## THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

What words mean and how they are used can be the source of endless argument. One word in particular made the headlines in the run-up to the recent annual meeting of Quakers in Britain. That word was God. Apparently, Quakers were thinking of 'dropping God' from a new version of our book of insights, *Quaker Faith & Practice*. Quakers have, historically, had a low profile in the national news media so it was disappointing that when we did hit the headlines it was over an inaccurate and misleading suggestion.

Quakers are deeply committed to building a community which allows diversity to flourish. This includes beliefs and language. Some Quakers do struggle with the word God while others are comfortable with explicit religious references, reflecting our Christian heritage. Speaking on behalf of Quakers, Paul Parker told the BBC Radio 4 *Today* programme that we are not about to do away with God at all, but Quakers had been asking "What is the right language to talk about religious experience today?". Quakers at their annual meeting were united in deciding that it was time to revise our book of insights to reflect how the world has changed since it was last revised. Terrorism, mass migration, same-sex marriage, gender identity and technological revolution are just some of the issues that need to have a place.

A letter to Quakers around the world from the annual meeting reflected on language. "We each choose our own words and together our stories make a whole ... We want the language of our book to be accessible, and also reflect the wealth of our tradition, and of our experiences today".

The letter closed with the words of the 17<sup>th</sup> century Quaker Isaac Penington: "And the end of words is to bring men to the knowledge of things beyond what words can utter".

#### IN MEMORIAM DEREK ROY HONOUR 16<sup>th</sup> April 1927-11<sup>th</sup> May 2018

Derek was born in North London and spent most of his formative years in East Barnet, where he became involved in his local church and was a keen Rover Scout, eventually becoming one of the leaders.

He was in the Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve immediately after the war as part of the ground crew for Seafires and Harvards, nurturing a great interest in such aircraft. On leaving the Royal Navy, Derek worked at Perry's Nursery in Enfield and the London County Council Kenwood Nursery, studying at the Hertfordshire Institute of Horticulture and gaining qualifications in both horticulture and



arboriculture. It was in the early 1950s that he met Peggy during a Scout fund-raising dance in East Barnet and they married in St Mary's Church, East Barnet in 1956. They moved to Stansted in 1958, the year their son Keith was born; their son Malcolm was born three years later. Derek continued to work in London for several years after moving to Stansted, before taking the plunge and setting up his own landscape contracting business, D Honour & Son (Landscape) Ltd in 1978, now run by Keith. Derek retained a keen interest in the development and running of the business until the last.

A lifelong love and extensive knowledge of trees led to Derek being a founder member of the Arboricultural Association. He was the Honorary Secretary for many years and was eventually made a life member and fellow of the Association. He was also involved in preparing British Standards relating to trees and construction, and was an advisor on the beautiful Beale Arboretum created in the grounds of the West Lodge Park Hotel in Enfield, where there is a plaque bearing Derek's name.

As well as making his mark in the horticultural world, Derek also made quite an impression on the Stansted community in his own quiet way. He donated a stained glass window to the Stansted Day Centre; the window was created by Mary Hayman (in consultation with Derek) depicting Richard de Montfichet at the signing of the Magna Carta. Continuing his interest in Scouting he helped start the Tortoises, a Scout group for children with special needs, receiving the Chief Scout's 30 Years' Service Award in 2008. He joined St John's Church where he was an active member of the congregation and a churchwarden for a number of years; he was very ecumenically minded and was an active member of the Shalom Group for many years from its beginnings in 1985. Somehow, he even found time to be a Samaritan volunteer for a while.

As can be seen from the many tributes paid to Derek in last month's issue of this magazine and elsewhere, he was involved in many aspects of Stansted life including The Link where he served as its Editor for 14 years and Chairman for 17 years. It was mainly due to Derek's drive and determination that the magazine has become the high quality publication it is today. I had the daunting task of taking over the Editorship of The Link from Derek, which was made somewhat easier by his unfailing support and wise advice. Derek had a very dry sense of humour and our Committee meetings have never been quite the same since he stepped down.

