Our Diocese of Brentwood celebrated 100 years on 22nd March with a Mass in thanksgiving for the centenary of the founding of the Diocese. This was celebrated at the Cathedral of St Mary and St Helena in Brentwood by Bishop Alan Williams. All the parishes were represented by numerous clergy, dignitaries and parishioners and they were joined by Cardinal Vincent of Westminster and Bishop Roger Crow of the Anglican Diocese of Colchester. A special tribute was paid to the Petre family, represented at the Mass by Baron Petre, Lord Lieutenant of Essex, whose members have made a significant contribution to the Diocese and the Church over the centuries. During the Mass a message from Pope Francis was read out, praying that we should 'experience anew the original freshness of the Gospel' and also a message from Bishop Stephen Cottrell, the Anglican Bishop of Chelmsford in which he referred to the friendship and partnership that exists between the two dioceses, which uniquely share the same boundaries. Part of his message read: "I believe God has laid upon us a particular responsibility to walk together and work towards that Christian unity that is Christ's prayer for his Church".

Suffer a serious immobilising ankle, knee or leg injury and you will certainly be offered crutches or a walking frame but not a wheelchair. In other words, you are on your own because the NHS is not obliged to offer one even on short term loan. The Red Cross is the biggest national provider of



wheelchairs in the UK for people who would otherwise be stuck on the sofa! Long before the NHS existed - during World War I in fact - the Red Cross was providing wheelchairs for injured servicemen. Today - and this is an amazing total - the Red Cross loans out 83,000

wheelchairs each year free of charge (although 80% of users make donations). Users are able to return to work earlier, attend vital college lectures and school lessons, get to shops and the pub, and are able to make fewer demands on family, friends and professional carers. Demand for wheelchairs is soaring. Please help us to raise funds for this special Red Cross project by joining us for a Tea Party on Wednesday 10th May 3.00pm-5.00pm in the Day Centre. 

Our nursery class at Bentfield Primary School is changing ... We currently offer free early years provision for all three and four year olds within a designated early year environment within the school. The children are able to take 15 hours each week for 38 weeks of the year from the term after their third birthday. We offer sessions in the term in which they are three, which are paid sessions. From September 2017 working parents/carers of three and four year old children could be eligible to receive an additional 15 hours of free childcare and education a week, on top of the current entitlement of 15 hours. This is because the Government is rolling out its new scheme where eligible families could receive up to 30 hours of free childcare per week. To check your entitlement please look at: https://childcare-support.tax.service.gov.uk/moreinfopar/2 which also links to a useful childcare calculator and information regarding the new childcare vouchers. We are currently considering the views of parents/carers in the wider community by offering a market research survey to find out what hours parents/carers would be interested in. KATHARINE HURFORD

11th June 1923 - 8th March 2017

Many in Stansted will have been sorry to hear of the death of Katharine Hurford at the age of 93. Although until the last couple of years she lived in Bishop's Stortford, she had been a member of Stansted Quaker Meeting since 1982. Ecumenism was very important to her. She was a strong supporter of, and worked hard for, Churches Together in Stansted, where she was widely known, respected and liked. Living in Mountfitchet House towards the end of her life, and no longer able to get to Quaker Meetings, she attended the Rev'd Paul Wilkin's services in the home. Katharine lived her Christian faith, always ready to help others. The fact that she was immensely capable and was a 'doer' was evident from the time she became head girl at her school. Having joined the WRNS in the War, she readily responded when volunteers were recruited 'to do something secret';



this was to be trained in code-breaking at Bletchley Park. She then volunteered to go abroad, and continued the code-breaking work in Ceylon. She was deeply affected there by receiving former prisoners of war, who were in a dreadful state. After the War, she worked for the BBC, then, after she married and had children,

for many voluntary organisations, including Citizens' Advice and Oxfam. She supported children at a school in Kenya. Katharine was very committed to her husband Michael, their two daughters and six grandchildren, but still found time for a wide range of interests. She enjoyed acting, and the fruits of her accomplished artistic achievements can be seen on the walls of the Quaker Meeting House. It is no surprise Katharine had many friends, who cherished her loyalty, kindness and, right to the end, her sense of fun. She will be missed.

