chestnut at the tennis club as they are diseased and the necessary consent for felling these has been granted.

POND WORKING PARTY

Sunday 1 May is the scheduled date for the volunteers to gather at the pond for a spring working party. As we write the water level in the pond is very high which may restrict what we are able to do but we will be there so please join us at 10.00 am and celebrate May Day with a bit of hard graft. We can supply some protective clothing but it would be a good idea to wear your wellies or even waders if you have them.

STANSTED IN BLOOM

This year Stansted in Bloom will be judged on Saturday 18th June and the presentation of prizes will take place on Saturday 2nd July. As it will be the Queen's 90th Birthday this year, we thought that a Royal theme would be appropriate. Rich colours, such as gold, red, purple, etc. would enhance any display, and the display itself could suggest a royal theme in its shape and design. More information concerning the competition will be in the next issue of The Link and we hope that many residents and businesses will enter this year and make the village look really splendid in this special year for our Oueen.

VILLAGE MAPS

A number of A1 size street maps are being displayed around the village. These are the result of a joint effort between the Parish Council and the Business Forum which we hope will facilitate visitors exploring the village and hopefully using more of the businesses in the village. A3 and A4 maps are available free of charge from the Council Office in Crafton Green.

UTTLESFORD GARDEN WASTE COLLECTION SERVICE

Households subscribing to the service can take advantage of fortnightly collections of their garden waste from their homes between April 2016 and March 2017 for a fee of £40 – the equivalent of just under £2 per collection. Information leaflets, which show what can and cannot be put in the bin, will be delivered with the new bins. A letter will also be issued giving details of the collection week and day, along with a collection calendar. For the majority of residents the collection

day for the garden waste bins will be different from the current collection day for the other bins – so people do need to read their information pack carefully.

To subscribe, contact the Council's Customer Service Centre on 01799 510510.

If you decide not to subscribe or your green bin becomes full you can make use of the green skip service which operates on alternate Sundays from Lower Street car park.

On the 12th June 2016, the Queen will celebrate her 90th Birthday. Communities up and down the country will be organising street parties and it would be wonderful if we could have a number of street parties in Stansted. You may recall that David Cameron warned local councils "not to interfere" and use red tape to make it difficult to have street parties to celebrate the royal wedding. The Parish Council certainly wouldn't want to upset Mr Cameron and we are very keen to encourage residents to get together with their neighbours and organise a street party on Sunday 12 June. The guide states 'Street parties are simple to organise' but they won't happen unless someone takes the initiative and starts talking to their neighbours so why not identify a few neighbours who are party animals, invite them round for a coffee and start planning.

NEWS FROM UTTLESFORD DISTRICT COUNCIL

From Cllr Terry Farthing, Uttlesford District Council The Local Plan Update

The results of the Call for Sites were published shortly before Christmas – these are the sites that have been put forward for development by their owners. The results are available to view on Uttlesford's website at www.uttlesford.gov.uk/callforsites. There is also a very useful interactive map.

A number of sites have been put forward by their owners. It is important to emphasise that just because the owner believes a site is suitable for development does not mean that Uttlesford will share this view. However, we are now in for a period of considerable uncertainty while each of the sites put forward is assessed by planners.

There will be a further consultation in November-December 2016 on the Local Plan (this will include details of the sites that have been selected for development). The Local Plan will then be submitted in March 2017, with the public examination by the Inspector in August-September 2017. We are in for a long and fraught year, with lots of uncertainty. I will do my best to keep you informed of progress.

Simon Howell Reported Uttlesford's Finances

As the member responsible for Finance he has been kept busy in recent weeks preparing Uttlesford's budget for the new financial year, starting on 1st April 2016. He has also been preparing something called the 'Medium Term Financial Strategy' which tries to map how our finances will look over the next 5 years. The Chancellor's Autumn Statement and subsequent announcements by the Government have made the task particularly challenging this year. There has been a general change in the way district councils are financed – though for local residents the one constant remains Council Tax. In particular, the Government has announced a major reduction in our core source of finance from Central Government - the so-called 'New Homes Bonus'. Uttlesford has been identified as the Council in the whole of England that is likely to be the worst affected by this change.