Although concerned about the scale and nature of its development, Derek never lost his affection for Stansted and its community. He knew that he had a good group of friends in the village and in his latter years was happy to tell them so whenever he was given an opportunity to stand up and speak. When he finally retired, Derek and Peggy enjoyed several happy cruises to Scandinavia, the Canaries and the Caribbean. Derek was a modest, gentle man who led a very productive, active life and will be remembered with affection by the many in Stansted and beyond who had the privilege of knowing him. He will be missed by Peggy, Keith, Malcolm, his five grandchildren and by us all – but never forgotten.

## SPEEDING ON CHURCH ROAD

Did you know Stansted Mountfitchet has an active volunteer Speed Watch team, who are on duty most weeks throughout the year? We are trained by the police and only use approved equipment to operate at Police stipulated locations. We are also only allowed to 'book' vehicles travelling over 36mph.

On 25<sup>th</sup> May we were on Speed Watch duty on Church Road between 3.00pm and 5.00pm, when we booked 36 vehicles travelling over 36mph. The average speed of these vehicles was 38.3mph. Six were travelling at over 40mph, two of which were travelling at over 50mph; the fastest was travelling at 57mph! The legal speed limit on Church Road is 30mph, and with its narrow footpath carries many children to and from Forest Hall School, also parents with small children and many commuters.

Information from Essex Highways dating back to 2012 showed that over 6,000 vehicles were using Church Road during a normal weekday. Since that report six years ago, the volume of traffic on the road has most likely increased; however, at present there is no available data to confirm this assumption. When Essex Highways is invited to comment on a planning application or request to introduce traffic calming measures, it normally refers to the average speed of vehicles using that road. They have in fact recently refused to install further traffic calming measures along Church Road because "The average speed is not high enough". I believe they should be brought to publicly account for this comment. Evidence of vehicles speeding along Church Road has been clearly captured and documented by the Speed Watch team. I would urge the Parish Council to assist us and the Police to get Essex Highways to explain in a public meeting why they have refused to approve additional traffic calming measures needed between the railway bridge and Churchfields.



## New Controversy as Airport re-writes Council Planning Policy

Stop Stansted Expansion (SSE) has slammed Uttlesford District Council (UDC) for proposing fundamental changes to the Council's airports policy based on wording provided by the owners of Stansted Airport, the Manchester Airports Group (MAG). The sweeping changes are included in the latest version of the UDC Draft Local Plan, published recently. As it presently stands, UDC policy only supports the expansion of Stansted Airport up to its current permitted limit of 35 million passengers per annum (mppa) compared to 26mppa today. However, the new policy - if endorsed at a meeting of all UDC councillors on 19th June would remove many of the existing local controls over expansion beyond the current permitted limit of 35mppa (see page 23). Instead, there would be no upper limit on the expansion of Stansted Airport, not even in relation to another runway.

It is no coincidence that the proposed changes have suddenly emerged at a time when MAG is seeking to increase the permitted limit at Stansted Airport from 35mppa to 43mppa. SSE views this as an attempt to shift the goal posts in order to manipulate a favourable outcome to the current airport planning application. SSE has established that the revised wording of the UDC airports policy, known as Policy SP11, was largely written by MAG in September last year and has resulted in the deletion of the previous requirement for airport development proposals to be "in accordance with the latest permission" as well as the requirement that there should be no significant increase in the number of flights.

SSE believes that the wording of the new policy was probably finalised at a meeting held behind closed doors between MAG and UDC planning officers in late 2017. Using Freedom of Information requests, SSE has established that no fewer than 35 meetings took place between UDC planning officers and MAG representatives in the course of 2016 and 2017, including a specific meeting to discuss changes to the UDC Local Plan held on 11<sup>th</sup> December 2017. UDC has refused to provide formal minutes for any of these 35 meetings. This most recent example of worryingly-close liaison between UDC and MAG is the latest in a long line of similar issues where it appears that UDC planning officers have been all too keen to accommodate the owners of Stansted Airport:

- The manipulation of the current planning application to try to leave UDC to determine the outcome and avoid the detailed national scrutiny that would result if the application were 'called in' by the Secretary of State. SSE continues to be prepared to take legal action on this issue.
- The 'Cash for Favours' agreement between UDC and MAG whereby the Council agreed to 'fast track' the current airport planning application in return for staged payments from MAG.

- The discovery buried in an appendix deep within the 2,930-page planning application – that MAG wants to remove the present restriction which prevents it lobbying Government for more night flights at Stansted. Until SSE's disclosure of this issue, neither UDC nor MAG had made any mention of this hidden proposal aimed ultimately at increasing night flights.
- UDC's clear bias in requiring those submitting objections to the planning application to provide their address whereas those supporting the planning application need not provide their address.