A warm invitation is extended to all who knew Katharine, to come to her Quaker Memorial Meeting on Saturday 27th May 2.30pm-3.30pm at the Meeting House, Chapel Hill. This takes the form of an hour of reflection on Katharine's life, during which there is an opportunity for family and friends to share and hear individual and personal memories of Katharine. Keeping physically and mentally active reduces the likelihood of developing many illnesses ie heart disease, diabetes, certain cancers, osteoporosis and dementia. Daily activity of 30 minutes per day at least 5 days a week is recommended but it does not have to be going to the gym! Sometimes it is beneficial to break this up into 2-3 periods of 10-15 minutes. The American Heart Foundation recommends that you walk at least 10,000 steps every day to reduce your risk of developing heart disease. Five lifestyle behaviours that add years to life are identified by the World Health Organisation:

- 1 Do not smoke
- Drink moderately no more than a glass of wine or half a pint of beer a day
- Keep physically active at work and in leisure time
- 4 Eat five or more servings of fruit and vegetables a day
- Control body weight and blood pressure

West Essex GPs set to Design Local Solutions in **Primary Care**

West Essex Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) will take on fully delegated commissioning responsibilities for general practice from 1st April. While the legal liability for primary care will remain with NHS England (NHSE), the CCG will buy and plan the care that people receive in GP practices. Primary care co-commissioning offers the opportunity to fully utilise the knowledge of GPs and build on the relationships that the CCG has developed. The CCG is already responsible for buying and planning the majority of healthcare services, including hospital, community, ambulance and mental health services. By commissioning services in general practice the CCG have more control of the wider NHS budget, enabling it to increase its investment on primary and community services. This new responsibility will also lead to the development of a more collaborative approach to designing local solutions in primary care. The CCG sees it as the beginning of a longer journey towards place based commissioning, where different commissioners come together to jointly agree commissioning strategies and plans for local services, using pooled funds. Dr Rob Gerlis, chair of West Essex CCG and Harlow GP said: "We now have more control of how money is spent on primary care and we can plan at a local level more than ever before". CCGs that have already taken on co-commissioning have reported that the move has enabled the development of a clearer vision for primary care, which is aligned to wider CCG plans for improving health services.

What does it mean for me?

The potential benefits of co-commissioning include:

- Improved access to primary care and wider out-ofhospital services, with more services available closer to home
- High quality out-of-hospital care
- Improved health outcomes, equity of access, reduced inequalities
- A better patient experience through more joined up services

Primary care co-commissioning is one of a series of changes set out in the NHS Five Year Forward View. It gives CCGs an opportunity to take on greater responsibility for general practice commissioning and was introduced to support the development of integrated out-of-hospital services, based around the needs of local people. IMPROVE RUNNING SPEED, WALKING AND BALANCE

Re-learning how to move the toes is an excellent step towards rejuvenating the feet and entire body. Ideally we should be able to wave each toe about individually! The brain has movement maps and the clearer those maps, the better we move. This exercise clears maps made foggy by wearing stiff arched shoes.

- 1 Take off socks and shoes
- 2 Test your balance by standing on one leg with your eyes shut, or bend over with straight legs and see how far down your legs you can get comfortably, or run on the spot
- 3 Lift and lower only the big toe of the right foot, leaving the other toes still
- 4 When you can do this, lift the other four toes up and down, leaving the big toe still
- 5 Repeat step 2
- 6 Repeat with left foot
- 7 Repeat step 2

We usually get a bigger improvement from one foot. This is the foot you should do the exercise with rather than the other.

If the exercise was easy, lift each toe individually. Decide someone has put rubber toes on your feet since they don't seem to belong to you. **Shoes** are necessary to protect the feet from sharp or nasty stuff. Unfortunately, those stiff insteps stop the foot from going through its natural rock and roll. The more supportive the shoe, the worse it is. An expensive, supportive, trainer is like wearing a neck brace; over time the neck muscles will lose strength and movement maps; so it is with the feet. The bigger improvement gained by moving the big toes/four toes of one foot only, is a wonder of neurology. Applied neurology - it is coming! Any questions, please contact me.



MERRY MONTH OF MAY

Birthstone: Emerald emblem of love and success:

Flower: Lily of the Valley after the Greek goddess *Maia*. Month of the Blessed Virgin Mary in the Catholic tradition, May is also National Pet Month, Skin Cancer Awareness Month and National Smile Month in the UK; and Older Americans and National Moving Month in the US. With a Bank Holiday at each end (1st and 29th) this month has the potential to be very merry indeed!