The budget for the new financial year (2016/17) looks to be fine, and the position in 2017/18 will be manageable. Put bluntly, thereafter, we face some real challenges and putting together a balanced budget is beginning to feel like one of those party games that just gets more difficult each year. We are going to

have to be smarter about how we deliver our services and more imaginative about how we can generate more income from the assets we own. However, we are determined to do everything we can to protect local services and to ensure that Uttlesford remains the lowest cost district council in Essex.

Fly Tipping and Litter

Like you, I am thoroughly depressed by the amount of rubbish that litters the roads across the district. I drive a lot for work and, on balance, I think that Uttlesford is not as bad as many other areas. Nevertheless, it is a real problem. Uttlesford currently spends about £300,000 a year on picking up other people's litter (apparently, in the UK we spend £1 billion of taxpayers' money every year clearing up litter). There seem to have been a growing number of instances of fly-tipping in the area in recent weeks – all of which I am pleased to say were promptly cleared by Uttlesford.

Please report any fly tipping or littering you come across to Uttlesford waste and recycling department on 01799 510341 and if you are aware of the culprit's details or vehicle registration numbers of people witnessed littering or fly tipping please call Uttlesford Enforcement who will actively pursue individuals through the courts and enforce fines.

Let's all try to work together to ensure our district is kept clean and tidy, an area that we can all enjoy.

ST GEORGE'S DAY

Saturday 23rd April

St George seems an odd choice for the patron saint of England as he wasn't actually English. He was born in Turkey in the 3rd century, and the most famous legend about him slaying a



dragon only became popular in the 12th century, long after his death. According to the most common version of the legend all the action took place in Libya, where a ferocious dragon was terrorising the country by demanding the daily sacrifice of a young maiden. When all the young girls had been killed except the King of Egypt's daughter, the

King promised her hand in marriage to the knight who could save the princess from being sacrificed by slaying the dragon. Despite falling from his horse after breaking his spear on the dragon's scales, St George was the knight who finally killed the huge beast by bravely attacking it from the ground with his sword.

St George's Day has been recognised in some way since the early 15th century when it was a major feast and national holiday in England on a par with Christmas. But the tradition of celebrating St George's Day waned at the end of the 18th century after the union of England and Scotland. Now there is a growing reaction to the recent indifference to St George's Day and 23rd April is reappearing on the calendar as a date to celebrate all things traditionally English – especially food and drink - and the St George's Cross flag is a more common sight. There have been calls to replace St George as patron saint of England with someone who has closer connections to the country. Suggested alternatives have included Edmund the Martyr, Cuthbert of Lindisfarne or St Alban. (St Edmund was the patron saint of England but was displaced by George some 400 years ago.) Given the current popularity of the name George, my money's on the Turk remaining as our patron saint for a few years yet! Happy St George's Day.

DID YOU KNOW?

Prior to the National Health Service the nation's wellbeing was largely undertaken by a number of Friendly Societies, the principal organisations locally being The Ancient Order of Shepherds and The Ancient Order of Foresters. It was recognised that by paying a few pence a week into a common fund, they would be able to offer sick pay and funeral grants when needed. Shepherds Friendly Society was formed in Ashton-under-Lyne, Lancashire on Christmas Day 1826. The branches of this order were distinguished by their use of the term 'Sanctuary' to describe their meeting place. Associated with the Ancient Order of Foresters, there was one Sanctuary of Shepherds in every district of Foresters. A few members wore a Masonicstyle apron, carrying the standard or a shepherd's crook; some officers held poles with a representation of an owl (knowledge), a palm, a globe and other symbols.



The Foresters Friendly Society was founded in 1834 although its origins go back to 1745. They considered it was their duty to assist their fellow men that fell into need "as they walked through the forests of life". This 'need' arose mostly through breadwinners' illness and death, which left families distressed and often destitute. In Stansted both Societies owned groups of cottages in West Road, Upgrove Hill, Millside, and Bentfield Lower Green, opposite the Rose and Crown. Nationally the Shepherds presented two lifeboats to the RNLI in the 1800s, while in 1864 The Foresters set up the UK's first voluntary Lifeboat Fund.