This is yet another attempt by MAG to manipulate the planning system to achieve its own objectives. The most worrying aspect is that UDC planning officers seem to be bending over backwards to accommodate MAG, regardless of the impact on the local community whose interests they are supposed to serve. The growing catalogue of concerns about UDC's handling of this airport planning application and the lack of transparency in the council's dealings with MAG make it all the more important for this application to be taken out of UDC's hands and dealt with by the Secretary of State.

Even regulars at the Café will have noticed little difference, but since 1<sup>st</sup> January the Café has been run by StanstedCAN (Stansted Community Action Network), a local charity formed in 2016 with aims to promote social inclusion, relieve the effects of financial hardship, and provide opportunities for children and young people. 

#### Two great walks or cycle trips

For my Notes this month I thought that I would pass on two of my favourite walks or cycle routes which are quite local to us. If you have already walked or cycled along these routes you would know exactly how special they are, and how lucky we are to have them on our doorstep.



The first route is the River Stort, going from Bishop's Stortford town centre to the Antiques Centre in Sawbridgeworth. On a sunny day it is truly a beautiful route to walk or cycle. It is approximately 4½ miles long and in places breathtaking. On this trip you would encounter not only spectacular views, but lots of different species of animal, bird and plant life, as well as the narrow boats cruising along the river. The second route is from Great Hallingbury to Takeley, walking or cycling along the Flitch Way (a disused railway line). If you can get there early, you will see quite a number of deer along the trail, as well as all the birds that flit from Hatfield Forest to the local gardens along the way. It may be difficult to park at Hallingbury or Takeley, but this three-mile route is worth it. Also, you can drop into the forest from a number of gates and walk around the forest at no cost. So next time you are thinking about what to do on a lovely day, instead of battling with the traffic ending up at a resort that is already packed out with tourists, give a thought to two local places that are quite stunning, quiet and great for the kids.

NEWS FROM YOUR LOCAL COUNCILS

#### HIGHWAYS - A FEW MORE QUESTIONS

The Neighbourhood Plan Group and the Parish Council would still like to hear from more residents. Your experience and thoughts are invaluable. A few questions are listed below for your consideration.

- 1 Church Road if the choice is between the existing traffic calming measures or <u>no</u> calming measures, which would you choose?
- 2 Walson Way should double yellow lines be implemented at both ends of this road (remembering it is a bus route)?
- 3 Commuter/airport parking if you are seriously affected by such parking would you support a one hour a day no parking scheme - always remembering that this would apply to residents as well?
- 4 Grove Hill if off-street parking could be guaranteed to residents within walking distance would you support the removal of on-street parking?
- 5 Cambridge Road if more short-term off-street parking could be provided would you support the reduction in the number of spaces for on-street parking?
- 6 Cycling if encouraging safe cycling is important, where can safe cycle paths be created and where would you want to cycle?
- 7 Walking what changes would make it more likely that you would walk with n the village rather than making that additional car journey?

Finally, if the above questions are too easy, is there any merit in considering a one-way system? If you think you have a viable way of doing this please share it with us.

By the time you read this, High Lane should be reopening and the temporary traffic lights on Cambridge Road should no longer be operating. The Parish Council has had a number of calls from despairing residents who are understandably very frustrated by the number of road closures in the village, as well as road works in neighbouring communities, making routine journeys a bit of a nightmare. Councillors have been trying to get the various agencies involved to co-ordinate road closures and to improve communications in order to minimise the pain they inflict on all of us. We live in hope. CRAFTON GREEN PROJECT

Construction work on the new library and community building is progressing to plan. The photograph below shows how the site looked at the end of May.



By the time you read this, all the ground work and relocation of cables should be completed and the building will be starting to take shape. We will keep you updated on how the construction work is progressing in future editions of The Link. We expect building work to be completed by October and that the building will be open to the public early in November.