May Day has been celebrated since pre-Christian times with



Bridge into the River Cherwell (a dangerous practice, strongly discouraged). A traditional sweeps festival starting with the Jack in the Green being woken at dawn by Morris dancers is held in Rochester, Kent. In Padstow an annual Obby-Oss (Hobby Horse) parade takes place with revellers dancing with the Oss through the streets and private gardens of the town, accompanied by accordion players and followers dressed in white wearing red or blue sashes singing the traditional 'May Day' song. On the 13th the **Abbotsbury Garland Day** has taken place in the Dorset village of Abbotsbury since the early 19th century. The local school (closed in 1981) used to give the children a day's holiday to construct and parade garlands of flowers around the village collecting money. Celebrations still take place, but in the evening or on the nearest Saturday to the 13th.

Oak Apple Day or Royal Oak Day on the 29th was held to commemorate the restoration of the English monarchy in 1660, and in some parts of the country the tradition continues to this day. Also known as Shick Shack Day or Oak and Nettle Day oak apples (a type of plant gall, also known as a 'shick-shack') or oak leaves would be worn, symbolising Charles II's escape from the Roundheads by hiding in an oak tree. Anyone not displaying such tokens risked being pelted with bird's eggs, thrashed with nettles or pinched, hence the unofficial name of 'Pinch-bum Day' (or 'Bumping Day' in Essex). May Balls held at the end of each academic year at Cambridge University colleges started in the 1830s and are thought to have originally been celebrations for successes in the May Bumps (rowing races) that took place before the university tripos exams in May. Since 1882 the Balls have been held during May Week, which is not in May but in June so the merriment continues!

NEWS FROM YOUR LOCAL COUNCILS

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

The Chairman, Cllr Maureen Caton, welcomed everyone to the meeting and referred to the tragic terrorist attack in London which had taken place earlier in the day close to the Palace of Westminster – the seat of democracy. She stated that we should honour those who have been killed and injured and a short period of silence followed to reflect on the events of the day.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN UPDATE

The Neighbourhood Plan is progressing well in spite of the delays with the Uttlesford Local Plan which is now scheduled for an initial consultation in July this year and final consultation in Spring 2018. We are now at the stage of consulting on our draft objectives and some initial policies.

Consultation Days

We are planning to hold a series of consultation days as follows and hope that everyone in the village will be able to attend at one of the following times:

- Thursday 18th May, 3pm to 8pm: St Theresa's Church Hall
- Friday 19th May 4pm to 8pm: Stansted Day Centre, Crafton Green
- Saturday 20th May, 10am to 4pm: St Mary's Pri mary School

The exhibition will cover various aspects of the plan:

- Housing & Design What mix of housing do we want? Do we need more starter and affordable homes? What should our housing look like?
- Green Infrastructure Do we have enough green spaces? Are our footpaths and bridleways adequate?
 What green spaces need protecting?
- Transport & Getting Around Do we have good walking and cycling routes around the village? What are the main issues facing us in terms of getting around the village safely? Is parking in the village adequate?
- Business & Local Economy Are our shops and services easily accessible and in the right place? Do we need a start-up hub for new businesses? Is our broadband up to speed?
- Sports, Leisure and Community Do we have enough sports facilities, indoor and outdoor? Is there anything missing? Do we have enough community meeting places for all age groups? Are clubs well provided for?

- Health We have a new health centre but do we need any other health services? Would these be accessible for everyone?
- Education How do we see the future of our village schools? Are they adequately resourced? Do they need to change in any way? What about education for all?

Obviously we want your ideas, and so we hope that you will be able to come along to one of our sessions and talk to our Neighbourhood Plan team. If you are away, you can always give your opinion via our website at www.stanstedneighbourhoodplan.com

EMERGENCY PLAN UPDATE

The Parish Council is reviewing its Emergency Plan and making sure all the information we have is up to date. One of the important sections is the list of qualified doctors, nurses, paramedics and other health professions we could call on if we had a major accident or public health incident to deal with. This applies also to interpreters. If you have a relevant qualification/language and are prepared for us to have your contact details, we would be happy to hear from you.