George Oakshott MA, the vicar of Stansted was greatly taken by the Friendly Societies, and was initiated into both the Foresters and the Shepherds in 1903. He spoke of the Easter Monday parade with full regalia in which he hoped to march stating, "he would like to see every 'Brother' who is in the choir, wearing his sash over his surplice, as he intended to wear his. The church service was at 11.00am. The parade would leave their Sanctuary/Lodge, the Barley Mow, Chapel Hill at 10.30 prompt".



GARDENING TIPS FOR APRIL

Wildflower meadow areas are currently fashionable concepts in gardening. They are particularly beneficial for insects and the environment as well as being very colourful. So how do you do it? The important thing is that it actually requires a really poor scrubby soil, so if you have an area that other plants struggle to establish in, it could be ideal. It also needs to be an area that enjoys full sunlight. It is a relatively low cost way of introducing seasonal colour too. Prepare the area by killing off and removing any weeds and grass, then on a dry day lightly rake, and tread down the area to get rid of any hollows. Sow the seeds from your packet(s) sparingly, read the packet carefully for recommended sowing rates which will be much lower than you will be used to for grass seed. Mixing the seed evenly with dry sand is a useful technique to prevent you over sowing the seed; it'll also assist you to see that you cover the entire area evenly. Pests such as aphids will be attacking the young tips of your roses, warm spring rains bringing a tide of slugs and snails up from hibernation amongst others, so keep removing these invertebrate plant hooligans to reduce the amount of damage caused. Prune/clip as desired evergreen hedges and bushes such as photinia, laurel, bay, griselinia, eleagnus and yew. All these will recover well from hard pruning if they have become out of scale with their location.



Other shrubs such as fatsia, mahonia, viburnums and hebes do not appreciate quite such as hard pruning, so try to only refresh these by taking out or cutting back by about a third of the

growth each year, and staggering the rejuvenation over the course of the next few years.

Our 105 super new baby trees from the Woodland Trust will have been planted by the time you read this, weather permitting. Our woodland workers will also have to protect them during their early growing years as we have deer and rabbits and they just **love** to eat nice fresh young shoots, which is exactly what we hope our new trees will be putting out in the coming months! The strong winds have knocked over several of our shallower growing and weaker trees, both old and young, which will be attended to by our very hardworking and short-handed woodland team. Everything is happening together - it never rains but it pours! With our capricious weather and its interesting and varied 'mood swings', when will the wood's white wood anemones be popping-up and flowering this year?



Our rescue hedgehogs should be on their feet in April, so that is a good time to see one on a Saturday in their Unit in the Compound, which should have all the mud-alleviation groundwork laid and completed by then. This will aid movement of vehicles, equipment, the wood sales and people within the Compound. The area outside the gate at the top of the public path is not in the ownership of the Trust, and can be rather wet, slippery and boggy at times. Many of you will remember that there used to be a pond to the left of the public footpath from Heath Row (the Water Tower side), near this muddy area and the gate entrance into Birchanger Wood, and this used to collect surplus water. Sadly, the pond has been filled in with rubble and therefore does not now assist in draining the area.



BEEKEEPING

For those of you who are regular readers, you will know I keep banging on about stopping the decline in pollinators, especially bees. Bishop's Stortford Beekeepers Association's major objective is to get more people interested in bees and getting the population of bee colonies on an increasing trend. In this context, I am pleased that the British Beekeepers Association at national level has taken another initiative which becomes 'live' from June 2016. The BBKA has launched a web site where farmers and spraying contractors can enter the details of the days they are going to spray their crops, so that nearby beekeepers can close their hive entrances for the day to avoid any damage from chemicals. The web is up-dated on a real time basis so if the dates change because of the weather, farmers can immediately up-date the information. It will also allow farmers to enter the chemicals they are using so the beekeeper can make judgements on what they wish to do to avoid bee colony damage. I will also remind readers that they can play their part in the Government's National Pollination Strategy by leaving one metre of their garden in a natural state, and planting with wild flowers to encourage pollinating insects. In fact, why not leave all your lawn in a natural state and watch sport on a Saturday afternoon, rather than cutting it!