#### VOLUNTEERING

The "Big Society" agenda that David Cameron advocated when Prime Minister saw "volunteerism" as a key part of how our society should function. Opponents saw this as a way of off-setting cuts in public spending and were unhappy with the idea of our libraries, and other public services, being run by volunteers rather than qualified staff being paid an appropriate rate for the job. The role of the voluntary sector is a potentially contentious issue, but the reality is that, without their contribution, some really important services, targeted at some of our most vulnerable citizens, wouldn't happen and lots of activities that help to improve the quality of life in our village wouldn't be on offer. There is a saying that suggests "If you want something done, ask a busy person" (attributed to Benjamin Franklin). A few of our residents who take on multiple voluntary roles might think that "flogging a dead horse" might be more appropriate as they juggle all their commitments to a variety of charity and not-for-profit organisations!

Many of the most active volunteers we have in our community are at the more senior end of the age spectrum, and it seems to get harder and harder to involve younger residents and train them to take over the more demanding roles when the time comes. People, often perfectly justifiably, don't want to commit to voluntary work because they have demanding jobs and want to devote any spare time they might have to their family. The increasingly complicated health and safety, child and data protection and other legal issues also tend to put people off getting involved, which is regrettable because there are lots of positive aspects of volunteering and it can be very rewarding.

Most volunteers are fairly modest about their contributions and don't expect anything in return, which is probably just as well as your chances of being recognised in the next Honours List, or receiving an invite to a Buckingham Palace Garden Party, are pretty remote!



At the local level, an invite to the Parish Reception (see photo above taken at this year's reception) is one way the Parish Council says thank you to our own voluntary organisations and, if you stay involved for long enough, you might get your long service recognised with an Uttlesford Community Achievement Award.


It's not really about getting recognition, or even a simple thank you (although that's always appreciated), the most important element is the satisfaction of knowing you are making a difference.

There is a long list of local clubs and organisations on page 42, all of which depend on volunteer involvement. If you are interested in finding out more about this they would be delighted to hear from you. Alternatively, you could log on to the Volunteer Uttlesford website www.volunteeruttlesford.org.uk which has lots of information and advice. If you don't really want to commit to being a regular volunteer there are still possibilities on an ad-hoc basis, such as turning out for the village litter pick.

There is a quote which sums it up nicely "Volunteers don't get paid, not because they're worthless but because what they do is priceless" (Sherry Anderson). WAR MEMORIAL

Conservation work on the War Memorial was carried out in May and we hope you will agree that the memorial now looks really impressive. With the enhance-

ment work that was done in the Memorial Gardens last year, we now have a fitting tribute to all those who made the ultimate sacrifice for their country. The photograph below shows the stonemason, Stan Reynolds, working on the inscriptions of the names of service men and one civilian lady, who lost their lives in WWI and WWII.



#### LOCAL GOVERNMENT

Trying to make sense of how local government in the UK is organised, and establishing who is responsible for what, can be very frustrating. Part of the problem is that there are a number of different structures in place across the UK, so how it works in our area is different to how it works in larger cities and other urban areas. This confusion was highlighted locally recently when a number of residents, who had been following the coverage of local government elections in the media, turned up at Bentfield School expecting to find a polling station, only to discover that we don't have an election until 2019. At that point you will get the opportunity to vote, or even stand for election yourself (providing you satisfy all the eligibility criteria), in District and Parish Council elections (but not County Council elections which take place in 2020!) The other thing that residents don't always understand is the distinction between councillors and officers. What you should appreciate is that councillors are elected (although not all elections are contested), they don't get paid but they attend meetings and get to make decisions on the important issues. Officers have a contract of employment and are paid. They implement policies and decisions of the Council, and senior officers often advise Councillors on legal and technical issues in areas where they have gualifications and experience. Officers often have some decision-making powers delegated to them, but they are accountable

If you phone one of the Council Offices (ie parish or district) you will speak to an officer who will try to deal with your query, but you may want to speak to a councillor if you have an issue on policy. All contact details are on page 24.

As this is such a complex topic we can't really do it justice in one article so over the next couple of months we will be trying to explain different aspects of local government to you. Next month we will be testing you with a "Who Does What?" quiz.

#### NEWS FROM UTTLESFORD DISTRICT COUNCIL

#### Cllr Thom Goddard writes

to councillors for their actions.

I am writing this article for The Link at the end of May, for publication in the July edition. If that makes perfect sense to you, then you too should consider becoming a local councillor. After all, the District Council elections are only 9 short months away.