SKATEPARK SAGA

Our "new" skatepark is now almost two years old. How time flies when you're having fun! On a day to day basis the park is well used and generally kept in pretty good



order by the skaters. Some unofficial street art (graffiti to some) has started to appear which, like a lot of modern art, doesn't appeal to everyone, but the Parish Council take the view that try-

ing to remove it would be counterproductive and although it's not exactly a "Banksy" who knows what it might be worth in a few years time!

Behind the scenes it has been far from plain sailing. The company that built the skatepark went into administration which means we have no guarantee on any of the workmanship. We did have some retention money that we would have paid after a year if they had still been in business and able to do some remedial work on the skatepark. After some protracted negotiations with the administrator it was agreed we could use this money for repairs to the park.

The floodlights have also presented challenges. It's a very long and very technical story, but when we eventually got to a position when we thought we could turn on the lights, it emerged that the cabling that had been put in place was not compatible with the lights that had been installed. Trying to sort this has often involved messages from us going through four different parties, but hopefully we have now resolved the issue and by the time you read this the lights will be working. It is a shame that this happens just as daylight hours are maximised, but in the Autumn when the nights draw in we will have the full benefits of the lights.

MEMORIAL GARDENS ENHANCEMENT

Despite the fact that all the money is in place to fund the project, work can't start until we have final approval from the Chelmsford Diocesan Advisory Committee for the Care of Churches (DAC for short). The land is owned by the church although the Parish Council is responsible for its upkeep. This has been a very frustrating project to manage, but we are almost there and we can hopefully start work very soon.

WAR MEMORIAL

2018 marks the centenary of the end of hostilities in World War I. The Memorial Gardens, and in particular the War Memorial, will be the focus of events to mark one of the most important events in our country's history. Peter Sanders' recently published history of Stansted gives a graphic picture of the impact the war had on the village. The population of the village at the start of hostilities was about 2,400; more than 400 men served in the war and according to the war memorial 54 were killed. Glyn Warwick's book *They Sleep in Heroes Graves*, which has the stories behind many of the names on the memorial, is still available from Amazon if you want to find out more.

Over the years the names inscribed on the memorial have been eroded and some are now very difficult to read. It would be nice if we could redefine all the existing lettering in time for centenary events. We have an estimate from stonemasons of £5,600 to undertake this work or about £100 for each life lost in the war. It has been suggested that we seek sponsorship from villagers to cover this cost. If you would be prepared to sponsor a named serviceman on the monument please get in touch with Trevor Lloyd in the Parish Office. If you want to sponsor a relative, or somebody who you feel a close association with, who is named on the war memorial, please let us know. More modest donations are also very welcome.

OPEN SPACES

At a recent Open Spaces Committee meeting members agreed that they will not permit goal posts to be used on Bentfield Upper and Lower village greens. This is for reasons of safety as balls do go out into the road, followed by the people trying to catch them. It was further agreed not to accept an area of land to the west of Pennington Lane, offered by a local landowner, for the provision of an informal kickabout area. There were several reasons for this:

- Safety youngsters would be out of sight, causing safety issues for them
- Ongoing maintenance costs would be incurred by the Parish Council
- 3 The ground can be very wet in winter
- An informal kick-about area is to be provided at Walpole Farm just opposite this site as part of that new development. The commit tee gave an undertaking that it will provide goal posts at that location.

WINDMILL FIELDS

We recently had to remove the bench from Windmill Fields because it had become a safety hazard due to some wet rot and, possibly, a bit of vandalism. The bench was donated about ten years ago in memory of a local resident and our handyman had made a number of repairs to it over the years, but sadly it had got to a state where it was beyond economic repair. We appreciate that it is a location that some of our more senior residents like to spend time at, so we would really like to replace the bench. If you would be interested in donating a bench in memory of a loved one please contact the Parish Council Office.

POSSIBLE TWINNING OPPORTUNITY - WITH RUNGIS

We have been approached by a village called Rungis in France who would like to establish a twinning arrangement with us. They identified us as a potential twin because they are situated very close to Orly airport to the South of Paris, and they felt we had something in common because of our proximity to Stansted Airport. The Parish Council have told Rungis that they will try to gauge the level of support in the village and if the response is generally positive a formal twinning arrangement could be considered. The Business Forum is being consulted, and then we will consult with local organisations and groups as well as residents.