On 1st April the new National Living Wage will become law. If you are an employee aged 25 years or over and are not in the first year of an apprenticeship you will be legally entitled to £7.20 per hour. You can find out if you are eligible using the simple calculator on www.livingwage.gov.uk. If you currently earn less than £7.20 per hour, you should see an increase in your pay automatically from April, so check your payslip. If you do not see the expected increase, speak to your employer. If you are an employer, you need to make sure that you will be paying your staff correctly from 1st April as there will be no 'grace period'. You can find all you need to know, including the new rates of pay at www.gov.uk. Data produced by the Office for National Statistics estimated that in 2014 there were 7,000 jobs in Uttlesford paying less than the minimum wage. We regularly see people who are struggling to manage their finances and who are living on exceedingly tight budgets. Although Uttlesford is seen as an affluent area, there are 1,500 children living in poverty and more than 2,700 households classed as being in 'fuel poverty'; the lack of affordable housing in our district also remains a major problem for those on low incomes. If you are unsure about how these changes will affect you, or you are worried about money, Uttlesford Citizens Advice can offer free, independent, confidential advice and support. Call us Monday-Friday between 9.30am and 3.30pm.

NEW HEALTH CENTRE

Castle Maltings formerly Castle Lotus Garage

It all started for some of us during November 2007 when the NHS PCT proposed a health centre on a site at Foresthall Park. It took us about nine months to demonstrate to the NHS that the site was too small to satisfy their basic specification. Cutting a very long and arduous story short, the former Castle Lotus garage site was suggested which not only satisfied the NHS specification but ours also. We asked for a central village location, close to existing bus and rail transport and a car park. The health centre floor had to be sufficiently large to accommodate an increasing population not only in Stansted Mountfitchet but surrounding villages who were already being served by Stansted Surgery. Two other key elements of our specification were that the new health centre would satisfy the needs of the not so able and that the working environment would be much better for our health practitioners and surgery staff. All these elements of our specification have been satisfied but we have a bonus it is a building we can all be proud of, it looks super and is compatible with the surrounding built heritage as was promised. During early March the scaffolding on the north side of the building was taken down, we can now begin to see the splendour of the design as seen in the photograph.



There is still a lot of work to be done but the target date for occupation is July. We can then say goodbye to Redlands which has served us well for about 50 years. On the ground floor will be a patisserie, NHS dentist, Co-op supermarket and hopefully an independent pharmacist. The health centre is on the first floor, then above that are the 14 apartments which will help pay for the health centre.

I will report more when the building is finished but if you see me in the village, please speak to me and let me know what you want from our new health centre.

We are pleased to say that this went very well and we had positive feedback at the end of the day from the inspectors. They acknowledged the progress we had made and promised to try and complete the report within 10 working days. This would then most likely have to go to the national panel which may take a little longer than expected. At the time of writing we have not had any formal response, but we remain optimistic about the outcome.

Changing the service we provide

As mentioned in the March Link, we are making changes to the clinic structure and appointment system, including:

- Making 50% of all appointments bookable on line.
 Please contact us if you do not have this. You can also get an app for your phone
- We shall be releasing more appointments on a Monday in advance of the day (ie the Friday before)
- Tuesday through to Thursday we shall be offering around 40% of appointments three or more days in advance
- More telephone triage (GP calling you before you actually get a face to face appointment) for on-the-day appointments. This may save you a trip to the surgery.

The new weekend service at Dunmow and Saffron Walden is working very well and our staff will be very happy to book you an appointment so that you do not have to wait through the weekend to be seen.

SEASONAL RECIPE

Rhubarb, Rhubarb

In early April pale pink sticks of Yorkshire forced rhubarb are in the shops, and by the end of the month the ruby-red garden variety will be ready for picking. Pies, crumbles and cakes will be on menus. One of my favourite rhubarb recipes is very simple:

Cut the sticks in to 5cm pieces

Place in an oven-proof dish

Add sugar (rather a lot is needed to counteract the tartness – most recipes use half the weight of the fruit) Drizzle over some orange juice

Cover the dish with foil

Cook in a moderate oven until the fruit is just tender (do not let it get mushy)

When it comes out of the oven add halved orange segments and leave to cool

Serve chilled on its own or with ice cream or crème fraîche. Ginger is also good with rhubarb. Grate or cut it very fine and add to the rhubarb before cooking.