#### The Local Plan

On 19th June, the District Council votes on 'Regulation 19, Consultation on the Local Plan'. If approved, the Local Plan for Uttlesford will move into its final, presubmission phase. There will be a consultation with the public over the summer so please send your views to your local District Councillors and also to planningpolicy@uttlesford.gov.uk.

More information on how you can engage with the Local Plan will be published soon and I hope we will see even more than the 6,000 people who joined in the last consultation. The Local Plan for Uttlesford must find locations to meet housing and employment needs, whilst ensuring the special character of the area is safeguarded. Please note, however, this will be the last chance to express yourself over the Local Plan before it is finalised. National Government may mandate how many houses have to be built in our area, but we should decide where.

#### **Stansted Airport Planning Application**

The planning application to raise the existing cap on passenger movements through Stansted Airport from 35 million to 43 million passengers per annum will be determined by the Planning Committee on 18th July. Stansted Airport is the largest employer in the East of England and so has many economic benefits for our area. The airport is also the single largest source of noise and air pollution, and any increase in passenger numbers will lead to an increase in congestion.

I am sure you have a view on Stansted Airport applying to increase passenger numbers. If you are reading this before 18th July you still have time to express your view, supporting the application or objecting, by contacting planning@uttlesford.gov.uk with planning reference: UTT/18/0460/FUL. Please include your name and address for your views to be registered.

#### Local Heritage List

Uttlesford has created a list of structures and other local assets considered to have significant character. The list includes ancient houses, pubs and churches to telephone boxes, signposts and even water pumps. The list is available in the library, by calling Conservation Officer, Angharad Hart on 01799 510531 or you can email conservation@uttlesford.gov.uk for more information. The consultation closes on 4th July so I hope you can give your opinion or even contribute some new nominations before then.

Agility is a competitive sport for dogs. If you have a fit and active dog, he or she will almost certainly love to have a go at agility training. You may have seen on television some of the competitions that are held at the Crufts Dog Show each year, and these are the very top dogs in the field. However, all over the country there are dogs taking part in agility competitions every weekend throughout the summer and many people travel miles to take part.



There are usually some 20 or more obstacles set out on the course involving jumps, tunnels and 'contact' items, including a see-saw. The dog runs to complete the course against the clock. Any jumps knocked over or contacts missed on the way round count as faults. The height of the jumps depends on the size of the dog. There is also a grading system, so that if you have clear rounds in the lower grades you automatically move up to a higher grade and a more difficult course. To help the poor handler remember which way to go, the obstacles are all numbered. For larger breeds, Border Collies are usually the stars of the show, but smaller poodles and terriers are very fast and do well. If you have a big excitable cross-breed like mine the chances are that he will charge around the course at top speed knocking things over left, right and centre, but the main thing is that he thoroughly enjoys himself and, thankfully, I have never had delusions of reaching the big time! If you are interested in finding out more, go to the AgilityNet website where you will find details of clubs and training.



## **GARDENING TIPS**

Rain is less frequent during July, so conservation of soil moisture is essential; mulch borders with organic matter, farmyard manure, homemade compost, or even old newspapers and grass clippings if you do not mind the appearance.

In the ground, you only need to water recently planted or shrubs and perennials which have been moved. An efficient system for watering plants in a border is to use a leaky pipe or seep hose, as all the water goes straight where it is required around the base of the plants. If you are going away for a couple of weeks, all but the most recently planted specimens will normally cope while you are away if they are in the ground. However, pots will require assistance so that they are still alive when you come back. A friend or family member who can give them a soak daily would be ideal. Ask them to soak the soil and not to just stand with the spray going over the leaves, as hardly any water reaches the soil where it is needed. Alternatively, if no assistance is available, move pots into a permanently shaded position where possible, and set up some kind of reservoir of water. Empty soft drink bottles filled with water and placed in the ground neck first will help, as will a pot tray for the pot to sit in filled with water.



A last minute thorough soak will help. Smaller pots will dry out in a fraction of the time of larger pots; pay particular attention to these if your resources are limited. If, when you arrive home, a pot has totally dried and become hydrophobic (water runs off), immerse the pot in water or apply a slow drip of water until the soil becomes absorbent again; plants recover as long as their cells have not completely desiccated.