STANSTED IN BLOOM

Hopefully by the time you read this we will have had a a good start to Spring and the gardeners amongst you will be be pleased with the way your gardens are looking. We published details of this year's Stansted in Bloom competition in last month's Link, and if your garden is looking in good shape we would love you to enter the competition. It is a real community asset and could prove to be a vital hub for the village, so surely it is only common sense that Prof Ashok Soni be granted an NHS prescribing licence?

I would like to thank local campaigner Ray Woodcock who has gathered more than 500 signatures in his petition supporting Prof Soni, as I want to see the people of Stansted fully benefit from the surgery, without the risk of dropping dead while walking up the hill to get a prescription. Those fortunate enough to be able to drive up to the chemists, currently have the issue of trying to find a parking space on the main road which is already clogged up with delivery vans, shoppers and passing lorries. The surgery and the pharmacy are a great asset to the community and Prof Soni is a highly qualified medical professional - to not allow him to dispense medication to patients seems like madness.

New Police Base Opens

I am pleased to inform you that we now have a new police station based in Saffron Walden following the closure of the old Station. Police have now moved into the lodge within the council office complex on London Road Saffron Walden. Hopefully this will give a focal point for residents needing to contact officers and lead to better response times to local incidents.

The Local Plan

Work is still continuing on the local plan and these documents are very important as they set out the policies which are the starting point for consideration including the identification of suitable locations for strategic development. As you can imagine, putting together a local plan is a lengthy and complex process which involves gathering much evidence, analysis and cooperation with statutory bodies and consultations. The new local plan for Uttlesford will bring together all major planning projects for the district in a single document and it needs to meet requirements of the national planning policy framework. One of the main requirements for local authorities is to significantly boost the supply of housing and this applies across the country. A strategic housing market assessment helps councils work out how many houses are required and what type. It suggests Uttlesford needs to provide 641 extra houses per year between 2011 and 2033. Councillors are considering a number of options to help them meet this target, being a mixture of new homes in existing towns and villages and possible new settlements. To this end developers are briefing Councillors on a regular basis on a number of options that have been identified. No decisions have been made and a draft document should be ready for consideration in the Summer of 2017.

STANSTED EVENING WOMEN'S INSTITUTE



Our March meeting was our annual Members' Evening. Once a year the regular Committee is given a rest and members take over. They form their own committee and arrange the whole meeting as a surprise. They chose for their theme 'roses'. Thus, all flower arrangements were roses: there were rose petals on the tables; the competition was for anything to do with roses; the raffle had a gardening theme; and the cup-cakes eaten at refreshment time were decorated with edible roses. The speakers were Heather Horner and her son, Calvin and their talk was entitled The Fascination of Breeding Roses. The Horners are a local family. The first passion of Heather's husband Colin (1933-2005) was breeding birds. Having married, he concentrated on his children, but when the family was complete, he tried his hand at breeding fuchsias, then changed to roses, which he and family members did for 50 years. Breeding roses means trying, by trial and error, to produce a new rose with certain features in the bloom that are suited to various climates around the world and are as disease-free as possible. Having chosen two suitable blooms, these are crosspollinated, and the resultant seeds are grown and the blooms produced on these seedlings assessed for their potential. After four years, the new roses go to trial and the breeder hopes they have a winner. Colin clearly had several winners. He was the top amateur rose breeder in the UK and third in the world. He won several medals here and abroad. New roses that pass all the tests are then grown by a commercial company to sell on to the public. The talk was illustrated with slides of their successful roses.

Daffodils and Dandelions, and now ... **Cow Parsley** *Anthriscus sylvestris*

Cow parsley can be seen as a pretty addition to the countryside, but this is at the expense of many other once loved



spring flowers. The increase in this plant has come about due to intensive farming procedures. Most 'weeds' prefer poor soil. It is sometimes known as Queen Anne's lace and may be named from Anne, wife of James 1, said to have been an excellent lace maker; or Queen Anne who ruled until her death in 1714.

Bringing flowers of cow parsley indoors was said to be unlucky, known as 'dead man's flourish'. Herbalists may use it to treat insomnia, respiratory or kidney problems. This plant can be confused with more dangerous umbelliferous, therefore expert advice is needed, and treatments should not be tried at home. Modern scientific research is investigating the possibility of finding anti-proliferative and anti-tumour activities to fight cancer.

Green Alkanet Pentaglottis sempervirens is found in woodlands, and in hedgerows. It is a tall, handsome plant, evergreen, as the name suggests, and from April through the summer it has small, intensely blue flowers, resembling those of forget-me-not, and is popular with bees. This plant has a close relative, alkanet tinctoria. Both are of the borage family. The latter was used by Culpeper for ulcers, and Dioscorides for snake bites. It was also acclaimed for the dyes it produced which are used in cosmetics, furniture and textiles. Green alkanet was introduced to Britain for use as a dye, cultivated by monks to colour ecclesiastic robes. Unlike the expansion of cow parsley, alkanet by contrast is losing much of its natural habitat due to the removal of the hedgerows, therefore might be less common in future.

GARDENING TIPS

Many flowering perennials and shrubs begin to flower now that the weather is warming up and nights are becoming shorter. Some star plants to look out for in May are: foxgloves (digitalis), rhododendrons, clematis montana, oriental poppies (papaver orientale), choisya 'Aztec Pearl', lilacs (syringa spp.), and peonies. Tall perennials such as delphiniums nearly always need staking to support the flower heads, so it is better to get ahead of the game and put in lots of pea sticks, canes or other support now before they flop on a windy or wet day. Rare as they are, it is possible to receive a night frost in the early part of the month, so protect any recently planted tender plants with some fleece if such weather is predicted. Blackfly, greenfly, lily beetle and other pests will all be escalating their assault on your plants over the course of the month. It is best to control them organically by encouraging ladybirds, lacewings and other gardener friendly insects. If you do need to use an insecticide spray, do not use a systemic insecticide on a plant that is in flower, as it will definitely kill all the bees that visit the plant as well as the aphids, and other 'nasties' you were aiming at. For plants in flower, only use a contact insecticide. Any new plants you buy will require a good soak (at the base, not on the leaves) to help them acclimatise and to help settle the soil and push out excessive air pockets. They will also need to be kept moist through the first summer until their roots have found their way down to the moist soil lower down.

'Lost and Found' by Carolyn Wingfield curator, Saffron Walden Museum

Since Saffron Walden Museum opened in 1835, its collections have included 'antiquities' - archaeological finds made by chance or as a result of other activities such as agricultural work or gravel-digging. Organised fieldwork and excavation finds are potsherds, animal bones, flint-knapping debris, building materials or fragmentary objects of non-precious. However, finds of objects made by members of the public, especially metal detectorists, continue to be an important and distinct contribution to the district archaeology collections in Uttlesford with over 50 treasure acquisitions, and rising. Finds must be reported to the local Coroner, through the *Portable* Antiquities Scheme, which has Finds Liaison Officers based in every county and a core team based in the British Museum. Once formally declared 'treasure', the finds are Crown property and a market value is established by the independent Treasure Valuation Committee. The local accredited museum is offered the opportunity to buy the treasure find from the Crown, which then pays the finder and landowner. Typically,



finds are small objects over 300 years old which would have been worn or carried about the person (portable antiquities) and are at least 10% gold or silver. Anglo-Saxon, Viking and medieval rings, brooches and clothes fasteners demonstrate a wonderful range of craftsman-

ship, fashion and symbolism, even secret messages. The most important acquisition, one of national significance, has been the so-called **North-West Essex ring**, a weighty gold signet ring dating from around AD 580 to 650. Coin hoards (groups of two or more coins found in association) are another type of find classed as treasure, which include the earliest gold coins found in the district - a small hoard of Gallo-Belgic skaters which came from northern France in the mid-2nd century BC. For information, visit the museum in Museum Street.

DID YOU KNOW THAT?

Henry Gilbey (1789 – 1842), father to Sir Walter, was a character in his own right, variously described as Innkeeper and Victualler in both Bishop's Stortford and Stansted? Henry was on the box of 'The Old Stortford Coach', Boxing Day 1836, when he made an extraordinary journey to London and back to Bishop's Stortford during the heaviest snow storm ever recorded in this country.

Hold fast! was the word, as the rugs were withdrawn
From the backs of a good useful team,
And dull was the light of the lanterns that morn,
For the falling snow thickened their gleam,
St Michael's proclaimed the hour to be five,
When GILBEY adjusted the reins,
And prepared for a terrible coarse cold drive
Long before the commencement of trains.