### **BARBECUE WINES**

At this time of year, I drink mainly chilled rosé or white wines, but it's not time to forget the reds. Some cooler climate reds from the Loire or Beaujolais can take a little cooling but of course for fans of barbecue ribs, steaks, burgers or sausages then stronger red wines or beers are the order of the day. Grapes grown in hot countries ripen more easily leading to fuller, riper and even sweeter flavours. Often there is higher alcohol and more residual sugar than in cooler climates. These characteristics help match balance the flavours of smoke, heat and spice found in barbecued food. For steak or sausages, I would go for a Malbec from Argentina or Chile. The Chilean Bio Bio Valley 2016 Malbec from the Co-op at £6.99 is good value. For spicier sausages or burgers, I would go for a Syrah from the southern Rhône. If barbecue ribs are your thing then a powerful Zinfandel from California or Primitivo from Italy (the same grape) would be a good match. Try the rustic, ripe, blackberry, spicy 2015 Definition Lodi Zinfandel at £8.99 or the Surani Costarossa Primitivo di Manduria 2015 at £9.99 with its deep prune and fig flavours, both from Majestic as part of a mixed six bottle case.

For lamb, a Californian Cabernet Sauvignon or Australian Grenache blend, such as the spicy and red fruit 2015 Bethany 6 Gen Old Vine Grenache from the Barossa Valley at £9.99 from the Co-op, would be just the thing. Don't forget the whites though. For chicken a Californian or Australian Chardonnay would work well. For shellfish or scallops a Chablis works wonders, or for something to go with oily fish such as sardines or mackerel, try an Albarino from Spain such as the Tres Mares 2016 from Waitrose at £9.99 with its fresh fragrant and slightly saline tangy finish. A great match. Get those fires lit!



Claudia started keeping chickens when she was six and over the years has turned her hobby into a successful poultry breeding business. The presentation covered the equipment needed, type of food: from 'just hatched' to 'layers', pellets to treats, medical issues fowl might encounter, types of hen houses and equipment available, the Law (noise, avian flu etc) and the various breeds and their egg-laying capability. BGP have a mixture of pure breed and cross-breed chickens and they produce 'rainbow' coloured eggs – pink, olive, blue, dark brown, beige and white - which are sold at the Little Hadham Farmers' Market. At the moment there is a two/three month waiting list if you wish to purchase bantams to raise in your garden. As well as really fresh eggs another added advantage is chickens love slugs which are the gardeners' nemesis and they eat most kitchen scraps. Their manure is good for the garden

## UPDATE – ANOTHER DISPENSING PHARMACY IN STANSTED MOUNTFITCHET

Many of you will be aware that the application for a second dispensing pharmacy in our village was refused by NHS England. Our subsequent appeal to NHS Resolution was also refused, after they held a private meeting without any form of public representation. The community are now saying to me, "This decision is wrong, we need a dispensing pharmacy at the bottom of Chapel Hill."

#### Latest update

Since the beginning of the year we have met with local MP, Kemi Badenoch and Parish Council Chairman, Maureen Caton; Maureen fully supports our need. I have also met with the NHS West Essex CCG Chief Pharmacist, who advised me that the CCG cannot directly get involved, but she suggested a number of actions. We have written to the Chairman of Essex Health and Wellbeing Board asking for a meeting. On 7<sup>th</sup> June Maureen Caton, Ruth Clifford, Terry Farthing and I met Ash Soni and John Zucker. We all reconfirmed the need for another pharmacy and agreed on a new action plan, which we have started to implement. **Residents' survey** 

The *Essex Pharmaceutical Needs Assessment* Report April 2018-March 2021 (published in January) states that there was a "Residents' Survey from 27<sup>th</sup> April to 16<sup>th</sup> June 2017". It reports that "West Essex is often under-represented". I have been campaigning for the additional pharmacy since early 2017 and was not aware of this residents' survey! Were you aware of it? If you contributed to this survey, would you please contact me by email. Also, if you have any suggestions which will help progress our need, please let me or our Parish Council know.



Meanwhile, the local Parish Council is planning to set up a PPP (Parish Paths Partnership) with Essex County Council whereby a group of local volunteers will, in conjunction with Essex CC, help in controlled management to maintain Stansted's many Public Rights of Way. Elsenham Parish Council has had a similar arrangement with Essex for some years.