SCENIC DOG WALKING

Are you looking for lovely walks in the local area for you and your dog?

As a relatively new Stansted resident, I am keen to discover different walks in the local area for my Labrador and her human. One of my favourites is **Thorley Wash Nature Reserve**, just south of Bishop's Stortford. This walk combines two of my favourite hobbies: walking and looking at wildlife. The Nature Reserve has been designated a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI), and it is administered and cared for by Herts and Middlesex Wildlife Trust and is part of the Stort Valley scheme.

How to get there

The Reserve is 7 km from Stansted. From the southbound A1184, turn left onto Spellbrook Lane East, pass the Three Horseshoes Pub, cross over the railway crossing and two small bridges over the Stort River, and park on the right-hand side of the road, up a slight hill in a shady area. Then walk back about 100 metres towards the river and take the public footpath sign to your right, by a lock. Walk along the



river bank for 15 minutes or so, and cross a small white bridge over the river. Turn immediately right along the opposite river bank and you will see the Nature Reserve on your left. Dogs and humans cannot go in, as it is bordered by a low see-through fence, but you will be able to see very clearly into this beautiful wetland area. The well-signed path takes you all the way round the Reserve. The path is dotted with lovely wood carvings such as the owl below which help make it a very special and unusual walk. I advise you to take binoculars, as the bird life is rich and varied. Some species I have seen are: cormorants, bearded tits, reed warblers and

green woodpeckers. There may also be kingfishers, but I have not had any luck with them yet. The Reserve is noted for its water voles, but they are very secretive and hard to spot. There are many stunning botanical species as well, plus a host of butterflies and dragonflies. The early part of the walk, along the river, is also beautiful, with many species of duck, some rather fierce swans, coots and moorhens. It is a great place



for my otter-like Labrador to swim; she is more at home in the water than on land! Naturally we take care to stay well away from any of the creatures who live here; a Labrador doing belly flops into one's nest does not bode for good human/wildlife relationships! The whole walk usually takes me about 80 minutes, but that depends how much time you take looking for birds or chucking balls in the water for foolish dogs! It is a terrific place to take children, as they particularly love the wood carvings.

UPDATE ON NEW PHARMACY

The M11 corridor, including Stansted and surrounding villages, is subject to considerable development. Stansted has grown by 30% through the development of Foresthall Park and other smaller developments. The Stansted Surgery also serves Bishop's Stortford, Birchanger, Debden Green, Elsenham, Farnham, Henham, Manuden, Mole Hill Green, Plegdon Green, Quendon, Rickling, Rickling Green, Thorley, Ugley. There have been many developments in these places and work has recently started on 3000 new dwellings in Bishop's Stortford. Stansted will see another 213 dwellings within the next few years. These developments will put additional pressures on our village primary care health resources. In addition, the NHS has recently promoted the benefits of "So even if it's just a cough or a cold, seek advice from your pharmacist before it gets more serious".

To satisfy myself if the community supported a new dispensing pharmacist next door to the Stansted Surgery, I started a petition which 501 people signed. More people would have signed it but I decided that 501 signatories would demonstrate that we need another dispensing pharmacist which would serve the southern part of our village and those who attend Stansted Surgery from other places. It would also help serve the growing population. Castle Maltings is connected by Chapel Hill to Cambridge Road where our only existing dispensing pharmacy is situated. Chapel Hill is 450 metres in length with an average gradient of 20:1, the lower half of it is 10:1, a steep hill for the unwell, aged and mothers with pushchairs who are often holding a child's hand whilst walking. Many of these people do not have cars and have to walk. Those who have cars find it difficult to park on Cambridge Road. The next nearest dispensing pharmacist is in Snowley Parade, Bishop's Stortford, over three miles away, which is used by many in our community because it provides, they say, a very good service. Our Parish Council considered this issue at the meeting on 29th March, and agreed to support the application by Professor Soni; this is an important decision and should be welcomed by all. For the reasons described I believe it has been shown there are many 'unforeseen benefits' which demonstrate why Professor Soni should be granted a NHS prescription dispensing licence.