#### Craft Group Knit and Natter

### SWANNING ABOUT ON THE RIVER

It is all happening on the River Thames this month. During the first week in July the Henley Royal Regatta takes place; which when first held in 1839 was completed in one afternoon. Now it takes five days and has become a very popular event on the social calendar in certain circles.

#### Swan Upping

The British Crown has ownership of all unmarked mute swans in open water, but up to the 16<sup>th</sup> century landowners were granted ownership of swans in a given body of water. Each owner marked their swans in a particular way by making nicks in their beaks with a sharp knife and paying a fine into the Royal Exchequer for the privilege. New cygnets were marked in the same way as their parents; the Dyers' Company used a single nick made on the side of the beak, the Vintners' Company a nick on both sides - thought to be the origin of pub sign 'The Swan with Two Necks' (or nicks). This process, known as swan upping, had to be completed in one day by the various gamekeepers along the Thames in the days of Elizabeth I. The only bodies still exercising such rights are two livery companies of the City of London (Vintners and Dyers) who share equal ownership of the swans with the Crown, and during the third week in July the annual ceremony of swan upping still takes place. It's carried out by Swan Uppers, under the supervision of Swan Markers, rowing up the river from Sunbury-on-Thames to mid-Oxfordshire: a five day journey of around 70 miles. The mute swans are rounded up, caught, now ringed rather than marked with nicks on their beaks and then released by the officials representing the Crown, the Vintners' Company and the Dyers' Company. The ceremony is now mainly used to conduct a census of the swans and check their health.



In 2009 our present Queen, Seigneur of the Swans, attended the swan upping ceremony for the first time in her reign and it was also the first time the monarch had personally watched the procedure in centuries. In its 900-year history there has only been one known cancellation of the ceremony: in 2012 when exceptionally high river flows halted proceedings – a sign of global warming perhaps?

## MAGNA CARTA PRIMARY ACADEMY

Magna Carta Primary Academy is only in its second year and so the culture and traditions are being developed each day. With the arrival of new headteacher Marios Solomonides this term, there is a renewed push on healthy living. The brandnew building for Magna Carta, next to the existing temporary site, is due to be finished in July. Developers are including a one-mile track around the site which will enable pupils to take

part in The Daily Mile project, where they are challenged to walk or run one mile every day to keep active. The school is also looking at the food its children are eating and educating them on healthy eating choices.



Marios has joined the Stansted Business Forum and is discussing opportunities with local contacts for parents to use parking spaces in the village. He said: "We are keen to take cars away from St John's Road as there is no pavement and it is not safe for dropping children off at school. Plus, it is a private road and so parking for parents is not permitted. We appreciate the disruption parents and residents have been through while building work takes place on our new school and are trying to find solutions. I am looking at green travel options and the idea of setting up a walking bus to be co-ordinated by volunteer parents. Discussions are taking place to establish somewhere that is safe for parents to drop their children off, so they can walk together (away from the busy roads) to school. This will be a long-term project. Not only do we want to ease the parking situation, it is also about healthy lifestyles and encouraging children to walk. We want them to walk to school and to be moving during the day, for physical activity to be a part of their routine".

Insect-pollinated plants produce a variety of volatile chemicals which attract passing bees, wasps or flies. Gardeners select scented flowers such as roses, lavender, sweet peas, stocks and honeysuckle so we can enjoy their fragrances too. But have you noticed that in built up areas you need to get really close to smell such perfumes? If we can't smell the flowers, then what is the impact on insects? An article published in the *New Scientist* in February this year described how recent research had found that the various chemicals present in traffic fumes quickly disrupt the chemical signatures of these plant fragrances, making them unreadable by insects. Thus, if the vital pollinating insects cannot sense the flowers they need for their essential supplies of nectar and pollen, pollination may not occur, and seed production could be compromised.

Much of the area within the Hundred Parishes is largely rural with low levels of traffic pollution, but there are higher levels of traffic fumes close to major roads, motorways or larger towns, especially those with narrow streets. On sunny days the pollutants in these fumes will be interacting destructively with the volatile chemicals from the flowers, leaving the insects confused and hungry. The Essex Air Quality Consortium was formed in 1995 and now oversees the monitoring of air quality across the county as this has implications for human health. It is more important than ever to have an abundance of flowers in every garden, high street, side road, lane and verge to combat this pollution. Many local gardens welcome visitors during the summer. 