KEEP YOUR DOG UNDER CONTROL AT ALL TIMES

Following on from the 'please clean up after me' piece in last month's Link, I would like to highlight another important responsibility of dog ownership. Within a seven-day period in March our dog was attacked twice by dogs not on leads. The first incident was on a country footpath when a very large breed ran over 100 metres and tried to bite our dog; this was only prevented by grabbing the dog by its collar. The second incident was in the village where a small dog ran out from a garden and started to bite our dog's hind legs. Dog ownership is a pleasure, especially in an area such as ours, but it is the responsibility of all dog owners and walkers to ensure dogs are kept under control at all times. Some people are scared of dogs; not all dogs like other dogs, so leads are important. We reported both incidents to the police who shared with us that this is an issue they are seeing more and more of. So grab a lead, a pocket of poo bags and enjoy the longer days safely.

BE A RESPONSIBLE DOG OWNER

I usually try to be informative in a vaguely amusing way when I write these articles but this month I feel a little rant coming on. We had just returned from a lovely holiday in the Lake District, where even a hardened old vet like me was oohing and aahing over the lambs as they gambolled about the fells, when I read an article in one of our veterinary magazines. It stated that approximately 15,000 sheep are lost to dog worrying every year at a total cost of over £2 million pounds, if you take into account loss of lambs and future potential. Not long after I had qualified, I was called to a farm where two dogs had got into a field of sheep. Surrounded by dead, dying and bleeding animals, I remember thinking, 'this is what it must be like in the aftermath of a battle when you survey the carnage'. It is an experience I never want to repeat and one that should be easy to avoid. The law is very clear: It is against the law to let a dog be dangerously out of control anywhere. This applies to public and private places, including a neighbour's house or garden or the owner's home. The law applies to all dogs, and your dog is considered dangerously out of control if it injures someone, or makes someone worried that it might injure them. A court could also decide that your dog is dangerously out of control if it attacks someone's animal or the owner of an animal thinks they could be injured if they tried to stop your dog attacking their animal. A farmer is allowed to kill your dog if it is worrying their livestock. Owning a dog is a privilege and a responsibility, and we have a duty of care for any animal for which we are responsible; this means proper socialisation and training as well as providing food and water and adequate shelter. There are so many opportunities these days - our nurses run Puppy Preschool classes where basics in training are explained and puppies get a chance to socialise, and there are numerous dog trainers in the area who run classes for all ages and abilities. Vets are happy to offer advice and help to owners if their dogs have behavioural issues, and of course, you can learn how to do anything by looking on YouTube! So no excuses, it is not acceptable to let your dog jump up at people, or run through fields of livestock off a lead, or chase other dogs in the park when the owner is clearly worried. Be a responsible dog owner and keep your dog under control.

Flower-time in the Wood

The beautiful white wood anemone was indeed beautiful, flowering profusely in Birchanger Wood towards the end of March and early April. A truly gorgeous sight, and a tableau of glory in the early warmth and brightness of the sun. It was uplifting, and a joy to behold. In April, the English bluebell will have been blooming in Birchanger Wood - will this be as beautiful and rewarding? The young green shoots from the bluebell bulbs have been quite badly eaten this year, so there may not be so great a display – we shall see.

Bluebell plants are in fact poisonous - they contain a chemical used in alchemy and which is being researched by modern day scientists for possible medical use. However these fresh green shoots are appealing food; they can apparently be eaten by sheep and cattle, and the muntjac deer are very partial to the bluebell leaves. This all causes great damage and loss. Interestingly, and sadly, it would seem in Birchanger Wood, squirrels are the prime suspects for eating the bluebell leaves even though poisonous, because owing to their large numbers in the Wood, their normal food is insufficient to adequately feed them all. It takes a bluebell bulb about five years to reach maturity and to flower. Even in small numbers, squirrels cause a lot of damage in other ways too by eating every fresh green shoot from young trees and the coppiced re-growth, causing the trees to die-back and often to die completely. Additionally, they eat the bark which cuts off the tree's protection and thereby lays it bare for insect predation and fungi growth. With the expanding tree canopy, you are unlikely to see the local buzzards - yes, they are about again - but maybe you will hear them. Certainly, out in an open space when their young start to fly, you will not only be able to see them, but hear them calling to each other. 'My' swallows too are also very noisy chattering on the telephone wires. The first arrived on 31st March, and the second on 1st April.




